District 7 Rep. Peterson honored with Golden Triangle Award from National Farmers Union

WASHINGTON – DFL Rep. Collin Peterson of Minnesota's 7th District was recognized this week with the highest legislative honor from National Farmers Union (NFU).

Peterson was one of 33 U.S. Senators and Representatives who have demonstrated leadership and support at the federal policymaking level for family farmers, ranchers and rural communities. Representatives from Minnesota Farmers Union presented the award to him in Washington.

The Golden Triangle Award,

the family farm organization's highest legislative honor, was presented to each recipient during NFU's Fall Legislative Fly-In.

"The Golden Triangle Award recognizes farm and food champions in Congress that display outstanding leadership on the issues that are important to both our industry and our organization. We're appreciative of their insight and devotion to securing the nation's food supply for the good of both American family farmers and consumers," said NFU President Roger

Johnson.

The Golden Triangle, first presented in 1988, symbolizes the core principles of the Farmers Union organization: education, cooperation and legislation. This year's Golden Triangle honorees were selected for their leadership and dedication to improving the livelihoods of family farmers and ranchers.

"Rep. Peterson has long supported Minnesota Farmers Union in its work to better the lives of family farmers and rural residents," said MFU President Gary Wertish.

Digi-Key Electronics Breaks Ground on 1 Million-Square-Foot Expansion

ST. PAUL – Governor Mark Dayton and Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) Commissioner Shawntera Hardy today joined leaders from Digi-Key, a global electronic component distributor in Thief River Falls, to break ground on the company's new \$200 million expansion project.

"I am deeply grateful to Digi-Key for its continuing commitment to Thief River Falls and our state," said Governor Dayton. "I congratulate the company for breaking ground on its new expansion,

and thank its leadership for undertaking this project in Thief River Falls. Digi-Key is one of Minnesota's greatest success stories."

Once completed, the 1 million-square-foot expansion, which will be located adjacent to Digi-Key's current facility, will add at least 1,000 new jobs to the company's operations over the next 10 years. Digi-Key currently employs about 3,200 people in Thief River Falls, a city of approximately 8,800 people. Construction is expected to be complete in 2021.

"The investment Digi-Key has made in our state will be felt by people in northwestern Minnesota for generations to come," said DEED Commissioner Hardy. "I applaud Digi-Key for their decision to expand in their home state of Minnesota, and look forward to seeing this innovative company continue to grow."

During the 2017 legislative session, Digi-Key received a sales tax exemption through the Greater Minnesota Job Expansion Program for \$5 million per year up to \$40 million.

Minnesota Doctors, Nurses and Ambulance Drivers of WWI

Minnesotans rushed to France to serve in Europe before the U.S. entry into the war in April 1917. Individual Minnesotans from across the state joined volunteer organizations, including the Norton-Harjes Ambulance Service, the American Red Cross and the American Field Service (AFS). American males filled 76 volunteer ambulance sections in France long before the United States entered the war. Hamline University was among many schools that formed an ambulance corps for the war. They left for France in the fall of 1917 and served as Section 568 of the United States Army Ambulance Corps.

In October 1916, half a year before the United States declared war with Germany, the University of Minnesota and the Mayo Clinic began preparations for establishing a base

hospital at the request of the Surgeon General. The unit, known as Base Hospital No. 26, organized itself over the summer of 1917 under the auspices of the American Expeditionary Forces and waited for the call to active duty. In December 1917, the War Department mobilized the unit. Many doctors and nurses from Minnesota went overseas with Base Hospital No. 26. Minnesotan doctors and nurses served in other hospital units in France, as well. One Minnesotan couple, both doctors who met and married in France, remained in Europe after the Armistice to address the epidemics that threatened war-ravaged Poland.

Steve Chicoine is best known for his books *Our Hallowed Ground: The World War Two Veterans of Fort Snelling National Cemetery* (University

of Minnesota Press) and *The Confederates of Chappell Hill, Texas: Prosperity, Civil War and Decline* (McFarland & Company). He has been an active Board member and presenter for the nationally known Dr. Harold C. Deutsch World War Two History Round Table in the Twin Cities for a number of years. “Lions Day at the Ralph” was held at the Ralph Engelstad Arena in Thief River Falls

“Lions Day at the Ralph” was held at the Ralph Engelstad Arena in Thief River Falls on Sunday, Sept. 10 at the 2:00 pm hockey game between the TRF Norskies and the Selkirk Steelers.

Except for the fact that our Norskies lost their game, it was a wonderful day for the Lions. This event was in celebration and service of the Lions CENTENNIAL SERVICE CHALLENGE, celebrating 100 years of Lions clubs throughout

the world. Lions clubs were formed in Chicago in 1917.

There were Lions members at the game event from 18 of the clubs in District 5M11, including a few Lions in attendance from Canadian clubs.

The Lions and the public were asked to bring items for collection boxes in the four core areas of service: Hunger, Vision, Environment, and Youth. The TRF Area Food Shelf, for HUNGER, collected at their display over 200 pounds of non-perishable foods and \$44.31 in their cash bucket. At the VISION display, five boxes of used eye glasses were collected, including a big box from Digi-Key. These glasses are sent to a recycling center where they are cleaned, the prescriptions determined, and taken on mission trips to third world countries where volunteer optometrists fit them with people who would otherwise go without proper vision. Lions have donated over a million glasses and are always collecting more. For ENVIRONMENT, the St. Hilaire Lions can

trailer was parked outside the arena and collected several bags of aluminum cans, which netted \$36 at the recycling center. Inside, several bags of pop-tops were collected which go to support Ronald MacDonald houses. At the YOUTH table, 172 children's books and 44 pairs of new socks were collected. The books were presented to the area ECFE Big Blue Bookshelf project and the socks were given to the Violence Intervention Project. The goal for Lions in this Centennial Service Challenge was to serve 100 million people in the three years leading up to 2017. At this point, Lions have served over 180 million people through service in many different areas, and still counting!

“Lions Day at the Ralph” was a very successful day. The public awareness is a major goal, in this, our 100th year. The Lions motto is “We Serve.” The centennial motto is “Where There's a Need, There's a Lion.” To learn more about Lions, google Lions International about joining a club near you.

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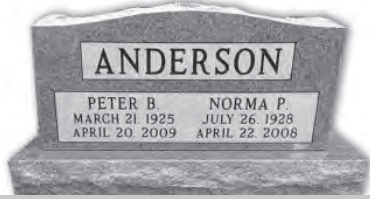

Ask a Trooper

Question: If you are 15 years old and have a farm permit to drive a farm truck, how late at night can you drive?

Answer: A 15-year-old may qualify for a restricted farm work license after completing a driver education course and passing a road test. A restricted farm work license allows a young person to drive alone only to perform farm work for his or her parent during daylight hours, within 20 miles of the farmhouse, and in cities with populations of less than 100,000. The applicant is not required to wait six months before taking the road test for this license. The parent must fill



out an affidavit, available at all driver license examination stations, and present a property tax statement and/or rental agreement.

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Hired Men

Growing up on a farm brought up some interesting stories. When a farmer needs extra help for some reason or the other it may require hiring additional help. My brother and I were still too young so my Dad needed some extra manpower. I recall several of the “hired men” that we had and remember the good and the ugly of having that extra hand around the farm. This recollection is not meant to hurt anyone’s feelings, but simply a look back on some of the things that took place during those years.

I’m not exactly sure how my Dad hired all of the different people that were employed here at one time or another. I imagine a simple ad placed in the local papers was probably how it all started out. I don’t know what kind of job interviews took place or if references were required. Basically, you had to be somewhat ambitious and wanted to come to a farm where a variety of jobs took place. Those jobs could have ranged from doing chores or spring field work to square baling hay or painting the buildings at the farm. There was fencing to do, hogs to feed, cows to calve out, and manure to haul. Some jobs on the farm probably didn’t sound too glamorous to these men but they were looking for work and Dad was looking for help. The dairy cows were a seven day a week job, 365 days a year, so other responsibilities were put on the hired men to take care of. I don’t suppose they were jobs everyone was wanting to do but necessary to get done as part of a farm operation.

There were a couple of men early on that I don’t remember too well but I was told they were good workers but moved on to bigger and better things. Of course, hiring a relative for the job was a little easier and they could even be guaranteed a room in the house named after them. The hired help sometimes came from a wide area so there was always a variety of backgrounds. I’m not sure how they all were enticed to come and work at the farm. Maybe it was the vacation time, hot meals or not so hot meals (bologna sandwiches) or the big wages they were about to receive. Some of the men were even picked up and brought home again, on the same day in fact. There were more than one of the guys that would stay at the house and that seemed to work out good. They were never late for morning chores that way.

I believe there is a saying that variety is a good thing. Well, that was not necessarily true when it came to hired men. Dad took their word when they said they had experience on a farm. That wasn’t always the case so it was frustrating I’m sure for both parties. If you’ve driven a garden tractor that is fine. But that doesn’t mean you can drive a larger farm tractor. The only comparison between the two of them is the word tractor. Maybe it sounded good on the resume.

I know it takes all kind of people to make the world go around and I am not an expert at other fields. However, I always thought that everybody knew the difference between hay and straw. Hay was green and straw was yellow. I guess sometimes a person that grows up on a farm figures that’s just common knowledge. We always had the square bales of hay up in the hay mow and the straw outside in a pile or later on under a roof. I recall doing pig chores and one young man was told by Dad to get some square bales of straw for bedding. Of course, he had no idea which was which so he asked me. Maybe he thought he would get a lecture on which

was which. I don’t think he ever knew the difference between the two. He only remembered what was outside and what was upstairs in the barn. His employment was short lived. Arriving on time is usually important for any job. Maybe the car wouldn’t start or the alarm clock didn’t go off or had to stop for gas or what have you. There were usually several excuses for not getting there on time. I think Dad was pretty lenient compared to other people. There were those guys that enjoyed doing certain tasks over others so one learned that quite fast. I believe that goes with any job. There were some men that I recall would have stayed on longer but they had other commitments at home such as a death in the family. The ones that left didn’t stay on as long as one would have liked were usually the best help. Being a hired man wasn’t excepted to last forever so both sides knew that.

At times, you could have men that were married or just starting families. Dad and Mom had an extra house that was rented out to them. Maybe they took the rent out of the check. I’m not exactly sure. The extra house was only a few miles away so it was convenient. Dad would hire a guy and later would find out they had a brother that was looking for work. It was probably a toss up there on who to hire. One of them had good work ethic and well, the other liked the shade of the oak tree. It was nice to have a nice young couple living in the extra house. But it was usually just the opposite when it came to young single guys. Looking back on the cleanup after they had moved on was something to be desired. Garage was one thing and wood chips in the kitchen another. But dead chickens in the basement topped it all. I won’t go into any further details to save you the misery. Some of the men from around the countryside had wives who showed up from time to time. I guess their husbands had forgotten something or they were lonely or what have you. It became way to regular so a halt had to be put on that.

When Dad would put an ad in the paper for help it was always the thrill of the hunt to see who would come next. One particular man worked for some time when he requested some time off for personal reasons. Never, never tell a person that they seem normal unless you want to see the dining room table leap off the ground. He did apologize and was granted time off, lots of time off, as in forever at our farm. Once in a while, mom would push the clutch down while we were square baling at Emma’s and we would lose a guy off the rack. They were usually patiently waiting and jumped back on the next round. Every farm has low spots or wet holes. It’s pretty explanatory not to head for those areas, at least not on the first around. At least it was only half way up the rims.

For the most part, everyone got along well. If something broke it was fixed and the daily work that had to be accomplished was done. You can learn a lot from these experiences and they learned a lot also. We still have hired men that we have contact with or stop in for a visit now and then. I guess that is something good that came out of all those years when hiring help was necessary. There were long days for sure when the sun was shining and the work was there to get done.

It’s easier to remember the better worker’s that were here at the farm. However, one has to look back and laugh at some of the challenges Dad went through with some of them and be thankful for not having a help wanted as in the local paper.
