Candidates File for Red Lake Tribal Election

Election to be Held Wednesday, May 16, 2018

Forty-two candidates have filed for three officer positions and five district representative seats on the Red Lake Tribal Council. The deadline for filing was Saturday, March 17, 2018, at 4 p.m.

After passing a criminal background check, the candidates will be certified sometime in mid-April. Then, according to Executive Assistant, Tribal Secretary's Office, Audrey Jourdain, the election will be held Wednesday, May 16, 2018.

If a candidate receives 50% of the vote plus one in the general election on May 16, they are the declared winner. If no one attains this threshold in any or all seats, a run-off election will be scheduled sixty days after the conclusion of all certifications, challenges or recounts...probably mid to late July.

The Red Lake Tribal Council at their February monthly meeting, set the dates for the 2018 tribal election. All three officers and one representative from each of four districts will be elected or reelected to four-year terms. Two representatives from each community on the reservation, Little Rock, Red Lake, Redby and Ponemah, and three officers, Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, make up the eleven member tribal council.

Due to the recent passing of Little Rock Representative Richard Barrett, his seat will also be included in the election for a candidate to finish his two-year term.

Filing for Red Lake Tribal Chairman were incumbent Darrell G. Seki, Sr., Vince Brown, Williamette Hardy-Morrison,

Floyd "Buck" Jourdain, and Jim White

With no Incumbent do to the passing of Don Cook Sr., last May, those filing for election as Tribal Secretary include, Michael Barrett, Thomas J. Cain, Jr., Donovan "Mikinaakoons" Sather, Sam Strong, Darwin J. Sumner, and Tim Sumner. (Darwin Sumner, also a Hereditary Chief, was appointed to fill the Secretary slot until this election)

Candidates filing for Treasurer are incumbent Annette Johnson, LaNae Pemberton, Chad Prentice, and Cheryl Marie Thomas.

Incumbent, Gary L. Nelson, Sr., has filed for reelection as Ponemah District Representative, along with challenger Chele D. Kalstabakken.

For Red Lake Representative, incumbent Roman "Ducker" Stately has decided not to run for reelection after 30 years. Filing for the position include,

Dean J. Branchaud, David F. Desjarlait, Donald L. Good, Sr., Karen L. Graves, Michael A. Iceman, Lee Lussier, Jr., Clem H. May, Sr., Jordan May, Paul Smokey Smith, and Julie Stately.

For the Redby District Representative, incumbent Julius "Toady" Thunder has filed for reelection, he is being challenged by Sheldon "Skin" Brown, John Wayne Dudley, Maureen Thunder Lyons, Lester (Moe) Loud, and Thomas Westbrook.

Filing for the four-year term of Little Rock Representative is incumbent Robert "Charlie" Reynolds, Adrian Beaulieu, and Ron Lussier.

For the Little Rock two-year term are, Thomas Barrett, Jr., Marlon Blue, Michelle (Barrett) Cobenais, Katherine "Kathy Spears" Dudley, William (Billy) Greene, and George Chi-Noodin Spears, Jr.

Peterson Seeking Entries to Congressional Art Competition

WASHINGTON – Congressman Collin C. Peterson is inviting Seventh District high school students to submit artwork for the 2018 Congressional Art Competition.

The Congressional Art Competition is open to all high school students and the winning pieces are featured for one year in the Cannon Tunnel, which connects the House Office Buildings to the U.S. Capitol.

"I encourage young artists from across the district to display their talent by entering this contest," Peterson said. "The yearly competition is a great opportunity for local artwork to be showcased at the Capitol and I look forward to seeing everyone's hard work."

The Congressional Art Competition began in 1982 as an opportunity for Members of Congress to recognize and encourage the artistic talent of their young constituents. Since then, more than 650,000 high-school students have participated in the nation-wide contest.

Submitted artwork may be up to 26 inches x 26 inches x 4 inches (including the frame) and weigh no more than 15 pounds. Accepted mediums include:

- Paintings – including oil, acrylics and watercolor
- Drawings – including pas-

tels, colored pencil, pencil, charcoal, ink and markers

- Collage (two-dimensional)
- Prints – including lithographs, silkscreen and block prints

- Mixed Media
- Computer Generated Art
- Photography

All entries must be original in concept, design and execution. Artwork that is a reproduction of another artist's work, including photographs, does not qualify for this competition.

HOW TO APPLY:

To best ensure accessibility for all students, Peterson's office will be accepting all Congressional Art Competition submissions online. Selection of the winning piece, made in early May, will be determined based upon the photograph submitted with the application.

Nell Spring Season begins with program on WWII POW Camps in Minnesota

During World War II, the United States faced a shortage of workers, especially for the smaller rural communities in the Midwest. The shortage of workers, along with Allied countries running out of space, all lead to the United States housing Prisoners of War stateside. Thousands of prisoners from Germany, Italy, and Japan arrived on the shores of the United States before being sent across the country for housing. This presentation, with Historian Matt Carter, will concentrate on those Prisoners of War, with a more specific emphasis on those in Minnesota.

Matt Carter is Executive Director for the Dakota County Historical Society. He holds a Master's Degree in History from the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire and has worked in the museum field for over five years. He has conducted research on the topic of World War II Prisoner of War Camps in the United States for his collegiate senior thesis.

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Minnesota Farmers Union invites farmers and rural residents to Rural Voices Discussions

ST. PAUL – Many elected officials, journalists and others are often asking the question, "What do rural people think?"

Minnesota Farmers Union (MFU) wants to help make the answers clearer. The organization is holding seven Rural Voices Discussions in March and April and invites family farmers and rural Minnesotans to participate in these listening sessions.

"The voices of real farmers and rural Americans must be heard as part of our various policy debates," said MFU President Gary Wertish. "The farm economic crisis has left countless rural Americans searching for answers. We have a Farm Bill renewal coming up, plus we have uncertainty about renewable fuels, trade, health care and rural broadband."

"We strongly encourage all rural Minnesotans to attend the Rural Voices Discussion closest to them."

President Wertish will lead a listening panel along with officials from Gov. Mark Dayton's administration and National Farmers Union (NFU). State and federal elected officials are invited as well. Attendees may bring up any topic for discussion they would like to. MFU staff will take notes at these meetings for future reference.

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How to control common spring pests

Just when winter thaws out and people are anxious to enjoy the blooming flowers and luscious lawns of spring, pesky pests can appear and impact comfort levels and safety.

Many pests resume their levels of activity as spring draws closer and temperatures warm up. The presence of these insects and rodents may cause problems in and around a home, which makes it essential to recognize them and avoid issues. The following are some of the more common spring pests and how to remedy infestations.

Pavement ants
Pavement ants are some of the most common pests residents encounter inside and outside of their homes. These ants are light brown to black with appendages that are lighter than the rest of their bodies. Small in stature, pavement ants have parallel lines on their heads and thorax, according to pest extermination company Orkin.

Although pavement ants nest outdoors, they can enter homes through small crevices in search of food scraps. Their large colonies may not disappear until treatment is introduced. Keep foods in tightly sealed containers, clear counters and floors of crumbs, and address water sources, such as leaks. Pesticides may be needed in extreme conditions.

Fleas
Fleas are tiny, jumping, biting pests that must find a host upon which to live. As

ectoparasites, they feed on blood while living on the body of living hosts. Pets can bring fleas inside the yard and home in warm weather. According to the University of California Statewide Integrated Pest Management Program, flea larvae develop more quickly at higher temperatures. At normal room temperatures, the entire life cycle of a flea is about 18 days.

Several flea control products are available to control fleas on cats and dogs. There also may be powders and sprays to alleviate flea infestations in the home. Vacuuming is also very effective in killing larvae in the carpet and at picking up adults.

Wasps
An errant wasp, hornet or yellow jacket may have survived winter and ridden out the colder temperatures within a home. Once the weather warms, queens will begin to look for places to lay eggs and establish colonies. Treating areas where wasps are seen entering and leaving the home is key. Seal holes as soon as possible.

Although wasps help control other insect populations, their painful stings and potentially aggressive nature can make them challenging to have around a home. If a nest is found, hire a professional to remove it.

Spiders
Many spiders are not harmful enough to humans and pets to be much of a problem. In fact, spiders can be helpful to have

Rain barrels provide an eco-friendly opportunity to repurpose rain water while helping homeowners conserve water and save money. But homeowners must exercise caution when using rain barrels in their lawns and gardens. Water collected by rain barrels should never be used for drinking, cooking or bathing. Pet owners should know that water collected by rain barrels also should not be used to bathe pets. Rain barrel lids should also be tightly secured to prevent mosquito infestations. Secure rain barrels to also protect children and pets from falling in. Overflow valves should always direct water away from structures to prevent water damage to homes or sheds. In addition, to reduce risk of falls and injury, homeowners should be certain that water is not directed toward sidewalks, driveways or other areas where foot traffic is common. Before the arrival of winter, homeowners should disconnect their rain barrels from downspouts to prevent the formation of ice.

Therefore, sealing cracks in a home's foundation and repairing small openings around windows and doors can help keep spiders out. Also, alleviating moisture issues in basements, garages or attics may keep out other bugs that would be prey to spiders.

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does law enforcement do when they come across someone who is deaf or has hearing disabilities?

Answer: This is a good question and as a State Trooper I have come across situations dealing with this on traffic stops, motorist assists and crashes.

Minnesota's deaf and hard of hearing community recently helped create a two-way communication card. They provided significant input in the card's creation, identifying symbols that would be most helpful to them in communicating. The Departments of Public Safety and Human Services collaborated to produce the finished product.

A deaf or hard of hearing person can keep the two-sided, laminated card in their car and bring it out to show to law en-

forcement when necessary. The card features a set of icons the person can point to suggesting the best way to communicate (such as writing or lip-reading) and another set to indicate what help they need. Hospital? Tow truck? Directions? They're all there on the card.

The law enforcement officer can also use it to communicate by pointing to the icon indicating what information they need, such as a driver's license or insurance card. If the officer has pulled over the deaf or hard of hearing person, they can point to icons such as the speed limit sign or traffic light on the back of the card to explain why. There's also a section to help explain what happens next, with icons for things like warnings and tickets.

Along with the icons are helpful tips for communicating, such as, "Maintain eye contact with me while speaking" and "Shining a flashlight in my

face will make it hard for me to understand you." The card ends with a list of things a deaf or hard of hearing person might need if arrested or brought in for questions, like assistive technology for phone calls and a sign language interpreter.

So although traffic stops and flat tires still happen, this communication card can make the interaction safer, easier, and more productive for law enforcement and deaf and hard of hearing people alike.

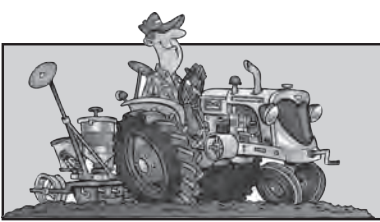

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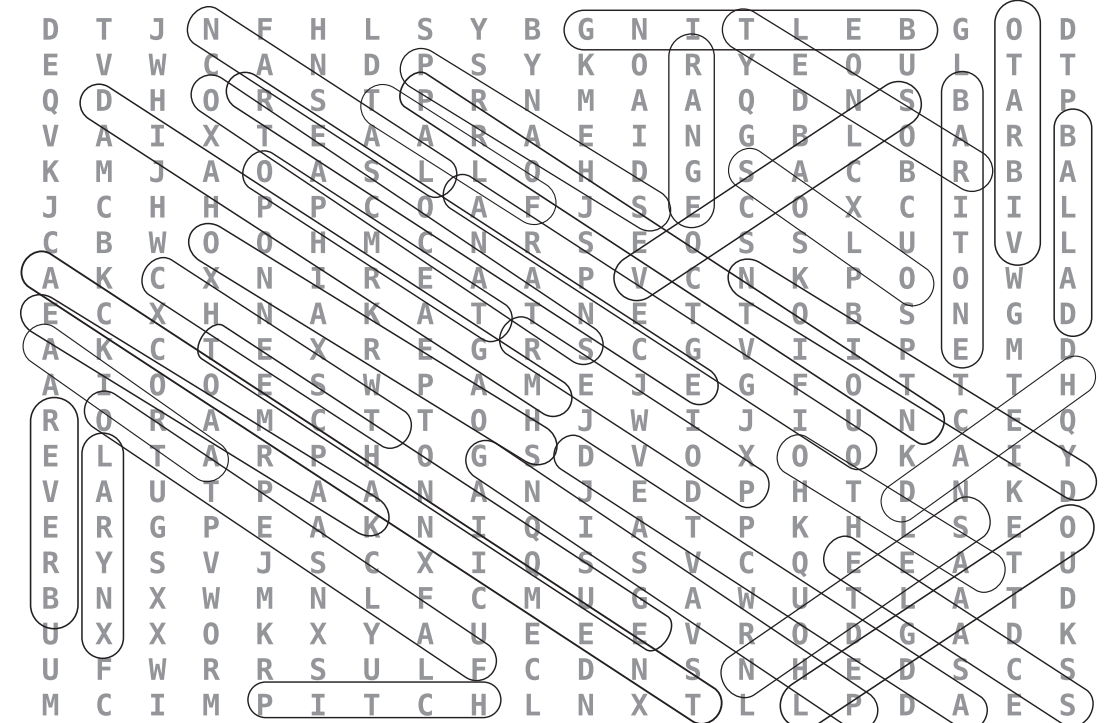

Vision greatly affects driving ability

Driving is a multisensory experience that requires careful coordination and mastery of a wide array of skills. Understanding the rules of the road and having sufficient practice are only part of the equation. Being able to see the road and react to obstacles, signage and more is crucial. Drivers should not downplay the importance of visual acuity when they turn their ignition keys.

Acceptable vision is involved in all components of driving. Motor vehicle operators need to have clear vision to read gauges and operate the controls of the car. Distance vision also is essential to identifying road hazards and seeing other cars on the road. The health resource All About Vision says aging and visual changes at any age can affect a person’s ability to see moving objects while one is in motion - as is the case while driving a car or truck. In addition, changes in peripheral vision can increase blind spots while driving and affect reaction time.

Aging motorists

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that 6,165 people ages 65 and older were killed in automobile accidents in 2015, representing 18 percent of all traffic crashes in the United States, and declining vision may have been a factor in many of those accidents. Older drivers can make certain changes to improve their safety on the roadways.

- Reduce driving at night. The group AAA says by age 60 eyes need three times as much light to see as they did at age 20. Over time pupils get smaller and do not dilate as much in dark conditions at night, making it harder to see. Limit driving at night as much as possible.
- Accommodate for glare. Invest in anti-glare coatings for glasses to minimize glare from the sun and oncoming headlights.



Easter symbolism complements the holiday

Tradition plays an important role in Easter celebrations for many families. Cherished traditions and symbols of Easter may include anything from egg hunts to lilies to lambs. Understanding the importance behind these symbols can make sharing the miracle of Easter that much more special.

Eggs

Eggs are one of the more recognizable symbols of Easter. For Easter egg hunts, eggs are hard-boiled and decorated in bright hues. It’s believed that the origins of Easter eggs are both secular and religious. From the secular (once pagan) perspective, the egg is an ancient symbol of new life, according to The History Channel, and has been associated with pagan festivals that celebrate spring. Some Christians feel that Easter eggs represent Christ’s emergence from the tomb and his subsequent resurrection. Eggs were once a food not consumed during Lent, therefore painting and decorating them to mark the end of fasting and penance became a way to celebrate Easter.

Crucifix

The crucifix is one of the central symbols of Easter and Christianity. The cross is a symbol of Christ’s crucifixion and sacrifice. The crucifix also highlights the ability of God to give new life to people after death.

In addition to wearing and displaying the cross during Easter, some people bake “hot cross buns” as another symbol of the season.

Rabbit

The Easter bunny is very much a secular symbol of the holiday, but one that has become so ingrained with the season that many people ascribe to it a Christian meaning. Pagan celebrations of spring often linked rabbits or hares with the season because of their fertility and ability to bring forth new life. According to the Christian living resource Crosswalk, believers associate the rabbit coming out of its underground home as a symbol of Christ emerging

- Be especially cautious at intersections. The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety says 40 percent of the fatal collisions that occur for people age 70 and older take place at intersections. Taking more time to assess oncoming traffic and make sure intersections are clear can save lives.

- Get frequent vision checks. Annual eye exams are recommended by the American Optometric Association. This can help older drivers be aware of shortcomings in their vision.

Other drivers

Drivers of any age with vision issues should take heed of their limitations and make modifications as needed.

- Driving with macular degeneration. Macular degeneration affects central vision. It happens when deterioration of the central portion of the retina occurs. The American Macular Degeneration Foundation says MD is the leading cause of vision loss. As MD impacts vision, driving may need to be reduced or ceased.

- Color blindness impacts driving. Those with color blindness may need to use caution when identifying traffic signals or the brake lights of other vehicles. It may take practice and driving with someone who sees colors to become comfortable.
- Cataracts can blur vision. Those with cataracts may have blurry vision and see halos around lights that can make driving challenging. Cataracts also may make it more difficult to see pedestrians against the landscape, especially at night. Treating cataracts can improve vision significantly.

Many motor vehicle agency vision tests do not take into consideration all of the factors that can impact vision while driving. Seeking care for visual problems and changing driving habits when necessary can help people stay safe on the road.

New northern pike fishing regulations coming for fishing opener

New regulations for catching and keeping northern pike will be the most significant change anglers will see when they open up the 2018 Minnesota Fishing Regulations Booklet being distributed throughout the state.

"Anyone who wants to keep pike in Minnesota's inland waters needs to take a close look at these regulations and be prepared to measure the pike they want to keep starting on the Saturday, May 12, fishing opener," said Al Stevens, fisheries program consultant with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

The new fishing regulations have three distinct zones to address the different characteristics of pike populations in Minnesota. While not designed to manage for trophy pike, the new regulations are meant to restore pike populations for better harvest opportunities across the state for sizes that make good table fare, up to around 28 inches or so.

"It's almost go-time and we're happy to be at this point after years of discussion on these issues with pike," Stevens said. "This has been a long-running topic of conversation and is becoming reality in the 2018 fishing season."

The move toward new regulations was a response to anglers' concerns about the

over-abundance of hammer-handle pike in much of central to north-central Minnesota; the low numbers of pike present in southern waters; and a desire to protect large pike in the north-eastern part of the state.

The new pike harvest regulations apply to inland waters of the state.

- North-central: Limit of 10 northern pike, but not more than two pike longer than 26 inches; all from 22 to 26 inches must be released.

- Northeast: Two pike; anglers must release all from 30 to 40 inches, with only one over 40 inches allowed in possession.

- South: Two fish; minimum size 24 inches.

Darkhouse spearing regulations for pike change slightly and those regulations are listed in the spearing section of the regulations booklet.

Meanwhile, the new pike regulations do not affect border waters fishing regulations and special regulations that cover individual lakes, rivers and streams.
