Giving Kids a Head Start

Would you like to be a part of a program that makes sure our littlest community members are ready for school when they go off to Kindergarten?

Inter-County Community Council's Head Start staff have begun their annual recruitment campaign. They are out in our communities seeking families with children ages birth to 5 years old to participate in our Head Start program. They will be knocking on doors and making phone calls to households that

may have children in this age group. Our program does have income guidelines, but we do accept applications for families that are over income. You may also know a family and can make a referral to one of our staff of someone you may know that is eligible for our program.

The Head Start program serves the counties of Clearwater, Pennington, east Polk and Red Lake.

The goal of Head Start is to make sure children are ready

for school by the time they go off to Kindergarten. We work toward this goal by working with the whole family in a two generational approach, teaching parents /guardians how they can be their child's first and most important teacher, helping families gain self-sufficiency, ensuring children have received all their preventive medical & dental care, and are referred for any additional services that make sure they are healthy & ready to learn.

ICCC has several program op-

tions to meet families' needs. We serve children across our service area in our home based program that brings a teacher out to the family home to provide weekly services. We also serve 4 year olds in a classroom setting in the communities of Bagley, Fosston, Oklee, Thief River Falls, and Win-E-Mac.

Farm Rescue Hauling Hay to Nebraska Flood Victims

Nonprofit activates Operation Hay Lift to support ranchers affected by natural disaster

HORACE, N.D., March 19, 2019 - Farm Rescue, a nonprofit organization that provides planting, haying, harvesting and livestock feeding assistance free of charge to farm and ranch families who have experienced a major illness, injury or natural disaster, is ramping up hay relief efforts in response to recent severe flooding in the state of Nebraska.

Farm Rescue is again activating "Operation Hay Lift" to haul much-needed livestock feed to ranchers affected by the natural disaster. The organization is calling for hay donations, volunteer CDL drivers and monetary gifts to help support the mission, which will last throughout the next several weeks, as funding and resources

allow.

Affected ranchers are asked to fill out applications for hay hauling assistance, which will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis. Applications can be obtained at farmrescue.org.

Heavy snow was the last straw for buildings around the area

March 2019 came in like a lion, when nearly 12 inches of wet, heavy snow blasted Northwest Minnesota causing structural damage or a total loss to many buildings around our area.

Fosston Tri-Coop was hit hard when they lost a Quonset building at their Fosston location and a shop roof at their McIntosh location all in the same weekend.

Many farmers lost roofs on shops and storage buildings as the weight of the snow was too much for some structures to withstand. Many businesses lost roofs fully or partially. With the loss of roofs, many suffered financial hardships or insurance claims.

Homeowners rushed to get

their roofs cleared as forecasts for additional snow loomed in the future.

How much snow is too much for a home? State building codes require residential roofs to withstand the weight of 35-42 pounds per square foot, depending on where you live. At 35 pounds per square foot, your roof should be able to support 7 feet of fresh snow; 2.5 feet of packed snow; 1.75 feet of wet, heavy snow and 7 inches of ice. Anything beyond these measurements will stress your roof and removal is key. A quick way to check for stress on your roof is to try your interior doors to see if they are closing normally or if they are sticking, which could be a sign of too much pressure from the snow load on your roof.

Polk County Sheriff

Possible drug overdose, victim deceased

On 3/21/2019 at approximately 12:24 pm, the Polk County Sheriff's Office received a report of a possible drug overdose in the City of Fosston. Polk County Deputies arrived and attempted to resuscitate the victim. Essentia Ambulance arrived shortly after and the individual was pronounced dead at the scene. The deceased was transported to the UND Medical Examiner's Office for an autopsy.

Identification of the deceased is being withheld pending notification of family.

The Pine to Prairie Drug Task Force is conducting a thorough investigation into the events leading up to the death. Once the Medical Examiner's Office provides information on the cause of death, further investigation will follow and possible charges will be determined by the Polk County Attorney's Office.

The Pine to Prairie Drug Task Force is a collaboration of investigators from eight counties in NW Minnesota, including Polk County. The Task Force investigates violent crime, including drug distribution and deaths involving suspected controlled substance abuse.

As this is an ongoing investigation, no further comments will be provided.

Green statement re: DNR starting Line 3 comment period

ST. PAUL – State Rep. Steve Green, R-Fosston, issued the following statement Monday in response to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources beginning a 60-day comment period related to permits and licenses for the proposed Enbridge Line 3 replacement project in northern Minnesota:

"This project already has been the subject of intense scrutiny, turned inside out and upside down over the last four years before the Public Utilities Commission provided unanimous approval for work to begin," Green said. "Then Gov. Tim Walz put the project back in court and the DNR says we need to spend another 60 days submitting comments, which I can only guess will lead us to even more delays and red tape. It's pretty easy to see why people get frustrated with our government and I hope people bring the DNR an avalanche of comments in support of the Line 3 project because we can't afford to be silent. The agencies have rigged the system and Twin Cities environmentalists will stop at nothing in their attempts to stall and deal this project a death by 1,000 paper cuts."

According to the DNR's website, comments will be accepted until 4:30 p.m. May 17. Comments may be submitted online at mndnr.gov/line3. Submissions are limited to 9,999 characters per application and up

to four attachments, each less than 20 megabytes. Comments may also be mailed to the DNR at 500 Lafayette Road, St. Paul MN 55155-4025, Attention Line 3 Replacement Applications

Good Nutrition is Essential for Health

We've all heard the old cliché, you are what you eat," but it is true: what we eat significantly affects our health, our quality of life, and our longevity regardless of age.

Studies show that a good diet in later years helps both in reducing the risk of certain diseases such as heart disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, osteoporosis, and some cancers.

Unfortunately, many seniors are daunted by the extra effort that is required to prepare such recipes and may instead settle for foods that are quick and easy to prepare, such as frozen dinners, canned foods, lunch meats, and others that may provide too many calories, or contain too much fat and sodium for their needs.

Participating in a congregational meal program is the perfect solution for many older adults. It allows seniors to gather at

a local site, often the senior citizen center, other public building or a restaurant, for a nutritious meal and activities such as games, presentations on nutrition and other topics of interest to older people.

Each meal provides at least one-third recommended daily allowance (RDA) for nutrition.

Congregate dining sites are designed to accommodate the needs of those persons sixty and older. If you are a spouse under 60, you may also participate in the meal program.

The meals not only provide good nutrition, they also give older people a chance to socialize--a key factor in preventing the adverse nutritional effects of social isolation. Frozen meals that are locally prepared are available for seniors living far from a meal site or for seniors who are physically unable to dine at a congregational dining site.

Hot, home delivered meals on wheels are available from most sites. Home bound seniors may receive meals after returning from a stay in the hospital.

Diners are given the opportunity to confidentially contribute towards the cost of the meals, but no one is denied a meal because of inability to donate.

Are you looking for a gift idea for an older person? Gift certificates for meal tickets are available for purchase. This makes a great gift for those seniors who have everything, for those seniors in need of good nutrition and social interaction or for those seniors who need a helping hand.

It is never too late for us to make nutrition changes. If you have not been to your local congregational dining site, give it a try!

What is the Green New Deal legislation that was recently proposed by Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, D-N.Y., and Sen. Ed Markey, D-Mass.? According to a February 7, 2019, article in the NPR Politics Newsletter, these are the specifics of their Resolution that calls for a series of goals to be accomplished in a 10 year time frame:

"upgrading all existing buildings" in the country for energy efficiency,

working with farmers "to eliminate pollution and greenhouse gas emissions...as much as is technologically feasible" (while supporting family farms and promoting "universal access to healthy food"),

"overhauling transportation systems" to reduce emissions – including expanding electric car manufacturing, building "charging stations everywhere," and expanding high-speed rail to "a scale where air travel stops becoming necessary"

a guaranteed job "with a family-sustaining wage, adequate family and medical leave, paid vacations and retirement security" for every American, "high-quality health care" for all Americans.

While the rhetoric calls for "high-quality health care for all Americans", they are actually proposing "Medicare for all"

which would completely eliminate private healthcare insurance plans. The cost estimate would have a price tag of \$32T over 10 years.

The experts tell us that the Green New Deal price tag would cost approximately \$93T, an estimate of \$600,00 per household in the U.S.

And not only is the Democratic party supporting the Green New Deal and Medicare for all but is also legislating for tougher gun control, proposing higher taxes (as high as 90% for the top earners), abolishing ICE, fighting for open southern borders, supporting sanctuary cities, wanting voting rights and drivers licenses for illegals, and legislating full term abortions...also known as infanticide. Where is this NONSENSE going to stop?

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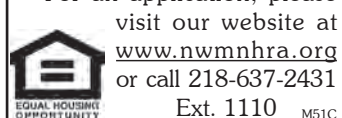

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Ask a Trooper

Question: I moved to Minnesota two days ago. I am living with a cousin of mine in Minnesota. I am writing to you concerning driving legally within the state. Back in my native country, Kenya, I am licensed to drive and currently I have that license with me. I also obtained an international driving permit from the necessary licensing body back in Kenya. Are these documents sufficient to allow me to drive within the State of Minnesota before I am able to acquire the State's Driving License? Thank you for your time and consideration.



Answer: Hello and welcome to Minnesota! If you are visiting from another country with a valid driver's license from your home country, you are not required to get a Minnesota license, and can operate a vehicle legally in our State.

Once you become a Minnesota resident, you have 60 days to get a Minnesota driver's license.

Also, many insurance companies do not honor an "out-of-country license". Being that auto insurance is required to operate a motor vehicle, you would need to get a Minnesota driver's license or ask them about your options.

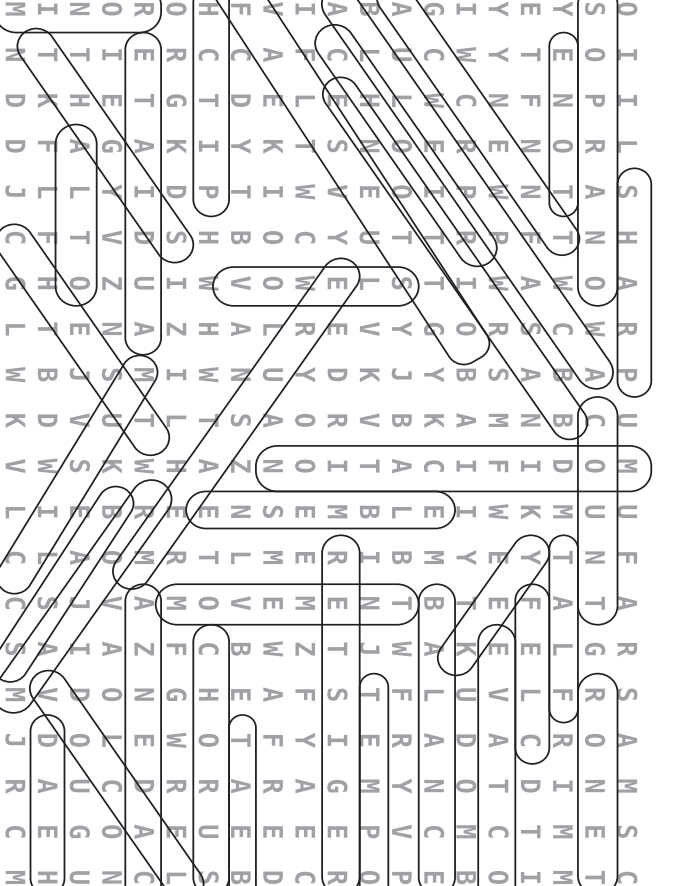

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McKeever Saw ‘Crazy’ Journey To D-I Hoops

VERMILLION — Madison McKeever comes from a small town.

How small?
Erskine, Minnesota: Population 400.

She went to a small school.
How small?

Win-E-Mac (comprised of four towns) has 430 students in Pre K-12 and McKeever's graduating class had 36 students.

"And I had one of the bigger ones," McKeever joked.

She truly is a small-town girl.

It's not as though she jumped to a huge city (Vermillion has 10,000 residents after all), but McKeever is now a starting guard on a Division I women's basketball at South Dakota that has realistic aspirations of reaching the NCAA Tournament.

"It's unbelievable and hard to imagine," she said this week. "Thinking I'm part of one of the top-25 teams. Thinking that we have a chance to get to the tournament and hopefully make a run, it's crazy to think about."

It was something she never envisioned.

Sure, McKeever helped her high school team win a state championship her sophomore season and she eventually became one of that state's all-time greats (she scored 3,298 points in high school), but Division I?

It didn't seem possible, she said.

"It was crazy to even think I'd be playing for a Division I team," McKeever added.

Everyone else likely had the same thought, as well.

Before McKeever signed with the Coyotes — a big event for her school and for Erskine — no other player at her high school had ever inked with a Division I program.

"For how small it is, I don't think our community really understood what that meant," McKeever said.

What McKeever did under-

stand from an early age, though, was that basketball was something she really enjoyed.

She would ride to school with her father, Kevin, who was the school's principal. They would arrive at 7 a.m. every morning, and McKeever would spend that next hour in the gym. Then, for an hour after school, she'd back in the gym — as well as on the weekends.

"Luckily he had the keys to the school," McKeever joked. "I didn't have to call anyone up."

As her career blossomed and she realized she'd like to — given the opportunity, of course — eventually play basketball in college, McKeever said she and her family came to a realization: She would have to be proactive in the recruiting process to get her name out there.

In short, she had to bring herself to the coaches, rather than vice versa.

"We didn't have a lot of access to many trainers or even the media, so I had to go and travel

around," McKeever said.

That travel included a 4.5-hour drive every weekend to Minneapolis for practice with an AAU team (Minnesota Fury), and that team would then travel around the country to play in various summer tournaments.

McKeever eventually committed and later signed with USD, which was coached at the time by Amy Williams. When Dawn Plitzuweit was hired at USD in 2016, she and her assistant coaches drove to meet McKeever, and spent time watching her high school and AAU video highlights.

Plitzuweit's initial thoughts on McKeever?

"There are certain players who just have a different desire defensively, and she has that," Plitzuweit said this week. "She has that light in her eyes and that fire in her belly."

That's how McKeever has become known in Vermillion: A pest for opposing guards.

Defense, she'll tell you, has

always been a passion — her 823 steals in high school ranks second all-time in Minnesota.

"That was my main go-to," McKeever said. "It's always something I've been good at. "With my speed, it helps, and I've always liked pressuring the guards."

It's also one of the reasons Plitzuweit refers to McKeever as an "energy-giver" — she flies around and makes things happen on both ends of the court.

"Because of her size and versatility, she's become a fan favorite with the way she plays and the way she carries herself," Plitzuweit said. "She makes it really fun for our fans to jump on board."

During her freshman season (2016-17) at USD, McKeever was the top reserve for the Coyotes and was named the Summit League's Sixth Woman of the Year. And then last season, she was selected to the all-conference honorable mention team.

McKeever has followed that up with a junior campaign this season in which she is averaging 8.2 points, 3 rebounds, 1.9 assists and 1.3 steals.

She and the Coyotes (26-4) — ranked No. 25 in one national poll was the No. 8 seed and faced off against No. 9 Clemson on Friday, March 22 at 6 p.m. CT in Starkville, M.S. on the campus of Mississippi State. South Dakota lost 79 to 66 on last Friday. While it's unlikely that she'll score 25 points or pull down 10 rebounds, McKeever will likely again factor significantly in USD's performance.

It's what she's brought to the table for the Coyotes since leaving Erskine.

"I love her personality within all of it," Plitzuweit said. "She has a very fun-loving, light-hearted personality."

"When she lets that shine, it's so much fun to watch her on the court be competitive and be loose."

Coyotes in NCAA tournament

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. – For just the second time in league history, two teams from The Summit League will be dancing in March as both South Dakota State and South Dakota have earned spots in the field of 64 in the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament.

The South Dakota State Jackrabbits (26-6) earned The Summit League's automatic bid into the field by winning The Summit League tournament championship back on March 12. The Jacks will be the No. 6 seed and will face off against No. 11 Quinnipiac on Saturday, March 23 at 10 a.m. CT in Syracuse, N.Y. on the campus of Syracuse University. The game will be broadcast on ESPN2.

The University of South Dakota (28-5) earned an at-large berth into the field of 64, becoming just the second school

in league history to earn an at-large bid. The Yotes will be the No. 8 seed and will face off against No. 9 Clemson on Friday, March 22 at 6 p.m. CT in Starkville, M.S. on the campus of Mississippi State. The game will be broadcast on ESPN2.

South Dakota State will be making its second straight NCAA Tournament appearance and ninth overall in the last 11 seasons, the most in Summit League history. The Jacks' No. 6 seed is the highest seed a Summit League squad has earned in the NCAA Tournament. The previous high was back in 2009 when SDSU earned the No. 7 seed and defeated No. 10 TCU, 90-55. South Dakota State's, and The Summit League's, last NCAA Tournament victory came in 2016 when No. 12 SDSU upset No. 5 Miami, 74-71. The winner of SDSU and Quinnipiac will play either No.

3 Syracuse or No. 14 Fordham on Monday, March 25.

South Dakota earned the No. 8 seed in the 2019 NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament. The Yotes join the 1994 squad from Northern Illinois as the only schools from The Summit League, then the Mid-Continent Conference, to earn an at-large bid into the national tournament. USD is making its second NCAA Tournament appearance in school history. The Yotes first appearance came in 2014 as a No. 15 seed. This is just the second time in league history

that a team has earned the No. 8 seed, with the last No. 8 seed being SDSU in 2018. The winner of USD and Clemson will play either No. 1 Mississippi State or No. 16 Southern University on Sunday, March 24.
