Clifton Gustafson was one of 14 to be inducted into the U of M Hall of Fame

The University of Minnesota "M" Club inducted 14 new members into its Hall of Fame on October 15. A former Gonvick resident was among the 14 - Clifton Gustafson, Big Ten champion and first two-time All-American in program history in wrestling.

Family members were invited for the special events that were taking place including the presentation, a Gopher hockey game and a Gopher football game.

The "M" Club, one of the oldest and largest letter winners clubs in the nation, welcomed the 14 newest members to its Hall of Fame in the DQ Club Room at TCF Bank Stadium on the University of Minnesota campus in Minneapolis. The event celebrated the accomplishments of an eclectic group of Gopher greats whose playing careers spanned eight different decades and nine different Gopher programs.

"The 'M' Club Hall of Fame Ceremony is the annual marquee event, providing the university a chance to celebrate Golden Gopher student-athletes who set the highest standards for athletic achievement, both at the University of Minnesota and nationally," said George Adzick, "M" Club

director. "These athletes are the best of our best and it is a privilege to honor those who have created so many special moments and memories in the history of Gopher athletics by forever enshrining them in The "M" Club Hall of Fame."

This year's class of inductees included:
•**Luke Becker (Wrestling)** National Champion, four-time All-American and a key contributor to the program's first two NCAA titles.

•**Ronda Curtin (Women's Hockey)** Program's first two-time All-American, 2002 WCHA Player of the Year.

•**Chris Darkins (Football and Track)** Minnesota's single-game rushing record holder, top-five in career rushing yards and 1996 Big Ten champion in 55-meter dash.

•**Roland DePaul (Men's Hockey)** All-American and three-time team scoring leader.

•**Olga (Splichalova) Espinosa (Women's Swimming)** Seven-time All-American, three-time Big Ten champion and two-time Czech Olympian.

•**Brent Gates (Baseball)** All-American and 1991 Big Ten Player of the Year, currently second on Minnesota's career batting average list.

•**Clifton Gustafson (Wrestling)** Big Ten champion and first two-time All-American in program history.

•**Jack Manders (Football)** Two-time All-American and three-time All-Pro during NFL career.

•**Dick Meredith (Men's Hockey)** NCAA All-Tournament team honoree and two-time U.S. Olympian.

•**Jennie (Moe) Coughlin (Women's Tennis)** First three-time, First Team All-

Big Ten performer in program history and leader in career double wins and career overall wins.

•**Dave Odegard (Track and Field)** First All-American hurdler at Minnesota and two-time Big Ten champion.

•**Joey Ray (Men's Gymnastics)** Six-time Big Ten champion, including four-time parallel bar champion, and 1984 Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient.

•**Bill "Buzz" Schneider (Men's Hockey)** Leader on Minnesota's first NCAA championship team and two-time U.S. Olympian.

•**Byrl Thompson (Track and Field)** Two-time Big Ten champion in discus and alternate for 1948 U.S. Olympic team.

In addition to highlighting the exceptional careers of those heading into the Hall of Fame, the event also recognized all members of the Hall of Fame in attendance and showcased student-athletes who earned a varsity letter in 1965, honoring them with a 50th year letter winner pin during an on-stage presentation.

The induction of the 2015 class brings the total number of Gophers enshrined in the "M" Club Hall of Fame to 334 individuals across 27 different varsity programs.

Clifton Gustafson

(Wrestling, 1936-38) -- One of the earliest stars in Gopher wrestling history, Gustafson was the program's first multiple-time All-American, finishing third at heavyweight at the 1937 NCAA tournament and then finishing as runner-up the following season. Gustafson was also a two-time finalist at the Big Ten tournament, winning the conference title in 1937 and finishing as the runner-up in 1938. Beyond his accomplishments in conference and NCAA events, Gustafson won the 1938 AAU national championship.

Clifton Gustafson was born and raised on a farm southwest of Gonvick, the son of C.H. and Gurina Gustafson. He attended school at Gonvick.

What started him on his career was when he won a \$500 scholarship to the University of Minnesota at the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago in 1934. He received "high man" in sheep judging for the 4-H General Livestock Judging with a perfect score.

He went on to attend the University of Minnesota and during his sophomore year Cliff was talked into representing his fraternity at an intramural wrestling meet. He did not have any wrestling experience but he won the match. His friends also entered him in the "All-University Meet", which he also won. Coaches saw him at the meet and invited him to join the wrestling team.

When he was in high school he suffered from rheumatic fever which damaged his heart and almost took his life. Due to his condition, Cliff decided early on that he needed to conserve energy and depend on his speed. He developed a technique that he called "the Drop", which he continued to

use during his career.

During his junior and senior years at the U of M he was undefeated. As a senior, he was made captain of his wrestling team and also held the record for the fastest fall at the U of M, which was 12 seconds.

He went to the 1938 National Finals in Pennsylvania where he took the National Amateur Athletic Union Championship (AAUC). That determined who would go to the Olympics.

As an A.A.U. wrestler he was on a squad of seven on a tour of Europe. They spent a 3-day round robin tournament in Stockholm. He was well received in Sweden since he could also speak Swedish.

Gustafson won tournaments in Norrköping, Karlstad, Sandviken and Uppsala, Sweden and in Stuttgart and Munich, Germany.

His biggest thrill of the tour came from beating Bohmer, the German champion at Stuttgart. Bohmer had previously beaten Hornfischer, the 1936 German Olympic champion. Adolph Hitler, who had been watching the match, walked out after Bohmer was defeated.

Two professional wrestlers Joe Stecher and Bronko Nagurski with their manager Tony Stecher wanted Cliff to sign on as a professional wrestler.

He returned home to think about it as he was assured of a berth on the 1940 Olympic squad. But World War II broke out and the 1940 and 1944 Olympics were cancelled. At that time he decided to turn pro. He wrestled for ten years as a professional, always in the main event.

He developed a tremendous following all over the United States as he wrestled in cities including Boston, St. Louis, Chicago, Los Angeles, and Minneapolis.

In 1948, Cliff retired from wrestling. At that time he held the Heavyweight National Wrestling Association Championship title. He wasn't impressed with pro wrestling but he liked the amateur style.

He held teaching and coaching positions in area school at Gonvick, Janesville and Sebeke before they retired to his farm near Gonvick. They were engaged in beef farming.

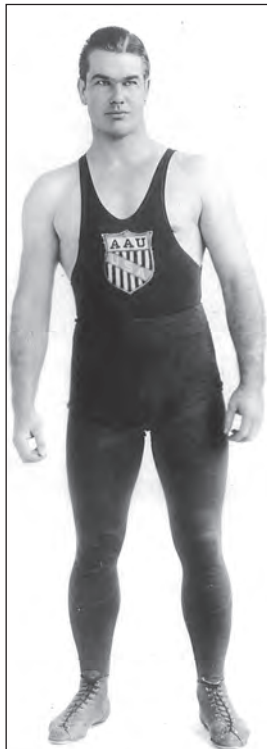
During his retirement years he took long walks along the country road where he lived.

There, plaques for each of the 14 inductees were unveiled on a wall recognizing the entire roster of the Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame, with exhibits dedicated to all 25 Gopher teams, is open to the public during special events and for two hours prior to and one hour after every Gopher home football game. Admission is free.

Peterson announces \$8 million for Minnesota biofuels program

Congressman Collin C. Peterson announced that Minnesota has been awarded \$8 million for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Biofuels Infrastructure Partnership (BIP) program. The funds will be used to expand access to biofuel blender pumps across the state. "Minnesota is well-positioned to expand market access for biofuels benefiting farmers, consumers, and our state's economy," Peterson said. "We know from experience in our state that consumers will choose to use more biofuels when given an opportunity. This investment in the Minnesota program to install blender pumps will improve biofuel availability to consumers statewide and also send a strong market signal to fuel retailers about the economic potential of

installing blender pumps." The State of Minnesota currently operates a successful public-private partnership which has significantly increased opportunities for consumers to use higher blends of ethanol. The State's application for additional resources will expand this operational program. The combination of a strong existing program, significant stakeholder interest, and increased local cash and in-kind commitments makes Minnesota uniquely positioned to provide a roadmap for other states to overcome the blend wall.

Area meetings at McIntosh and Thief River Fair farmland rental agreements addressed in 44 statewide workshops

Average corn and soybean budgets for cash-rented farmland will be non-profitable, according to projections based on currently available input costs and market prices for 2016.

To assist agricultural landowners, renters, agri-business professionals and others, University of Minnesota Extension educators will present 44 workshops throughout the state during November and December. A complete schedule for the "What is a Fair Farmland Rental Agreement?" workshops is at z.umn.edu/10lp. No registration is required.

Rents are the major input cost for soybeans and corn, accounting for 44.5 percent and 28.5 percent, respectively.

Landlords with increasing property taxes increased rental rates during record prices. Now, they are trying to play catch up when budgets do not support current rental rates and other input costs.

Lower rental rates in 2016 would help struggling farmer tenants, but lowering those rates may require some tough negotiations.

A flexible rental agreement may be the best option for 2016. In this kind of agreement, both the landlord and farmer share the price risks; if prices improve, so does the

rental payment. A flexible agreement also can factor in higher-than-average yields.

During the workshops, Extension ag business management professionals will lead discussions about current farmland rental rates, land values, leasing agreements and related financial issues for land owners, farmers, landlords, tenants and agri-business professionals. Presenters will provide examples and worksheets for both tenants and landlords covering the FairRent program, flexible leases, and fair rental agreements.

Anticipation builds for Saturday’s deer opener

Deer hunters will soon head out to the fields and forests in anticipation of the firearms deer opener that gets underway a half-hour before sunrise on Saturday, Nov. 7.

“Many hunters look forward to deer season all year as a way to enjoy nature and the outdoors, and reconnect with family,” said Steve Merchant, wildlife populations and regulations program manager with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. “Hunters also enjoy seeing deer, and the good news is there should be more deer out there this year.”

Deer populations are on the rise following a milder winter and a conservative hunting season last year. This season will again be a conservative one, which means fewer antlerless deer permits were issued. Harvesting fewer does allows deer populations to grow and helps provide more opportunity in the future.

Here are some other reminders from the DNR for the Minnesota firearms deer season.

Check regulations
The DNR strongly advises

hunters to review new deer hunting regulations, permit area designations and boundary changes. Current and up-to-date information is available at www.mndnr.gov/hunting/deer.

Buy license
With nearly 500,000 firearms deer hunters in the state, the DNR encourages hunters to purchase their licenses early to avoid long lines and any potential system issues associated with the high sales volume. A list of DNR license agents across Minnesota can be found at www.mndnr.gov/licenses/agents.html.

Changes in 2015 affect when licenses are valid if purchased after a season is open. A deer hunting license purchased after a season is open is valid the same day of purchase if purchased prior to the beginning of legal shooting hours. If the license is purchased after legal shooting hours have begun, then the license is valid the following day.

Register deer
Deer must be registered within 48 hours after the deer

was taken, before being processed and before antlers are removed. Hunters can register deer they harvest by making a telephone call, using the Internet or bringing deer to a big-game registration station. Hunters need to provide accurate information when registering. It is a violation to register a deer as taken in a permit area different from where it was actually taken. Registration instructions for all methods are available at www.mndnr.gov/gameregistrationhelp. Registration is important because it provides harvest data used for management of deer populations.

Projected harvest
The 2015 season will be the second year of a management approach to rebuild deer populations in areas below population goals. The DNR is projecting the 2015 total harvest to be between 140,000 to 155,000 deer. The 2014 total harvest after last year’s conservative season was just over 139,000. 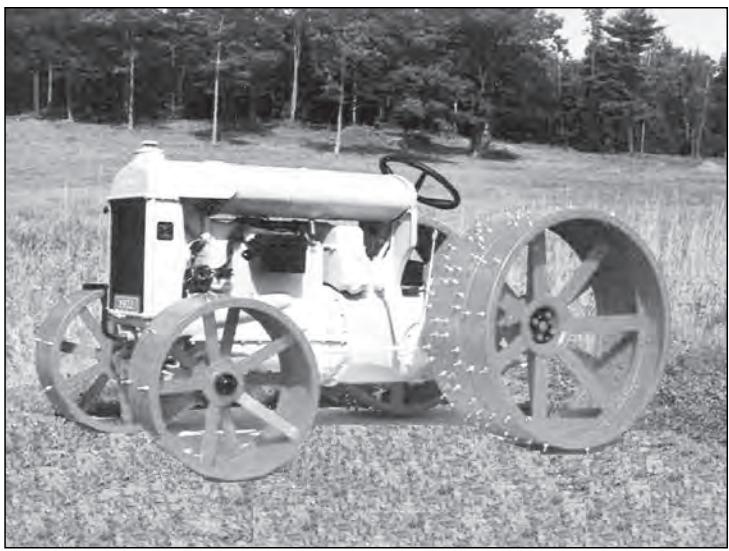
Tractor Trivia

Fordson Tractors by Eric Mickelson Henry Ford grew up outside Detroit, Michigan, on a small farm that used the power of the day....horses. One of the drawbacks of this era of agriculture was that each horse used 5 acres of the farms production to supply them with the energy they needed to do their job.

Shortly after the turn of the century Henry Ford began experimenting with tractor production, using automobile parts. The name "tractor" wasn't actually used. Ford called his experiment the Automobile Plow. His first attempt at the Automobile Plow in 1907 is on display at the Henry Ford museum.

At the same time a group of investors in Minneapolis started their own Ford Tractor company. They hoped Henry Ford would pay them to get the sole use of his name on his "tractors." But Ford solved this problem by incorporating his investment partner and son, Edsel, in the new venture. The tractor company came to be named Ford and Son, or Fordson. This was the birth of

the Fordson Tractor Company. In November of 1917 the Fordson was put into production. It was the first lightweight tractor to be mass produced in the world. Using Ford's mass production methods now the "average" farmer could afford a tractor!! The original Fordson produced about 20 horsepower and featured a three speed transmission. Because of it's gearing only about 10 hp actually made it to the drawbar. US production of the Fordson ceased in 1928, although British production continued until 1946. More Fordson tractors were produced than any other tractor model, 750,000. Even though so many were produced some farmers were not happy with the Fordson. Some missed the connection with the horses they had grown used to working with. Because of the way it was hitched to some implements of the day the Fordson sometimes was prone to flipping over backwards causing accidents, injury and death. There were also some complaints about the fact that sometimes the Fordsons were difficult to start. Because of these

early Fordsons many new entrepreneurs began to throw their hats into the new industry of agricultural tractor production. Most of them worked hard to design something that would compete with the Fordson!!

Did you know?

The origins of Veterans Day can be traced to the ending of World War I nearly a century ago. Known at the time as "The Great War," World War I officially ended on June 28, 1919 with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles in France. But the fighting had actually ended seven months earlier when an armistice between the Allies and Germany went into effect on November 11, 1918. The following November United States President Woodrow Wilson declared November 11 "Armistice Day" in honor of the cessation of the hostilities, and the day became a federal holiday in 1938. That act was amended in 1954 after veterans service organizations, in recognition of the efforts of soldiers who fought in World War II, asked that the day be renamed "Veterans Day" so it honored all soldiers and not just those who fought in World War I.

Ask a Trooper

Question: Your advice in one of your last articles, really, keep your plate visible at all times? You are advocating that at night, in a snow storm, under very poor visibility, that I pull over every few miles to clean the plate? If I fail to do so I can be ticketed? What is more important here, a person's safety or obeying the law? I realize you can only answer this by reciting what the law is, and you cannot be on the record condoning law breaking. In my opinion any law enforcement official who would not allow for winter time travel conditions should be given a good talking to by his/her superior. I do have knowledge of an incident that this occurred with a relative. Please do not take this email as angry in tone. Also in my opinion, the best officers are the ones that don't always enforce by the letter of the law but can see the gray areas. Thank you for your columns, they often clarify or bring new knowledge about traffic laws. Have a good day.

Answer: Thank you for the question, and I will most certainly clarify the article on "obstructed taillights and license plates."

In that article I mention, "If any part of the taillight or license plate is blocked by a bike, carrier or any other object, it is illegal and you may get stopped and possibly cited for it." That is the simple explanation of the law and "any other object" could include snow. The person

asking the question in that article stated they were "once pulled over for snow obstructing their rear plate during a blizzard..."

You ask what is more important - safety or obeying the law? I believe they go hand in hand, along with common sense. If taillights or license plates become obstructed, it is the driver's responsibility to keep them visible. Get in the habit of regularly checking them. Most of the time, this will be at the start of your trip and at the end. If you find yourself fueling up in-between, this would also be a good time. In other situations, find a safe and legal place to pull over.

In the event of inclement weather like a blizzard, law enforcement will most likely be very busy with crashes, vehicles getting stuck in the ditch/median, and assisting stranded motorists. But when time does allow me to address snow covered taillights and license plates, I'll have a quick chat with the driver to remind them of the issue and get them safely on their way.

Fire Away!

Your Firearms Questions Answered By Mike Illies, Manager of Black Bear Firearms Instruction LLC



We are on the verge of another firearms deer hunting season and the feeling to reminisce is strong. Many hunters recall their first deer, but what about their first deer rifle? When I first started hunting, many years ago, most families did not have the money or credit line that they do now, so the first deer rifle was often borrowed from a friend or relative and was often an older beat-up one – one that could get dropped, scratched, or even lost without the owner getting too upset. Old Italian Carcano's and war torn surplus mausers were pretty common. These rifles were often called the "truck gun" because they could bounce around behind the seat of the truck without adding any more damage than was already there. Other common first guns were old 30-30 Winchester rifles. A decent used 30-30 could be had in any pawn shop for under \$100 and sold for about the same the day after season ended. I actually knew of a few fellows who did just that. In those days deer meant venison and the goal was to fill the freezer, expensive guns were not practical. I myself hunted with an old borrowed bolt action .410 shotgun. It was older than my father. While it worked, it was nothing to brag about. I was taught that no shot was to be taken unless it was one guaranteed to put down the deer as quick and painlessly as possible. We were expected to accomplish this with one round. This meant passing up a lot of deer. To wound a deer or lose it due to a poor shot was the ultimate shame. I didn't have a lot of confidence in that old .410 with the bead sight. The deer had to be close, standing still, and broadside before I would think of taking a shot. That year, I had no shot. The second year I upgraded to a Savage 99E in .308 Winchester – also borrowed. This one had more power and was a lot more accurate. At the time, the savage 99 rifles were thought to be an odd but slick lever gun. They

were nice but nothing all that special and commonly seen in the woods and on used gun racks. Nowadays, you never see them in the woods. Savage quit making them and all of a sudden they became collectables commanding ridiculous prices way out of proportion to their utility. I got my first deer with that old savage. The third year, I was able to find a .30-06 bolt gun. The newspaper money I was saving was put to good use and that has been my deer rifle ever since.

As I got older, first rifle trends changed. The surplus guns were still common, but the older Springfields, Enfields, and unmodified Mausers had become more collectible and fewer and fewer 94 Winchesters were seen – they had also become "collectibles". SKS rifles however, were everywhere. With power close to the 30-30 and a cost around \$75, they were the perfect "truck gun" and loaner deer rifle. The current trend is somewhat fascinating to me. Almost all of the major rifle manufacturers now offer various youth models of their rifles. These rifles are tailored specifically to the younger small framed shooter by using shorter light weight stocks and barrels and chambering low-recoil calibers. Even at prices more than double that of a good rifle ten years ago, they seem to be very popular. The days when you could get decent but cheap high powered surplus rifles are probably gone. At the same time, families that hunt are more likely to have more than one rifle today, so the old custom of borrowing one, or needing a loaner to lend to a young relative are not as prevalent. Enjoy this upcoming hunting season and from our house to yours - happy hunting. We wish you a safe and successful hunt. Until next time, keep both eyes open.

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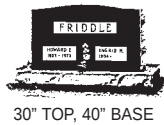

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Polluted: Garbage and Fishing Don't Mix

It's a beautiful day - perfect for fishing. Your kids are really excited about this day! You gather the fishing equipment, pile in the car and stop by the local bait shop for some shiners before you head to your favorite fishing spot along the river. When you get there, you see a sign saying "Polluted: No Fishing." You look around and there is garbage everywhere: in the trees, in the brush, along the banks and even in the water...

It is virtually impossible to live in this day and age and not create garbage. But, the type of garbage we create and where it goes is sometimes an issue. When not handled properly, trash that comes with fishing can injure aquatic life and people and ruin a perfectly good fishing outing. Trash items, no matter how small, are unsightly and are a sign of human neglect or disregard for aesthetic value and our natural resources. Consider following these tips:

1. Take particular care to properly dispose of nylon fishing line. In the water, it can entangle fish, wildlife, swimmers, and boat propellers. You can recycle fishing line at many tackle shops.
2. Don't toss any trash overboard, including cigarette butts. They are small and light and are easily blown from place to place or washed into the stormwater system which carries 1 in every 10 dropped butts into our lakes, rivers and streams.
3. When fishing from a boat, store trash securely so it does not fly away while boating.
4. When fishing from shore, dispose of bait containers and other garbage properly.
5. Be a good watershed neighbor and pick up trash that you come across, either flowing in the water or on land.
6. Use the appropriate trash receptacles. If a trash can is full, find another that has room for your trash.
7. If possible, separate recyclable materials and bring them to a recycling center or drop off site.

Research has shown that people are more likely to behave in ways that preserve our waterways if they are clean in the first place. If a stream bank or shoreline already has litter, people are more likely to continue littering. Individuals can take the initiative by cleaning up streamside trash and by disposing of trash properly.

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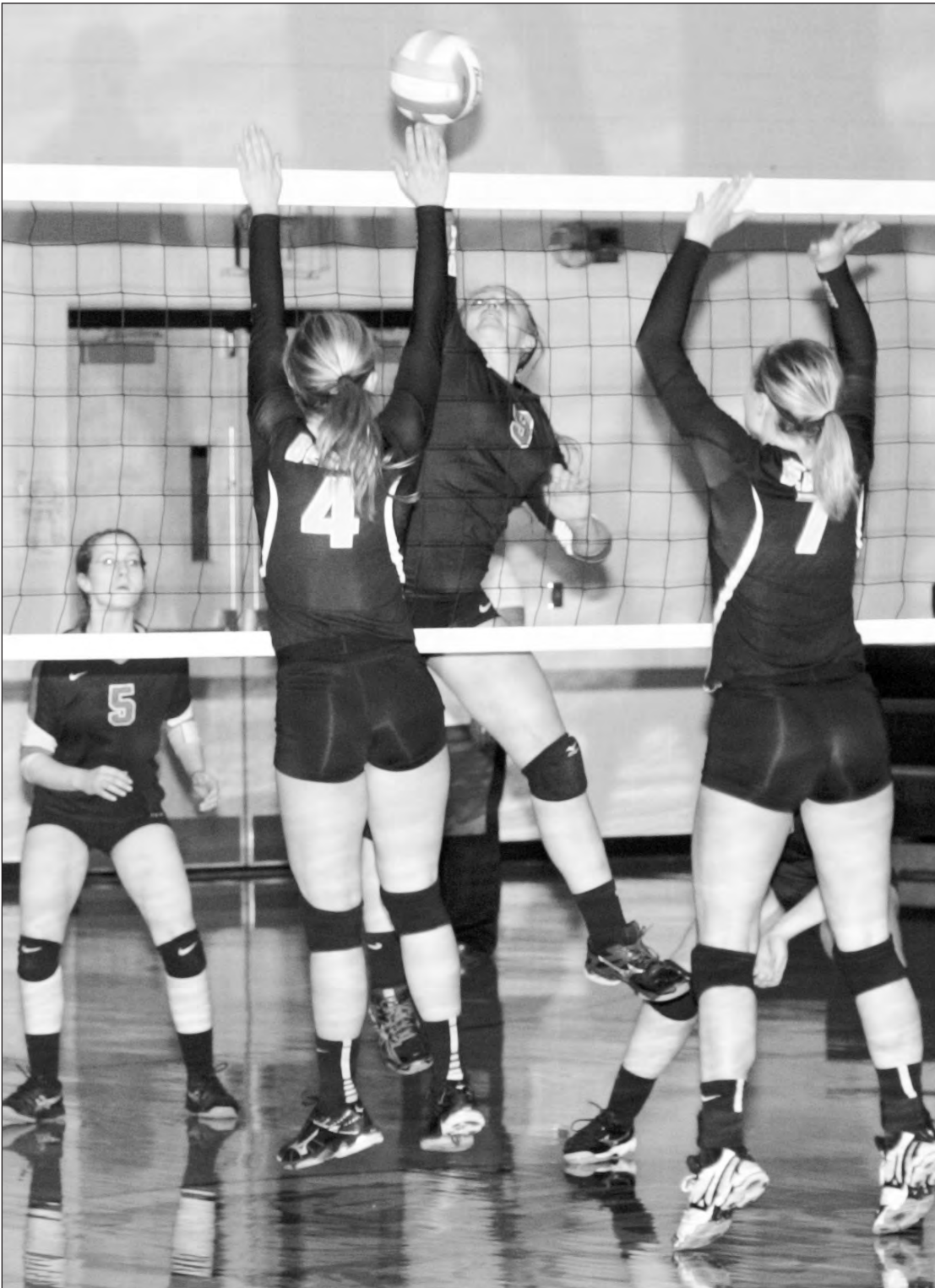

Plan safe backyard campfires this fall

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds everyone to be safe with backyard campfires this fall.

- All campfires should be:
- Clear of any combustible material 5 feet in all directions around the fire.
 - Contained within a designated fire ring. To build one, scoop out a depression in the center of a cleared area and arrange a ring of rocks around it.
 - 3 feet or less in diameter and 3 feet or less in height.
 - Legal—check if the local municipality requires a permit.
- Additionally, it's important to select a safe place for a campfire. Choose a level area not near dry grass, shrubs or logs, and free of overhanging branches. Always have a shovel and water available to extinguish a fire. Watch the fire at all times — even a light breeze can cause the it to spread. Finally, extinguish fires with water or dirt, and stir the embers repeatedly until every ember is out cold.
