## Key Minnesota PCA Certification and DNR Permits Issued for the Line 3 Replacement Project

St. Paul, Minn. (November 12, 2020) – Jobs for Minnesotans released the following statement in response to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) issuing its remaining eight permits and the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) issuing the 401 Water Quality Certification for the Enbridge Line 3 Replacement Project:

“Today is an exciting day for Jobs for Minnesotans and all supporters of responsible industry in the state. We commend the MPCA and MDNR for the thorough review of the Line 3 Replacement Project and adhering to timelines set earlier this year. We thank the dedicated agency professionals for their responsibility to Minnesotans. And, for approving the best option to protect our communities and environment replacing an aging pipeline on which the state relies.

“Today’s news paves the way for all remaining permits

to be issued and for the Line 3 project to begin construction soon. Jobs for Minnesotans now looks forward to supporting a safe and respectful work environment for the communities along the corridor and for construction workers as this project moves into the construction phase.

“We encourage all Minnesotans to accept the sound agency decisions based on an expansive scientific record and the fact that the project has proven it will meet and, when possible, exceed regulations as outlined by law. It’s time we come together as a state to advance this critical \$2.6 billion dollar private investment in Minnesota’s energy infrastructure.

“While unemployment rates along the corridor of the Line 3 route are still above 20 percent, the project will create timely and impactful investment in and bring thousands of jobs to northern Minnesota communi-

ties feeling deep economic disparities right now and enhance the safety of our environment for generations to come.”

## 2020 Farm Service Agency County Committee Elections Underway Ballots Have Been Mailed to Eligible Voters

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9, 2020 — The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has mailed ballots for the Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committee elections to eligible farmers and ranchers across the country. To be counted, ballots must be returned to the local FSA county office or postmarked by December 7.

“FSA has over 7,000 county committee members nationwide who serve their communities by providing input on our programs at the local level,” said FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce. “We value their knowledge and judgment as decisions are made about the services we

provide, including disaster and safety-net programs.”

Each committee has three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms of office, and at least one seat is up for election each year. Newly elected committee members will take office January 1, 2021. County committee members help FSA make important decisions on its commodity support programs, conservation programs, indemnity and disaster programs, and emergency programs and eligibility.

Producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program to be eligible to vote in the county committee election. A co-

operating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation(s) but may not have applied or received FSA program benefits. Also, producers who supervise and conduct the farming operations of an entire farm, but are not of legal voting age, may be eligible to vote.

Producers can find out if their local administrative area is up for election and if they are eligible to vote by contacting their local FSA county office. Eligible voters who did not receive a ballot in the mail can request one from their local FSA county office. Visit [fsa.usda.gov/elections](http://fsa.usda.gov/elections) for more information.

## AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK 2020 November 16-20

### American Education Week focuses on nation’s commitment to students and educators

NEA partners with WETA to help families navigate distance learning

WASHINGTON—Communities across the nation will join the National Education Association (NEA) Nov. 16-20, 2020, to celebrate American Education Week (AEW), which is in its 99th year. The annual observance honors students, educators, and parents—and rededicates the nation’s commitment to providing a quality public education for every student.

As the pandemic brings new challenges to students, educators and parents, AEW has even greater relevance. With many students not in school buildings as a result of the crisis and educators working in new ways to teach from a distance, deliver meals, and more, the occasion is more meaningful than ever. This pandemic has heightened the challenges faced by many students of color—including Black, Latinx, and Native students—as well as many students in rural communities.

“American Education Week serves as a tribute to the team of people who work with our students, everyone from the classroom teacher and the administrative staff to the cafeteria worker and the bus driver,” said NEA President Becky Pringle. “We honor and thank them for the work they do every day, in the midst of a pandemic, to make sure that our students are safe, and ready and able to learn.”

As part of an ongoing effort to support educators and families through the COVID-19 crisis, NEA partnered with PBS television station WETA to create resources for educators and families navigating distance learning.

“We know parents and caregivers are crucial to providing

our students with the best possible education,” said Pringle. “Our partnership with WETA will provide the tools and resources they need to ensure our students have access and opportunity, whether they are inside a classroom or learning virtually. Public schools are the cornerstones of our communities. Parents, grandparents, caregivers, friends, neighborhood advocates: we all have a role to play in supporting student learning in the classroom and beyond.”

NEA and WETA developed tips and tools to help ensure that learning continues—no matter where it takes place. The web site [www.nea.org/familyresources](http://www.nea.org/familyresources) includes experts’ tips for at-home reading instruction for K-3 kids, provided in partnership with Reading Rockets; advice on digital and virtual learning; insight into communicating and collaborating with educators; and background on why family engagement is an indicator of great public schools.

“This is an enormously challenging time for our entire education system,” said Noel Gunther, vice president of Learning Media at WETA. “More than 60 percent of students in the U.S. are now being taught remotely. We’re seeking to give families and educators some of the tools they need to help students keep learning even when they can’t go to school. We’re very grateful to be working with NEA in this effort to support student learning.”

AEW’s Education Support Professionals (ESP) Day, when we celebrate ESPs who are in the center of everything we do to ensure every student has what they need to thrive, is celebrat-

ed the Wednesday of AEW. During this pandemic, ESPs have been distributing meals to their communities, sanitizing school buildings, maintaining proper HVAC systems, supporting distance learning, making phone calls to check on students, and so much more.

“Every year since since 1987 we have celebrated ESPs’ dedication and commitment to their students, but this year we have seen ESPs go well beyond anything we have seen before as they work to meet the needs of our school communities during the pandemic,” said Pringle. “Whether our schools are virtual, in-person, or a mix of both, ESPs are ensuring students are safe, healthy, and ready to learn.”

AEW takes place the week prior to Thanksgiving. It was first celebrated in 1921, with NEA and the American Legion as co-sponsors, and grew out of national concern over illiteracy. After 99 years, the original goal of American Education Week—to generate public awareness and support for education—continues today.

MPCA to fund up to 22 new charging stations to make electric vehicles more convenient and climate-friendly

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) announced \$170,000 in grants available to help install up to 22 additional dual-port electric vehicle (EV) Level 2 charging stations in public places and workplace locations. Smart investments in EV charging stations will support the growing use of EVs in Minnesota. Applications for grant funds are due by 4:30 p.m. on February 8, 2021.

EVs are significantly cleaner than traditional vehicles already, and they offer even more climate benefits when charged with renewable energy sources instead of fossil-fueled electricity. With this grant round, MPCA is offering a new incentive for charging station owners to add clean energy sources at the same time. Grant applications will get extra points if the project adds power from a new solar array. The more solar added, the more points awarded.

This grant opportunity is one part of the agency's initiative to expand access to EV technology across the state using funds from Minnesota's share of the national Volkswagen (VW) settlement. As of November 2020, MPCA has used VW dollars to install nearly 50 charging stations throughout the state: 22 fast-charging stations along highway corridors in Greater Minnesota and 25 dual-port Level 2 charging stations in local communities. The agency has also used settlement funds to pay for a variety of electric

heavy-duty vehicles and off-road equipment, and will invest approximately \$3 million in an electric school bus pilot project, which recently generated an overwhelming interest in electric vehicles, demonstrated by approximately 19 applications for more than 40 buses. The agency currently has an open grant opportunity to fund additional fast-charging corridors in Greater Minnesota.

Level 2 charging stations are ideally placed in locations where EV drivers plan to park for at least 30 minutes, such as retail, restaurants, workplaces, or government buildings. In

2020, the City of Coon Rapids used MPCA grant funding to install two new Level 2 charging stations outside public buildings where community members can easily access them. "We placed one in the city hall parking lot and another outside of the Coon Rapids Ice Center," explained Dzevad Mahmutovic, facilities operations manager for the city. "We're proud that we can now provide a convenient charging option for EV drivers in our community."

Ask a Trooper

**Q u e s - t i o n :** I hear that many people that have been arrested for impaired driving have had multiple arrests. I heard something about DWI court and that it is trying to prevent that. Can you explain more?

**A n s w e r :** Great topic and here is some information that was posted on the Minnesota Department of Public Safety's blog. "If you had a leak in your roof, you might put a bucket underneath it to catch the dripping water. But you certainly wouldn't call it "fixed." That would only happen when you actually patch the roof. Until you solved the underlying problem, you'd need a bucket every time it rained – and that's not an ideal scenario.

Addressing the problem of drunk driving in Minnesota poses similar issues. Yes, it's very important for law enforcement to arrest impaired drivers, with the accompanying fines and sometimes jail time. It helps keep Minnesotans safer by removing the immediate threat of drunk driving from the roads. Unfortunately, those drivers can – and often do – drive under the influence again.

Minnesota's DWI Courts are the roof patch in this scenario: The more long-term solution to the problem. And one such court, in St. Louis County, is starting as early as possible. They've started a program called SBIRT – that's screening, brief intervention, and referral to treatment – with first-time offenders. The idea is to identify problems as soon as possible

so that participants can avoid becoming repeat DWI offenders.

If offenders show signs that their drunk driving behaviors are going to continue, the program provides intensive probation and a holistic intervention approach to resolve a deeper issue. Participants have to take multiple blood-alcohol tests every week, and they have daily contact with their probation officer (for comparison, offenders who aren't in this program may connect with their probation officer only a handful of times in a year). The DWI court team provides mental health and chemical dependency services, and they help them get their lives back. Offenders get help finding housing and employment, and mental health providers help them reestablish relationships with family members. This can help provide a much-needed support system. In short, they're getting rid of the bucket and fixing the roof instead.

Although the SBIRT program sounds great, it's important to have empirical evidence it works. So far, participants in the St. Louis County program are down to 11 percent recidivism, compared to 40 percent in the rest of the state. But St. Louis County wanted to know more, and a grant from the Governors Highway Safety Administration (GHSA) and Foundation for Advancing Alcohol Responsibility (Responsibility.org) is providing the perfect opportunity to study the program's effectiveness.

The Minnesota Department of Public Safety Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) applied for and received the \$35,000 GHSA/

Responsibility.org grant on St. Louis County's behalf, who will combine it with money from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and some of their own funds to conduct the evaluation.

The money pays for interns, who interview and follow up with the program participants. It also covers a recovery specialist, who oversees the interns, and an organization called NPC Consulting, which conducts the actual evaluation. This involves site visits, staff interviews, observation of the process, a comparison group, outcome evaluations, and a cost evaluation.

If the evaluation finds that the St. Louis County DWI court SBIRT program is effective, OTS will begin helping the state's other 16 DWI courts implement those same methods to re-create the St. Louis County program's success in their own communities. It's possible that this grant and the evaluation it funds just might be the long-term solution to the drunk driving problem: It could help fix the roof."

WD Allis Chalmers

In 1948 Allis Chalmers updated their WC tractor coming out with the model WD. With a quick look the "new" WD did not look much different than the WC that had been restyled in 1939. One of the only WD Allis Chalmers tractors I was ever around was one that belonged to my dad's friend, Duane Whyte. Duane loved old tractors but had sold his farm and whenever he bought a tractor he would keep it over at my mom and dad's farm. So for a time there was a WD on the farm! We used it a few times to pull a gravity box or hay wagon around the farm.

The WD had some improvements over the WC. One of the biggest improvements was the addition of an "extra" hand clutch located between the PTO and the transmission. It was a great feature as you could stop forward motion of the tractor without stopping the PTO. This of course was great with the Allis Chalmers Roto-Baler! Now the bale could be wrapped with twine and ejected as the PTO continued but forward motion of the tractor was stopped!

Another feature was the traction booster hydraulic system. The implement was hitched under the tractor and with the use of a kind of "2-point system" weight was transferred to the rear wheels adding more traction!!

Advertising for the WD also "bragged up" the Power Adjust Wheels. If the clamps on the wheels were loosened the tractor's own power could be used to "spin" the wheels on the rims moving them in or out. Narrower setting were used for plowing

- while the wider settings were used for various row crop jobs.
- Many of the WD tractors in our area had a wide front, although some had narrow fronts. I think the wide fronts are stable and useful, but if I ever had the chance to get a WD
