Red Lake County French Students Visit Quebec

Six members of the RLC French 2 Class, their teacher, and a parent visited the province of Quebec March 28 – April 1, 2016. Lafayette High School students were Hope Cardinal, Danielle Eckstein and Shy-Ann Larson. Red Lake County Central students were Shelby Gunderson, Lynsey Morris and Dede Walton. Adult travelers were parent Mandi Cardinal and teacher Lynn Vathauer.

Our adventure began Easter Sunday, at 5:00 in the evening, when we loaded a school van and headed to Fargo to stay overnight for an early flight the next day. We left Fargo at 5:35 in the morning and arrived in Montreal at 11:30. After going through customs, we boarded our mini bus around 12:20 and headed north (three and a half hours) to Quebec City. The first stop on the tour was the Hôtel de Glace (Ice Hotel) in Quebec City. In its 16th season, the Hôtel de Glace is open from the beginning of January to the end of March. This year's hotel, which was based on a river theme, was built by only fifty workers using over 30,000 tons of snow and 500 tons of ice. Even though it was raining, causing the snow and ice to melt faster, we all agreed the Ice Hotel was amazing. We only had an hour to go through the forty-four rooms and suites and the wedding chapel, boasted as being one of the top ten dreamiest settings for a wedding, but we enjoyed every minute of it, even taking time to slide on the ice slides inside the hotel. Unfortunately, since we visited during the last hour of the season, we were unable to check out the Sugar Shack, snow shoe trails, tubing slides or ice maze.

We left the Hôtel de Glace to check into our hotel, a beautiful, warm hotel in Quebec City. We had about an hour to go to our rooms and get ready for supper and our introduction to Quebec City by Mme Vathauer's friend, Simon, a native of Quebec, who is a tour guide in this beautiful city. Simon had our bus driver take us around the lower town, then the upper town, giving us a little history along the way. We got off the bus and said "au revoir" to our driver in front of the historical Château Frontenac. After a quick introduction to the area around the Chateau, (it was windy and raining) we

Seki Presents State of the Band Message

Outlines Tribes Major Project Initiatives for 2016 and Into the Future

It was standing room only as Band members, and friends of Red Lake Nation slowly streamed into the Red Lake Seven Clans Casino Event Center on Friday, March 25, 2016. They were there to attend the annual State of the Band Address scheduled to begin at about 11:00 a.m.

Entering the complex the eye was drawn to scores of people visiting dozens of tribal program booths dotting the perimeter of the hotel lobby outside the event center. Most hosted drawings for giveaways. A simple but elegant look decorated the event center. Numerous "Indian Blankets" covering round tables

faced a stage set up in the East.

On the stage at the center was a glass podium, behind which were flags and eagle staffs. Spotlights shone on the podium, banners and floral arrangements. In front of the stage were rectangular tables both left and right and facing the crowd where Red Lake's eleven member Tribal Council and seven Hereditary Chiefs would take seats.

Shortly after 11 a.m., Gary "Rez Dawg" Jourdain took center stage as emcee for the event. Spiritual Advisor and Hereditary Chief Greeting Spears provided the invocation. The Colors and Red Lake Royalty entered the Center from the back to the drumbeat of Eyabay.

After the posting of the colors, Jourdain recognized several federal, state and county elected officials seated in a reserved section immediately in front of the stage and the council/chief tables. Jourdain introduced US Congressman Collin Peterson, a Representative of US Senator Al Franken's Office, Bemidji Mayor Rita Albrecht, Beltrami County Sheriff Phil Hodapp, and four of the five Beltrami County Commissioners, Tim Sumner, Joe Vene, Richard Anderson and Keith Winger. Also Jerry Loud, recently endorsed candidate for state representative, and other state and county leaders were introduced.

Seki then took the stage and as is his custom first spoke in his

walked a short distance to "Le Petit Château", a quaint little restaurant specializing in fondue, raclette, crepes and poutine. We ordered off the menu, choosing poutine and the fondue trio. The first course was a cheese fondue which was served with bread. The second course was chicken, which we cooked in an onion broth in the fondue pot. Accompanying the chicken were baked potatoes and vegetables. The final course was a dessert fondue; we tried both chocolate and maple, which were equally delicious. Since we had to get up at 3:00 a.m. Monday we decided to sleep in a little Tuesday morning. Our second day in Canada began around 9 a.m. with a wonderful breakfast provided by our hotel. After eating, we prepared for a long day of exploring. Simon met our group in the hotel lobby at 10 a.m. to start our walking tour of Old

native Ojibwemowin introducing himself and thanking the Color Guard, the Drum Eyabay, Dancers, and Chief Spears.

Now speaking in his second language English, Seki said, "I'm honored and humbled to be standing before all of you Red Lake Nation members and visitors. It's been nearly two years now since I was sworn in as the tribal chairman of this great nation."

"Before I get started, first I want to acknowledge and congratulate our Red Lake high school boys basketball team with their awesome season and also our Red Lake girls basketball team with their awesome success," said Seki. "Congratulations to the coaches and the Red Lake school district #38."

After our snack, we headed to The Martello Tower. Vieux Quebec is a fortified city and the Martello Tower was one of the three towers built to defend it. The tower was circular in form, with thicker walls on the sides facing the sea. In 2007 he was hired by the Minnesota Public Defender's Office as the Managing Attorney in Thief River Falls. He currently manages Public Defender Offices in Thief River Falls and Crookston. Fontaine practices law in all of the county seats in District 1.

He and his wife Sheila have been married for nearly 29 years, and have three children, Karli, Keaton, and Kael. They have made their home in Mentor, MN on the former Ulland's Campground, started by Fontaine's grandparents in 1964.

Fontaine is an active member in his community in civic and volunteer roles - as a member and Deacon at Maple Lake Lutheran Church, a former ten-year board member and past chair of the Northwest Minnesota Foundation. During his public and volunteer life he has served as past president of the Crookston Lions and Bagley Rotary clubs and been active in community theater, curling, and youth basketball

Letter to the Editor

Dear Governor Dayton:

We are County Commissioners from counties along the Enbridge Mainline system and the Sandpiper Pipeline and Line 3 Replacement Project routes in northern Minnesota. We requested a meeting with you several weeks ago in the hope of sharing our support for these projects and how important they are to our constituents; the Minnesotans who have lived and worked alongside Enbridge's existing pipelines for 65 plus years. We understand that your schedule didn't align with our request and would like to thank your Chief of Staff for meeting with a few of us.

First, we would like to thank you for your continued support. We appreciate that you understand how important these projects are to our economy and the safety of all Minnesotans located along the oil train routes that cross our state. Every day of further delay is another day that more oil is unnecessarily crossing our state on trains instead of in pipelines where it belongs.

Millions of dollars in local property tax revenue and thousands of jobs are at stake. Our area businesses benefit greatly when projects like these are constructed. Sometimes these projects are the difference between businesses closing or staying open for the area. Delays by agencies can kill projects like these. Local support for these projects is strong in our counties and we want to make sure you are aware of that.

We ask you and your agencies to work as expeditiously as possible in supporting the PUC so they can review and permit these projects in a timely manner. The jobs and tax and economic benefits from Sandpiper are past due and Line 3 has already lost months in the process.

We invite you, your staff or the Lieutenant Governor to visit with us and our constituents in our home counties anytime so we can further talk about how these projects would benefit our area and the state. Thank you for your time Governor Dayton.

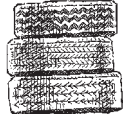

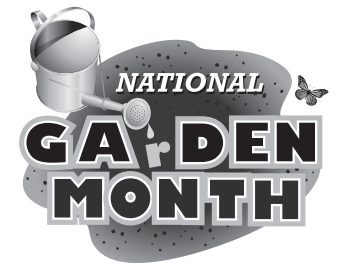

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Ask a Trooper

Question: With all this attention to distracted driving recently, I know that a person can “talk” on a cell phone while driving if they are 18 years old or older. I understand that it is illegal for anyone under that age to be “on a cell phone”. Does that apply to a “hands free” device such as a “blue tooth”?

Answer: Anyone under 18 years of age may NOT operate a vehicle while using a cell phone whether handheld or hands free, when the vehicle is in motion. A driver with a provisional license may use a cell phone to call 911 in case of an emergency.

So a “hands free” device while a vehicle is in motion is also illegal for someone under 18. Vehicles in motion also apply to someone stopped at a stop sign, stop light, and stopped in traffic in general. The exception of “obtaining emergency assistance” is quite limited in my professional opinion. Calling “911” would be a good example. Calling mom and dad to let them know you are late should be done before you put the vehicle in motion.

Minnesota is involved in a serious effort to reduce the

fatalities and serious injury crashes on our roadways. It involves a partnership with a mission of “Towards Zero Deaths” (TZD).

I believe distracted driving is the next dangerous epidemic plaguing our roadways and the statistics show

that. Distracted driving contributes to one in four crashes in Minnesota. Ask yourself what the most important text message you ever sent or received. Now ask yourself, is that text worth your life or another life on the road?

Help us put an end to distracted driving. Before you get in the car, put away the phone, adjust your radio and enter your location into your GPS. If you're a passenger, speak up if someone drives distracted.

Rereading Life's Lessons

Testing season is upon us. All year long the students within our school work hard. They work on many things but are tested on only a few. One area in which they are tested is reading. In order to do well on these tests, the students learn strategies. One of the strategies that the students learn is to reread a passage or a question several times before they choose their answer. Once they reread, it helps them comprehend the passage better as well as understand exactly what is being asked in the question. Rereads help clarify.

That got me to thinking about life and the possibility of utilizing the rereading strategy, if you will, so that it might bring clarity to any given circumstance or happenstance. Another way to put it might be the need to relearn a lesson or two that I thought I'd already learned. As I find that certain situations tend to repeat themselves in my life, I've wondered about the possibility of utilizing the reread before acting upon them.

As I began thinking, I decided to list a few things that I've had to reread, so to speak, and still manage to get it wrong most days. Confession is good for the soul they say, so here goes.

Matthew 9: 12-13 sums it up: “Healthy people don’t need a doctor – sick people do.” Then Jesus added, “Now go and learn the meaning of this Scripture: ‘I want you to show mercy, not offer sacrifices.’ For I have come

to call not those who think they are righteous, but those who know they are sinners.”

Perhaps it's the “showing mercy” part that's calling me to reread. Or, maybe it's remembering that He died for sinners. Or possibly it's the not needing to offer sacrifices that gets me all jumbled up time and again. Just when my heart is feeling peaceful about living each area authentically, a challenge arises and I find myself back at square one. Knowing how dependent I am on Him, I confess my shortcomings.

When I show little mercy, anger arises, words pour forth unfiltered, and my little finger points in the air all haughty like I've always had it all together. And as I reread the situation, it comes...slowly but surely. It comes that indeed I am who I am only because He is who He is.

That He died for sinners is easy to remember and easy to forget. For it was “while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us” (Romans 5:8). When I forget, I reread. Just when I know I know, pride leaks from a seam or two, and I must reread once more. Once sight is lost in this area, it can be blinding. Removing blinders so others can see Jesus would be a vision worth of catching.

So many areas of His life I must reread because He alone is the Holy One, He alone is the Lord, He alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, together with the Holy Spirit, to the glory of the God the Father. Amen.

Darrell G. Seki, Sr., outlined the tribe's major projects and initiatives for 2016 and into the future.

First he gave a little background on how the Nation has been involved with a referendum on alcohol at Thief River and Warroad, and reviewed the results of the Enbridge trespass negotiations and results, and assured the crowd that the tribe continues working on the East boundary.

Seki praised the nation's gaming industry while also addressing the necessity of expanding the Red Lake economy. “We cannot depend on our gaming. We as a nation have to diversify. We need to create and develop our nation to be self-sufficient. By working together we can accomplish this task to make our nation stronger.”

Seki then cited reports of major new developments for jobs and major initiatives. First up was the well-received Solar Energy initiative that will take place in three phases. First solar panels installed on major tribal buildings, a solar farm on the ceded lands, and a solar energy plant on the reservation. Other plans on the table include a 12 unit Dialysis center, a 16 bed Chemical Dependency treatment center, a new solid waste transfer station, new fire departments for Red Lake and Ponemah, expanding the Red Lake Food Shelf, a large Controlled Environment Agriculture (greenhouse) Project, and a new children and family services and elder complex.

“The development of these projects are designed to address our basic needs and understandings,” said Seki. “They include the preservation and conservation of our environment, providing an energy source which is compatible with

our beliefs of living in harmony with nature, the diversification of our economy and investments, improving the quality of life, training for our labor force, and employment; jobs for our People. The development of these projects will be funded by the entities themselves, via the program or the business revenue generated by itself, and Not Using General Funds of the Tribe.”

Seki then moved on to tribal program initiatives. The strategic plan has been completed with computer systems upgraded. Red Lake radio is coming and there is a new PR person who is working with the website and social media. A report from the Secretary and Treasurer offices and legislative activities followed.

Seki then reported on police successes against drugs despite still being short ten police officers. He talked about Red Lake engineering infrastructure plans, street signs that will be posted in Ojibwemowin, and Red Lake transit providing 28,000 passenger trips. Reports from Equay Wiigamig, Family & Children's Services, Abinoojiyag Noojimmoo Wigamig (Children's Healing Center) Oshkimaajitahdaa (New Beginnings), Comprehensive Health, Housing, Economic Development & Planning, and Red Lake, Inc. rounded out the reports.

During the address Seki also discussed frustrations and challenges with the United States government saying that federal agencies had failed to live up to their responsibilities. “We as the Red Lake Nation will continue to utilize our sovereignty, strength and courage to remind the federal branches of the US government of their trust and their responsibilities to honor our treaties.”

lesson by resident historian, Nathalie, dressed as a captain of the British army. Our group was taught the twenty-second method of loading a gun (replicas, not the real thing) and we acted out a journal entry of a British soldier who was punished for disobeying an order. Our captain divided us into two groups and sent us to all three floors of the tower searching for words taped to the walls and objects on each level. Our task was to unscramble words written on the slips of paper and write them down on a clipboard. For each English word spelled correctly we earned one point for our team; we earned four points for every French word. All of the words were significant to the Martello Tower so it was another fun way to learn about life of a soldier in the tower. After our history lesson and activity in the tower, we walked back down to the Old Quebec area and had a little more time to shop. After shopping and walking over 24,000 steps, including sixty-four flights of stairs, we decided to eat an early supper at the popular restaurant Le Cochon Dingue, which specializes in Canadian cuisine. They had a special menu for March which featured a "Carnival de Poutine". Most of us ordered a different poutine (a mixture of gravy, French fries, and cheese curds, a Canadian specialty) sharing bites with one another to determine the best poutine. We also sampled their desserts, including: sugar pie, desert poutine (cheese cake bites, churros, and caramel sauce), maple fudge, maple cream

cake, raspberry squares, and chocolate truffles. Our day was exhausting and exciting at the same time, thanks to our fantastic tour guide, Simon. We ended our day relaxing at the pool and in our rooms at our beautiful hotel. Wednesday, March 30th, was another busy day. We left our hotel at 9:30 for our last look of Quebec City. To save time, Simon lead us to the local bus stop where we boarded a city bus to take us to Vieux Quebec. We did some last minute souvenir shopping and went inside the Château Frontenac, which is now a luxury hotel, for a quick tour. It was a nice morning and we took many pictures outside the hotel to help us remember the great time we had in this beautiful city with our SUPER GUIDE, Simon. After saying our goodbyes, we boarded another minibus and headed back to Montreal. Our first stop was at Montmorency Falls, just outside Quebec City. This waterfall is higher than Niagara Falls but not nearly as wide. On our way to the falls we stopped to drink the spring water coming down the face of a rock - very refreshing. Some of our group chose to climb the stairs up to the bridge that goes over the falls; what a view! We got back on the bus and went the rest of the way to Montreal, stopping at a Tim Hortons in Trois Rivières for a fifteen minute break and snack. Our first stop in Montreal was the Botanical Gardens. Since it was already 4:00 in the afternoon we decided it would not be worth the nineteen dollar entrance fee to go in for only an hour so we spent fifteen minutes in the gift shop and headed to our next stop, Saint Joseph's

It was the perfect ending to another great day. Thursday we explored the

city of Montreal. Our first stop was the Notre Dame Cathedral, where we had been the night before. We were glad it was open for tourists this morning as it was a very rainy day. Thankfully, we took the subway back to where we started because we were too tired to try to figure our way back through all those buildings and tunnels. We learned that Montreal is rich in culture, and that the food is delicious! Friday was bitter-sweet. We were happy to be going home after a whirl-wind 5 days, but sad to leave the beautiful province of Quebec, a place we all hope to return one day. We are very grateful for the opportunity to visit both Quebec City and Montreal and all feel a little more confident speaking French. 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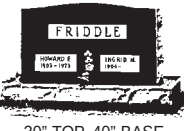

HealthPartners, Essentia Health study to look at increasing preventive cancer care in rural areas

A HealthPartners Institute study will assess whether a clinical decision support tool in electronic medical records called the Cancer Prevention Wizard can increase preventive care in rural areas for cancer.

The Cancer Prevention Wizard (CP Wizard) helps primary care providers identify all eligible patients ages 11-80 who are not up-to-date on recommended cancer prevention services and it provides them with evidence-based recommendations for primary and secondary cancer prevention. Primary cancer prevention will include smoking cessation, body weight management, and human papilloma virus (HPV) vaccination. Secondary cancer prevention will include screening tests for colorectal, breast, cervical and lung cancer according to US Preventive Services Task Force guidelines.

The 5-year study, Implementing Cancer Prevention Using Patient-Provider Clinical Decision Support, will involve more than 150,000 patients who receive care at 30 Essentia Health primary care clinics in northern Minnesota, northwestern Wisconsin and eastern North Dakota. Using a cluster-randomized trial design, the study will compare three groups of clinics: in one group, primary care providers will use the tool to identify and offer prevention services to their patients; in a second group, certified medical assistants will use the tool and discuss screening and prevention options with patients before they see their doctor. The third group includes clinics where patients will get usual care that has no cancer prevention activities promoted by the CP Wizard.

In addition, the CP Wizard will personalize recommendations by determining each patient's unique characteristics and using special cancer risk assessment tools from the National Cancer Institute.

Researchers will assess whether use of the CP Wizard results in more patients getting recommended primary and secondary cancer preventive services and whether certified medical assistants have an effect on patient outcomes. The study will also evaluate if use of the Cancer Prevention Wizard results in higher short-term health care costs but lower long-term costs compared to clinics that do not use the tool.

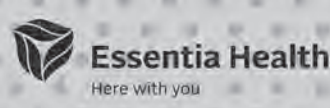
"Nearly one in four Americans live in rural areas, and this study has the potential to improve their health and quality of life because research clearly shows that in general

people in rural areas have higher rates of chronic illnesses than people who live in larger cities," said Tom Elliott, MD, HealthPartners Institute senior research fellow and principal investigator.

"This tool will create a patient's risk profile for cancer and display it in one place so that the clinician and the patient can engage in a shared decision making discussion to create a plan for primary prevention of cancer and cancer screening. The rapid collection of the data creates efficiency for a busy clinician and how it displays this data for the patient will lead to better patient engagement," said Joe Bianco, MD, Essentia Health co-investigator on the study.

This research is supported by a \$3 million grant from the National Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of

Health under Award Number R01 CA193396. It is the third partnership between HealthPartners and Essentia Health to use clinical decision support tools in electronic medical records to provide evidence-based guidelines in the exam room to improve care. Other decision support tools being studied include providing current recommendations to reduce cardiovascular risk in patients with serious mental illness and identifying patients that have pre-diabetes who are at risk of developing diabetes if left untreated. According to the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality rural residents have fewer visits to health care providers and are less likely to receive recommended preventive services including cancer prevention and management of cardiovascular disease and diabetes.

MnDOT announces 2016 construction program in northwestern Minnesota

Long term plan for the Highway 11 corridor between Greenbush and Roosevelt

BEMIDJI, Minn. – The Minnesota Department of Transportation has announced its 2016 transportation construction program, which includes a projected \$30 million for highway improvements in northwestern Minnesota. To view statewide project information visit www.dot.state.mn.us/construction.

Locally in District 2, which serves all or portions of 14 counties in northwestern Minnesota (Beltrami, Cass, Clearwater, Hubbard, Kittson, Koochiching, Lake of the Woods, Mahanomen, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake, Roseau), the 2016 construction program includes a projected \$7.5 million for the Highway 11 reconstruction project in Baudette.

The resurfacing project from Baudette to Pitt is only eight miles, but it's a complex project that includes in depth collaboration with the City of Baudette to accommodate sewer and utility upgrades. It is planned to begin on June 1 and you can find more details at www.mndot.gov/baudette.

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Bear hunt applications available; deadline is Friday, May 6

Applications for Minnesota bear hunting licenses are being accepted now through Friday, May 6, wherever Minnesota hunting and fishing license are sold, online at www.mndnr.gov/buylicense and by telephone at 888-665-4236.

A total of 3,850 licenses are available in 13 permit areas. Bear licenses cost \$44 for residents and \$230 for non-residents, and there is a \$5 application fee. The season is open from Thursday, Sept. 1, through Sunday, Oct. 16.

Notification to lottery winners will be made by June 16. The deadline to purchase licenses awarded by lottery will be Monday, Aug. 1. Any remaining unpurchased licenses will be available over the counter starting at noon on Friday, Aug. 5.

An unlimited number of bear licenses will be sold over-the-counter for no-quota areas in east-central and far northwestern Minnesota. No-quota licenses are valid only in a no-quota area. Hunters with a no-quota license can harvest one bear.

Bear license numbers in the

quota area have increased from 3,700 last year to 3,850 this year. The increase is the result of increasing permits in areas 45 and 51 where managers have been having increasing bear conflicts. Increasing permits may help address some of those bear conflict issues. In all other areas, bear permit numbers have remained about the same for the last three years in an effort to allow bear population numbers to gradually increase.

Hunters that previously hunted in permit areas 26 and 44 and intend to do so in 2016 must review new permit area boundaries. These areas have changed to incorporate four new permit areas: 27, 28, 46, and 47. Areas 28 and 47 have been created to manage the bear population in coordination with the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe and their request to create bear quota areas that reflect the Leech Lake Reservation boundaries. Maps are available on the DNR website and on the bear lottery application.

Live bait will be allowed on Mille Lacs Lake starting with opener

DNR works with local advisory committee to reconsider live-bait restriction

All Mille Lacs Lake anglers will be able to fish with live bait when the season opens Saturday, May 14.

"This year's Mille Lacs regulation will not include a live bait restriction due to feedback from anglers and stakeholders," said Don Pereira, fisheries section chief for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "The DNR is hearing that anglers are accepting of the catch-and-release aspect of the walleye season, but members of the Mille Lacs Fisheries Advisory Committee heard clear concerns about the live bait restriction, as did the DNR."

The DNR decided to allow live bait after committee members and the DNR met Wednesday, April 6, and had a productive discussion about the pros and cons of the live-bait ban.

"Our discussion showed the DNR and the committee are determined to work together to protect the resource while still providing the best recreational opportunities on Mille Lacs for a wide range of users," said

Dean Hanson, who operates Agate Bay Resort in Isle and co-chairs the advisory committee.

All other Mille Lacs regulations announced March 21 remain in place, including the provision that requires all walleye caught to be immediately released.

The new regulations come as the DNR is working to conserve young walleyes so they can mature and become spawners, thus helping the lake's walleye population to recover. Hooking mortality – an estimate of the number of fish that die after being caught and returned to the water – is a factor in keeping state anglers under this year's state walleye allotment.

Hooking mortality increases as water temperatures warm and catch rates increase. Both factors are at play in Mille Lacs this year. Studies show anglers using only artificial bait can reduce hooking mortality substantially because fish are less likely to swallow artificial bait and suffer internal damage from a hook.

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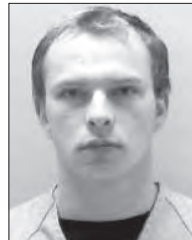
