Local FFA Students and Advisor Attend Washington D.C. Fall Fly-In with National Farmers Union

WASHINGTON, D.C. (September 15, 2016) – FFA students Camryn Larson and Anna Olson of Fertile, with their FFA advisor Witney Ruppecht of Fertile, were able to fly along with Minnesota Farmers Union (MFU) to join National Farmers Union (NFU) and nearly 300 fellow farmers, ranchers and rural citizens from across the country to meet with several U.S. Senators and Congressman.

Camryn and Anna were able to use the skills that they learned while in FFA and their commitment to rural Minnesota and farming to give their insight to representatives in Congress on the things that are affecting family farmers today.

The group in a whole was able to express their concerns

and the need for change in the agriculture industry of the country in order to protect the future of family farmers including concerns about consolidation and current prices in agriculture and addressing the trade and renewable fuels

“This is the opportunity that our members have to get in front of the representatives of Congress to help them understand the struggles that American family farmers go through,” said Doug Peterson, Minnesota Farmers Union President. “This is democracy at its finest, the voice of the farmer was heard in Washington D.C. during this visit, and it will make a difference”

In addition to Capitol Hill visits, Katie along with other

MFU members were addressed by Tom Vilsak, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, who answered many questions that were brought forth by all members of National Farmers Union from all over the country to get the answers they needed.

Another major component of the fly-in that Camryn and Anna were able to witness was having the opportunity to present the Golden Triangle award to the key leaders who strongly support agriculture and family farmers, and have a 100 percent voting record with MFU & NFU policies. These leaders are Senator Amy Klobuchar, Senator Al Franken, Representative Colin Peterson, Representative Rick Nolan and Representative Tim Walz.

Emergency Food & Shelter Funds Awarded

Red Lake County HAS BEEN AWARDED FEDERAL FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE THROUGH THE DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY (DHS)/FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY UNDER THE EMERGENCY FOOD AND SHELTER NATIONAL BOARD PROGRAM.

Red Lake County has been chosen to receive \$2,800 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the U. S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; The Jewish Federations of North America, The Salvation Army; and, United Way Worldwide. The Local Board was charged

to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country. The National Board selects jurisdictions (cities or counties) for funding, not specific agencies. These are not state/county government or United Way funds.

A Local Board will determine how the funds awarded to Red Lake County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program. If you live in Red Lake County and are interested in sitting on the local Board please contact Catherine Johnson.

Under terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary

non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capacity to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Red Lake County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds previously with Inter-County Community Council food shelf and Red Lake Falls food shelf participating.

The deadline for applications to be received is September 26, 2016.

Minnesotans can vote absentee by mail and in-person starting Sept. 23

Secretary of State Steve Simon is reminding Minnesotans that in one week—Friday, September 23—eligible voters can begin casting their ballots early for the November 8 General Election by voting absentee. This is the first presidential-election year where Minnesotans no longer need an excuse to vote absentee—a reform also known as no-excuses absentee voting.

Minnesotans can request an absentee ballot to be mailed to them, or they can vote absentee in-person at their county or local elections office.

"I encourage all eligible Minnesotans who can't make it to the polls on Election Day, or simply want to vote from the comfort of their own home, to vote early by casting an absentee ballot and ensure that their voice is heard," said Secretary Simon. "I know that together we can get our state back to number one in voter turnout in the country."

For nine elections in a row

Minnesota was number one in the country in voter turnout. In 2014, Minnesota fell to number six. Secretary Simon is challenging the people of Minnesota and the thousands of nonprofits and businesses across the state to return our state back to number one.

HOW TO REQUEST AN ABSENTEE BALLOT
Minnesotans can request an absentee ballot quickly and easily at mnvotes.org using the online application.

Voters can also request an absentee ballot by downloading the "2016 Minnesota Absentee Ballot Application" and returning it to their county election office by email, mail, or fax. Absentee Ballot application forms are available in English, Spanish, Hmong, Somali, Vietnamese, Karen, Russian, Chinese, Lao, Oromo, Khmer, and Amharic.

Voters can request an absentee ballot even if they are not registered to vote—a voter registration application will be provided with their ballot.

IMPORTANT DEADLINES
Voting Absentee by Mail: Minnesotans voting absentee by mail must make sure their

ballot is returned on or before the November 8 General Election. Ballots returned after November 8 will not be counted.

Voting Absentee In-Person: The last day to vote absentee in-person is Monday, November 7. **MILITARY AND OVERSEAS VOTERS**
Minnesotans serving in the military or living abroad—temporarily or indefinitely—can have an absentee ballot sent to them anywhere in the world. Learn more here: <http://bit.ly/1Yybb1v>.

WHAT'S ON MY BALLOT?
In addition to voting for the next President of the United States, Minnesotans will vote for their member of the U.S. House of Representatives, their state Senator and Representative, as well as on a constitutional amendment. Some Minnesotans may also be voting for their local County Commissioner, Soil & Water Supervisor, City Officers, School Board Members, Township Officers, or local ballot questions.

Minnesota 4-Hers from 86 counties arrived with over 2800 animals at the 2016 "Great Minnesota Get-Together" for this year's 4-H livestock encampment held Thursday, August 25th - Sunday August 28th.

Education is integral in the "learn by doing" philosophy of 4-H. As part of the educational component, Minnesota 4-H requires every youth exhibiting an animal to also participate in knowledge tests, skill-a-thons, and personal interviews directly related to the animal species they are exhibiting.

Along with interviews, all 4-H youth livestock exhibitors complete the Livestock Quality Assurance and Ethics (LQA&E) Training which covers bio-security, educating the public on the role of livestock, and caring for their animal's welfare. Other learning opportunities included over 40 exhibits featuring the "Science of Animals" and over 200 youth demonstrating safe and flavorful ways to grill the best of Minnesota Meats.

And of course 2016 continued the strong Minnesota tradition of excellent livestock exhibits, featuring animals that earned a trip to the State Fair by excelling at county fairs across the state. This year also saw the much welcomed return of live birds in the Poultry depart-

Savannah graduated in May of 2016 from Bagley High School. Her mother Marion Silvestre lives in Clearbrook.

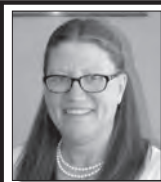
BCHS Announces the Beltrami County Courthouse Open House & Tour

Ask a Trooper

Q u e s - t i o n : Could you explain the Zipper Merge for

merging into construction zones in Minnesota? I have tried using the Zipper Merge many times and it seems that hardly anyone else on the road knows about how it is supposed to work. If another driver intentionally blocks a lane, isn't that against the law?

Answer: According to the Minnesota Department of Transportation, when a lane is closed in a construction zone motorists should use both lanes of traffic until reaching the defined merge area, and then alternate in "zipper" fashion

into the open lane.

Some drivers slow too quickly and move to the lane that will continue through the construction area. This driving behavior can lead to unexpected and dangerous lane switching, serious crashes and road rage.

It is suggested that when you see the "lane closed ahead" sign and traffic backing up, stay in your current lane up to the point of merging. At that point, take turns with other drivers to safely and smoothly ease into the remaining lane. When traffic is heavy and slow, it is much safer for motorists to remain in their current lane until the point where traffic can orderly take turns merging.

Studies show that the "zipper merge" works the best to keep traffic flowing, especially when there is a lot of traffic, by:

- Reducing differences in speeds between two lanes
- Reducing the overall length of traffic backup by as much as 40 percent
- Reducing congestion on freeway interchanges
- Creating a sense of fairness and equity that all lanes are moving at the same rate

The "zipper merge" also helps prevent road rage from drivers who intentionally go slow in the lane that is closing, and blocking other drivers from passing or getting through. That is against the law. Lane blocking or impeding traffic

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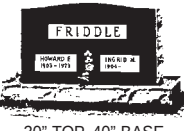

Good waterfowl opener expected this weekend

Duck hunting is expected to be good when Minnesota's regular waterfowl season opens a half-hour before sunrise on Saturday, Sept. 24.

"The abundance of breeding ducks in Minnesota and North America has been good in recent years, so we hope that results in good opportunities for duck hunters this fall," said Steve Cordts, waterfowl specialist with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "Wetland habitat conditions are fairly good across the state and with a little help from Mother Nature with some favorable fall weather, it could be a good season."

Duck seasons and limits
The duck season structure is similar to recent years. The waterfowl seasons are based on a federal framework that applies to all states in the Mississippi Flyway. Waterfowl hunting regulations are available wherever DNR licenses are

sold and online at www.mndnr.gov/regulations/hunting.

Duck season will be open for 60 days in each of the three waterfowl zones:

- In the north zone, duck season is Sept. 24 through Tuesday, Nov. 22.

- In the central zone, duck season is Sept. 24 through Sunday, Oct. 2, closes for five days, then reopens Saturday, Oct. 8, and runs through Sunday, Nov. 27.

- In the south zone, duck season is Sept. 24 through Oct. 2, closes for 12 days, then reopens Saturday, Oct. 15, and runs through Sunday, Dec. 4.

The daily duck bag limit remains six per day. The mallard bag limit remains four per day, including two hen mallards. The daily bag limits remain at three for wood duck and scaup; and two for pintails, redheads and canvasbacks.

The DNR will post a weekly waterfowl migration report each

week during the duck season. The reports are typically posted on Thursdays at www.mndnr.gov/hunting/waterfowl.

Goose and sandhill crane seasons

Minnesota's goose season will re-open in conjunction with the duck season statewide on Sept. 24, with a bag limit of three dark geese per day the entire season. "Dark" geese include Canada geese, white-fronted geese and brant. Goose season will be closed in the central and south duck zones when duck season is closed.

The season for sandhill cranes remains open through Sunday, Oct. 16, in the northwest goose and sandhill crane zone only. The daily bag limit will be one sandhill crane per day. A \$3 sandhill crane permit is required in addition to a small game hunting license.

More information on duck, goose, sandhill crane and other migratory bird hunting is available in the 2016 Minnesota Waterfowl Hunting Regulations booklet from license vendors and online at www.mndnr.gov/hunting/waterfowl.

Reminder: No whole deer carcasses allowed to enter Minnesota

Hunters who harvest deer outside the state are reminded that whole deer carcasses are no longer allowed to be brought into Minnesota from anywhere in North America.

This new restriction that includes all members of the deer family (deer, elk, moose and caribou) is an effort by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources to respond to the increasing prevalence and geographic spread of chronic wasting disease (CWD).

"Minnesota is fortunate to have a healthy deer population and the cooperation of sportsmen and women in protecting the health of the deer population is vital and appreciated," said Adam Murkowski, DNR big game program leader.

Hunters may bring only the following parts into Minnesota, regardless of where in North America the animal was harvested:

- Meat that is boned out or that is cut and wrapped (either

commercially or privately).

- Quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached.

- Hides and teeth.

- Antlers or clean skull plates (no brain tissue attached) with antlers attached.

- Finished taxidermy mounts.

- Nonresidents transporting whole or partial carcasses on a direct route through Minnesota are exempt from this restriction; however, similar restrictions exist in all surrounding states.

The 2016 Minnesota Hunting and Trapping Regulations Handbook states that this rule is likely to be in place (pages 2 and 62). This rule has been finalized and is in place for the fall of 2016. The deer carcass import restrictions are available at www.mndnr.gov/deerimports.

Access road at Roseau River WMA under construction

Hunters and other visitors to the west end of the Roseau River Wildlife Management Area in northwestern Minnesota are cautioned that the main access road from the west is under construction this fall.

The road can become impassable at times, particularly after a significant rainfall. Hunters are urged to call the wildlife management area headquarters at 218-463-1130 to find out the latest information on access to this portion of the WMA before traveling there.

The road construction is part of a project to improve water management for wildlife and flood control on the wildlife management area pools and the Roseau River. Construction was delayed by excessive wetness throughout the summer of 2016.

Take a Kid Hunting Weekend is Sept. 24-25

Small game hunting is the focus of Take a Kid Hunting Weekend this Saturday, Sept. 24, and Sunday, Sept. 25, according to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

During the weekend, adult Minnesota residents accompanied by a youth under age 16 can hunt small game without a license, but must comply with open seasons, limits and other regulations.

"Making sure youth have a good experience is a big part of this weekend," said Mike Kurre, DNR mentoring program coordinator. "With the focus on the youth, the whole experience becomes important, everything from spotting animal tracks or a bee hive in a tree to hunting safely and having fun."

Adults can help youth have a good experience by listening to

what youth need, and together they can learn the lessons of the forests and fields, added Kurre.

"Having an adult continue over the years to mentor a young hunter is extremely important in helping that hunter continue the pursuit as an adult," he said.

MnDOT asks motorists, farm equipment operators to safely share the road

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Motorists traveling on Minnesota highways this fall need to be aware of large farm equipment transporting crops to markets, grain elevators and processing plants, according to the Minnesota Department of Transportation.

"Harvest season is in full swing and farmers in every corner of the state are out using the highways," said Jay Hietpas, state traffic engineer. "Motorists need to be prepared to encounter slow-moving farm vehicles, especially on rural, two-lane roads now through November."

Farm equipment is large and heavy, making it hard for operators to accelerate, slow down and stop. The machines also make wide turns and sometimes cross over the center line. In addition, farm vehicles can

create large blind spots, making it difficult for operators to see approaching vehicles. All of these factors can cause serious crashes.

During 2013-15, 422 traffic crashes took place on Minnesota roads involving at least one farm vehicle, resulting in 12 fatalities and 204 injuries. Of the 12 fatalities, eight were farm vehicle riders; of the 204 injuries, 57 were farm vehicle riders.

"The biggest factors contributing to farm equipment/vehicle crashes are inattention, unsafe passing and speed," Hietpas said. "Motorists should always slow down and use caution when approaching farm equipment."

Motorists should:

- Watch for debris dropped by trucks hauling sugar beets and other crops. It is safer to

brake or drive through debris than to veer into oncoming cars or off the road.

- Wait for a safe place to pass.

- Wear seatbelts.

- Drive with headlights on at all times.

Farm equipment operators should:

- Use lights and flashers to make equipment more visible.

- Use slow-moving vehicle emblems on equipment traveling less than 30 mph.

- Consider using a follow vehicle when moving equipment, especially at night.

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
