IDEA Competition Deadline Approaching

BEMIDJI, MN - The deadline to enter the ninth annual IDEA Competition is fast approaching - January 5th is the last day to register. More than \$300,000 has been awarded to Northwest Minnesota entrepreneurs in the past eight years.

The competition has earned a reputation in the region for helping competitors turn great ideas into great businesses. The competition provides training, business coaching, and capital to entrepreneurs who apply and want to turn an idea into a fast-growing business.

In the past, most entrepreneurs have entered to win one of three \$10,000 cash awards. Now, IDEA Competition applicants will also have a chance to win a guaranteed spot as a semifinalist in the MN Cup - a statewide competition for breakthrough ideas. MN Cup has awarded \$2 million in seed funding and its finalists have gone on to raise over \$225 million.

Applicants also receive business development resources, a business coach, open access to all IDEA Labs, attention in the media, and a chance to present their idea to accredited angel investors and business leaders.

While business ideas are important, IDEA judges place a higher importance on the commercialization of ideas. "It takes skill, strategy, and execution to turn an idea into something more," said IDEA Project Coordinator, Phil Knutson. "That is the real purpose of the IDEA Competition - to help entrepreneurs turn great ideas into profitable business ventures."

Did you know?

Tipping men and women who work in the food service industry is commonplace in the United States and Canada, where citizens typically tip between 15 and 20 percent when dining out at restaurants. But American and Canadian travelers about to depart for overseas destinations may want to familiarize themselves with the practices regarding gratuities before their planes touch down. Some countries automatically add gratuities onto customers' bills. For example, the government in Dubai mandates that a 10 percent service charge be added to all hotel, restaurant and bar bills. This service charge is then divided by the staff at the establishment, making the charge the equivalent of a tip. Diners in Morocco, where the gratuity is sometimes included in the bill, might be surprised to learn that a 10 percent tip in that country is considered generous. Tips are included in the bill in Costa Rica, where travelers need not feel obligated to leave any additional gratuities. Service is often included in the bill within the United Kingdom as well, though travelers should inspect the bill before assuming gratuity was included. Visitors to Spain should not feel obligated to leave a gratuity larger than 13 percent, and even a tip in the range of 7 percent is considered acceptable.

New Year’s Eve Safety Tips

New Year’s Eve is one of the most festive nights of the year. Many people spend the final moments of the year celebrating with family and friends. As joyous as such celebrations tend to be, it’s important that New Year’s revelers keep certain safety precautions in mind when celebrating the end of one year and the dawn of the next.

· Arrange for transportation in advance. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, an average of 304 people die in drunk-driving crashes in the days surrounding Christmas and New Year’s Eve each year. fellow motorists who might be driving erratically. If possible, take public transportation to and from the festivities so no one is tempted to drive after consuming alcohol.

· Pick a meetup spot in case anyone gets separated from the group. New Year’s Eve celebrations in public places such as bars, clubs or town squares tend to become crowded as midnight draws near. It’s easy for groups of friends or family to be separated, so choose a meetup spot where everyone can gather after the ball drops. Choose a spot that’s well lit and easily accessible to all, and confirm the location of the meetup spot via a group text message before heading out for the night.

· Stay sober. Many people feel pressured to overindulge with alcohol on New Year’s Eve, but men and women should be responsible with regard to their alcohol consumption. Overconsumption of alcohol makes it difficult for men and women to stay alert, and that loss of alertness can be difficult to manage on nights as hectic as New Year’s Eve. While it’s acceptable for men and

women of legal drinking age to raise a glass of champagne at midnight, it’s best to limit alcohol consumption throughout the festivities so the party is memorable for all the right reasons.

· Be a responsible host. When hosting a New Year’s Eve party, hosts must prioritize the safety of their guests. Make sure guests don’t drink too much, which can leave hosts open to criminal or civil action should guests leave their home and cause an accident. Serve plenty of food and nonalcoholic beverages so guests who are drinking have something in their systems other than alcohol. Schedule things to do throughout the night so guests have more to do than drink alcohol. In addition, make room for potential overnight guests should someone be incapable of driving home at the end of the night. Keep contact information for local taxis or shuttle services readily available so guests know they don’t have to drive themselves home.

Advent

Tis the season of Advent, a time when we remember His arrival in Bethlehem...in a manger, in swaddling clothes ... and so it goes...and so we wait. Why such sadness in the midst of this glorious time of year? Why talk about something other than the warmth of a babe in the hay? Her authentic words carry with them the promise of why our precious Lord came in the first place. He came into a broken world, to eventually be broken so that all the broken may finally remember to “remember” themselves to Him.

Ann’s words usher in truth: “Don’t waste a minute of your life on anything less than what lasts for all eternity. Think of eternity, and live backward from that. Does chronic soul amnesia

make me keep forgetting that if He believes in me, I am enough, because He is enough? Habits of self-condemnation can only change when they’re taken to the cross of Jesus, not to the court of judgment. Go to the cross first and hear no condemnation; then go to the mirror and see deep transformation. There is always more grace in Christ than there is guilt in us. It’s grace that allows you to make U-turns.”

Intertwining her personal stories upon the pages, she walks right into your heart. By making herself vulnerable and showing us her wounds, she allows us to open our own. It is in the breaking open the brokenness and pouring it out on behalf of others that helps both heal. Union through communion happens as we become one.

I am so thankful He came as a babe to be poured out and broken. “In shattered places, with broken people, we are most near the broken heart of Christ” (Ann VosKamp). Amen.

Exploring the origins of New Year’s resolutions

For millennia, people around the world have commemorated the arrival of a new calendar year by adhering to various traditions. Once such tradition is making resolutions for the year ahead. Resolutions are promises to oneself geared around personal fulfillment and betterment.

Resolutions are widely practiced, but some people may not understand the origins of New Year’s resolutions and why they have become the norm.

Some historians tie the practice of making resolutions to the ancient Babylonians. More than 4,000 years ago, the Babylonians celebrated the New Year in March rather than January. The spring harvest was in March, and a festival called Akitu, which lasted 12 days, was celebrated. An important part of the festival was the crowning of a new king. Special rituals also affirmed

a connection to the gods. The Babylonians made promises to the gods, which included vows to return borrowed objects and pay outstanding debts.

Resolutions can also be traced to ancient Rome. The Romans were instrumental in creating a more formal calendar, and the start of the new year was moved from March to January (January and February were added to the Roman calendar under the rule of Numa Pompilius). Julius Caesar wanted to honor January’s namesake, Janus, the Roman god of beginnings. Janus’ two faces enabled him to look back into the past and forward into the future. Sacrifices to Janus were made, and worshipers exchanged gifts with one another. A custom of setting resolutions began during this period as well, with Romans promising to be good to one another.

Eventually, these resolutions were funneled into prayers and fasting when Christianity was adopted by the Roman Empire. Other religious parallels include the Jewish holiday of Yom Kippur, which is a day of atonement and reflection as celebrants examine their wrongdoings and seek forgiveness and to behave better moving forward. Yom Kippur follows Rosh Hashanah, Judaism’s own new year.

Resolutions also may be loosely tied to Medieval times. During this time, knights took a "peacock vow" at the end of the Christmas season. Each year, these knights would reaffirm their commitment to chivalry.

Today New Year’s resolutions are largely a secular tradition, but they’re still connected to a desire to be a good person and put one’s best self forward.

In 1899, they entered into manufacturing gasoline engines. By 1908 they were producing a pretty full line of farm equipment. WWI put a strain on the company and in the 20’s they put most of their effort in tractor production. They started with a two cylinder design but, in 1930, Eagle went to a 6 cylinder engine. (Sounds like John Deere!)

In 1932, they produced the Model 6A, a standard tread tractor with the “new” 6 cylinder engine. The 6B came out in 1936. This was a row crop tractor. A year later the 6C came out, with a standard

tread design and improvements that made it quite a handy tractor. The depression, lower sales, and higher costs all contributed to the end of the Eagle Manufacturing Co. after

50 years in business!!

Whenever I hear a story like this I wish I could have seen an new Eagle tractor in 1938! But, I guess I’m glad I got to see one this summer!!



Ask a Trooper

Question: With all these smart phones out there, I’ve heard about being able to get emergency information from them if you find someone in some type of medical emergency where they might be unable to speak or unresponsive altogether. I know you Troopers are the first ones to respond to a lot of these types of things, could you write about that? Love the articles and thank you for providing all of your services.

Answer: Thank you and you are welcome! You are correct about some smart phones hav-

ing these options. Depending on the phone, a person can find medical health information by hitting “Emergency” on the password log screen. This provides first responders or anyone else with emergency access to the user’s Medical ID. A user can configure their Medical ID with a custom picture and name, date of birth, list of medical conditions, notes, allergies, reactions and medications. Users also can display an emergency contact with name, telephone number and relationship.

If you have a phone that allows it (I will use the iOS 8 for iPhone, for example), users can configure it by launching

Health, tapping the Medical ID menu in the bottom right, and then choosing “Create Medical ID.” After the Medical ID has been created, users can go back and make changes at any time through the Health app. (See photo attached.)

Winter truck load increases begin Dec. 16 for north, north central frost zones

Winter truck load increases will begin Friday, Dec. 16, on unrestricted highways in the north and north central frost zones, according to the Minnesota Department of Transportation.

Vehicles will be allowed to operate up to 10 percent over the standard legal maximum loads on unrestricted highways during the winter load increase period. However, trucks must comply with current registration weight laws and not exceed registered gross weight tolerances.

Drivers should check with local agencies before increasing any weights on city, county and township routes. The sign erected on the roadway governs the load limit in effect. A winter weight increase permit

is required to take advantage of the 10 percent weight increase on interstate highways only; a permit is not required for state trunk highways.

For questions about over legal weight/size “heavy haul” trucking, call MnDOT’s Freight and Commercial Vehicle Operations - Oversize/Weight Permits, 651-296-6000 or email: ofcvopermits.dot@state.mn.us.

For questions about enforcement call the Minnesota Department of Public Safety - State Patrol - Commercial Vehicle Enforcement; 651-405-6196 (select option 3, option 3).

The start and end dates for winter load increases are based on how weather is affecting roadway strength. These dates are established by monitoring roadway strength as weather

conditions change. The end date for winter load Increases is variable and drivers should check for updates throughout the year. Vehicle operators are required to check with MnDOT for the exact start and end dates.

All changes are made with a minimum three-day notice.

Services held for Leland Hall

The eighty-eight years that defined the life of Leland William Hall began with his birth at 5:30 PM on July 10, 1928 to parents Evangelyn (Anderson) and Arnold W. Hall in Wilton, MN. The long-awaited opportunity for Lee and his family to move back to northern Minnesota came in 1969 when Minnesota Pipeline Company had an open position in Clearbrook, MN at their pumping station. He was so thrilled and excited to be able to move 'home' that he was unable to voice the words to Pat when he came home to tell her the good news. Once the family settled in Clearbrook Lee was able to buy a 40 acre parcel of land near the pipeline pumping station where he worked, and subsequently

they built the home in which he would live out the rest of his years. He was an active member of the Clearbrook American Legion and could be counted on to be involved in their activities.
