McIntosh native featured on FYI Network's 'Tiny House Nation'

Editor's Note from the McIntosh Times: Cody Bartz was born and raised in rural McIntosh and is the son of Clayton and Carol Bartz. He is a Win-E-Mac graduate who now lives in the southeastern part of Minnesota. Cody is married and works as a graphic designer.

Of the two of them, Cody is the minimalist in the relationship, but his wife Ashleigh (Bartz) is learning to be one too. "Of the two of us he's always been a minimalist," Ashleigh said of her husband. "He has only two pairs of shoes, a few pairs of pants."

Ashleigh, who by no means is a collector of stuff, has embraced the minimalist style and is living along side her husband in a 219 square foot print house in Hokah.

The couple shared their story with America as they were featured on FYI Network's "Tiny House Nation."

Their home, which now sits in Houston County just outside Hokah, can be moved to any location which is part of the appeal for the couple.

"We've always loved living in the city," said Cody. "We love La Crosse."

"But we're getting used to rural living and we're really comfortable," said Ashleigh.

Ashleigh, who teaches 4th, 5th and 6th graders at La Crescent Montessori Academy and STEM school said that because of the family like atmosphere at the school the couple were able to find a location for their home.

"A lot of people buy a lot and you still are 'stuck' to one location," said Cody.

"Thanks to the closeness of the people at my job we were able to find a suitable place for us to have our home," Ashleigh said.

They approached the Houston County Zoning office for permits to put the home on the property.

"They were really great to work with," said Ashleigh.

"They basically permit it like a camper," added Cody.

He said that the couple can live in the structure for a period of 11 months but must not live there year-round.

"But they said they'd work with that," he added.

Given that tiny houses are becoming more and more common, municipalities are going to need to address the phenomenon in their zoning laws.

"We do wish cities and governments would take a closer look at zoning tiny homes," said Cody.

The home
Cody, who is a graphic designer and works in downtown La Crosse, designed the home from scratch. "It started by doing some research in the hope of lowering my environmental

footprint," said Cody. "That led to research about tiny homes. It's owning a home without a huge mortgage. The other expenses, materials, heating and cooling is obviously less."

So Cody designed the home online.

He started with sticking to the legal parameters so the home could be mobile.

"You have to stay less than 13 1/2 feet tall so you can go under bridges and eight and a half feet wide to fit in traffic lanes," Cody stated. "We can hook it up to an F350 pick-up truck and move it if we need to."

Ashleigh wanted the home to function well so she contributed to the overall design as far as the floor plan, "We wanted to build in lofts to maximize the space," Cody added. "And the lofts add square footage," said Ashleigh.

The couple's bedroom is on one side in a loft form and on the other side is an office where Cody does much of his design and art work. The lofts bring the overall square footage of the home to 330.

Initially the frame of the home was built, and filming occurred during this process.

Once the frame was done, Cody asked his parents, who live in the Bemidji area, if it could be stored on their farm.

The show
A crew of 10 producers followed the home and the couple as their new living space was created.

Ashleigh got to add her "Bohemian style" and the couple chose features, functions and finishes that fit both their styles.

"I like a lot of plants," said Ashleigh. "So they built us an 'herb garden' where we can have fresh herbs, vegetables

and plants, and it doesn't take up a lot of space." Ashleigh, who is vegan, said that was an important feature for her in the home. "We're both artists so we wanted a visually pretty home as well," added Cody.

That led to details like stairs leading up to the loft which serves as an office being see through.

"So you can sit on the couch and be able to see through to the whole other side of the house," Cody said. "That really gives the home an open feeling."

Filming happened in August, with much of the process taking place in the metro.

The couple moved the home

to Hokah in late August.

"The show really focuses on the people and why they decided to live in a tiny house," Ashleigh said, "We love the freedom it provides our life."

"Not having to be burdened by a mortgage is really liberating," said Cody.

U-Haul 2016 Growth State No. 3: MINNESOTA

Minnesota is the No. 3 U.S. Growth State for 2016, according to the latest U-Haul migration trends report.

Minnesota rose nine spots from its No. 12 growth ranking for 2015. Its year-over-year arrivals of one-way U-Haul truck rentals went up 1 percent last year. Departures held steady.

Arrivals made up 50.9 percent of U-Haul traffic in the state in 2016. St. Paul, Mankato, Alexandria and Apple Valley paced the net gain of one-way U-Haul trucks. St. Paul ranks ninth among U.S. Growth Cities for populations of more than 50,000.

Growth States are calculated by the net gain of one-way U-Haul truck rentals entering a state versus leaving a state during a calendar year. Migration trends data is compiled from more than 1.7 million one-way U-Haul truck rental transactions that occur annually.

While migration trends do not correlate directly to population or economic growth, U-Haul growth data is an effective gauge of how well cities are attracting and maintain-

ing residents.

"Minnesota is growing very well as a whole," says Christopher Bohlman, U-Haul Company of Southern Minnesota president. "We have a strong, healthy economy. The unemployment rate is very low and houses are being built in the suburbs."

Speed limit increases on several northwest Minnesota highways

BEMIDJI, Minn. — The speed limits on several highways in northwest Minnesota increased from 55 to 60 miles per hour beginning February 1, according to the Minnesota Department of Transportation.

The new speed limits take effect when the new signs are posted.

Highways that will receive new speed limit signs include:

- Highway 113- Mahnomen/ Norman County line to Highway 32
- Highway 200- Mahnomen/ Norman County line to North Dakota Speed limits lower than

55 miles per hour along these sections of highway will remain unchanged.

The speed increases are based on a traffic and engineering study of each location, which looks at past crash rates, physical attributes of the highway (such as shoulder widths and access points), and an analysis of current driving speeds.

In 2014, the Minnesota Legislature directed MnDOT to evaluate its two-lane, two-way 55 mph highways to determine whether speed limits could be reasonably and safely increased. The statewide study will end in 2019.

Julia is excited for this amazing opportunity and hopes to make Red Lake County proud when she competes in Australia this coming July.

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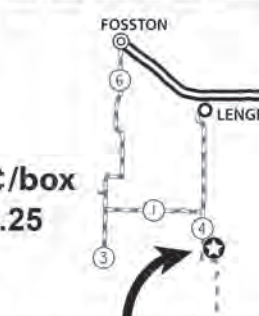

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Ask a Trooper

Question: Recently I have noticed quite a few semi-trucks on the free-way with snow and ice blowing off the top of the trailers, sometimes in sheets. I can only imagine what would happen if a sheet came off and struck an unsuspecting vehicle while traveling on the roadway. Is there a requirement to remove the snow/ice prior to traveling with the trailer?

Answer: This type of incident would fall under the “Unsecured load” statute. The law says that no vehicle shall be moved on a roadway, unless the load is securely covered to prevent any leaking, blowing, shifting or dropping.

Ice or any type of debris that comes off a vehicle could be considered an unsecured load. Drivers should be concerned about civil liability if they fail to take reasonable steps to re-

move snow and ice that result in property damage or injuries from a crash.

When traveling behind a vehicle with an unsecure load or ice/snow falling from it, give yourself plenty of room behind the vehicle to avoid any obstacles that may fall off and strike your vehicle. If possible, go around or pass the vehicle when it is safe to do so.

If you are involved in this type of incident where your vehicle is damaged and/or crashes as a result from falling debris, try to get a license plate number and report it to law enforcement and your insurance company.

Please take the time to remove all snow, ice and items that may come off your vehicle so it does not become a hazardous situation on the roadway.

Also, clear all frost, snow and ice from the windows so the driver is able to see from all angles.

Below are photos of the damage that can result when

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ice falls onto a vehicle while in motion. This happened in Mahtomedi last month. The motorist suffered minor injuries after a large ice chunk flew off a tractor-trailer and struck the vehicle following it.

Lt. Governor Tina Smith Visits Glyndon to Urge Support for Tax Cuts for 74,000 Minnesota’s Farmers

ST. PAUL, MN – Lt. Governor Tina Smith today visited Glyndon to urge the Minnesota Legislature to pass property tax relief for Minnesota farmers struggling with the perfect storm of rising land values, falling commodity prices, and aging schools. If approved by the Legislature, approximately 74,000 farmers would be eligible for the credit – saving them nearly \$34 million in property taxes. The Ag property tax credit was included in Governor Dayton and Lt. Governor Smith’s 2017 Tax Bill, which was unveiled earlier this month.

“Right now, the cost of much-needed school improvements in greater Minnesota communities disproportionately falls on farmers,” said Lt. Governor Smith. “Our agricultural property tax relief will keep more money in the pockets of Minnesota farmers, while supporting strong schools, so all Minnesota students have the opportunity to learn.”

Over the last ten years, property taxes for Minnesota farmers have increased by 114 percent. This problem has been compounded by low commodity prices and rising agricultural land values. In many rural communities, school district levies disproportionately affect farmers, making it challenging for schools to secure the funding for basic needs.

In 2016, the majority of levy referendums put to rural voters failed, while the majority posed to urban voters passed. This puts students in school districts like Barnesville and Dilworth-Glyndon-Felton, where referendums recently failed, at a disadvantage to their metro peers.

Tax Cuts for Minnesota’s

Farmers

Governor Dayton and Lt. Governor Smith are dedicated to supporting Minnesota’s farmers and agricultural industry. Other provisions that aid farmers in the 2017 Tax Bill include:

- Investing in 21st Century Classrooms – All Minnesota students need a world-class education, no matter where they live. However, in school districts without high-value land, the burden of paying for modern schools can fall disproportionately on just a few businesses, farms, or homeowners. Governor Dayton and Lt. Governor Smith have proposed a \$62 million investment over four years to help school districts repay school bond levies without overly burdening private property owners.

- Water Quality Buffer Aid – To help alleviate the cost of compliance with state water quality requirements, the Dayton-Smith Tax Bill includes a proposal that provides eligible farmers and landowners \$40 per acre each year for each tillable acre converted to a water quality buffer strip. Payments would be made for five years starting in 2019.

- Farmland Estate Tax Reforms – Governor Dayton and Lt. Governor Smith’s 2017 Tax Bill includes a reform to eliminate the recapture tax paid on inherited farmland subject to the estate tax when the farmland was acquired by the government through eminent domain.

Change will protect large fish and harvest opportunity

Anglers on Mille Lacs Lake will be able to keep three bass starting Saturday, May 27, when the bass harvest season begins. Catch-and-release bass fishing opens the same day as the walleye and northern pike fishing opener on Saturday, May 13.

“It’s no secret that Mille Lacs is a nationwide destination for smallmouth bass fishing,” said Don Pereira, DNR fisheries chief. “Knowing that we have something special here, we’re proceeding with caution and dropping the possession limit from four to three, which is a good balance between desire to harvest fish and preserving the trophy-sized bass that have

RiverView Health's Level 4 Trauma Center Designation Renewed

Crookston, MN –RiverView Health has once again been designated a Level 4 Trauma Center by the Minnesota Department of Health. The designation is valid for three years. RiverView first received this designation in 2008.

A trauma system like RiverView's is a predetermined and organized response to managing and improving the care of severely injured people. It spans the continuum-of-care; from prevention and emergency care to rehabilitation. Best practice standards guide each stage of trauma care to ensure that injured people are promptly transported to and treated at facilities appropriate to the severity of their injury.

A trauma system also provides a foundation for disaster preparedness and response. As part of its day-to-day activities, a trauma system coordinates the movement and care of severely injured people. Thus, a trauma system expands and contracts based on the needs and resources available at the moment.

RiverView Health and staff voluntarily participated in the intense designation process to become part of Minnesota's statewide trauma system. The process included an outside review of the hospital's resources and capabilities to care for trauma patients. RiverView met standards of commitment, clinical and equipment resources and staff training. The hospital also participates in a continuous performance improvement process.

For a severely injured person, the time between sustaining an injury and receiving definitive care is the most important predictor of survival – the "golden hour". The chance of survival diminishes with time; however, a trauma system enhances the chance of survival regardless of proximity to an urban trauma hospital.

"Trauma is the third leading cause of death in Minnesota," said Minnesota Commissioner of Health Dr. Edward Ehlinger. "The goal of the trauma system is to decrease injured patients' time to care by making sure their medical needs are appropriately matched with hospital resources. With the designation of RiverView as a Level 4 trauma hospital, we are getting closer to our goal of ensuring that seriously injured Minnesotans have access to an organized system of trauma care wherever they are in the state."

On average, trauma claims the lives of 2,400 Minnesotans annually. States with trauma systems have seen survival rates increase by 15 to 20 percent. Wide-scale participation in the voluntary trauma system ensures that a statewide, cooperative effort is in place to care for seriously injured patients.

Minnesota began developing a comprehensive statewide trauma system in August of 2005. Through its designation RiverView recognizes the vital role that communities, ambulance services, hospitals and health care professionals play in the care and management of trauma patients.

Valentines traditions from around the world

Valentine's Day is celebrated across the globe. Come Valentine's Day, candy, flowers and other gifts are exchanged between sweethearts in one of the many traditions associated with the holiday.

The origins of Valentine's Day are largely unknown. Some suggest Valentine's Day was initially a way to honor St. Valentine on the anniversary of his death. Others believe it was the Christian church's way of Christianizing the Pagan celebration of Lupercalia, a fertility festival dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture.

Regardless of its origins, Valentine's Day is now celebrated by millions and is one of the retail industry's most lucrative shopping holidays.

Many different traditions can be linked to Valentine's Day. Here is a list of the interesting ways Valentine's Day is celebrated across the globe.

South Korea - In South Korea, men get to enjoy the spotlight on Valentine's Day, as women bestow gifts of chocolate on them. In return, a month later men reciprocate with gifts for women on White Day. South Koreans take Valentine's Day a step further on Black Day, which falls on April 14. This is an opportunity for all single people who may not have received Valentine's Day gifts to gather at restaurants and eat a dish called "black noodles" as they celebrate their singleton status.

Denmark and Norway - These Scandinavian countries didn't really celebrate Valentine's Day until recently, but have now put their own spin on the traditions. Men write funny poems or rhyming love notes called Gaekkebrev and send them to women anonymously. Women must try to guess their admirers by counting dots that are put on the note that correspond to the number of letters

in the man's name. **Estonia** - In Estonia, Valentine's Day is a day more devoted to friendship than romantic love. It is called "Sõbrapäev" in Estonian, which translates to "Friend's Day." Cards and gifts are exchanged among friends.

Wales - In Wales, Valentine's Day is not celebrated. Rather, the Welsh commemorate St. Dwynwen's Day, who is their patron saint of lovers on January 25. It is customary to gift love-spoons, a tradition that likely stems from the practice of sailors carving intricately decorated spoons of wood and presenting them to women they were interested in courting or marrying.

France - Considered to be one of the most romantic countries in the world, France can be an ideal place to participate in Valentine's Day traditions. The French have an old custom called "une loterie d'amour," which is a drawing for love. Single men and women of all ages once entered houses that faced one another and took turns calling out to one another to find romantic matches. The men could refuse the match and leave the woman looking for another man to call on. Women who were not paired up would light a bonfire and damn the men who rejected them. The French government eventually banned the practice because of rowdy crowds.

Italy - Italian lovers celebrate Valentine's Day in much the same way as Americans. One interesting Valentine's tradition in Italy is locking padlocks to different structures, which is called "Lucchetti dell'Amore (locks of love)." Couples attach the locks to bridges, railings and lamp posts, inscribe their names and throw away the key. The action suggests the couple will be together forever.

MnDOT extends mowing permit application time frame and will revise permit requirements

ST PAUL, Minn. – Due to public concern regarding last fall's mowing and baling permit announcement, the Minnesota Department of Transportation has extended the time frame for permit applications by those who want to mow and bale on state highway right of way adjacent to their land and has modified permitting requirements.

The agency has worked closely with farmers, lawmakers and agriculture advocacy groups to modify requirements to better serve those who mow while still adhering to the law.

Landowners who want to mow on state highway right of way adjacent to their property now need to apply for a permit before the end of February to be considered ahead of others. All others who wish to mow on state right of way not adjacent

to their property may apply for the permit after March 1.

The agency will also revise requirements such as:

- The amounts and type of insurance necessary
- The use of safety equipment mounted on mowing vehicles and worn by individuals mowing
- The amount of the permit deposit fee
- Permit reassignment and procedures
- How many miles a permit will cover

After March 1, MnDOT will review and approve permit applications on a first-come, first-serve basis, including those already submitted. Landowners who have already received permits for mowing will receive an updated permit in the near future, so they do not need to re-apply.

Last fall, MnDOT announced that it had adopted a statewide standard for mowing and baling in state highway right of way and had revised the permit application form. State law requires that MnDOT manage right of way mowing, which includes cutting in advance of baling.
