2017 USXC I-500 Winnipeg to Bemidji Race held February 8, 9 and 10

Racers make a fuel stop in Gonvick on the last day of the race

The I-500 Cross Country race ran through the area in a flash. The final day was on Friday, February 10 and Zach Herfindahl took home the honors in the Pro 600. Zach had a tribute to Hunter Houle on his helmet during the race. Hunter was the young man who died in a pre-race event on Pine Lake last month. The race started out in Canada on the first day and the temperature was brutally cold -22 degrees. There were a few fingers and faces that had frost bite.

The race started in Winnipeg and went to Thief River Falls the first day. The second day the race went on a loop from Thief River Falls back to Thief River Falls at the Casino. The race had to be changed as the snow condition toward Willmar, had to be canceled. The third day the race went from Thief River Falls to Bemidji where the awards were presented that night. On the third leg of the race to Bemidji there were fresh ditches, rolling hills and tight woods for the racers to get through.

The top ten finishers in the Pro 600 were Zach Herfindahl, Arctic Cat; Ross Erdman, Arctic Cat; Aaron Christensen, Polaris; Re Wadena, Arctic Cat; Brian Dick, Arctic Cat; Ryan Trout, Arctic Cat; Gabe Bunker, Polaris; Taylor Bunke, Polaris; Dillan Dohrn, Skidoo and Erick Christenson, Polaris.

Three women completed the 3 day 525 mile race from Winnipeg to Bemidji. Taking first place was Savannah Landrus, Arctic Cat, 2nd place Jolene Bute, Arctic Cat and third place Jill Tangen, Polaris.

Matt Feil, a senior who attends Bemidji High School ended up in 14th place in the Pro 600 despite having trouble with his sled. He has ties to the Feils in Shevlin.

Derek Frie took first place in the Sport 600 Stock class despite breaking his hand during the first three laps in the Thief River Falls run.

Ellen Frondorf wins the 2017 Shenandoah National Park Trust Research Grant

A Bemidji State University graduate student has won the 2017 Shenandoah National Park Trust Research Grant for her project on oak and pine regeneration after fires in Virginia's Shenandoah National Park.

Ellen Frondorf, a biology major from Cincinnati, Ohio, will research fire-adapted oak and pine ecosystems, which make up about 40 percent of the park, to assess how those ecosystems regenerate after fires.

"I've worked the previous three summers for Shenandoah National Park as a fire effects monitor and have seen first-hand the ecological benefits that fire can have for forests and grasslands," Frondorf said. "Knowing why fire is used as an ecological tool made me interested to see how prescribed fire and wildfires affected the park."

The grant program supports research that will benefit the



park by answering questions of the staff and management. The park manages the program, and recipients may receive up to \$15,000 to aid in their field research. Frondorf was awarded \$14,838 to pursue her research. "I was both shocked and elated that I had been chosen," Frondorf said. "The objectives of the grant and my research objectives lined up well. By receiving this grant, I am able to hire a BSU student as a re-

search assistant and we will be able to focus the whole summer on completing the research."

Many ecosystems in Shenandoah National Park are adapted to occasional low-intensity fires that stimulate plant regeneration. Frondorf's research will examine both prescribed-fire and wildfire areas dating back to 2002 in an effort to determine the most-suitable conditions for proper regeneration of oak and pine trees. The work will

help guide park management decisions such as determining appropriate times to re-apply fire to previously burned areas, based on her observations of the land.

"Factors like seed availability, litter and duff layer thickness and presence and abundance of fire-intolerant species all come into play," she said. "Assessing oak and pine regeneration in seven previously burned areas in the park will give me working knowledge of what those landscapes look like from one year post-burn to 15 years post-burn. These insights will undoubtedly be used as I continue on in my fire ecology career."

Frondorf's research will also include Shenandoah's Rocky Mountain Fire, which occurred from mid-April to early May, 2016, in the park's south district. The fire burned more than 10,000 acres of park land

and temporarily closed several trails.

"Fire is a critical component to these forests, and this research will allow us to have Shenandoah-specific information on post-fire recovery and forest regeneration," said Jeff Koenig, a fire management officer at the park.

Jim Northrup, superintendent of Shenandoah National Park, says the research funded

by the grant program helps to guide his staff's efforts to manage the park.

"For the last three years, the Shenandoah National Park Trust has enabled researchers to answer critical questions of our park staff," he said. "This project is especially timely, as we learn about the Rocky Mount fire and its effect on plants, wildlife and people."

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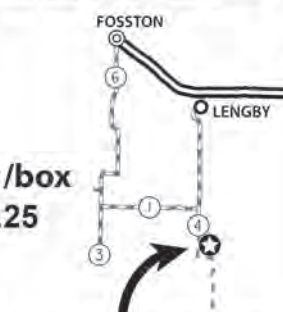
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Road trips enable travelers to discover the country's wonders up close.

Sanford Health announces licensed practical nurse (LPN) forgiveable loan application deadline

BEMIDJI, Minn. - Sanford Health and Northwest Technical College are partners in a program to help aspiring students reach their goals of becoming Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs). The program loans LPN nursing students \$5,000 toward their tuition expenses, and offers them part-time employment while they go to school. In return, after graduation students work for two years in a full-time LPN position at Sanford in order to receive the full loan forgiveness.

Brian Matthews, director of human relations for Sanford, described the forgiveable loan program as a way to encourage more students to join the LPN program at the Northwest Technical College. "The loan helps remove the financial barriers for students, and gives Sanford Health more new nurses when these students graduate. It benefits us all. And an LPN degree is often a stepping stone

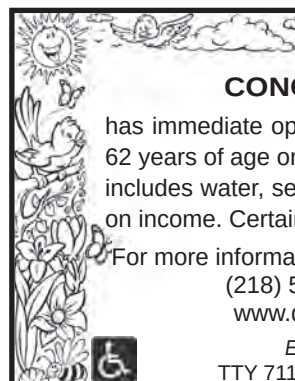

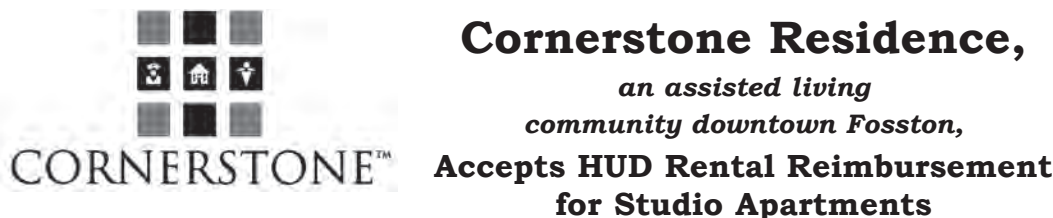

A one-way trip for one passenger flying from Minneapolis to Los Angeles causes more than 1740 pounds of greenhouse gas emissions. It would take more than 20 trees seedlings grown for 10 years to sequester that amount of carbon. With a few changes you can green up your time away from home.

Planning for your green vacation

- For a low-carbon option, consider taking a train or motor coach.
- If you fly, choose a nonstop coach flight.
- Driving solo has the heaviest environmental footprint. Consider carpooling or renting a fuel-efficient or hybrid vehicle.
- If you drive, choose a green route.

Packing

- Bring and use a reusable bottle.
- Pack light. Those few added pounds in planes, trains, and automobiles will cause more carbon to be emitted into the atmosphere.
- Bring your own toiletries. The miniature soaps and shampoos from hotels contribute to thousands of bags of waste each year.

Before you go

- Unplug any unnecessary appliances such as televisions, computers, toasters, and microwaves. They still use energy in their off mode.
- Set your thermostat and water heater at low settings so that energy isn't wasted while you're gone.
- During your stay**
- If the hotel or lodge promotes sustainable practices participate as much as possible.
- Keep your showers short and shut off the water while brushing your teeth.
- If you use the complementary toiletries, take them home and use them up.
- Let the hotel know that you prefer not to have towels and sheets changed every day.

- Lower the thermostat if you'll be gone for a long period of time.
- Recycle and sort your trash.

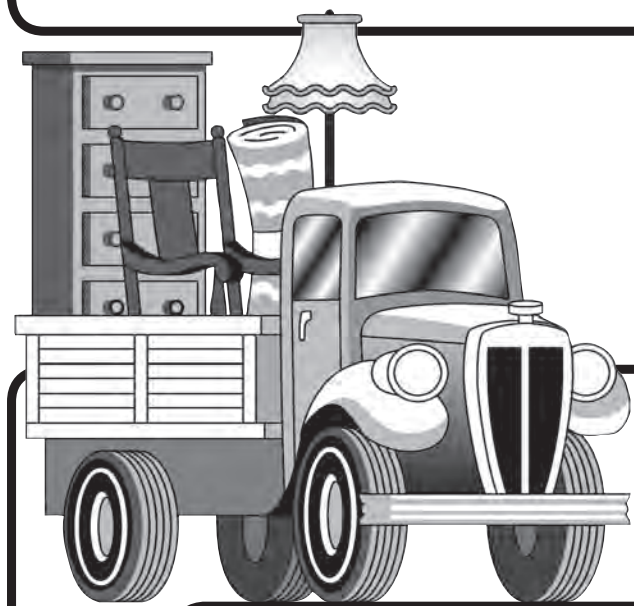

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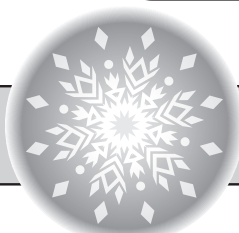

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The Winter Shows

Most people of a certain age in this area remember the winters shows. I'm not talking about the blizzards and howling winds that Mother Nature displayed in the month of February. Rather, I'm referring to the annual event held each February in Crookston, MN.

It was an annual ritual for a lot of families and individuals to attend. The winter shows would usually be a week long and take place around the middle of the month. I can remember as a kid looking forward to it each and every year. Sometimes we would go on a Saturday, however, we also would attend on a weekday so we also got out of school for a day. As I look back, it was probably more educational that what we would have learned in school that day anyway.

I was very young when I first started going, but I recall it like it was yesterday. Dad would get the morning milking and chores done and off we would go. I still remember the first time going there and thinking about all the vehicles in the parking lot. I would look at the winter show building and think how mammoth it looked to a little kid. There would be men around directing the traffic and pointing with long sticks on where to park. In the back towards the livestock area you could see rows of pickups and cattle trailers lined up. There was an admission to get in so we would wake up to a man sitting in a little booth just inside the doors. He would grab his little stamper and stamp our hands before we went in. I think they used a different color each day so someone didn't come back the next day and walk right in.

The first thing you would see when you walked in was a display of various crops displayed neatly on stands. There were different varieties of each crop and ribbons hanging for various awards. There were hundreds of booths from different businesses or organizations set up throughout the building. There was also an upper deck that went around part of the building. There was a place to sit down and eat on the south side of the building, plus other things to eat scattered around.

The first few years I attended I was too little to look around by myself so I would walk with Mom and Dad. After a few years and I could head out and look around on my own. The first thing as a kid was to pick up a bag with good handles on it found at one of the booths. This

bag was necessary to have to collect all the things that the businesses were giving away. I would start on one side of the building and stop at each booth to see if there was a pen or pencil or little notebook to give away. This was exhausting for a little kid and I would get hungry. I would then look for the sunflower booth that would give away little packets of sunflower seeds. There sometimes would be candy in bowls to eat so I had some of that as well. Once I was energized again it was off to filling my bag. Sometimes my arm would get tired because of all the weight in it so I would have to switch hands. I know for a fact I didn't miss a thing. I remember getting a yardstick at one place and was wondering how I would get that in my bag of goodies. I can recall running into Mom and Dad and they would look inside my bag at all that I had collected. I can still picture in my mind the location of the booths. It seemed they were in the same spot year after year. The Farmers Union booth always had balloons and cobs to give out and Cenex was just across the dirt aisle. I would get a button there to wear.

If you went just down the way from them you would see Dad talking to the Hanson silo man. He appeared to be older to me with white wavy hair. I think they had sold us our silos. Across from them was always Bemidji Woolen Mills. They had their wool red and black jackets on display. Back then there were so many farm, seed and chemical companies to advertise their products. It took most of the morning to finish going around the ground floor. Usually then I had set a time to meet everyone else for dinner. We would have a hamburger and fries and something to drink over at the food stand. It always felt good to sit down and relax for a while. Being the food stand was right next to one of the stairs to the upper part, I would go there next.

The Gideon booth was always at the top of the stairs. Some vacuum cleaner man was next to the Gideons. In the corner there was a radio station from Crookston that was always broadcasting live. I would have the area upstairs covered and then would head back to the north part of the building. This is where I would stop to look at a man's display of shiny belt buckles. He was a large man with a huge belt buckle on himself. A person could barely see it though as his belly was large and hung over it, I would

always make sure I had enough money with to buy one. I still have them all to this day.

I had pretty much covered everything I wanted to, so it was time to go look at the animals. My first stop was always at the chickens and rooster to see if my Dad's uncle was there. Henry Busse was married to my Grandma Paulson's sister Mart. They lived in Crookston. Henry would be sitting on a stool in the corner as he would have several prize winning entries. He never talked a lot but was always proud to show me his roosters. He always wore a crisp blue bibs overalls. We would always stop and see Mary at the house before we went home. She always looked for us to stop sometime during the winter shows.

After seeing Henry's roosters, it was off to the cattle and hogs. There were some nice animals that were well taken care of. I would get back to where the hogs were and that's where Dad would be watching the annual hog sale. We would buy boar pigs there from time to time. My Dad's cousin, Roger Schmidt would usually be there too with his trailer and haul them home for us. Roger was raising pigs at the time as well. I would spend a little time there watching the pig sale and then would head back to walking around.

It was probably three or three thirty now so I would go buy a pop and a box of popcorn. When I was finished with that it was time for one more quick walk around the booths. I may have missed a sticker or what have you, so I had to take one last look. I had more pencils and pens than I knew what to do with. To this day there are pencils around home from my trips to the winter shows. It was soon 4 o'clock and that's when we were supposed to meet up front by the main doors. Another year at the winter show had come and gone and it was time for us to head home to do the chores and get the milking done. After chores, I would head to my room and dump out my bag of goodies.

After looking at the pile on my bed, I know I didn't miss a booth or item they were handing out. If it was on a Saturday when we went to the winter show, I always had a new pencil to school with me the next Monday. I probably looked pretty sharp as well writing with that pencil. Why? Well, I was wearing my shiny new rhinestone belt buckle that I had purchased on our February trip to the winter shows in Crookston.

Answer: There is a law that covers this issue. The state statute says that it is unlawful to obstruct any highway or deposit snow or ice on the road. This prohibits the plowing, blowing,

shoveling or otherwise placing of snow on to public roads. This includes the ditch and right-of-way area along the roads.

There may be local ordinances against it as well.

Violations are considered misdemeanors, but civil liability also applies if the placement of snow creates a hazard, such as a slippery area, frozen rut or bump that contributes to a motor vehicle or pedestrian crash. The civil liability can extend to both the property owner and the person who placed the snow.
