The “Brain Gain” of Rural America

The Northwest Minnesota Council of Collaboratives and Tri-Valley Opportunity Council Inc. hosted "Rewriting the Rural Narrative: The 'Brain Gain' of Rural America" first in Thief River Falls on Tuesday, February 7th at the Ralph Engelstad arena and then on Wednesday, February 8th at the Crookston Inn & Convention Center. Both featured University of Minnesota Extension Research Fellow Ben Winchester and Washington Post writer Chris Ingraham who moved to Red Lake Falls after writing an article about the "absolute worst place to live in America."

Christopher Ingraham's story:

Immediately after the August 2015 story, Ingraham wrote about Red Lake County being the worst place to live in America, which was based on U.S. Department of Agriculture data showing the prevalence of physical characteristics ranking each county from high to low, he receiving "hate tweets" from many residents in Red Lake County including one from Minnesota Senator Al Franken. He was shocked since he had written many pieces based on USDA data and never had such a response.

Before long, he also received an email from Jason Brumwell that invited Ingraham to Red Lake County. After verifying it was a legit offer, he brought the idea to his editor and Ingraham was on his way to Red Lake

County.

He said when he arrived at the Red Lake County Courthouse to meet Brumwell, he was greeted by about 50 television cameras, dozens of people and a marching band.

The Red Lake Falls people who invited him put a lot of thought to Ingraham's visit bringing him around to many places in Red Lake County, on that whirlwind tour. After Ingraham had returned home, he couldn't stop thinking about Red Lake County.

Ingraham had long commutes to and from work and didn't get to spend time with his twin sons in the evenings, and his wife also worked. It was a hectic life for a family. Before long, he pitched the idea to his wife and they went from living in an expensive 900 square foot row house in Baltimore to buying a house in Red Lake Falls.

Since he is a reporter, 99 percent of his work is done by phone and the computer was easy to move to the small town in Red Lake Falls, where he works from home. And he doesn't miss the 3 hour a day commute. That is one reason there is a desire to get back to small towns and rural life.

Ingraham closed his presentation of pictures, and added that he and his wife were expecting another child.

Ben Winchester, U of M Extension Researcher

It is often heard that the young people in rural Minne-

sota don't stay after high school, leaving their small towns for college. However, it has been found that there is a migration to these same towns with 30 - 49 years old adults with their young children. This is what Winchester calls a brain gain.

During Winchester's presentation of statistical data, he said, "High school kids are still going to want to get out no matter where they are. It happens everywhere, not just small towns."

Winchester said many young people end up coming back to their communities to get back to a simpler lifestyle (quality of life), and to take on leadership roles. He talked about rural cities concentrating too much on population change, but that most don't realize the actual numbers show fluctuation within the age groups.

Winchester also mentioned that there is an influx of people who work from home, like book editors and engineers, and you don't always realize they are here, because they're not "working for someone."

Winchester said that the average American moves approximately 12 times in their lifetime and more people are choosing rural places. The bottom line is people want to live and move here for what we have, a quieter, simpler life style that lets families spend more quality time together.

Minnesota schools have 47 percent fewer fires each year than national average

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Minnesota schools are some of the safest in the country when it comes to fires, according to a new report released today by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety State Fire Marshal Division (DPS-SFMD).

Minnesota's annual average of 43 school fires is 47 percent lower than the national average of 81, according to the "Minnesota School Fire Report."

The report also shows that since the DPS-SFMD School Inspection Program began in 1990:

- The annual average number of school fires in Minnesota has dropped from 90 (1990-1994) to 41 (2010-2014).
- From 2009-2013, Minnesota's school fire loss has decreased by just over 70 percent to \$3,201 per fire, while the national average has increased 50 percent to \$17,241 per fire. Minnesota's average loss per school fire is about 81 percent lower than the national average.
- "School is like a second home to most children, and we're proud that they care about fire safety," State Fire Marshal Bruce West said. "Our inspectors work hard with local officials so they understand how to prevent fires in their schools. These numbers show that our partnership is working to reduce these incidents around the state."

Key findings from the report

- Apart from insufficient exits, unprotected corridors and stairways were the most significant and costly corrections

school officials had to make when DPS-SFMD inspectors first started visiting schools.

- As the inspection program has progressed, less serious issues are more common such as improper use of extension cords and other routine maintenance issues that are relatively easy and inexpensive to fix.
- Almost 60 percent of Minnesota school fires happen in middle schools, junior high schools and high schools.

- o These buildings tend to have more hazardous operations or activities such as science experiments, shops, or large-scale cooking operations.
- o Secondary school-age children are more likely to engage in firesetting.
- o Secondary schools tend to be larger in size.
- The most fires occur in February and May and on Thursdays.
- Almost 33 percent of school fires started in bathrooms or locker rooms. Other common areas include heating/mechanical spaces and classrooms (11 percent each).

School fire safety: What you can do

Kids may know how to escape their burning home, but may not have the same understanding about their school. State law requires schools to conduct at least five fire drills per school year, but that's only one part of school fire and emergency preparedness.

Teachers and parents should talk to their students and children about fire drills and make sure they take

them seriously.

- Students should be familiar with, and strictly follow, their school's fire safety and evacuation procedures.
- Students must never assume a fire alarm is a false alarm, even when there's no apparent signs of fire.
- When outside of normal classroom hours, students should know where to go and who to report to when the fire alarm sounds.
- Following an emergency evacuation, students should immediately report to their assigned meeting location and be sure their attendance is recorded by school staff.
- School activities requiring the use of hazardous materials, open flame or heat producing appliances should only be done under direct supervision.
- Parents should talk to their children about the dangers and power of fire, and teach them safe behaviors.**
- Set a good example by installing and maintaining smoke alarms.
- Take responsibility for fire safety by pointing out fire safety and fire prevention rules and discussing the dangers of fire.
- Control access to fire by keeping all ignition devices out of reach of children. Teach them to notify an adult if they find things like matches or lighters.
- Check in trashcans, under beds and in closets for burned matches or other evidence your child is misusing fire. If you find evidence, use it as a teaching opportunity.

The stable is one of the oldest and most successful saddlebred training stables in South Africa. Kris Swanson's grandmother Margaret (Margit) Larson first husband passed away when she had four young children; Alice, Art, Henry and Effie. Alice Larson is Kris's mom. Art and Henry Larson lived in Gonvick. Effie Larson lived in Bagley after she retired from Nursing. Margaret Larson remarried Ellis Vinje after his wife died of tuberculosis. Ellis Vinje's homestead was near Gonvick, Pine Lake Township, Clearwater County.

(Note: Ellis had three children from his first marriage to Suaave Mitgarden that included Marie (Henry) Johnson of Clearbrook (which include Robert and Vernon Johnson of Clearbrook) and Edward and Oscar Vinje.)

Kris grew up with her parents Alice and Don Swanson in Minneapolis and spent time in the summer with their families in Clearbrook and Gonvick. She would visit with her cousin Priscilla (Larson) Hollander, daughter of the Art Larsons.

Three arrested in Audubon robbery

AUDUBON, Minn.—Three men were arrested Tuesday morning, Feb. 14, after a robbery at the Orton's Convenience Store in Audubon.

According to a report released by Becker County Sheriff Todd Glander: The robbery was reported about 1:14 a.m. Tuesday.

A store clerk told authorities he was robbed by two males possessing knives who fled with an undetermined amount of cash and merchandise.

Shortly after the robbery was reported a suspect vehicle was reported driving south from Audubon on County Highway 11. A few minutes after the car was spotted, three individuals were taken into custody.

Those arrested were identified by Glander as John Greywind, 22, of Bismarck; Dylan Beckman, 23, of Lengby, Minn.; and Steven Golden, 23, of Moorhead.

The three are being held in the Becker County Jail pending the filing of felony charges, according to Glander, who said no one was hurt in the robbery.

The Detroit Lakes Police Department and the Minnesota State Patrol assisted the Audubon Police Department and Becker County Sheriff's Office in responding to the robbery, Glander said.

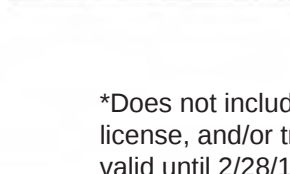

Lloyd & Carol Wold weren't too far away, but then was any neighbor? They were like another set of grandparents. Lloyd would drive us to school in Gully on his orange bus. We would get to go to their place quite often and get candy & play with their dog, Otto.

Kenny & Arlene Wold were the other Wolds. Kenny managed the lumber yard in Gully. We would go to their place especially for 4-H meetings.

Being on a farm and having some old two cylinder John Deere tractors meant getting Roy Larson over to work on them. He had a light blue pickup with a white topper on it. He was a bachelor that lived by Lloyd Wold's. He would come get milk as well. His tin milk can had a sweet aroma. We called him tiddeldunce. Why, I don't know.

My brother Danny & I would sell Olympic cards when we were young. That meant a stop at Alf & Alice Roland's. She would always welcome us in for goodies and buy some cards. She was a good repeat customer.

Of course we had neighbors that were relatives. Such was the case for Phillip & Mable Schmit. He was farming and Mable was a nurse, I believe, at Johnson Rest Home in Fosston. Schmit's neighbors kiddy corner to them were Orvin & Lois Sunrud. Orvin had big hands and a hearty handshake. Orvin always waved with his index

finger back and forth. Later on Lois and Grandma Doris were good friends.

There were some nice beef cows in the area as well. They belonged to Charles & Ester Pletschett. He was a early bird feeding and tending to his cows. Both worked and raise a family on that farm.

Ernest & Ester Thorssen were farmers as well. Who wasn't back then? They were retired. Ernest talked with the help of a device he put up to his throat when he spoke. Ester lived to be in her upper nineties. Ernest has a brother, Victor. Victor & Emma Thorssen lived just down the road from them. They farmed and lived very simple and had Perch Lake to the west of them and Moe Lake to the north.

We have a country church in Eden Township called Salem Lutheran Church. There's a driveway by it that led to Alfred Haugen's. Alfred was a bachelor. They are still looking for all of his coffee cans.

My cousins had grandparents that were neighbors as well. Sanford & June Bergh had a farm by the Eden town hall. They raised sheep, lots of sheep. I would go there lots with Jill and Kelly. I thought Roy Larson lived there too. I guess they needed a mechanic also. June had good lunches.

Some neighbors weren't known as well or seen as much. That's probably because they worked hard every day at their job. Hilda Swenson lived south of Orvin Sunrud's. She was employed in Fosston.

I liked playing with gravel trucks as a kid. However, I thought the real ones were better yet. Norris Brekke had one and hauled in the area. Norris & Leona Brekke lived on the north of Selmer Wold's. Leona was a friend of my grandma, Catherine Paulson.

Effie and Harriet had warm milk for supper that night.

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Ask a Trooper

Question: My husband was driving while I was a passenger and an elder man driving ran a stop sign and cut in front of us. My husband honked his horn to alert the driver prior to him attempting to come into our lane. However, he did not appear to hear us. Fortunately, we were able to avoid being hit, as my husband was an alert driver and saw this coming. Is this something we can report? I am not sure if this man should be driving, as he appeared to have no regard for anyone else on the road. I am not sure what police could have done, as there was no accident or injury. I guess I am curious to know what the protocol is in such a situation.

Answer: It sounds like your husband was very attentive and because of this, he was able to avoid a crash. This situation is one of the reasons why law enforcement talks about the importance of avoiding all distractions while driving, as you might be able to see a potential hazard or crash before it happens.

If you witness any dangerous driving conduct, call law enforcement and report the incident as soon as possible. Report your location, attempt to get the license plate number, direction of travel and the driving conduct you are seeing. We will do our best to get that vehicle stopped before anyone gets hurt. We will talk to the driver and determine if they are/were impaired, distracted, fatigued, valid to drive, and the reason for their driving conduct.

Law enforcement officers can send a request for review to the Minnesota Department of Public Safety Driver and Vehicle Services (DPS-DVS) if they identify a driver who they

believe should re-test or be checked by a doctor. DPS-DVS can allow the person to keep driving with increased limitations such as roadway speed, daylight only, certain times of the day or within a set limit of miles from his or her home. They can also require follow-up doctor's exams.

Wearing your seatbelt along with avoiding distractions while driving will increase your chances of not being involved in a crash and could save your

life. Take driving seriously each time you get behind the wheel.

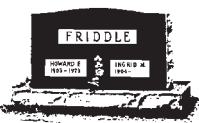

Having dated Ruby Christopherson for many years, they finally married February 24, 1979. She later passed away on May 5, 2012.

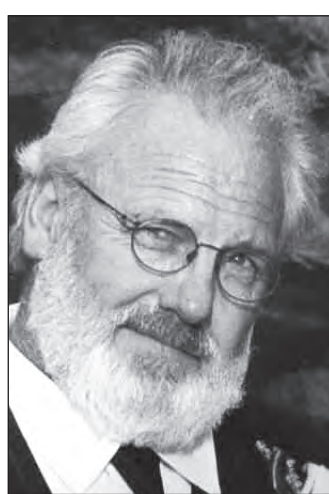

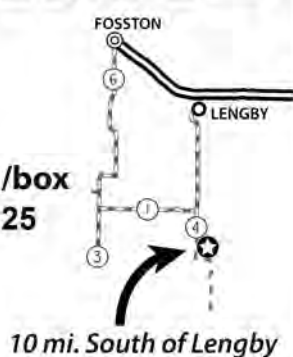

Silent stroke may not exhibit any symptoms, making it more difficult to detect.

What Is a Silent Stroke?

The brain is a complex organ responsible for controlling many different bodily functions. When working at optimal capacity, the brain is a wonder to behold. When illness or trauma affects the brain, various parts of the body may not work as they should.

One of the more devastating things that can affect the brain is stroke. Stroke describes a sudden stoppage of blood from reaching the brain. Harvard Medical School states that if a large number of brain cells are starved of blood supply, they can die. With their demise, a person's memory and ability to speak and move can be compromised.

While many strokes come on suddenly, certain factors may indicate a person is at risk. Such factors may include prior heart attacks, genetics, high blood pressure, smoking, or a prior stroke. However, in a particular type of stroke - a "silent stroke" - symptoms are far more subtle and difficult to spot.

Silent cerebral infarction, often referred to as "SCI" or "silent stroke," is a brain injury likely caused by a blood clot interrupting blood flow to the brain, offers the American Stroke Association. Silent strokes increase risk for other strokes and can be a sign of progressive brain damage. A silent stroke is typically only noticed as a side component of an MRI of the brain. Many times patients do not recall having a stroke and never felt any symptoms. Silent strokes should not be mistaken for mini-strokes. Mini-stroke is a brief but discrete and memorable event, with symptoms appearing for a few minutes or a few hours.

According to a study on silent stroke titled "Functional and Cognitive Consequences of Silent Stroke Discovered Using Brain Magnetic Resonance Imaging in an Elderly Population" and published in the Journal of American Geriatrics Society, silent strokes are quite

common and can have serious consequences. Researchers have found that silent stroke is associated with impairments in tests of cognitive function rather than movement-oriented performance tests like rising from a chair. Almost 50 percent of studied silent strokes affected frontal circuit components of the brain, such as the frontal cortex, basal ganglia and thalamus. Lesions in these brain structures compromised executive functions and were related to vascular dementia. Another study showed associations between silent stroke and visual field deficits, weakness in walking on heels, history of memory loss, migraines, and lower scores in cognitive function tests.

The "silent" part of a silent stroke also refers to the areas of the brain that the stroke affects. Experts at Harvard Medical School explain that, during a silent stroke, an interruption in blood flow destroys areas of cells in a part of the brain that is "silent," meaning that it doesn't control any vital functions. Researchers say that, over time, the damage from silent strokes can accumulate, leading to more and more problems with memory. Collectively, silent strokes become silent no longer.

There are certain ways to reduce the risk of any type of stroke. These include:

- managing high blood pressure and high cholesterol levels
- quitting smoking
- reducing the risk of diabetes and effectively treat the condition if it is present
- losing weight to prevent obesity
- exercising and avoid a sedentary lifestyle
- taking a low-dose aspirin or a drug that prevents blood clots.

Silent strokes largely go unrecognized but can lead to significant brain injury. Getting the facts can help men and women reduce their risk for silent stroke.

More than 10,000 Minnesota farms have been honored since the program began in 1976.

Family farms are recognized as Century Farms when three requirements are met. The farm must be: 1) at least 100 years old according to authentic land records; 2) in continuous family ownership for at least 100 years (continuous residence on the farm is not required); and 3) at least 50 acres.

A commemorative certificate signed by State Fair Board of Managers President Sha-

ron Wessel, Minnesota Farm Bureau Federation President Kevin Paap and Governor Mark Dayton will be awarded to qualifying families, along with an outdoor sign signifying Century Farm status.

Applications are available online at mstatefair.org (click the "Recognition Programs" link at the bottom of the home page); at fbmn.org; by calling the State Fair at (651) 288-4400; or at statewide county extension and county Farm Bureau offices. The submission deadline is Monday, April 3. Recipients will be announced in May. Previously recognized families should not reapply.
