SIMPLY DELICIOUS

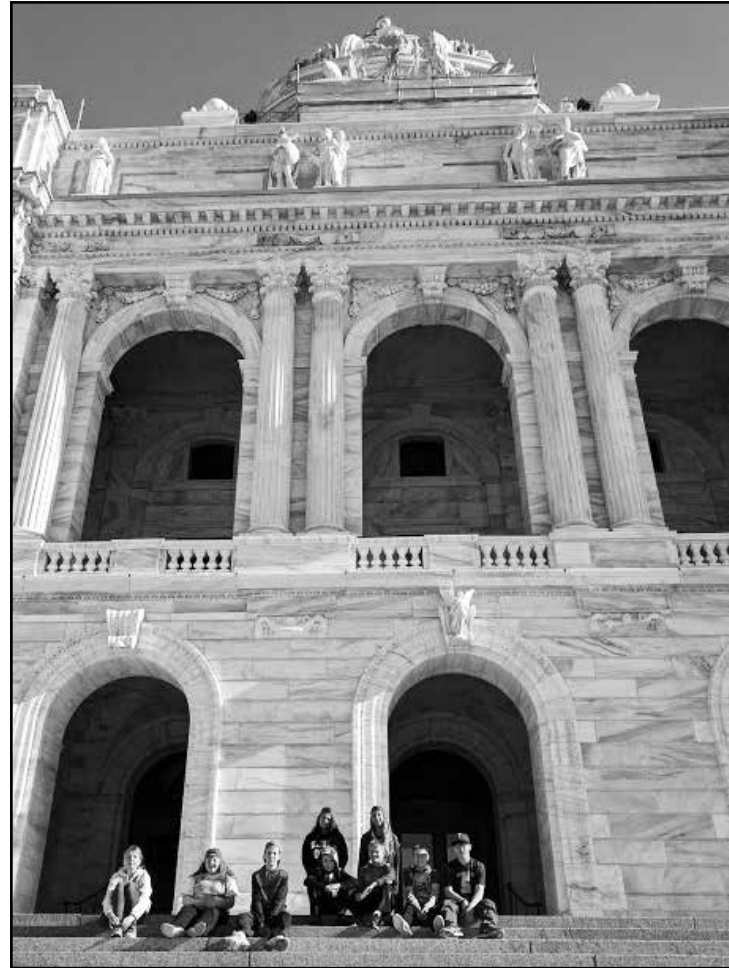

olive oil. Placed 4 thawed chicken breasts inside. Mixed together one can of chicken broth and one can of cream of chicken soup and poured over the top. Then, I put Stove Top Chicken Stuffing on top of that. Into the oven it went for about 90 minutes. (I stirred it all together about half way through.)

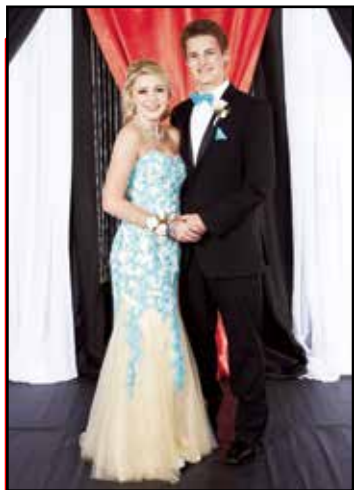
The Chinese had a city and some people lived in the city. The city was built with wood. They were built with tile, plaster, mud, and stone. Thatched or tile roofing was common on the Chinese homes. None of the Chinese homes still stand today.

There is a type of grain that was eaten and was one of the main crops in ancient China. Rice grew naturally along the long Huang River. Peanuts were eaten as a tasty snack or added as a good cooked meal. Rice was used to make good wine as well as cakes and lots of pudding.

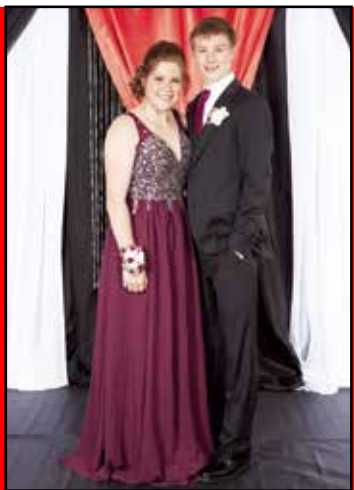
Men and women wore tunics, and sometimes a shirt that usually went to their knees. Some wore this with long pants. Others wore floor-length robes. Most common people wore clothing made of fluffy cotton or soft hemp. Only wealthy rich people could afford silk clothing.

It was very common practice to worship one's ancestors. The Chinese people irrigated their crops only using canals. In rural areas, daily life centered on lots of farming tasks. Men tilled fields, hunted, and fished. Women spent most of their time cooking, making wine, raising silkworm, silk production, and weaving.





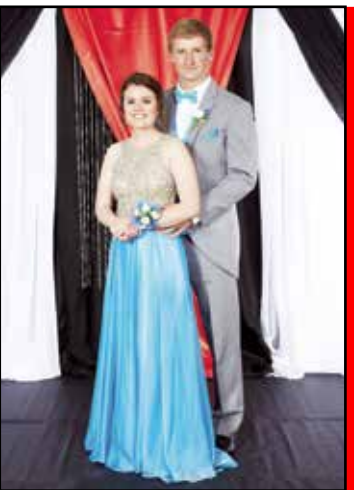
