Grygla City Council holds July meeting Members approve the official minutes from June

The regular meeting of the Grygla City Council was held on Wednesday, July 13th, at 7pm. The agenda included the approval of the June 8th meeting minutes, which are included below for your reference. The June Council meeting was held on the 8th with the following council members present: Mayor Richard Mosher, Gavin Nordby, Lindsay Oslund and Robert Thompson. Absent: Dave Dunrud. Also present were Crystelle Phipps, Stacie Meyer and Rose Aune.

The following agenda items were approved at the start of the meeting: previous month's minutes, receipts & disbursements and payment of all bills presented on the claims list.

Crystelle Philipps, from Hoffman, Philipps, & Knutson

PLCC, went over the 2014 City Audit.

The Revolving Loan Committee met to discuss the purchase of Motel 89 by Shawn & Stacie Meyer. A motion was made & approved to go with the Revolving Loan Committee's recommendation and loan Meyers Management \$40,000 at 3% interest for 15 yrs with payments to start 8/1/2015. Rose Aune is to talk to Bryan Grove about possibly setting up the amortization schedule and the loan agreement.

City garage siding: Aune will check with Galen Clow, Grygla School Superintendent, to see if they will settle for 25% of the entire repair bill, since the City has already paid Bill Neuschwander \$3,800 for the east wall of the city garage.

Marbel Home mowing: \$20 per lot per time mowing at the apartments, since Meyer's do all the trimming themselves.

Community Center: New

flooring is going to be ordered for the Eagle office. Windows need to be fixed in the Eagle office and the library.

Grygla Seed/New Lots: Depending on the cost of the installation of the culvert, the city may settle for Grygla Seed paying for all of that for payment of the extra land west of their property.

Safe Routes to School Grant: A motion was made to approve the resolution for the Safe Routes to School Grant.

Playground Equipment: Oslund sent measurements and pictures in for a design of a playground that will fit that area by the campground.

Trees: Rocky is supposed to meet with Lisa Newton and Jim Hest to figure out what trees should be purchased and planted on the west side of Klein Addition.

Data Privacy Policies: The following Data Privacy Policies were approved: Data Inven-

tory, Data Practices Policy for Members of the Public, Data Practices Policy for Data Subjects, Data Practices Policy for City Employees & Elected Officials.

SHIP Mini-Grant: The council decided they would let the school pursue the SHIP Mini-Grant if they are interested at all. The council wasn't interested in applying for it.

Enbridge Safe Community Grant: Bob is going to contact Meg about the Enbridge Safe Community Grant to see if it's something that the Fire Department would be able to use for something.

Work contracts were tabled until the July meeting.

Extra meetings: Oslund, Thompson, Mosher and Nordby had a meeting with Lynn Anderson to go over the insurance policy changes.

Tips to prevent getting a cold or the flu Eagle Intern, Jelle, visits with Coleen Kiesow, RN

Coleen Kiesow graduated from Grygla High School in May of 1985 and started on her college classes that June at NCTC to become a Licensed Practical Nurse. In the years to come she finished her Registered Nursing degree there and her associates degree in 1988. She is presently working at Public Health in Warren, Minnesota, and her official title is Geriatric Care Coordinator.

Coleen, who is married to Ronald Kiesow, and has four children that she greatly loves, is currently living in rural Goodridge, Minnesota. In an interview last week, Coleen says that her favorite part of the job is the interaction she has with the residents at the nursing home and meeting older people in the community, finding out their needs, and then with the help of the Marshall County social workers, meeting those needs.

Outside of work, her interests include the three dogs her family has, mowing grass in between rain showers, anything to do with her kids or the church, and reading a good book.

We all know, though, that soon cold and flu season is coming up and we all want to try and skip over it. Coleen was helpful enough to give a few tips on what to do before and after cold season. The biggest and most effective way to keep the germs away would be by sanitizing or washing your hands as often as you can. It is important to keep your hands as germ free as possible since that is the most common way to spread germs. You probably touch a lot of things in the course of one day and every time you do that you're spreading possible flu or cold germs. A newer recommendation is to cough or sneeze into your sleeve instead of into the air or your hands.

No one wants to be stuck at home all day with the flu either. Coleen recommends that you get a flu shot every fall. Even early December isn't too late to get that flu shot! If your doctor allows it, and if you are brave enough, getting a flu shot is very important every year to prevent getting sick. Another cause of getting sick is lack of vitamins. "I am a firm believer in taking vitamin C and D during the winter; it doesn't hurt to even take it all year!" Coleen

said. If you are 65 or older she recommends getting the pneumonia shot to prevent this harsh virus.

Many people also have the misconception with the flu shot and how it works.

The flu shot is a dead virus and cannot make you sick with the flu but it will help your body build up antibodies, the little cells that help keep you

healthy, to defend you when the flu does get inside your body. If even after the flu shot you get sick it is either bad luck or you are having a reaction to the solution that the flu shot is kept in, something that Coleen, like some of the rest of

us, has experienced personally. We must also remember that the flu is very common and is always evolving to find ways and slip past the antibodies. To treat the flu you can buy Tamiflu, which does shorten your sick time considerably, or you can do what your mom used to tell you! You can get plenty of rest and eat a nice bowl of chicken noodle soup and remember to drink plenty of fluids. If you happen to come down with the flu do not go to work or school and spread your germs thus making everyone sick. Remember one of the main differences between the flu and a cold is if you have a fever it normally means the flu. There isn't much you can do if you start to come down with a bad cough or cold. 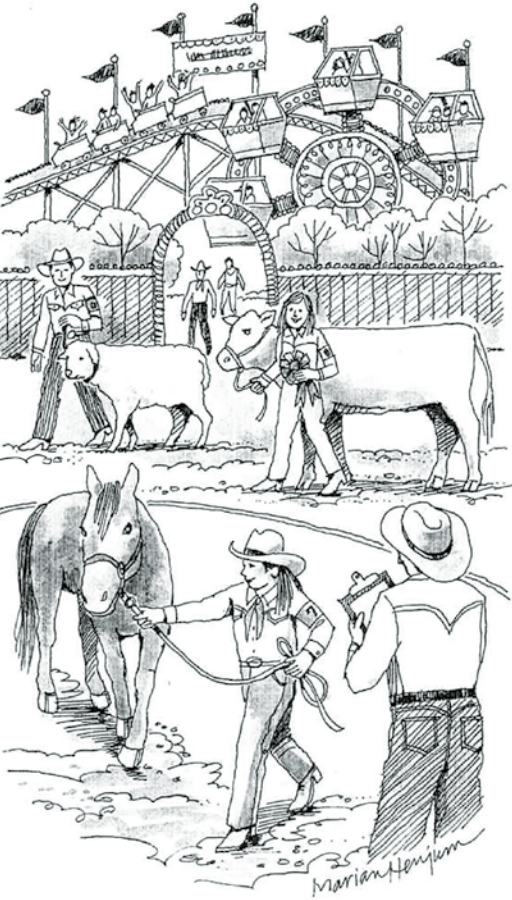

The Downside of Insurance Insecticide Applications for Soybean Aphid

For soybean aphid management, we encourage you to rely on scouting (actually getting into the field and looking at plants) and the validated economic threshold (average of 250 aphids per plant, aphids on more than 80% of plants, and aphid populations increasing) to determine when to apply insecticides for soybean aphid. The threshold number of aphids is below the number required to cause yield loss and allows time to apply an insecticide before economic loss is incurred. However, you might be tempted to apply insecticides for soybean aphids at low population levels or without regard to the size of the aphid population in field, just in case you might have a problem. These “insurance” applications of insecticides can have negative impacts.

Insurance applications of insecticides for soybean aphids may occasionally provide an economic benefit, if they happen to coincide with development of a threatening population of soybean aphids. However, keep in mind that low populations of soybean aphid do not affect soybean yield. Furthermore, not all aphid infestations will grow to levels that will cause yield loss. Therefore, investments made in insurance applications are often wasted.

Repeated use of insecticides can lead to development of insecticide resistance in pests, which makes the insecticides ineffective against those pests. Insecticide resistance has not yet been documented in North American soybean aphid populations. However, this pest has shown resistance to some organophosphates in China. If we are not careful, insecticide resistance could develop in soybean aphids here. Furthermore, applications of insecticides for soybean aphid increase the likelihood of development of insecticide resistance in other soybean pests. Resistance to chlorpyrifos in a population of spider mites from southwestern Minnesota was documented in 2012. Spider mites are not often the target of insecticide applications in Minnesota, so the resistance in those mites was likely due to applications made for soybean aphid. Please see “Insecticide resistance management in soybean” to learn what you can do to help prevent or postpone the development of resistance.

Many of the insecticides used for soybean aphid management, such as pyrethroids and organophosphates, are also very toxic to the beneficial insects (predators and parasitic wasps) that feed on aphids. Treating a real or imagined aphid population will kill beneficial insects. Without these

natural controls, newly colonizing aphids or other pests, such as spider mites, can rapidly grow to damaging levels. An insecticide application becomes worth this potential risk once the beneficial insects can no longer keep aphids below economic threshold in the field.

Some insecticides are advertised as being selective or less harmful to beneficial insects (predators and parasitoids) that feed on soybean aphids. Though these products may be less toxic to some beneficial insects, they show toxicity to others. The impacts of selective insecticides on the behavior and biology of beneficial insects are not understood. Such impacts could affect the ability of the beneficial insects to control pest populations. Therefore, we do not recommend the use of selective insecticides for insurance applications against soybean aphid. Limiting your use of insecticides to when they are most likely to provide an economic benefit will also reduce the risk to pollinators (see earlier article about protecting pollinators).

Tank mixes of insecticide and herbicide can lead to poor insect and/or weed control. The aversion to extra trips across the field is understandable from both a labor and fuel investment perspective. Unfortunately, the best nozzle type, water volume and pressure for application of insecticides and most herbicides are not the same. In addition, the timing of herbicide and insecticide applications should be based on the targeted pests (weeds or aphids), but these timings are not likely to coincide. Currently, there are serious weed control issues in soybean, with waterhemp and giant ragweed being just two examples. Both of these weeds are most efficiently and economically controlled by herbicide applications before July 1, which is well before the time fields generally need to be treated for aphids.

Any pesticide should be applied only with a reasonable expectation of a return on investment. Poor weed or insect control resulting from tank mixes of herbicide and insecticide are unlikely to add anything to your bottom line. Delaying an herbicide application to add insect control or applying an insecticide before the economic threshold are generally poor investments that can lead to more problems than they solve. For instance, the improper timing or application of insecticides or herbicides that can result from tank mixes can increase the likelihood of the insects or weeds developing resistance to these pesticides.

As you manage your soybean crop, be aware of the potential short- and long-term consequences of your management actions.

Breakfast on the Grill: Chive, Cheese and Egg Stuffed Peppers Making breakfast on the grill is a fun way to start the day. And these peppers stuffed with cheese, eggs and chives are absolutely delicious. Serve with a favorite side such as grilled kielbasa or other sausage, which is shown in the picture.

- Ingredients**
5 eggs
2 large red peppers, cleaned and halved lengthwise
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
1/4 cup milk
2 tablespoons chopped chives
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1/4 teaspoon salt

Instructions
Preheat half of the grill to medium high heat; leave one half of the grill off. In a medium bowl whisk together eggs, shredded cheddar, milk, chives, salt and pepper. Oil grill on the hot side and place red peppers, cut side up, on grill. If necessary trim a small slice (be careful not to cut all the way through) from the bottom to make sure they sit level.

Using a measuring cup, carefully pour in egg mixture until each pepper is about 3/4 of the way full. Grill the filled peppers on the side that is on medium high heat with the lid closed. After 10 minutes, carefully move the filled peppers to the indirect (cold) side of the grill. Close lid and grill indirect for 15-20 minutes or until the eggs have set, puffed up and turned golden brown. Carefully remove peppers from the grill and serve with grilled kielbasa or other sausage.

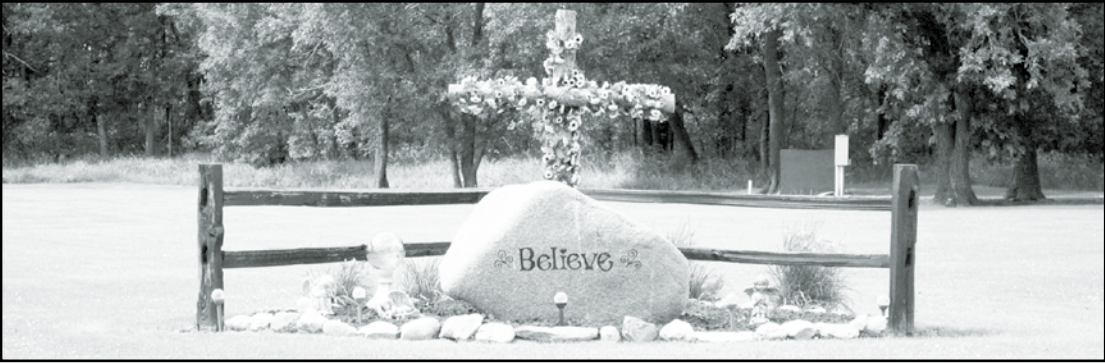
