Grygla has a new community garden



Sam Nordby enjoys checking on the new community garden daily. Her favorite vegetable that's planted is radishes! The garden is located in the spot of the old cafe.

Located where the old café used to sit, the city is working to increase fresh, healthy food for people within our community. After receiving a grant through the University of Minnesota/Northwest Regional Sustainable Development Partnership, a community garden was worked up by Mayor Richard Mosher and vegetables were planted with the help of community members.

Helping to plant veggies on Saturday, May 3rd, were Shirley & Orvis Nordby, Betty Ostby, Jessica Nordby, and her daughter, Sam.

Sam, who will be a Grygla 5th grader, says she wanted to help out and thinks gardening is fun! She marked all of the rows and goes to check on things daily. "I like to make sure no one is destroying it and I make sure no weeds are growing," she says.

The produce will be going to whoever helps out and participates in the garden work. Depending on how successful it is and the amount of interest from community members, the garden could possibly be expanded.

University of Minnesota SNAP-Ed Educator, Kristina Kaml, says, "The community garden can be as open and free as they'd like it to be. Each community can be creative and use their grant dollars however

they'd like! As long as they are promoting fresh and healthy food for people within the community, that's what it's all about!"

Beets, carrots, cucumbers, radishes, sweet peppers, onions, tomatoes and beans have been planted, along with a row of flowers!

If you read the article in last week's Grygla Eagle, you'll know that the city has implanted a new program called "One Vegetable, One Community." OVOC unites local communities by encouraging gardeners of all levels to plant, grow, cook and/or share a featured vegetable of the year. The vegetable Grygla chose for their first year is beans, which are planted in the community garden. Bean trellis' can also be seen in the Grygla Garden Club pots in front of Cenex and the Grygla Coop. In addition, "bean bags" have been made up and are currently being distributed at the Coop, Farmer's Union and the library. Each bag contains 10-20 purple beans, along with recipes. Kids and adults are encouraged to grown them - if you don't have a garden spot, a milk jug works great!

For more information and to hear about the progress, the U of M Extension SNAP-Ed will have a booth set up at the Grygla Centennial the last weekend in August.

I hope you've been enjoying a more personalized, inside look and going "Behind the Scenes" of our local entities.

This week we're taking a look at Meyer Management, LLC. Founders, Shawn and Stacie Meyer, stay busy, indeed, making sure multiple businesses are running successfully in Grygla.

After purchasing Motel 89 in July of 2015, the couple has made many improvements and renovations to the building. They have a short term goal of putting on a maroon tin roof before the Grygla Centennial and they also have a long term goal of adding on a couple more rooms. "It's something we'd like to do down the road a ways because we know they'll definitely get used," said Stacie.

Currently, Motel 89 has 7 rooms. 5 of those are single, 1 is a double and there is a 4 bedroom fully equipped apartment. Stacie says things have been a bit slow at the motel this summer, but they are usually pretty booked up between construction crews, loggers, farmers, hunters and family members of community members.

Upon check in, someone is always available on site. Motel 89 accepts reservations via phone call or email, currently reservations are not available online. In addition to owners, Shawn and Stacie, Motel 89 also has 2 part-time employees. "Misty Erickson and Stacy Anderson basically run this place," Stacie laughed. Both employees stay busy with taking reservations, housekeeping, laundry, maintaining the tanning room, and keeping an inventory of supplies. While Shawn takes care of maintenance and the lawn, Stacie

A celebration was held on April 29th honoring the efforts of area educators. SIMPLY DELICIOUS

Homemade BBQ Sauce
Barbecue sauce is such an interesting thing. Everyone seems to have a preference on it and there are so many tasty variations of it as well. This particular recipe is very easy to make. It's a little sweet, yet a little tangy and just slightly spicy. This is the first time I've ever made a homemade BBQ sauce so if you have one that's a little different that you really love PLEASE let me know...I'd love to try it out.
Ingredients:
16 oz tomato sauce
4 oz tomato paste
½ cup water
¼ cup apple cider vinegar
8 tbsp brown sugar
½ tbsp. ground pepper
½ tbsp. onion powder
½ tbsp. ground mustard
½ tbsp. garlic powder
½ tbsp. lemon pepper
4.5 tbsp Worcestershire sauce

1 tsp Tabasco sauce
Directions:
Combine all ingredients in a small saucepan. Simmer on low for about an hour, until the sauce thickens and has the chance to meld all of the flavors together. Cool and serve. Store in the refrigerator in an airtight container.



For those of you who may recall, the Gordy Saul Plantation was established in 1986. DNR invites input on proposed trails in Beltrami Island State Forest
The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources invites anyone with an interest in recreational trail systems and motorized recreation in the Beltrami Island State Forest in Beltrami, Lake of the Woods and Roseau counties to attend a public meeting on Wednesday, June 28, to review a set of proposals that include changes to trail systems in the state forest.
The meeting will be from 6-8pm at the DNR Forestry Office, 804 Cherne Dr. NW, Warroad, with a presentation at 6:30 followed by time for questions and answers, map review and comments.
Draft recommendations aim to improve trail sustainability and to enhance recreation opportunities. Proposed changes include adding new trails and trail connections, designating new hunter-walking trails and redesignating unsustainable minimum maintenance roads. The draft proposals reflect feedback gathered during an open house in June 2016.
Beltrami Island State For-

est is classified as "managed" with respect to motor vehicle use, which means that forest roads and routes are open to motor vehicles unless posted closed. The DNR does not propose changing the "managed" classification.
Anyone unable to attend the June 28 meeting can review the project documents online at www.dnr.state.mn.us/input/mgmtplans/ohv/designation/revisions.html and submit written comments through Friday, July 28.
Comments received at the meeting and during the public comment period will be used to develop a final recommendation that will be submitted to the DNR commissioner for approval. Changes to state forest trail designations must be made by commissioner's order and published in the State Register.

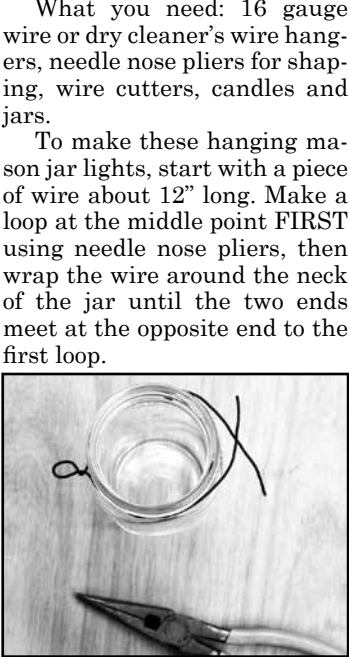

DO IT YOURSELF

When the warmer seasons come around, most of us like to spend some evenings lounging in our yards and gardens. Having some outdoor lighting can make your outdoor space a usable and enjoyable spot to visit, have a late snack, or sit down with a good book. Sure you can hang a string of lights and call it good, but let's get a little more creative.
Hanging Mason Jar Lights
One can never have too many mason jars. One can never have too many hanging lights. So, what about hanging mason jar lights? The answer is obvious, is it not? These hanging mason jar lights are so easy to make and so enchanting. All you need are glass jars (even recycled styles), some wires and/or dry cleaner's wire hangers.
How lovely it would be to have lots of them hanging throughout the garden for an evening gathering?
What you need: 16 gauge wire or dry cleaner's wire hangers, needle nose pliers for shaping, wire cutters, candles and jars.
To make these hanging mason jar lights, start with a piece of wire about 12" long. Make a loop at the middle point FIRST using needle nose pliers, then wrap the wire around the neck of the jar until the two ends meet at the opposite end to the first loop.

the wire so the ends are pointing in. It looks better and is safer.
Now we are ready to make a handle. A dry cleaner's wire hanger is great for making a handle because it is bendable yet rigid enough to hold its shape without being pulled down by the weight of the hanging jar.
Cut the hanger and take the straight piece, use the neck of the jar as a guide and bend it in the middle.
Now we have a beautifully shaped handle with curved top and perfectly straight sides. Create a curved hook shape at each of the two ends using the needle nose plier. Hook the handle onto the two wire loops around the neck of the jar. Close the hooks.

They ended up staying at Motel 89 in Grygla as a stop on their way to Canada to catch their flight back to Norway! “People just love to share their stories and we love to listen,” she concluded.

After spending some time with Meyer Management, LLC last week, it’s evident that this couple has only good intentions and greater plans to improve the community in which they live in and open up their doors to.
