A look at next week... Grygla holds weekend-long Centennial celebration!

Grygla resident becomes US Citizen

Born and raised in Sinkatulan Makilala Cotabato, Philippines, Lolit Neuschwander moved to Grygla, Minnesota, in 2010 and proudly became a United States Citizen on September 28, 2016.

Lolit recently welcomed me and my family into her home and cooked us a delicious Asian meal while visiting about growing up in the Philippines. It was such a great evening and fun to hear her stories she shared with us. Lolit has been married to Bill Neuschwander for 6 years now and the couple has two children, Krystal (6) and Brayden (4). Her family still lives in the town she was born and raised in.

When sharing stories, she says it is similar in size to Grygla, but the weather is obviously different! The average temp in the Philippines is 95 degrees; December is the coldest month at around 70 degrees.

Sounds wonderful, doesn't it?

Lolit laughs and says, "I actually don't miss the heat at

all!" Having never seen snow before, when she first moved here she asked Bill when the snow would come. When it finally came she was in awe! "I jumped in it like a little kid," she revealed. After experiencing a few seasons of the snow and cold temps, Lolit is a bit like the rest of us cold-temp veterans. "I like it for about two days," she smiled.

When talking about the things she does miss the most, her family comes up in conversation and she says it's the simple things like eating supper around the table with everyone is what she misses the most. Lolit has 9 siblings with all of them living in the Philippines. No family members have come to visit yet, although they are looking towards the future to plan a visit for her mom. The process of getting here is a bit lengthy and complicated, however.

Lolit says when her mom sees photos of all the snow, she comments about all the ice and wonders how one can even survive! "Everything is green back home - green and hot! When

we'd get too hot, we'd go to the store and buy ice blocks in order to cool down," Lolit said.

Where she grew up, the area itself is not touristy. Being only 30 minutes from the ocean, Lolit says a lot of people don't go to the coast often as many don't have cars. She remembers taking a field trip there, and if someone had a birthday or wedding, sometimes they'd rent a truck and take a visit to

the ocean. The closest, biggest city to where Lolit grew up is Kidapawan City.

When she was in school, she shared that it was a 3 mile walk one way to the main highway. A Jeepney (like a bus) would pick up the kids and bring them to school at that point. Jeepneys are a popular mode of public transportation. Once she was at school, it was very similar to how it is here. For the elementary kids, there was 1 teacher and about 30 students per classroom. For high schoolers, you'd have 8 different teachers for 8 different subjects.

Lolit shared that the English language was an important subject in school. She, herself, knows 5 languages and shared that there are 108 languages alone in the Philippines. Visayas is Lolit's primary language; she also speaks Tagalog, Ilonggo, Bilaan and English. Her daughter, Krystal, can sing a lot of songs in Visayas and understands some, but not all.

Growing up, life for Lolit was very different than it is here. She grew up on a small farm where her family would raise chickens and a couple of pigs and cows to sell. Her family never ate beef or chicken so every Saturday at the market, they'd swap the chicken for fish.

Lolit said, "Every Saturday was market day. My mom would always go and we'd all want to go with her so we could eat bread! Back there, bread

Two driven young women are combining their lifelong friendship with their professional expertise to help build the business community of Thief River Falls and run the TRF Chamber of Commerce together.

Goodridge natives, Amy Halvorson, daughter of Bob and Jean Halvorson, and Ashley Marquis Nerhus, daughter of Earl and Penny Marquis, say they have pretty much been best friends their entire life. The girls both grew up in rural Goodridge, where they attended secondary school together, graduating in 2011. From there, they went on to attend college at UND together; they were even roommates their freshman year. Both girls majored in communications, while Amy double-majored in history and Ashley double-majored in recreation of tourist studies.

In 2014, Ashley accepted a position as administrative assistant for the Thief River Falls Chamber of Commerce. One year later, in the fall of 2015, she was promoted to Director of the Chamber. "After I became the director, there was a position open here for an executive assistant. I opened it

up to the public. Amy applied and was a very qualified candidate," says Ashley.

Once Amy and Ashley started working for the chamber, both girls said they were taken aback by all the steps it takes to keep a town organized and functioning. They say being from the small community of Goodridge was beneficial when starting their positions. "I think coming from a town like Goodridge, you see how all the smaller towns in the area rely so heavily on Thief River. You realize how crucial having successful businesses in this town, in particular, is to everyone around," Amy explained.

The Chamber of Commerce is a membership organization for businesses, and other organizations in the community. "We are always encouraging people to do their business locally," Ashley said.

The Thief River Falls Chamber plans many events throughout the year such as their yearly banquet and Everybody's Market. But, they say one of their biggest events is River Fest, which takes place every year in the Hartz Park. Amy said before working on The Chamber, she was unaware of all the minor details that go into planning such a big event, like River Fest.

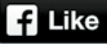

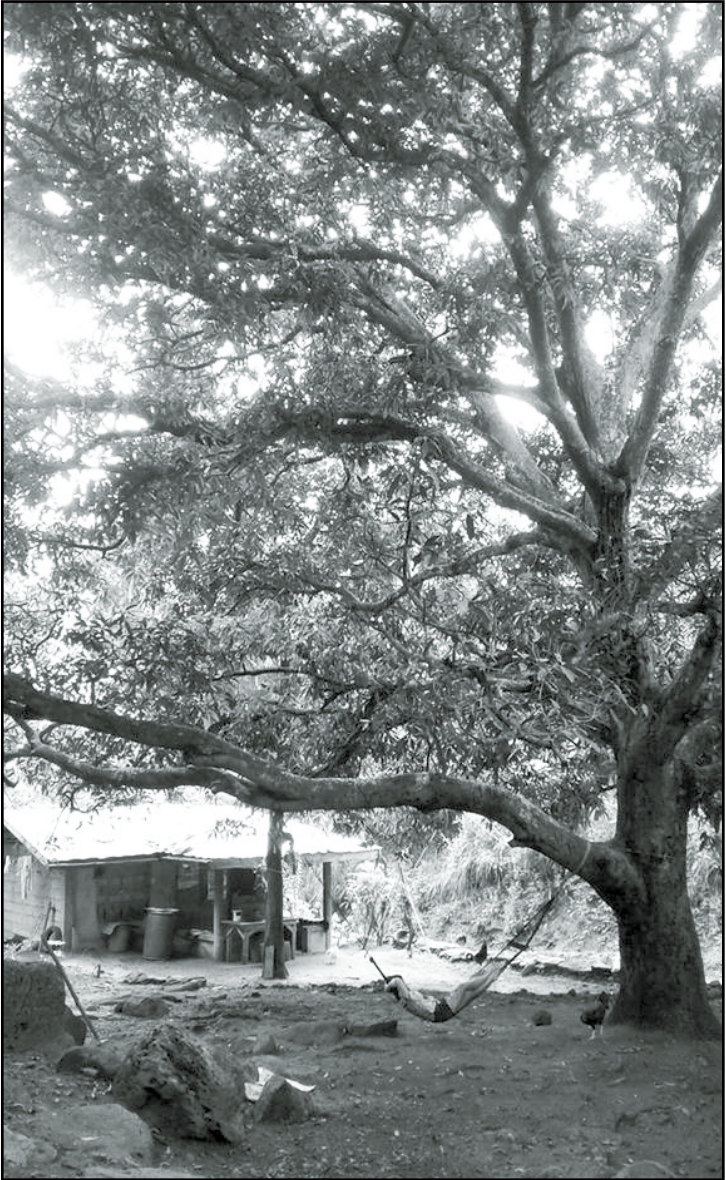

is just for snacks. Sometimes we would sell pancakes at the market, too, during special celebrations, but stuff like that isn't eaten there. My mom still goes to the market today, but just to buy, not sell." For them, there were never stops at fast food restaurants and no pizza, or other indulgences, like there is here. Lolit said she had never tried a cheeseburger before coming here and admitted she likes them but prefers the food back home better.

When it came to meals, there were never specific break-
fast, lunch and dinner foods like there are here. No matter what the meal, the traditional spread was usually rice and dried fish. They would eat veg-
gies out of the garden, but fresh fruit was usually too expensive to buy. Although, the family has a mango tree on their prop-
erty, but it only produces fruit occasionally.

"My parents would some-
times sell our crops during harvest and buy ice cream, but that didn't happen very often," Lolit explained.

Speaking of food, the Asian meal Lolit made us that night was absolutely delicious! The menu included spring rolls, which were a pastry/wanton type of roll filled with ground pork, eggs, shredded carrots, onion, and garlic. She also served a fried garlic rice with eggs and a side of noodles in a pork sauce. It was such a treat and my family enjoyed every last bite!

Bill and Lolit, along with both of their kids, visited the Philippines over Christmas last year. After spending 23 hours on the plane, the fam-
ily enjoyed their 32-day stay visiting family and friends. They had all met Krystal from a visit before, but it was the

first time Lolit's family had met Brayden. While on their vacation, the Neuschwand-
ers stayed at a nearby hotel as Lo-
lit's family home is too small. "We don't have mattresses, just wooden beds and mats. Bill says they hurt his back, but everyone else is used to them," Lolit laughed. She explained that her parents had their own room, but everyone else shared a room to sleep. Even neigh-
bors would sometimes sleep over if the walk was too far home. "We were packed in like a bunch of sardines," she says.

When it came to moving to America, Lolit mentioned that her sister always wanted her to move here and find a bet-
ter life and a good job. She was waitressing at the time and met Bill at the place where she worked. It took months to get to the United States, but the process went smoother after Bill hired a lawyer to help. Lolit commented, "It's so hard to come here unless you are very rich. If you don't have a lot of money, you need to explain why, what, where and apply and pass tests....it's very com-
plicated."

But after living here the re-
quired amount of time and get-
ting everything processed and passed, Lolit became an offi-
cial US Citizen on September 28, 2016, at the Fergus Falls Courthouse and she couldn't be prouder.

Though she misses spend-
ing time with her family back home, they communicate over the phone and internet. Lolit also takes pride in helping her parents from afar. "We bought them a couch when we were there last," she said. To which her husband, Bill, replied, "We really should've bought them a mattress."

Though the two worlds are very different, Lolit is proud of where she has been and where she is currently at.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Telephone calls to the school for students should be made only when most necessary. Students will not be called to the telephone except in an emergency. A phone is available for student use in the main entrance doorway. A pay phone is also available in the gym lobby.

Our school day will consist of 7 periods per day and a 35 minute home room at the end of the day. School begins at 8:30 am and ends at 3:32 pm. A student must be present for 4 periods during the day to get credit for a ½ day, and present in all 7 periods for a full day.

An informational packet was mailed to your home the beginning of August. If you did not receive a packet please call the school to request one. This mailing contains: Lunch Information, Yearly Meal Plan & Menu, Bus Routes (if applicable), Kindergarten Information (if applicable), Asbestos Notification, General Pesticide Notice, Quality Air Release, Internet Use Agreement, Data Privacy, and other school info that may apply. Students in grades K-12 will receive an assignment book with a student handbook printed in it the 1st day of school. Please take the time to read this and familiarize yourself with it. Please note that there is a 2017-2018 calendar in the Student Handbook for your convenience. This will help you to plan dr./dental appt., trips/vacation planning, etc.

The handbook will be reviewed the first day of school.

In order to keep our gym floors in good condition, students are encouraged to have a pair of tennis shoes to use when PE classes and recesses are held in the gyms.

SPORTS, BOOK AND BAND DEPOSITS

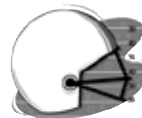
We would like to remind parents of the Sports, Book and Band deposits that are required. We would appreciate it if parents would stop by the office before school starts or send checks with their students on Tuesday, September 5, 2017 if they have not done so. The Book and Sports deposits are **\$40.00** each and are only for students in grades 7 - 12. Band deposits are **\$40.00** for band students using school owned instruments. This is a one time deposit that will be refunded when the child graduates.

— USE OF MEDICATION —

In the Grygla Public School District #447, we follow the recommendations of the MN Dept. of Education and school policy **"Use of Medication"** regarding administering medication.

The school policy reads as follows:

Students and their parents or guardians will maintain the responsibility for administering necessary medications to students. In cases where a student may need adult supervision for taking medications, permission forms for school personnel to administer medications will be available in the office. These forms must be signed by the parent or guardian and returned to the office prior to medications being given out by school personnel. **Permissions form must be submitted each year!** Forms will be included in family packets.



PARTICIPATION FEES YEARLY

1. Student Passes for Grades K-12 will be \$30.00 (optional). Individual event passes for students will be \$3.00 per event. Students who have paid a sports fee will be admitted free to activities. Students in band will be admitted free to activities that they are performing at. Parents are encouraged to purchase student passes for their children who are not involved in sports or band.
2. Participation fees for students in grades 7-12 will be as follows:
a) Volleyball, Girls & Boys Basketball & Track - \$50.00
b) Football - \$60.00
No family will be charged more than \$200.00 for participation fees. (This is above and beyond the \$40.00 equipment deposit.)
3. Band Rental - \$40.00/year for students renting band instruments from the school.



NOTICE TO NEW RESIDENTS AND PARENTS IN GRYGLA SCHOOL DISTRICT

Parents or guardians of school age children who have recently moved into the school district are requested to notify the school of the move. Please contact the school AS SOON AS POSSIBLE to register new students so teacher and bus assignments may be made, and to ensure that an adequate number of textbooks and supplies will be on hand. For current residents who have moved within the district, please contact the school with your new address, so that school information may be mailed to the correct address, and your children will be assigned to the correct bus route.

2017-2018 SCHOOL YEAR NOTIFICATION

As a result of recent federal legislation (Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act - AHERA), each primary and secondary school in the nation is required to complete a stringent inspection for asbestos and to develop a plan of management for all asbestos-containing building materials. The Grygla Public School has a goal to be in full compliance with this law and is following the spirit, as well as, the letter of the law. As a matter of policy, the district shall continue to maintain a safe and healthful environment for our community's youth and employees.

In keeping with this legislation, all buildings (including portables and support buildings) owned or leased by the Grygla Public School were inspected by EPA accredited inspectors and samples were analyzed by an independent laboratory. Based on the inspection, the school prepared and the state approved a comprehensive management plan for handling the asbestos located within its buildings safely and responsibly.

Furthermore, the Grygla Public School has completed their 3-Year Re-inspection required by AHERA. Our district buildings, where asbestos-containing materials were found, are under repair, removal and Operations and Maintenance.

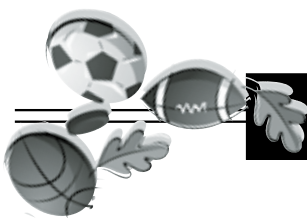
This past year Grygla Public School conducted the following with respect to its asbestos containing building materials:

"Implemented our Operations and Maintenance Program"

Federal law requires a periodic walk-through (called "surveillance") every six months of each area containing asbestos. In addition, the law requires all buildings to be re-inspected three years after a management plan is in effect. MacNeil Environmental, Inc will accomplish this under contract.

Short-term workers (outside contractors - i.e., telephone repair workers, electricians and exterminators) must be provided information regarding the location of asbestos in which they may come into contact. All short-term workers shall contact the lead maintenance person before commencing work to be given this information.

The Grygla Public School has a list of the location(s), type(s) of asbestos containing materials found in that school building and a description and time-table for their proper management. A copy of the Asbestos Management Plan is available for review in the school office. Copies are available at 25 cents per page. With my pound of hamburger, I mixed about ¾ cup corn flake crumbs, ½ tbsp. pepper, 1 egg, ½ tbsp. garlic, ¼ cup parmesan cheese and a couple shakes of Worcestershire sauce.

Form into balls and bake at 350 for about 30 minutes.

In the meantime, sauté garlic and butter in a pan. You can use however much garlic you prefer...I used about 5 cloves of minced garlic.

Once the garlic is sautéed, add 1 cup of ketchup, ¾ cup of honey and ¼ to ½ cup of soy sauce. Let it simmer for about 10 minutes. Once the meatballs are done, add them to the sauce for another 10-15 minutes.

The flavor is SO good and the whole family loved them.
