A look at next week ... GG Chargers Football holds Parent's Night

Goodridge farmer has an impressive display of vintage gas pumps

Gary Miller got his first antique gas pump about ten years ago. Being a bit hard to come by, he has since purchased more through friends and word of mouth. What has always drawn him to these old gas pumps is the fact that his dad, Edgar Miller, has one on his farm. Edgar's grandpa John used to have a store on the century farm in the 1930's. There was the visible gas pump for people to buy gas, along with some small supplies in the well house that is still there today. "The one at my dad's farm is all original with just a paint job," Gary explains. "I've always been interested in them. They are related to farming and tie together all of my interests," he added.

Gary collects and restores two types of vintage gas pumps: electric and visible. After the TV show American Restoration, people are more familiar with them and collecting them, making the unique antiques pretty rare to come by.

The first visible gas pump he ever purchased came from a guy south of Warroad. Always a project he works on in the winter, Gary has his routine down. "I find them, go and talk to them, deal, disassemble, sand blast, order parts, figure out a paint scheme, get it painted, assemble and apply decals," he says. He puts his finished products on rollers so they can be easily moved.

He has purchased pumps from the Brainerd and Roseau areas and at a couple of local auctions. With a total of six visible pumps, four are restored with the other two getting restored this winter. He cur-

rently has five electric pumps with only one restored at the moment. One of those was from his old neighbor Bernard Wells. "That one has a nice story behind it. Bernie used it for years on his farm and I bought it at his auction a couple of years ago," recalled Gary. He plans to restore that pump this winter, already having ordered a Sinclair Dino globe for the top of it. The pump will be painted in a green and white color scheme by a friend in Salo, MN, who has a body shop.

Gary orders all of his parts from Vic's 66 Automobile Petroliana out of Sedro Woolley, Washington. He says you'll never find a pump with a globe on it. "Weather, the sun and hail...and BB guns just prevent that from happening," he laughed. All visible gas pumps had globes, but as mentioned, Gary has never found one with the original. "When I go to look at a pump, the first thing I want to know is if the glass cylinder is broke or not. I'm concerned about having that intact and how much rust is on it. Generally, I get them before they are too bad and with the primer and paint, they should last forever," he says.

Gary enjoys the history and research of the pumps and has spent hundreds of hours reading up on them. He has an impressive display of his hobby set up in his shop on his farm in rural Goodridge.

Lined up against one wall are all of his visible pumps. With decals like Sunset Gasoline, Texaco, Standard and Super Shell, Gary likes to stick with actual gas station themes. His pumps have all the

original nozzles on them, but he orders new hoses. All the other parts and pieces are original with the exception of some nuts and bolts.

The pumps could all be set up for use today. There is no power to them, but you hand pump them and it pumps the gas. The reason they are called 'visible' is because way back when, gas was dirty. A person could pump it up, look at it and decide if it was clean enough to use. The indicator shows how many gallons you pumped; some have a control that allowed you to put the gas back into the tank.

Back in the day, there were no street lights so the globes that sit atop these pumps would light up – all of Gary's restored visible pumps have lights inside and he says it's fun to illuminate them up from time to time.

In his shop office, Gary has a set he made out of an electric gas pump and an oil luber. He got them both from an auction in St. Hilaire, MN, but they weren't a set and had nothing to do with each. Now it seems like a natural fit, both restored as a Sinclair HC Gasoline set.

In addition to his vintage gas pumps, Gary also collects and restores Coca-Cola machines and vintage Rear Engine Polaris and Arctic Snowmobiles. He collects old gas station and farm toys, too, all of which are displayed in his shop.

"People enjoy seeing that old stuff and I enjoy talking about it," he thanked.

He started his new position on Monday, September 25th, and brings a lot of experience to the table. With a degree in Ag Business from Montana State University, Patrick previously ran a farm with his family, which included growing wheat, peas, lentils, canola, garbanzo beans and feed for their Red Angus cattle.

Regarding the move, Patrick expressed, "What we have the opportunity to be a part of here isn't available to us back home."

Patrick's wife, Nicole, is back in Montana for now. The couple is looking to purchase a home in the Grygla area and the whole family will get settled in once that happens. The Hackleys have two sons, Hunter and Conner, who are 4 and 1. Nicole is finishing up work as a Drug and Alcohol Prevention Specialist and has plans to work from home when she moves to Grygla. "She'll write grants for those types of things – substance abuse and such," offered Patrick.

In the meantime, the Stanley Farms manager is settling into his new role just fine. He oversees the daily operations - planting, spraying, harvesting, delivering and drying grain, repairs and maintenance. During the busy season, Stanley Farms employees about a dozen people while during the off season, about half a dozen.

Back in Montana, Patrick says he was very involved with Farm Bureau, FFA Alumni, church, helped out with 4H and was on his county Republican Central Committee. "When you're in these small towns, you have to be involved in just about everything, but I enjoy it. I have to go all the time," he laughed. As for involvement in the Grygla Community, he plans to stay active here, too. "Eventually, I would like to get a Farm Bureau started in Marshall County, which is an advocate group for farmers and ranchers who lobby at the capitol for Ag issues. They have a powerful voice," he explained.

Patrick is also a fan of the Green Bay Packers and says he likes watching sports and snowmobile, as well. He has met quite a few people so far and says it's been fun to visit with folks and he appreciates the warm welcome to town.

Youth gear up for hunting weekend

Area youth, ages 10-15 are gearing up to participate in a special deer season that runs from Thursday, October 19th, to Sunday, October 22nd. "Youth can hunt with adult mentors during youth deer season," said Mike Kurre, DNR mentoring program coordinator. "This season is a way to focus on young hunters so they have good experiences and learn valuable skills."

Blaze orange requirements apply to all hunters, trappers and adult mentors in areas open for the youth deer season. Youth must meet all firearms

safety requirements, purchase a license and use the appropriate firearm for the permit area in which they are hunting. Youth may take a deer of either sex and may only take one deer during the youth season.

An adult mentor must accompany the youth but may not hunt or carry a firearm and does not need a license.

Public land is open, and private land is also open provided the hunters have landowner permission. Participating in the youth deer season does not affect eligibility of youth to participate in the regular firearms

deer season but any deer harvested does count against the youth's season bag limit.
