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The future has begun! The dream is becoming reality! The Marshall County Fair Board is glad to announce that the new grandstand project will be starting this fall. While there will be a new grandstand for 2018, the fundraising efforts are far from realized. The Fair Board has raised about \$150,000 of a total of \$900,000 needed for all phases of this project. Phase one will be to erect the grandstand itself, at a cost of about \$600,000. The remaining balance to accomplish this phase will come from loans, to be paid back over the next 30 years. While grant applications have been pursued, none have come to fruition at this time. All possible grants for this project will continue to be pursued and the board will continue diligently with local fundraising efforts to work toward the remaining goals of this project with a new enclosed area beneath the grandstand. Board members will be sending out a pamphlet to ask for local contributions either as a lump sum or a yearly contribution to assist with their current loan. and adult mentors in areas open for the youth deer season. Youth must meet all firearms safety requirements, purchase a license and use the appropriate firearm for the permit area in which they are hunting. Youth may take a deer of either sex and may only take one deer during the youth season. An adult mentor must accompany the youth but may not hunt or carry a firearm and does not need a license.

Public land is open, and private land is also open provided the hunters have landowner permission. Participating in the youth deer season does not affect eligibility of youth to participate in the regular firearms deer season but any deer harvested does count against the youth's season bag limit.

Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge to host Halloween fun

Last week National Wildlife Refuge Week was observed, October 8-14. The Grygla Eagle hit the road and went on a self-guided route to enjoy all the scenery the refuge has to offer.

Celebrated during the second full week in October since 1996, Refuge Week highlights the National Wildlife Refuge System – the network of lands and waters that protect wildlife and their habitats.

Agassiz is preparing to host some Halloween fun on Saturday, October 28th, from 4:30-7pm! Families are invited for an evening of FREE fun on the refuge. There will be a scavenger hunt along one of the nature trails from 4:30-6:30pm, along with 'Creatures of the Night' activities (All About Owls & Why Bats are Cool, Not Creepy). There will be a Haunted Hike for older kids at 6:30-7:30pm.

Kids are invited to come in costume. Bring your camera as a photo shoot area will be set up. You can also enjoy a light snack and hot cider in the Visitor Center!

No pre-registration is necessary. For more information, call Lynda at 218-449-4115.

At Agassiz you can enjoy a range of outdoor activities. There is a four-mile self-guided auto tour route to enjoy the scenery – open dawn till dusk from May through mid-October. There's also an observation deck located near the west Refuge entrance at Parker Pool, to give you a slightly elevated glimpse of the habitats and bird life on this pancake-flat landscape. If you truly want more of a birds-eye-view of the Refuge, you can climb the 100 foot observation (fire) tower. An access key can be checked out during office hours. If you prefer to take a leisurely stroll, there are three hiking trails for you to explore,

not far from the Refuge office.

The best viewing dates for Moose Rut is now (September 15-October 31). From Grygla, the Refuge Headquarters is approximately 17.5 miles away. The office/visitor center hours are Monday-Friday 7:30am-4pm.

Permitted on the Refuge

Bikes (non-motorized and motorized) on Lost Bay Habitat Drive; hiking – on designated hiking trails only; pets on leash; photography; hunting in designated areas in accordance with state regulations; wildlife observation.

Not permitted

ATV's; snowmobiles and all watercraft; alcohol; berry and mushroom picking; camping and campfires; vehicles off roads; wood cutting without a permit.

Wildlife viewing tips

Stop, look and listen. Nature is alive with sights and sounds! Viewing opportunities are best in the morning or late afternoon.

Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge was established in 1937 as the Mud Lake Migratory Waterfowl Refuge to protect a portion of this fertile region. Renamed in 1961, the Refuge now protects 61,500 acres of wetland, shrub land, forest and grassland. Agassiz offers excellent wildlife observation, photography, hunting and hiking opportunities.

As many as 287 species of birds use the refuge; half of which nest on the refuge. 49 species of mammals, 12 species of amphibians and 9 species of reptiles call Agassiz home!

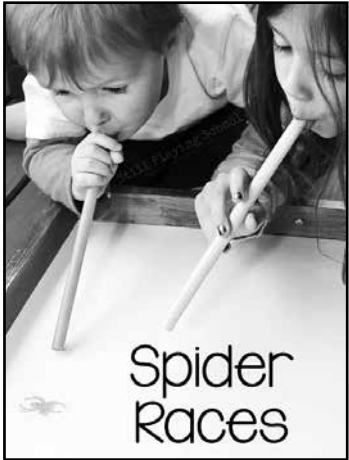

This is such a tasty, quick meal to make and super low in calories. For any fellow Weight Watchers out there, it's actually only 6 smart points for the whole thing and it's really filling and satisfying, too.

CCBR Toast (Chicken Cheddar Bacon Ranch)

2 slices of Village Hearth Italian Light Bread (2 sp's)

Canned Chunk Chicken Breast (1 sp for 4 oz.)

Dried "Real" Bacon Bits (1 sp for 1 tbsp)

Fat Free Ranch (2 sp's for 4

tbsp)

Fat Free Shredded Cheddar Cheese (0 sp's for ¼ cup)

Mix your chicken, bacon bits and ranch together – spread on your bread. Sprinkle each slice with cheese and bake for about 12-15 minutes at 350 degrees.

You know what that's a sign of? Stress!

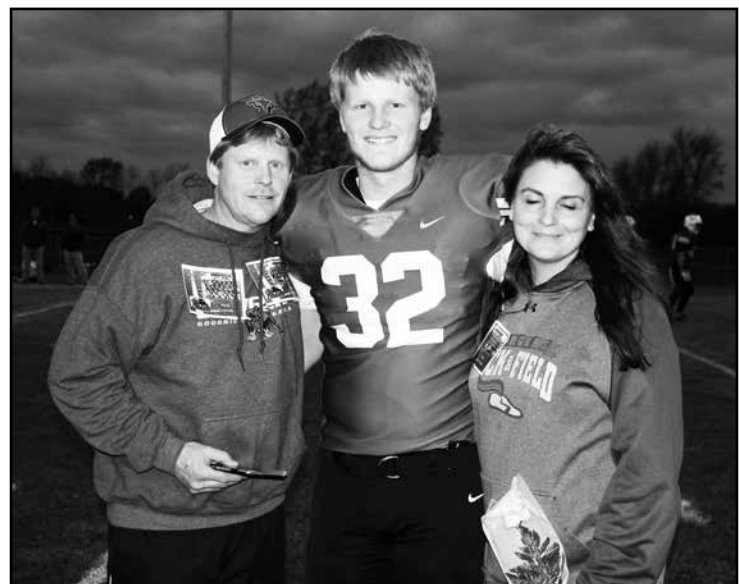

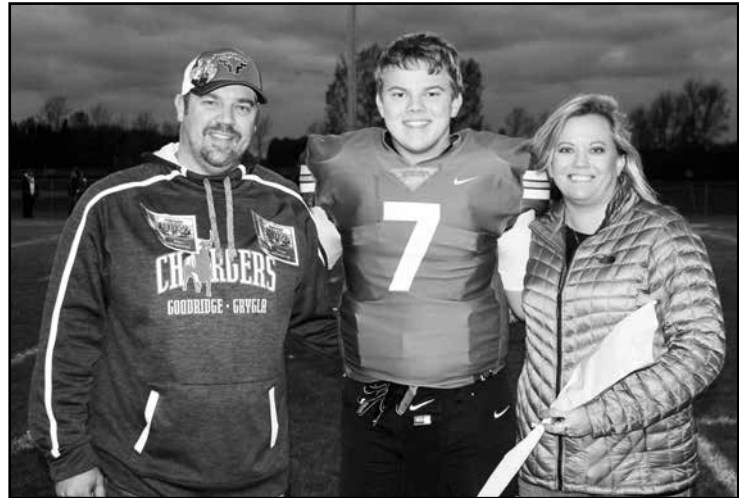

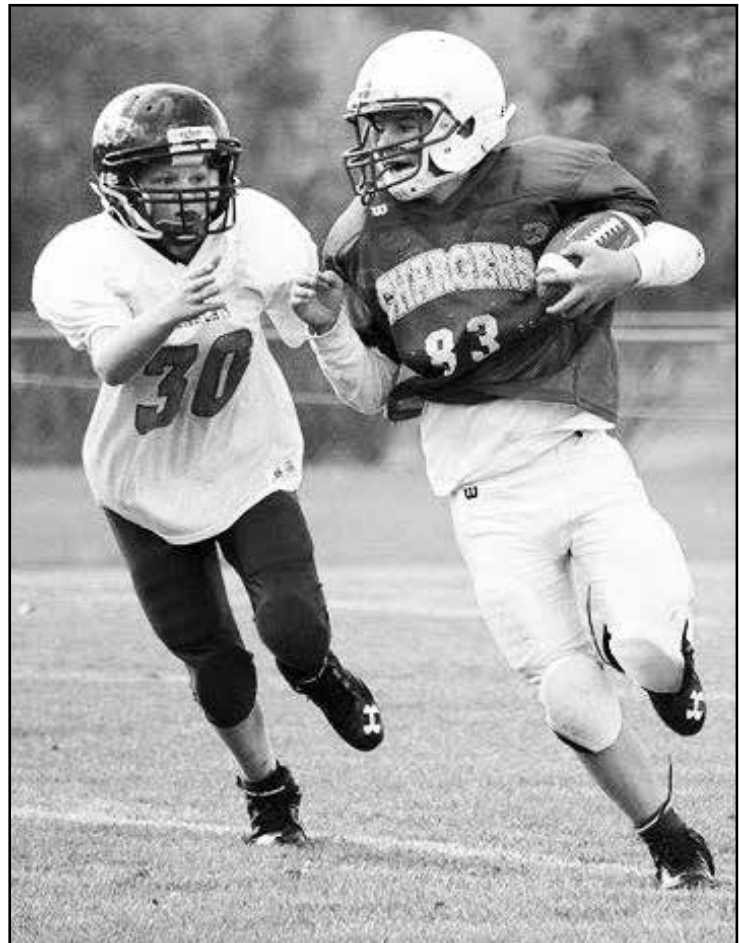

We had a couple untimely injuries during the 3rd quarter, which caused some break

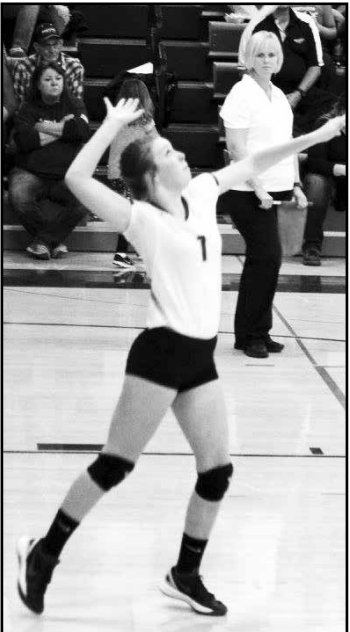
