Meyers become new owners of Motel 89

Shawn and Stacie Meyer never pictured themselves owning the hotel and managing six buildings a year ago today. "We definitely wanted to have or work at a business in Grygla, though," Stacie said in an interview with the Grygla Eagle. Although they are enjoying their time managing, it is a lot of work. "One perk would be being your own boss," offered Shawn.

When the owners of MarBel Homes, who had wanted someone local to manage the buildings, approached Shawn and Stacie to manage, they decided to take on the task. Previously Shawn had worked at Nelson Ink in Middle River and Stacie had been self-employed. On November 1st 2014, they became the official managers of the five buildings included in MarBel Homes. On July 1st 2015, they became the official owners of Motel 89, a motel that has been local to Grygla for as long as most people can remember!

Currently at the motel, the couple is working on redecorating all of the rooms to attract more guests; they are also remodeling the house portion of the motel. They plan on remodeling to accommodate continental breakfast for travelers on the go, and also putting in two tanning beds for public use. They have also been working on remodeling the Soil and Water Conservation office into two living suites. With all of the new changes, the only thing that they are planning on keeping the same is the name of the motel; they want to keep it easy to find and remember!

With owning the Motel, and managing five other buildings, come duties and responsibilities. Stacie does all of the financial and paperwork for the apartments and does the tenant leases also. Shawn does most of the maintenance and cleaning that comes with managing and owning the building, which can add up to a lot with all of

the buildings they manage. Although the couple doesn't have any employees yet, except for some help here and there from Stacie's three daughters, they do plan on maybe a few employees a little later down the road.

Future plans for the MarBel Homes would be to re-shingle the two duplexes and to go apartment to apartment and update all the old appliances. They would like to get newer appliances in Independence Hall and the Blair House. They also plan on fixing minor issues like chipped paint or broken utilities. A long-term plan for the MarBel homes would be to get some two-bedroom apartments for families and make it more family friendly; although it will be awhile, but it is still a thought! Regarding the motel, they are trying to modernize and update all the rooms to increase business a little bit, even if it is a small town!

Spittlebugs in Gardens
Spittlebugs fall under the category of unusual insect problems. The most obvious sign of their presence is, what appears to be, a wad of spittle on a leaf.

Spittlebugs are commonly found in and around Minnesota gardens; however they usually do not cause enough damage to be considered a problem, but will often raise questions. They are primarily known because of the frothy spittle mass that the nymphs produce while feeding on their host plants.

There are approximately 54 spittlebug species described in Minnesota, but the most commonly encountered species is the meadow spittlebug, *Philaenus spumarius*. Additional species you may find in your garden are the prairie spittlebug, *Philaenarcys bilineata* and *Aphrophora* spp.

Adult spittlebugs, also referred to as froghoppers, have enlarged hind legs for jumping. They are similar in form to leafhoppers but are less slender. Adult meadow spittlebugs are ¼ inch long and vary in color, often tan to brown, but could also be gray or mottled. Meadow spittlebug nymphs are orange at first, but as they progress through four molts they change from yellow to pale green. Large red eyes are apparent on the side of the nymphs head.

Spittlebugs overwinter as eggs in leaf litter. Nymphs emerge in late April or early May and start feeding at the base of the plants, but continue to move up, preferring tender foliage and blossom tissues. As the nymphs feed they pump bubbles into fluid that they excrete as a foamy substance. This frothy mass protects spittlebugs from predators and

from drying out. The nymphs mature in five to eight weeks. As adults, they migrate to nearby grassy areas, pastures or areas with broadleaf weeds. The females return in September and October and lay clusters of eggs amongst plant debris or in leaves and stems. There is only one generation per year.

Spittlebugs feed on a wide variety of herbaceous plants including ornamental grasses, roses, chrysanthemums, clover, strawberries, herbs, and many other garden plants. Spittlebug nymphs pierce the plant stems and suck plant juices. In most cases, especially on annuals and perennials, spittlebug feeding is not damaging to plants. If large populations are present, feeding can cause leaves to become distorted, and in the case of strawberries, the berries may be smaller.

In most cases, management of spittlebugs is unnecessary as their numbers are typically small, their presence is short-lived, and the damage they cause is minimal. Management options, if they are desired, are limited.

Remove weeds that are near your gardens. This eliminates plants that could be a food source for spittlebugs.

Physically remove the spittlebugs by hand when it is practical. Another option is to spray the spittlebugs with a strong blast of water; this can dislodge nymphs from the plants.

Insecticides are not effective against spittlebugs; the nymphs are protected inside their spittle masses from any insecticide sprays.

Grant monies available for Arts Legacy and Arts Projects Grants

A new round of grant money is available for northwest Minnesota. Funds are available to apply for various arts organizations, communities and school districts. Applications are being accepted in the seven county service area including Kittson, Marshall, Norman, Pennington, Polk, Red Lake and Roseau counties.

The Arts Legacy Grants is a main category for funding artistic activity within the seven county service region. Funding for the grants comes from the Minnesota State Legislature through the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund of the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment. A maximum of

\$10,000.00 can be requested. Applicants are required to provide for at least 10% cash match and in cases of repeat sponsorship, a 25% cash match.

Arts Projects Grants are supported by general allocation funds from the Minnesota State legislature, for locally produced projects and events as well as sponsorship of performances of touring companies and artists. These grants are a maximum of \$3,000.00 with an either 10% cash match or a 25% match for repeat sponsorship.

Also available on a first come-first served basis are Artist Residency Grants for area school districts. There is \$2,100.00 maximum to sponsor

a traditional week long residency. An extra \$400.00 may be requested for visual art residencies for supplies. Schools are strongly urged to use a COM-PAS artist.

Art Projects funded through these very important grant opportunities include festivals, community theatre projects, folk music entertainment, sponsorship of visual demonstrations, creative writing workshops and many other activities that improve the quality of life of people in our communities.
