CP Holiday Train schedules annual stop

The Canadian Pacific Train will be making its annual stop in Thief River Falls on Tuesday, December 12th, arriving at 7:30pm with the show from 7:45-8:15pm on the tracks by the City Hall, 2017 Highway 59 SE.

A typical Holiday Train event goes something like this: the train arrives and pulls to a safe stop in front of the crowd. The stage door lowers and the band opens with its first song. After that, a brief presentation takes place with local food bank officials and other dignitaries. Once complete, the band resumes performing a mix of traditional and modern holiday-themed songs. The whole event lasts about 30 minutes. Once the band plays its farewell song, the stage door closes, and the train heads off to the next

stop.

The event is free to the public. You are only asked to bring a canned food item donation for the local food bank. Food Bank representatives will be on site collecting donations.

The Holiday Train is about 1,000 feet in length with 14 brightly decorated rail cars. Each car is decorated with hundreds of thousands of technology-leading LED lights and holiday designs. As the train clears U.S. customs, the exterior lights are turned off. Otherwise, the Holiday Train lights are always on.

Kendra Jensen, Girls State Representative, spoke to the crowd about her experience attending Girls State last summer and Hannah Wilebski & Braiden Carver read a Veterans Day essay.

The guest speaker at the program in Goodridge was Vincent Desselier. The Kindergarten class performed "One Small Voice" and Student Council President, Brandon Stanley, gave the closing address, followed by Mercedes Coan and Mrs. Skalsky playing Taps and the Retiring of the Colors.

IMPORTANT PROPERTY TAX HOMESTEAD NOTICE
*This will affect the amount of property tax you pay in 2018, and it may affect your eligibility for a property tax refund.
Please contact your county assessor to file a homestead application on or before December 15, 2017, if one of the following applies:
• You purchased a property in the past year and you, or a qualifying relative, occupy the property for homestead purposes on December 1, 2017; or
• You, or a qualifying relative occupy a property for homestead purposes on December 1, 2017, and the property was previously classified as non-homestead.
A qualifying relative for homestead purposes depends on the type of property. For residential property, a qualifying relative can be a parent, stepparent, child, stepchild, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, nephew, or niece of the owner. This relationship may be by blood or marriage. For agricultural property, a qualifying relative can be a grandchild, child, sibling, or parent of the owner of the agricultural property or of the spouse of the owner.
Once you have been granted the homestead classification, no further applications are necessary unless they are specifically requested by the county assessor.
You must also contact the assessor by December 15, 2017 if you are the property owner, or a qualifying relative of the property owner, and the use of the property has changed during the past year.
If you should sell, move, or for any reason no longer qualify for the homestead classification, you are required to notify the county assessor within 30 days of the change in homestead status. Failure to notify the county assessor within this 30-day period is punishable by recalculation of tax as non-homestead, in addition to a penalty equal to 100 percent of the homestead benefits.

IMPORTANT PROPERTY TAX NOTICE - SPECIAL AGRICULTURAL HOMESTEAD
Legislation provides for homestead of un-occupied and non-contiguous farmland under the following conditions:
(1) agricultural property consisting of at least 40 acres;
(2) the owner, the owner's spouse, grandchild, child, sibling, or parent of the owner of the agricultural property or of the spouse of the owner, is actively farming the agricultural property, either on the person's own behalf as an individual or on behalf of a partnership operating a family farm, family farm corporation, joint family farm venture, or limited liability company of which the person is a partner, shareholder, or member;
(3) the owner and operator is a MN resident;
(4) neither the owner nor their spouse may claim another agricultural homestead in MN; and
(5) the owner and operator do not live farther than four townships or cities, or a combination of four townships or cities, from the agricultural property.
The applicant can live in their own home, an apartment, a rental home, a manufactured home park, a condominium or a cooperative and still qualify for homestead.
Actively farming includes participation in the day-to-day labor, administration and management of the farm. They must assume all or a portion of the financial risks and they must participate in any profits or losses.
An additional provision extends homestead treatment to detached agricultural land that is owned/leased by a family farm corporation, joint farm venture, limited liability company, or a partnership operating a family farm, if there is a shareholder, partner or member actively farming the land.
Homestead application: This special homestead provision is only available to qualified individuals that make application by the filing deadline of December 15, 2017. In order to monitor this homestead provision, the owner is required to make annual application accompanied by form 156EZ from the FSA office and proof of filing a Schedule "F" on income taxes.

5-ingredient White Chicken Chili

This delicious and easy recipe can be made with just 5 ingredients in 15 minutes. The salsa verde gives it such a great flavor, too. You won’t be disappointed.

Ingredients:

- 6 cups chicken broth
- 4 cups cooked shredded chicken

2 15-oz cans Great Northern beans, drained (or whatever white beans you prefer)

2 cups store-bought or home-made salsa verde

2 tsp ground cumin

Optional toppings: diced avocado, chopped fresh cilantro, shredded cheese, chopped green onions, sour cream, tortilla chips/strips

Directions:

Add chicken broth, shredded chicken, beans, salsa and cumin to a medium saucepan and stir to combine. Heat over medium-high heat until boiling, then cover and reduce heat to a medium-low and simmer for 5 minutes. Serve with desired toppings.

If you prefer to use the slow cooker method, add chicken broth, 2 uncooked boneless/skinless chicken breasts, beans, salsa and cumin to a slow cooker. Cook on low for 6-8 hours or high for 3-4 hours. During the last 30 minutes of cooking, shred your chicken with a fork and add the beans.

Hunters register 70,724 deer during first weekend of season

Minnesota firearms hunters registered 70,724 deer during the first two days of deer season, according to the Department of Natural Resources.

Preliminary numbers from opening weekend show that the number of deer registered was essentially the same as from 2016. Of the deer harvested, 57 percent were bucks, compared to 67 percent of the first weekend harvest of 2016.

In Zone 1, in northeastern Minnesota, total firearms harvest was up 16 percent. In Zone 2, which covers the majority of the state and runs from Canada to Iowa, harvest was down 5 percent and Zone 3, in southeastern Minnesota, was down 20 percent.

"We expected to see an increased harvest this year, and that appears to be so in Zone 1. In the other zones where the first weekend harvest is off, it could be that the amount of standing corn negatively affected deer harvest," said Steve Merchant, wildlife populations and regulations manager. "If that is the case, we should see improved deer harvest as more corn is harvested."

Based upon the number of antlerless permits available and the number of permit areas that allow multiple deer to be taken, the DNR is projecting the 2017 total deer harvest to be around 200,000. The 2016 total harvest was 173,213.

In much of Minnesota, the deer season continues through Sunday, Nov. 12. Additional deer will be harvested during the northern rifle zone season, which continues through Sunday, Nov. 19; the late southeast season, which runs Saturday, Nov. 18, through Sunday, Nov. 26; and the muzzleloader season, which begins Saturday, Nov. 25, and continues through Sunday, Dec. 10. More information on deer management can be found at mndnr.gov/deer.
