Grace/Our Savior’s Youth attend Reformation Remix

What is a remix? A remix is a piece of media that has been altered from its original state by adding, removing, and/or changing pieces of the item. It incorporates old material with fresh material, to create something new.

That’s exactly what I’d say we were a part of at Arrowwood Resort in Alexandria – a remix - something old mixed with something new and fresh.

November 17-18, Robert and I chaperoned the NWMN Synod of the ELCA Middle School Gathering. We had 9 great kids with us from 6th-8th grade: Riley Saurdiff, Brigitte Watne, Kia Klein, Ahna Stanley, Justin Thompson, Sheldin Sundberg, Kaylor Torgerson, Reece Sundberg and Blake Rychlock.

It was in 1517, 500 years ago, that Martin Luther nailed the 95 theses to the door of the church in Wittenberg, Germany. Acting on his belief, he wrote a list of questions and propositions for debate. After reviewing why Martin Luther felt the church needed to reform, the LYO Board met and discussed for almost a year about what they think needs to be reformed in today’s world and church. They came up with ‘Race and Sexual Orientation.’

Don’t panic.

A few of you will.

Keep in mind this was an LYO gathering, not an LGBTQ gathering; the messages were all delivered in an age-appropriate, loving and respectful way.

Listen up.

One of our presenters was Dave Scherer, also known as AGAPE. His hip-hop, rapping, dancing, storytelling approach was understood by every listener. ‘LOVE YOUR HATERS.’ His passion is to bring together people of all backgrounds and let them know about God’s love for the whole world. He has toured all across the US and in 8 different countries. He founded a youth-led worship service that attracts hundreds of youth across the Minneapolis/St. Paul area each month. And he has received awards for excellence in youth ministry. He was fantastic to listen to. He brought his friend, Mayata, with him, who is a young black woman. (And a phenomenal singer!)

loved her. I loved her. Everyone loved Dave and Mayata. Their songs of praise and love were very powerful, too. Their passion soaked right into all of us. And I thought it was so important for our young kids to hear these stories, not only because of the world we’re currently living in, but because of the predominantly white community we currently live in.

Another presenter of ours was Aubrey Thonvold. She is a lifelong Lutheran from Minnesota. She is also a lesbian. She told of the hurt and confusion growing up – knowing she was gay – but being told by the people in her church that she was broken and needed to be “fixed.” She was 24 years old before she met other gay Christians.

Aubrey has a master’s degree in Transforming Spirituality from The School of Theology and Ministry at Seattle University. She prides herself on inviting ALL people to the table and works to support the freedom to marry for LGBTQ couples. She and her wife both have a call to ministry and her message was this: We are a church that reforms. Keep your hearts and minds open; that’s how God works. And yes, there will be people who might not accept you if you are LGBTQ, but God uses strong disagreements to create movement in our hearts.

She strives to be a safe place

for anyone going through a gender identity/sexual orientation issue and encouraged our youth to be a safe place for their friends, too. She added that everyone can bring a gift to the church. And our role as adults and leaders in today’s world is to make sure young Christians know that.

Larry Wohlrabe was also at the gathering. He is the Bishop of the NWMN Synod – ELCA. It was his 10th year attending the yearly retreat and he felt very passionate about the two topics presented to us.

The worship leaders for the weekend were the Good Shepherd Worship Band out of Moorhead and they were AWE-SOME. Great music filled the huge room and got hundreds of kids up on their feet.

Throughout our time there, we had large-group assemblies, small-group mixers, games, panels and also some amazing food, FYI. The kids also had a couple hours of free time on Friday night. The night life included a black light dance, a movie room and free entry into the huge waterpark. I don’t know why we only had 9 kids instead of 50!? These things are life-changing, people.

Anyway, we stayed overnight Friday only and ended the night with a midnight devotion that made for some great discussion. “Our world is changing, just as it was in the time of the Reformation.

The changes occurring in the world will ultimately affect the church.” From there we talked about the challenges affecting our schools, communities and churches.

These kids get it. They weren’t afraid to share their thoughts openly, but most importantly...THEY GET IT.

For example, our first evening at the resort, there was this boy from another town who was an “outsider” in his group. The kids immediately recognized that he was being left out and doing a lot of activities alone. They not only invited him to be a part of our group activities, they even asked if he could sit with us during our big assembly at the evening Worship. I was so proud of them and made sure to tell them that.

Kindness, acceptance, friendship.

Like I said, these kids have got it.

And these are the types of gifts LYO retreats give us, in addition to praising God.

In closing, one of the songs by the Good Shepherd Worship Band had some powerful lyrics that we sang. It was dark in the room and we were all singing to Him:

“Your love never fails – it never gives up – it never runs out on me.”

Don’t we all deserve to feel and believe that with every fiber of our being?

Most of us have heard this quote before and it’s more evident than ever during the Christmas season.

Marshall County Social Services is sponsoring the “Sharing Tree Project” again this year; this is an opportunity for the people of Marshall County to show their love and generosity for the less fortunate children in the county.

Nine trees have been placed in Marshall County, with ornaments on them representing a child in need of a Christmas gift. The individual ornament will have specific information about a certain child. There will be a number, the child’s gender, and the child’s age on each ornament. The child’s clothing size and some of their interests are listed on the ornaments. Numbers are used to correspond to the children’s names due to confidentiality; no names will be released outside of the Marshall County Social Services office.

If you would like to be part

of this heart-warming experience, visit one of the nine locations, choose your ornament from the tree and record the number on the sign-up sheet with your name. Take down the information from the ornament, purchase a \$15-\$30 gift, return it to the location of the tree where you chose your ornament, unwrapped in a box. Instruction sheets, with the specific details are located at each of the tree sites.

Busy shoppers can take a load off while donating blood at the Grygla/Gatzke community blood drive from 11:30am-5:30pm at the Grygla Community Center on Wednesday, December 6th. The blood drive with United Blood Services, this area’s non-profit blood provider, will replenish the local blood supply and stock hospitals’ shelves for the upcoming holiday season.

United Blood Services encourages people to donate once more before the end of the year, when people are so busy with holiday plans. Traditionally, the nation’s blood supply is very tight during the holidays; area residents can help assure that a blood shortage does not occur this year.

The blood drive comes at

a critical time. Blood can be stored for only 42 days and the blood that is donated now will save the lives of patients who are in the hospital or receiving medical treatments during the holiday season.

Make your convenient appointment to give blood at www.unitedbloodservices.org or by calling Ralph (294-6177), Sheldon (294-6176), Mildred (459-3436) or Nadine (459-3315). With each donation, donors receive a free total cholesterol test and earn points in United Blood Services’ Hero in Me rewards program. To speed up the process, donors are encouraged to complete their Fast Track questionnaire the morning of their blood donation.

Volunteer blood donors must be at least 16, weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and be in good health. Additional height/weight requirements apply to donors 22 and younger, and donors who are 16 and 17 must have signed permission from a parent or guardian.

Chairperson of the board Nicolette Leach called the meeting to order at 8:07 p.m. with Karina Tinnes, Charisa Limesand, James Verbout, Jeremy Rychlock, Principal Lunsetter and Superintendent Clow present. Andrew Oslund absent.

DIY Dried Orange Garland

Want to try some natural/ from scratch Christmas garland ideas? It would be so much easier to buy something out of a store and hang it, but wouldn't it be more fun if it was homemade? Not only will this one look amazing, but it'll smell amazing, too.

Have you ever made a dried orange garland? The drying process takes some time, but overall it's pretty easy to make and looks very pretty at the holidays.

Materials

Oranges
Whole bay leaves
Cinnamon sticks
Twine

Process

Start by slicing oranges about 1/4 inch thick and placing them straight on the oven rack. Back at 200 degrees for about 4 hours, turning every hour or so. Next, gather your bay leaves in a bowl. Then, drill holes in the middle of the cinnamon sticks. You can also just wind the cinnamon sticks around the twine



as you go. (Drilling takes more time, but the cinnamon stick stays in place better.) Now all you have to do is string them together. You can do any pattern you prefer, but start with a cinnamon stick. It is helpful if you have a large embroidery needle, but you can always use a paper clip or even a piece of wire.

If this garland seems too time-consuming, you can always just string some popcorn and cranberries – who doesn't love that at Christmas time!?

Tis the season for goodies! And ho ho holy cow these look good, don't they!? S'mores always remind me of camping, sleeping bags, campfires...but you can enjoy these delicious S'more bars right from your kitchen this winter. They'll quickly become a family favorite and no campfires are needed.

Ingredients

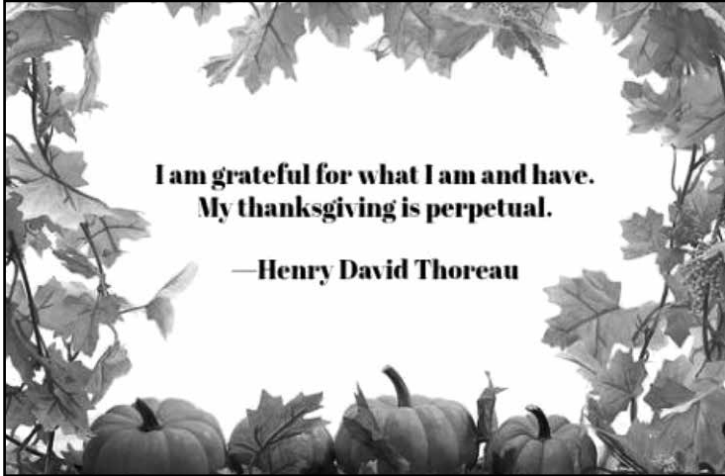
2/3 cup butter softened
1 cup brown sugar packed
1/2 cup granulated sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
3/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup milk chocolate chips
3/4 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
1 1/3 cup mini marshmallows divided
3 large sized Hershey bars broken into pieces
2 sleeves graham crackers broken into squares + 2-3 graham crackers broken into bits for top of cookies.
Instructions
Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Whisk together flour, baking soda, salt in a medium

bowl. Set aside. Using a mixer, cream together butter and sugars until light and fluffy in another bowl. Add vanilla, then add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition. Slowly beat in flour mixture until just incorporated. Fold in the milk chocolate and dark chocolate chips and 1 cup of marshmallows. Lay out graham crackers on a baking sheet, touching each other, no space in between. Place small scoops of cookie dough on the graham crackers, using an ice cream scoop and spread dough out a little by flattening with back side of scoop or spoon. Bake for 5 minutes without disturbing.

Or
Optional: Bake for 3 minutes and using a scoop or spoon, spread the top of the dough lightly, so the chocolate and dough mixes together, for a different variation. Place back in oven for 2 minutes.

After 5 minutes of baking Press Hershey pieces, 1/3 cup marshmallows and 1/3 cup broken graham crackers on top. Bake for 5-7 more minutes. Cool cookie bars in pan. Store at room temperature in a sealed container.

You know how people ask you what is your favorite movie or song, or they ask you to pick one answer to a question? That is so difficult for me!

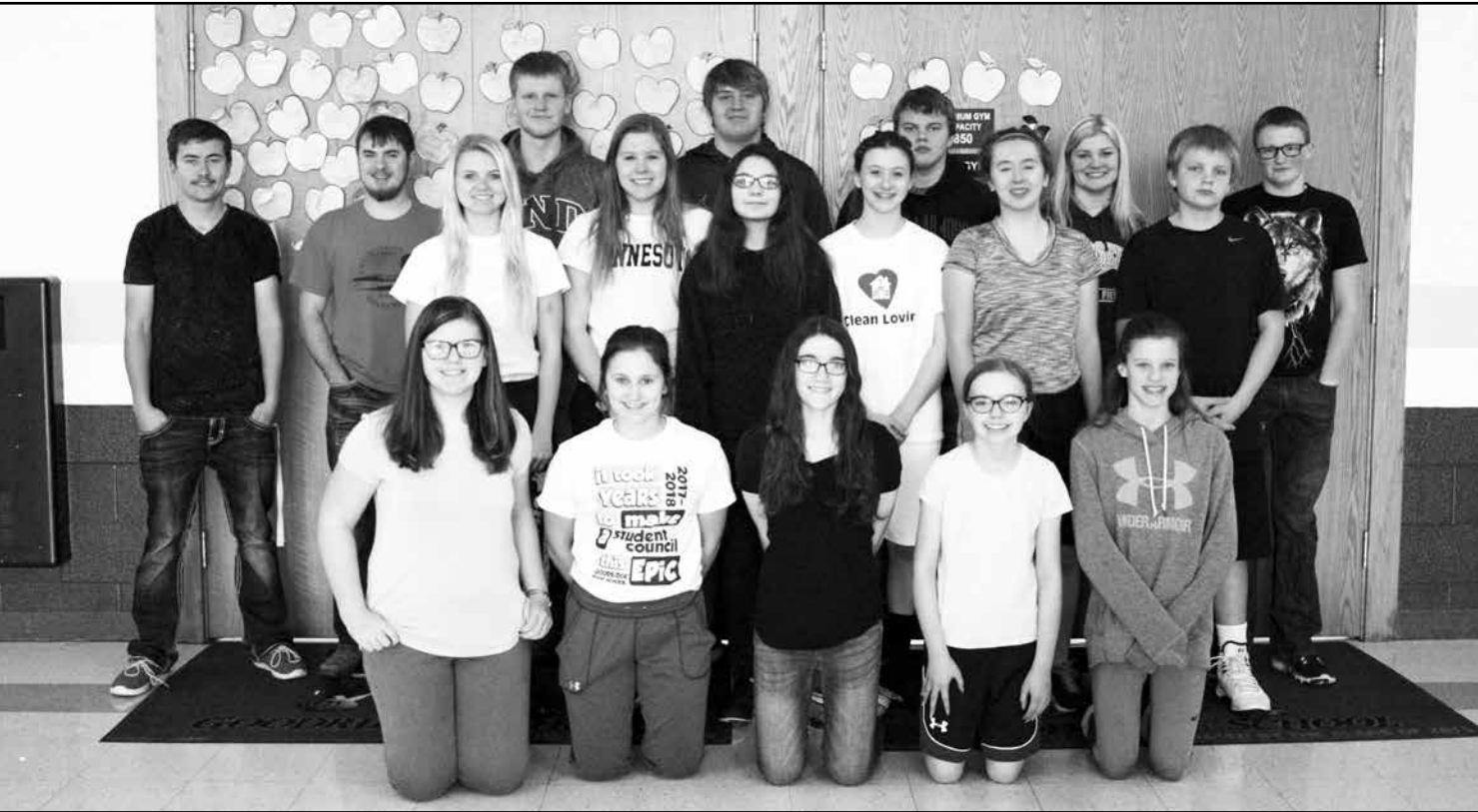

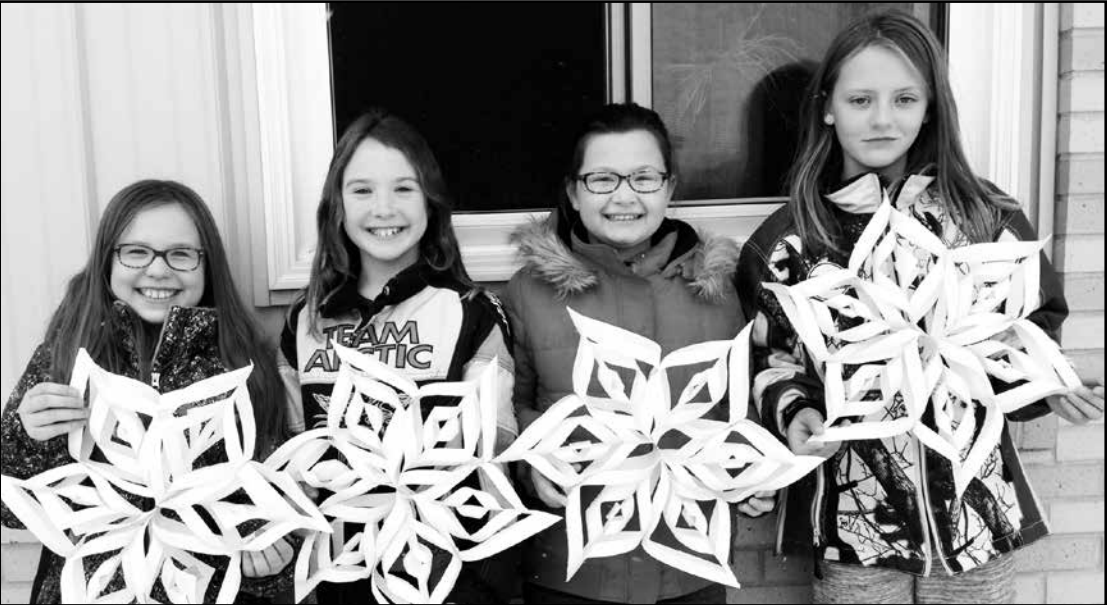

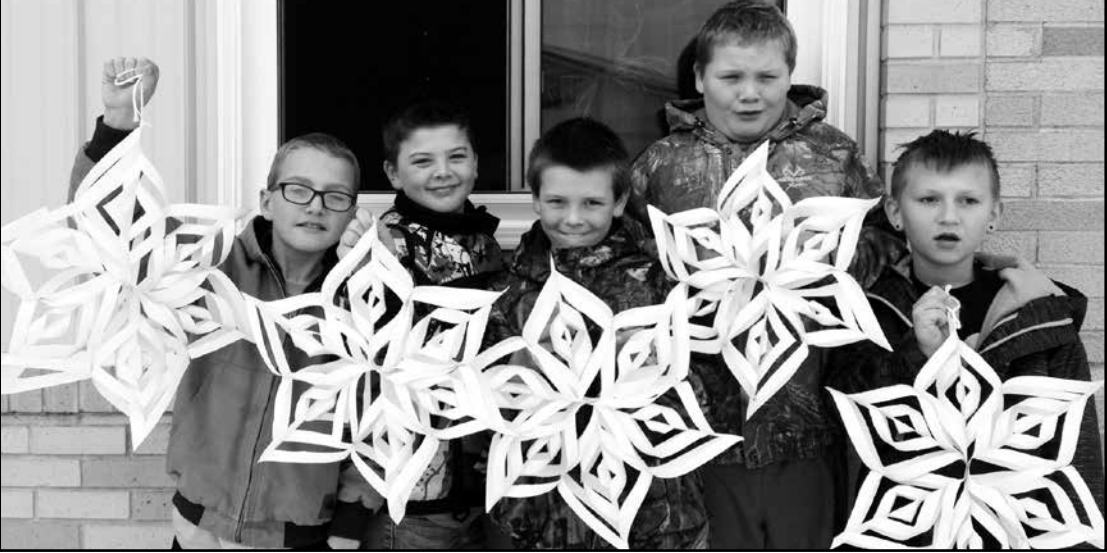
