Grygla/Gatzke Food Shelf beings March Campaign



Be the hero. Fight Hunger. March is here! That means it is time for the 2018 Minnesota Food Share March Campaign for Hunger Awareness. The Grygla-Gatzke Food Shelf will again participate by re-

questing food and monetary donations during the month of March. The food shelf is eligible to receive funding from Minnesota Food Share based on the funding raised and the amount of food items (number

of pounds) donated. This is their big fundraiser for the year, as the ability to generate some matching funds makes it all the more worthwhile. The friendly competition at Grace Church with "Pack the Pews" makes it fun, as well. The seriousness of the need for a food shelf is not a laughing matter, though. Statistics show that 1 in 10 people in Minnesota worry about where their next meal is going to come from, and this especially impacts children (1 in 7 children in Minnesota struggles with hunger) and senior citizens. That is why there are over 300 food shelves in Minnesota – to help alleviate their worries. The food shelf is run on in-

dividual donations and any grants that are received. With that help, they are able to buy food items through the North Country Food Bank at greatly reduced rates, but support is needed to keep this program going. Everyone (individuals, civic organizations and businesses) is urged to consider donating to the Grygla-Gatzke Food Shelf during the month of March, to take advantage of these grant programs. Food donations may be left at participating area churches, or at the Grygla Co-op Store. 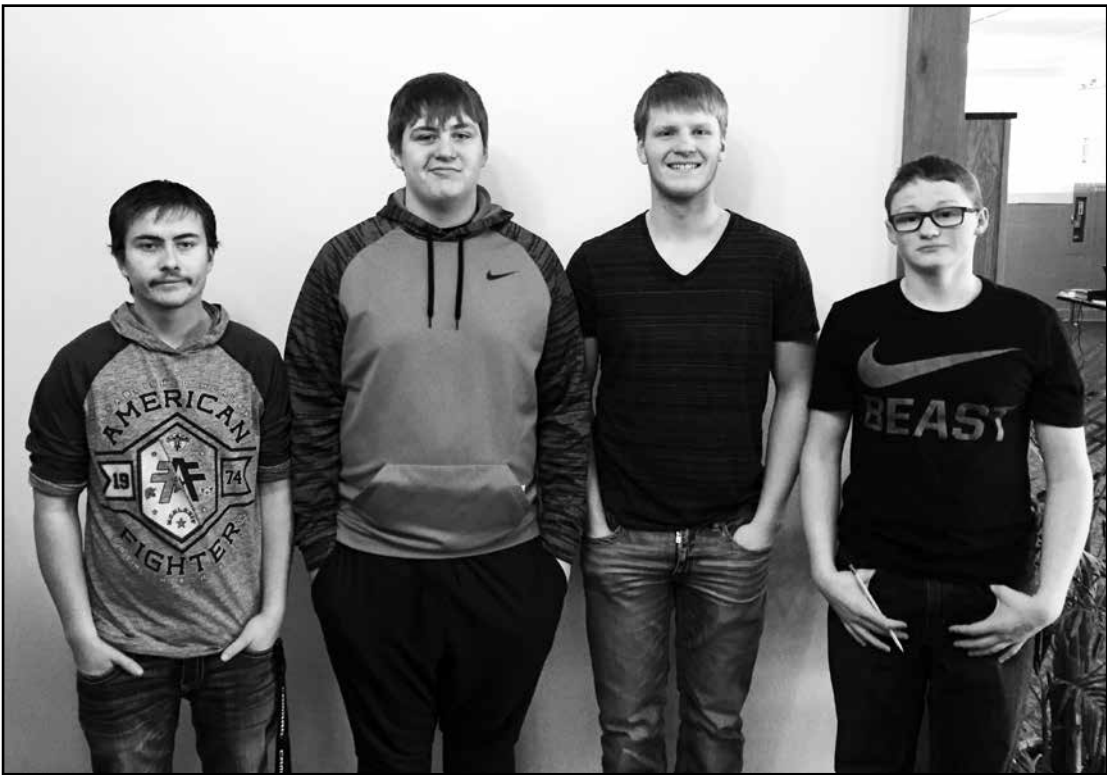
Alumni Basketball Tournament

Gryglas's blood drive brings in 25 volunteers

The Grygla Fire Department hosted a blood drive with United Blood Services on Wednesday, February 14th, which helped collect a total of 29 units of blood for patients in need.

A total of 25 individuals volunteered to donate blood and 22 individuals were able to donate at the United Blood Services blood drive on February 14th. A total of 7 donors also came forward to donate Power Red Cells (2RBC) which collects 2 units of red blood cells while returning platelets, plasma and a saline solution back to the donor.

United Blood Services expressed their gratitude to Bob Thompson and Paul Nordby, who co-coordinated the drive, as well as others who assisted the day of the drive: Brad Monson, Lynn Anderson, Rodney Hagen and Ida Stanley.

UBS strives to keep a 5-day supply of every blood type on the shelf at all times to be able to meet the needs of patients across the region. Donations from O-negative donors, the universal blood type, are especially important this time of year due to increased accidents and trauma cases.

United Blood Services is the only blood provider to nearly 70 hospitals across the region. The blood supply is dependent on selfless donations from volunteer donors to ensure the lifesaving needs of the region are met.

About 30 percent of UBS's blood supply goes to cancer patients across the region and 1 in 7 people entering the hospital will need blood. Those relying on blood in the region receive that lifesaving blood from UBS.

Donors can make a convenient appointment to give blood at www.bloodhero.com or by calling (877)827-4376. With each donation, donors receive a free total cholesterol test and earn points in United Blood Services' Hero in Me rewards program.

Blood donation takes about an hour from check-in to refreshments. Donors can save about 20 minutes by completing their Fast Track Health History the day they donate on www.unitedbloodservices.org

Put your car keys beside your bed at night. Tell your spouse, your children, your neighbors, your parents, and anyone else you think might benefit from this tip.

If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car battery dies.

Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of

this - it's a security alarm system that you probably already have and requires no installation! Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and will keep honking until your battery runs down or until you reset it with the button on the key chain. It works if you park in your driveway or garage.

If your car alarm goes off when someone is trying to break into your house, odds are the person won't stick around. After a few seconds, all the neighbors will be looking out their windows to see who is out there and sure enough the criminal won't want that.

Remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a parking lot. The alarm can work the same way there or be useful for a health emergency, such as a heart attack, if you don't have a phone with you.

Ground Philly Cheesesteak Grilled Cheese

I feel like I've been sharing a lot of supper ideas lately, but I have a perfectly reasonable explanation! I'm trying something new at home where I pick 10-12 new supper recipes out, add all the ingredients I need to my shopping list and then set out making them. Not only does it help keep me on budget when buying groceries, but it also saves so much time when it comes to making supper. (It also forces us to try new things!) Breakfast, lunch and snack-time comes easy as at our house, but we struggle for supper ideas and this totally helps. So there ya have it.

These 'Ground Philly Cheesesteak Grilled Cheese' sandwiches were one of the new suppers we tried last week and they were really great. I had to leave the peppers and onions off the kids' but they liked their version, anyway!

Ingredients
1 pound ground beef
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons butter
1 onion, chopped
1/2 green bell pepper, chopped
salt and pepper to taste
8 slices American or Provolone Cheese
8 slices buttered bread

Instructions

Start by browning the beef in a skillet. Break apart as small as you can (think taco meat consistency). Add the salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Stir and let simmer.

In another pan, add 2 tbsp. of butter, chopped onions and green bell pepper, cooking until browned and caramelized. Once browned, add to the meat pan and combine.

Spread butter on one side of each of the 8 slices of bread, put bottom 4 slices on griddle. Add a slice of provolone to each. Top those 4 slices with your meat mixture and close the sandwiches pressing down lightly. Grill on each side 3-5 minutes.

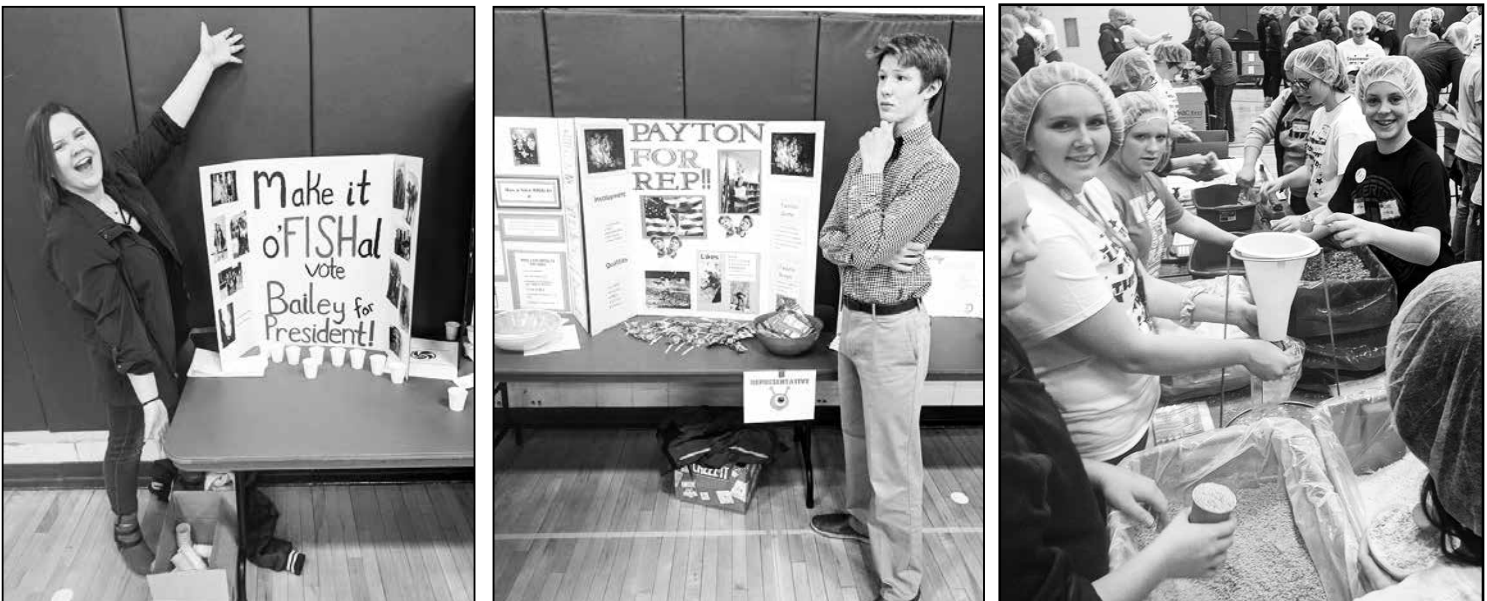

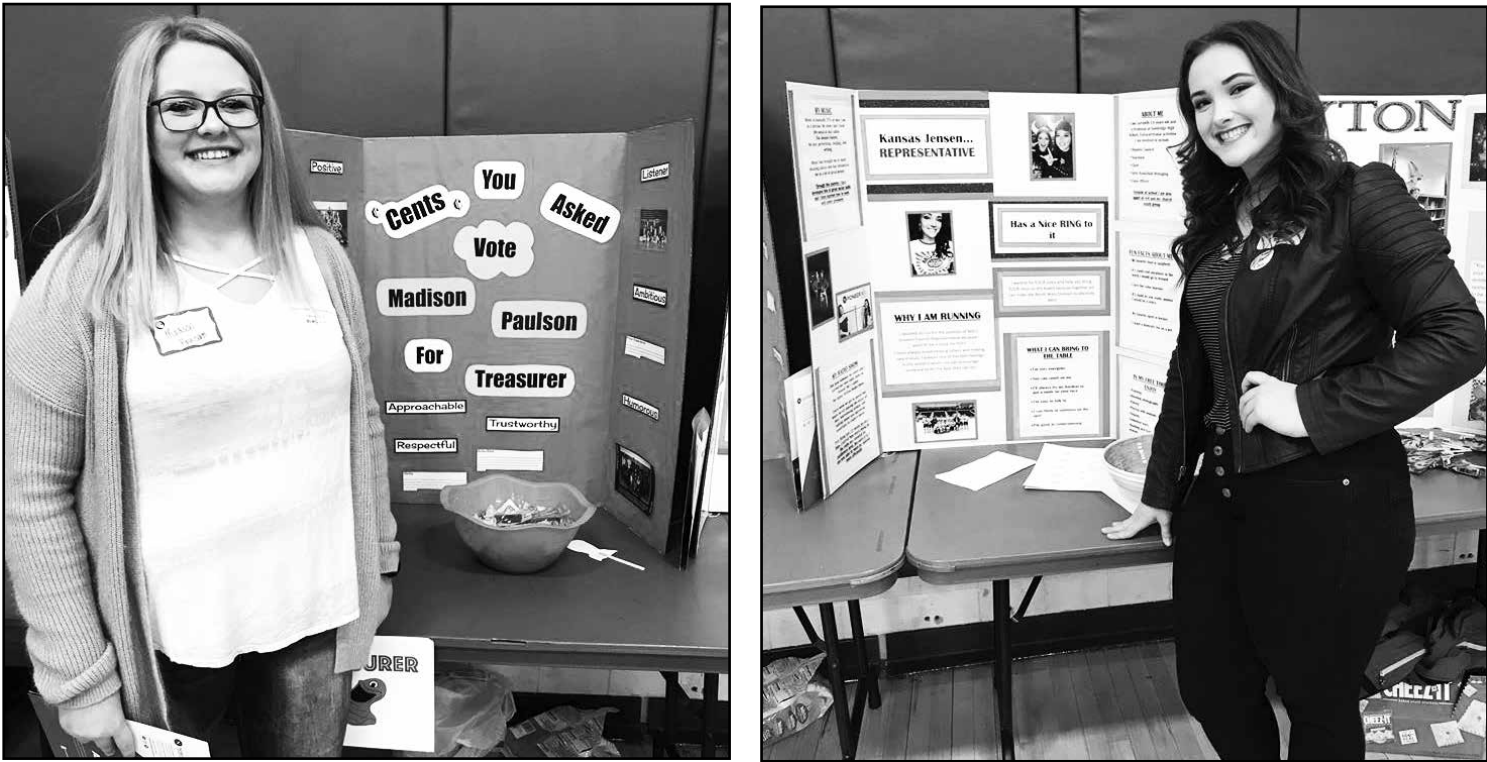
Youth hockey day

GG Student Council news



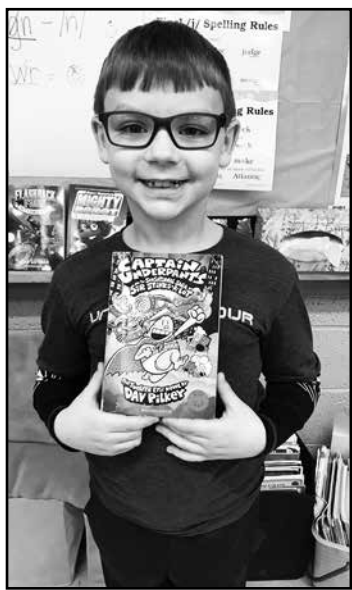
