Saurdiff is awarded Northwest Arts Advocate of the Year



The Northwest Minnesota Arts Council is pleased to announce "Of the Year" award winners, the Northwest Minnesota Art Exhibit Reception and the Arts Expo. Three awards are given each year to recognize artists and arts advocates within our seven-county region who stand out in terms of artistry or volunteerism in the arts. "Of the Year" award winners were nominated by area residents.

This year's recipients are Betsy Saurdiff of Grygla, Scott Pream of Thief River Falls and Jim Kent of Crookston.

These "Of the Year" awards and the NW Art Exhibit awards will be presented at

the Northwest Minnesota Arts Exhibit Reception on Saturday, April 28, in Thief River Falls at the Ralph Engelstad Arena at 2:30pm. Doors open at 9:30am to view the 99 pieces of high quality regional artwork on display in the REA lobby and to vote for people's choice. At 2pm enjoy a snack and music entertainment. The program will begin promptly at 2:30 with the main focus being the recognition and celebration of artists and the arts in Northwest Minnesota. Everyone is welcome to this free event.

In addition, there will be an Arts Expo starting with a VSA presentation by Executive Di-

rector Craig Dunn at 11:00 am in the Dakota Room. This is for artists with disabilities, as well as Arts Leaders or other organizations trying to provide access to people with disabilities. Round table presentations by representatives from numerous arts organizations will be held from noon to 2pm in the Imperial Room. Organizations represented include Minnesota Citizens for the Arts, Springboard for the Arts, the Minnesota State Arts Board, the Jerome Foundation, the Northwest Minnesota Arts Council, the Playwrights' Center, Minnesota Music Coalition, Northern Clay Center, MN Assn of Song-

writers, MN Theater Alliance, MN Fringe Festival, Nemeth Art Center, Women's Art Institute, North Dakota Museum of Art, MN Arts Online, Explore MN Tourism, and the Teaching Artist Roster Program.

Of the Year Award Winners include:

Betsy Saurdiff of Grygla will be awarded the Northwest Arts Advocate of the Year Award

Mrs. Saurdiff is an art teacher in the Goodridge/Grygla School District. She is passionate about the visual arts, an accomplished artist who works primarily in ceramics and encourages art exploration in her community. Arts Advocate of the Year award is \$500 and includes arts from all disciplines.

Scott Pream of Thief River Falls will be awarded the Northwest Artist of the Year Award

Mr. Pream is an extraordinary actor who also works behind the scenes to help others shine. Artist of the Year award can be given to any discipline artist including visual, performing, or creative writing who are emerging or at a midway point in their artistic endeavors. It is a cash award of \$500.

Jim Kent of Crookston will receive the Northwest Star Award

Mr. Kent is a musician and previously a school teacher in the Crookston School District. He is active in the Crookston arts community through the community theater, Civic Music League, Pirate Fine Arts Boosters, Community Oratorios and his church. This award comes with \$5,000. Artists can only receive the Northwest Star Award once, as a lifetime achievement award.

Beware of phone scammers using local numbers

Familiar-looking numbers are the latest twist in robo-calls. It's the latest phone scam known as neighbor spoofing and your very own cell phone number may be getting used as scammers are using automated systems that generate phone numbers with the same area code and prefix of those in your area. These telemarketers and scam artists are illegally disguising their identities under familiar-looking numbers to get people to pick up their phones.

While the caller's informa-

tion appears local and may even appear as the number of someone already in your phone, the calls are often placed by scammers who are located outside the state or country.

Scam artists realize many people no longer answer calls from phone numbers with unfamiliar area codes or that display no caller ID information so now spoof local phone numbers into caller ID devices hoping their calls will entice the recipient to answer.

If you receive these calls, hang up as soon as you recog-

nize the call is a scam or the caller is not a person or organization you know.

If you see a missed call from a local number, unfortunately you have no way of knowing if it's a scam or someone local actually trying to contact you. When you call the local number back, it calls the person who owns that number, not the scammer. Has this happened to you? Where the person on the other says they have not called you? Well, in that case you know it was a phone scam. The best way to handle an unknown

caller, even if the number looks similar to your own, is simply let the call go unanswered and let the caller leave a voicemail. If there's no voicemail, either the call was spam or the message wasn't that important to begin with.

Just a courtesy reminder to never give out your personal information (credit card numbers, birthdate, social security numbers, etc.) and beware of all the phone scams out there - this is just the latest of them.

Grygla Lions's Blood Drive brings in 48 volunteers

Grygla Lion's Club hosted a blood drive with United Blood Services on April 18th at the Grygla Community Center, which helped collect at total of 47 units of blood for patients in need.

A total of 48 individuals volunteered to donate blood and 41 individuals were able to donate at the United Blood Services blood drive on April 18th. A total of 6 donors also came forward to donate Power Red Cells (2RBC), which collects 2 units of red blood cells while returning platelets, plasma and a saline solution back to the donor. There were 10 people who volunteered for the first time.

United Blood Services expressed their gratitude to Ralph Rundell, who coordinated the drive, and the Grygla Lion's, who sponsored the blood drive, as well as others who assisted the day of the drive: Sheldon Peterson, Nadine Wold, Mildred Klamar, Ida Stanley, and the Grygla Student Council.

UBS strives to keep a 5-day supply of every blood type on the shelf at all times to be able to meet the needs of patients across the region. Donations from O-negative donors, the

universal blood type, are especially important this time of year due to increased accidents and trauma cases.

United Blood Services is the only blood provider to nearly 70 hospitals across the region. The blood supply is dependent on selfless donations from volunteer donors to ensure the lifesaving needs of the region are met.

About 30 percent of UBS's blood supply goes to cancer patients across the region and one in seven people entering the hospital will need blood. Those relying on blood in the region receive that lifesaving blood from UBS.

Donors can make a convenient appointment to give blood at www.bloodhero.com or by calling (877) 827-4376. With each donation, donors receive a free total cholesterol test and earn points in United Blood Services' Hero in Me rewards program.

National Infant Immunization Week is April 21-28

(Submitted for print) April 21-28, 2018, is National Infant Immunization Week and North Valley Public Health (NVPH) would like to take the opportunity to raise awareness about important infant immunizations this week. The diseases vaccines prevent are very real and many of these diseases are just a plane ride away. Vaccines have been so effective that these once-common childhood diseases are seldom seen

in the U.S. anymore. It is important for us to continue to be diligent with immunizing our children to prevent these preventable diseases from re-emerging. Cost should not be a barrier to getting your child vaccinated and the Minnesota Vaccines for Children (MnVFC) Program can help. In Marshall County, both NVPH and North Valley Health Center Clinic offer MnVFC vaccines. Through Mn-

VFC, children 18 years of age and younger who do not have medical insurance, are enrolled in Medicaid, are Native American or Alaskan Native or whose insurance doesn't cover the cost of vaccine can receive vaccines for free or at low-cost. All recommended childhood vaccines are available at both locations. Some parents have questions about the safety of vaccines for their baby. Vaccines are thoroughly tested before

they can be used and continually monitored while in use. Infants are exposed to thousands of germs every day. The antigens in vaccines given at a 2 month check-up are just a drop in the bucket compared to what their body handles on a daily basis. Infants have a tough immune system that is ready to respond to each vaccine on the schedule. Immunizing on time every time is the key to keeping deadly diseases away from our children and communities.

Breastfeeding-Friendly Skills Training held

(Submitted for print) Research continues to validate the importance of breastfeeding. One of the goals of the Quin County CHS Breastfeeding Coalition is to provide support to breastfeeding women and families with consistent, accurate and current information. One way to provide this is to educate area professionals on skills to support breastfeeding families.

In March, nearly 30 area professionals attended a Breastfeeding-Friendly Skills Training designed increase to knowledge of breastfeeding issues, skills and competence for professionals working with mothers and infants during the prenatal, perinatal, or postnatal period. Sessions included: skin to skin, latch and positioning, hand expression, supplementation of the breastfed infant, breast pumps and positive messaging.

The trainings were led by highly qualified, credentialed Certified Lactation Counselors (CLC) or International Certified Lactation Consultants (IBCLC)'s. Connie Hagen, RN, IBCLC, speaking as a leader of the Quin County CHS Breastfeeding Coalition, stated, "How wonderful it was that so many organizations, including LifeCare Medical Center in Roseau, Sanford Hospital in Thief River Falls, Polk County WIC, Quin

County CHS WIC, Tri-Valley Opportunity Council, Inc. of Crookston and Inter-County Nursing Service of Thief River Falls, stepped up to allow their employees to be trainers for this event. This shows we do have many organizations dedicated to breastfeeding families in NW Minnesota."

Comments from experienced professionals attending the training were overwhelmingly positive. Pam Hockstedler, RN, from North Valley Public Health of Warren, stated, "This was wonderful, I learned something new at each of the stations."

Now, many local breastfeeding resources will be utilizing the skills taught in the North Dakota Breastfeeding-Friendly Skills Training curriculum. Our NW Minnesota breastfeeding families will feel even more confident using our local resources knowing consistent current breastfeeding information is being provided for help with their questions.

The Stars are Fire by Anita Shreve

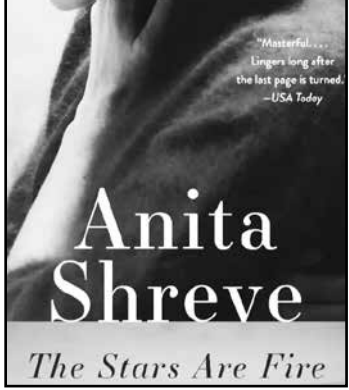

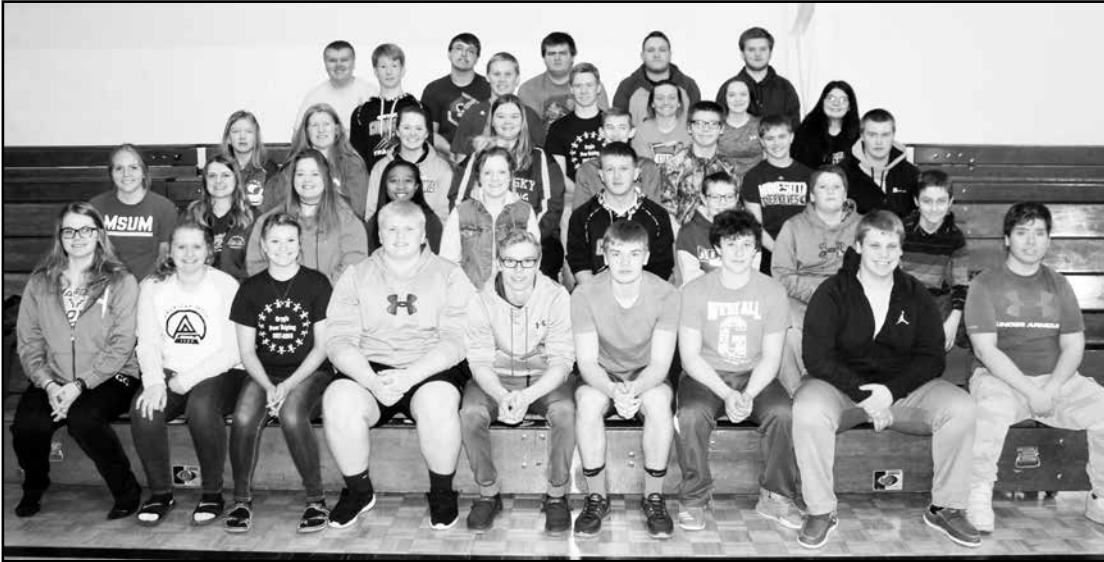

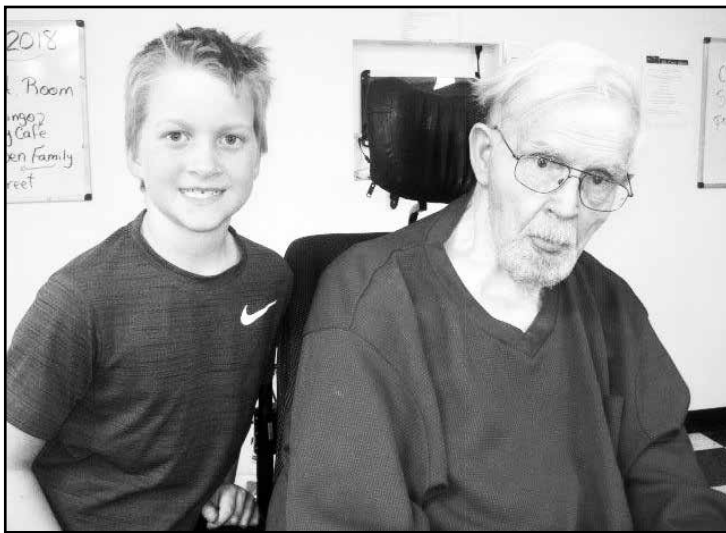

FSA 2018 Acreage Reporting Maps are available for producers

The Marshall County Farm Service Agency (FSA) has the 2018 Acreage reporting maps printed and ready for Producers to pick-up at the Marshall County Farm Service Agency office. The County Office asks that farm operators stop by the Marshall County FSA Office and ask to pick up their 2018 acreage reporting maps. If farm operators have made changes to the land they operate they are asked to inform the County Office of these changes prior to picking up their maps. To better serve producers, Marshall

County FSA has additionally arranged a map pick-up day for producers at the following times and locations. Please stop by and ask for your maps at these locations if it is more convenient for you to do so.
 • Tuesday May 01 from 9:00 AM to 1:30 PM at American State Bank of Grygla
 • Wednesday, May 02 from 9:00 AM to 1:30 PM at Newfolden Co-op Oil CO.
 • Wednesday, May 09 from 9:00 AM to 1:30 PM at Koda-Bank in Stephen, MN.
 Once producers have com-

pleted planting they should complete their maps and then call the County Office to schedule their appointment for Acreage Reporting. A letter attached to the map explains how to complete the map and what information is needed. This information will include the crop, variety, planting date, and intended use. Producers with questions about picking up their maps or acreage reporting requirements should contact their local FSA County Office or the Marshall County FSA Office at (218) 745-4251 ext. 2.
