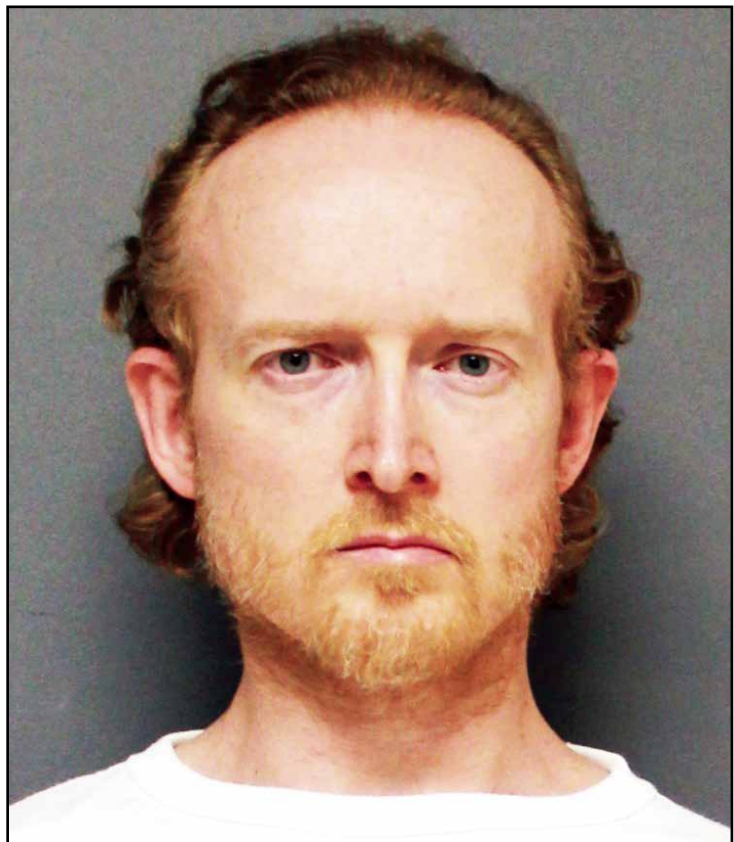

Sex offender registers rural Grygla address

A Risk Level Two Sex Offender was released from a Minnesota Correctional Facility on April 23rd, 2018, after being convicted in Pennington County and having been incarcerated since November of 2004. Several inquiries were made to the Grygla Eagle about a public notice being printed so the Marshall County Sheriff's Department was contacted for comment on the matter. Due to the offender's registered address, the matter was referred to the Beltrami County Sheriff's Office.
Chief Deputy Ernie Beitel confirmed that Roger John Wheat recently registered his address in rural Grygla/Beltrami County, however, no official press releases are sent

out to notify the public unless the offender is a Risk Level Three. Beitel said the offender has served his time and that is all he can comment on, adding, "Wheat is required to renew his status on a monthly basis, including any change of address." The risk level of this offender has been determined largely on his potential to re-offend based on his previous behavior.

Offense: Offender has a history of engaging in sexual contact with minor female victims (ages 6 months to 8 years). Contact has included sexual touching and penetration. Offender used his position of authority and size to gain compliance. Offender was known to victims.
A public record of the hearing in July of 2004 included the following Findings of Fact:
1. Licensee Christine Nelson has had a Family Child Care License for the premises at 231 North Tindolph Avenue in Thief River Falls since July 2002. Sometime in September 2003, the license for the premises at 231 North Tindolph was made joint, to accommodate the addition on the License of Roger John Wheat, who lived at the residence and provided child care services.
2. On or about June 3, 2004, Roger Wheat engaged in cunnilingus with two female children who were receiving child care services at the Licensees' home. He licked the vagina of each girl with his tongue in two separate incidents. The girls are 5 and 3.5 years old, respectively. Licensee Christine Nelson was not at the facility when the incidents occurred.
3. In separate interviews with Thief River Falls police during early June, 2004, Mr. Wheat admitted he had committed the acts described in the preceding Finding. Each of the girls had indicated to their parents what Mr. Wheat had done, and the parents took separate cases to the police.
4. On June 23, 2004, Mr.

Wheat was charged with Criminal Sexual Conduct in the First Degree, under Minn. Stat. § 609.342, subd. 1a, which provides that sexual contact with persons under age 13 is a felony.
5. Upon recommendation of the Local Agency, the Department issued an Order of Temporary Immediate Suspension against the License of Christine Nelson and Roger Wheat, based on the incidents described in the above Findings. The Order, issued on June 4, 2004, noted that the "Pennington County law enforcement" were investigating the serious violations alleged and, during the interim, the Local Agency could not ensure the safety of those enrolled in the Licensees' program. Licensee Christine Nelson filed a timely appeal, and this hearing process followed.
6. Christine Nelson had no part in and had no knowledge of the incidents of which Roger Wheat stands accused. If Wheat makes bail or otherwise is released from custody, he will not be living at 231 North Tindolph. Rather, Mr. Wheat possibly will live with relatives approximately 30 miles from Thief River Falls. If Wheat is released, Ms. Nelson will forbid him from being near or having any contact with the day care children.
7. Mr. Wheat resides at the Pennington County Jail, but receives his mail for the purpose of this proceeding at 231 North Tindolph in Thief River Falls. The contents of mailings for him sent to that address have been transmitted to him by Ms. Nelson. Ms. Nelson informed him of the hearing conducted on July 7, but Mr. Wheat took no steps to seek a release from jail to attend the hearing.

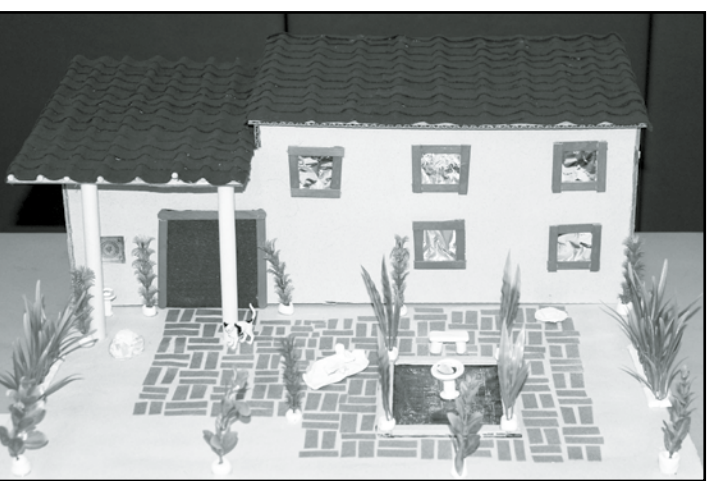

The Romans by Mollie Lunsetter

The ancient Roman homes were built out of flat and hooped tiles. Some roofs were rented out. The rooms on the street were often made into shops.

The Romans food was eggs for dinner and dessert was fruit. Meat and vegetables were separated. They grew vegetables such as asparagus, cabbage, carrots, cucumbers, leeks, lettuce, onions, squash, peas and beans. The rich ate fish and pastries.

Clothes were usually made of wool or linens with silk for the rich. They wore jewelry of mother of pearl and emeralds, for the necklace. For the wrists they wore gold snake brace-

lets. Woman wore cloaks. Pol-las was a rectangle cloth usually draped over shoulders and around the back.

Bath time was a tradition the Romans loved to do. Boys only went to school. They practiced reading with their school teacher. Girls stayed at home and practiced playing the lyre. Shop prices were not fixed. People dealt until they had agreed on a deal. They lived in many home or apartments. They farmed many fruits and vegetables and children went to school and learned. They loved to live in Rome. They copied the Greek but made up their own things too.

Creamy Chicken, Asparagus and Bacon Tortellini
This supper dish looks and sounds like it takes a long time to prepare, but it totally doesn't. It was quick, delicious and packed full of flavor. It presents itself like it's straight from a pasta palace in Italy, too, so that's always fun. (Serves 4)
Ingredients:
2 cups tortellini, uncooked

½ pound asparagus
1 tbsp olive oil
1 lb. chicken breast, chopped
¼ tsp Italian seasoning
¼ tsp salt
8 slices bacon, cooked and chopped
1 cup heavy cream
¼ cup Parmesan cheese
Instructions:
First, get your bacon chopped and cooked. Next, cook the tortellini according to the package directions, which they are usually done in under 5 minutes! While that's cooking, steam or boil your asparagus to your liking. Next, cook the chopped chicken in your olive oil and Italian seasoning, then combine all the ingredients (including chopped cooked bacon) in a large skillet. Add the heavy cream and boil for a couple of minutes until sauce thickens. I added grated Parmesan cheese right before serving.

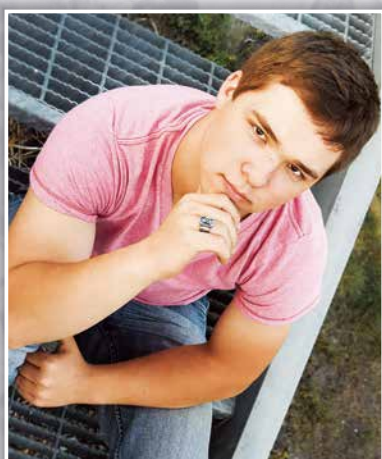

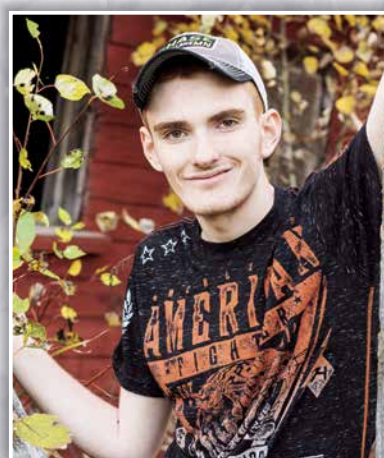
