Grygla students launch canoes down a river of dreams

Last Friday, May 11th, was an exciting day down at the Mud River in Grygla. The 4th and 5th grade classes have been taking part in the "River of Dreams" canoe launch program. Representatives from the International Water Institute, Conservations Corps and Red Lake Watershed District have been visiting the Grygla classrooms to teach the kids about our local watershed. Ashley Hitt, Natural Resource Specialist at the Red Lake Watershed District, and

Kyle Glowa, GIS Mapping and Outreach Corps Member, have been teaching the young students watershed functions and terminology, and the geography of local watersheds and how they fit into a larger drainage area. The River of Dreams program explores the connectivity of our planet's water supply and includes connections to reading, writing, social studies, science, math and art. Interactive classroom activities involved the Grygla 4th and 5th graders designing and decorating a 14" cedar canoe

that was assigned a tracking number so each canoe can be tracked and viewed online (at riverofdreams.org). Students were asked to imagine their canoe's journey down the local rivers and then write a story to describe the adventure. Photos of each canoe, the individual stories and tracking status can all be found on the website for students to view. After learning about the local river systems, students had high hopes as they set out to send their canoes down the Mud River last Friday morning; some even thought theirs would reach Canada by the weekend! For your information and enjoyment, let's give you the same path the kids were given: the Mud River begins at the Moose River Impoundment. It is a 21-mile long stream that flows westwards to the Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge. It is part of the Thief River watershed, which

drains via the Red Lake River, the Red River of the North, Lake Winnipeg, and the Nelson River to Hudson Bay! Students imagined their canoes making it all the way to the Hudson Bay and floating past Polar Bears and Beluga Whales! If someone happens to find the canoe, the instructions to log its whereabouts are glued in with the use of epoxy resin. Once they go to the website for that canoe, they can view all of the information, along with special messages from the students. One student asked, "If you find me and I need fixing, please repair me before putting me back in the water." Another suggested if found close to the winter season to bring it home until spring and then relaunch! What a great learning activity for these young minds!

Spontaneous combustion ruled cause of fire

Spontaneous combustion in a flower pot is more common than one may think. All that's needed is the right mixture of potting soil, moisture and heat to make the pot ignite; that's exactly what happened outside of a Grygla home recently. The Grygla Fire Department was dispatched for a structure fire to a residence within city limits on Thursday, May 3rd, at 10:11pm after a 911 call came in. A vehicle passing by witnessed flames outside of the home, made the emergency call and proceeded to alert the occupants inside by knocking on the windows. 11 firemen were on the scene for approximately one hour. Grygla Fire Chief, Bob Thompson, estimated the damage in his report to be around \$10,000 to the exterior of the house. Only minor smoke damage was sustained to the inside. The crew had to call the State Fire Marshall Investigator to the scene the following day in order to determine a cause of fire. Thompson stated, "We ruled out everything on our immediate list. The fire started near the deck, but there was nothing electrical in the area. A BBQ grill was ruled out as it hadn't been used since the fall season. Smoking was also ruled out as the residence is a smoke-free home." The next day, State Fire Marshall Investigator, Andrea Wenzlaff, out of Thief River Falls, determined that the fire started from a spontaneous combustion of a flower pot made of wicker. She explained that the wicker basket was sitting in a corner near the deck and house where it received direct sunlight, along with heat radiating off the home. The compost inside was ignited by the heat. Thompson concluded, "We all learned something that we never realized was so common. We're just glad everyone inside the home was able to get out safely and the flames were able to be put out after only minor damage. This could have been a lot worse."

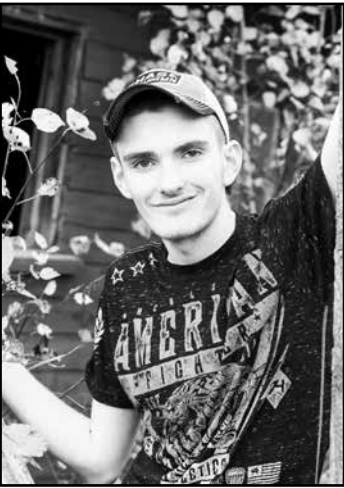

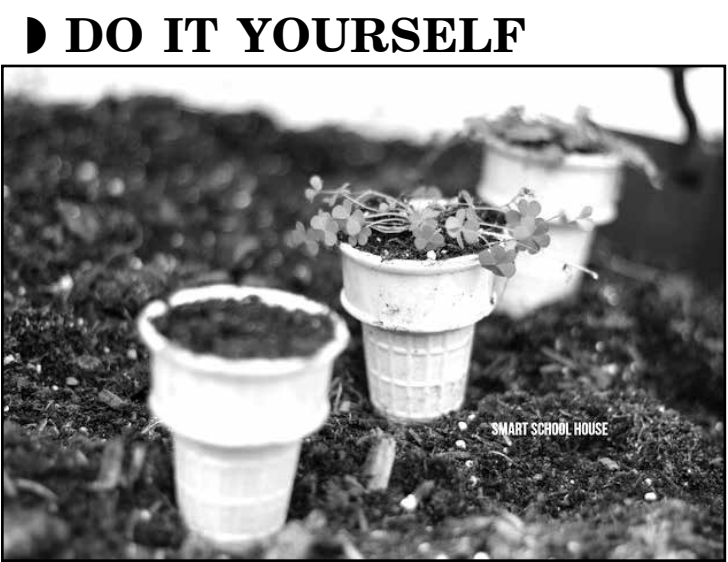

Loaded Potato Meatloaf Casserole

Ok, this casserole was so easy to make and so darn good. Sidenote: I doubled this recipe and used a cake pan instead. BIG MISTAKE. It made SO much for our family of 4 and we had leftovers for days. If your family is the same size as mine, I'd stick to the recipe below. I served this with side salads and it was simply delicious.

Ingredients:
Instant Mashed Potatoes – made according to package
1 lb. ground beef
½ cup diced onion
2 tbsp brown sugar
1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
1 cup Italian seasoned bread crumbs
1 egg
1.5 cups marble jack shredded cheese
¼ cup real bacon bits

Instructions:
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Make your instant potatoes on the stove according to the directions on the box. (I believe I made the 6 person serving, but you can make however much you want as the potatoes top the meat mixture.) Also, I made the potatoes according to everything on the package except where it said to add milk, I added sour cream. Personal preference. Anyway, once the potatoes are bowl, set aside. In a different bowl, mix your ground beef, onion, brown sugar, Worcestershire, bread crumbs and egg together. Press the meat mixture evenly into an 8 inch square baking dish. Spread prepared mashed po-

tatoes over the top. Sprinkle your cheese followed by the bacon bits. Cover with aluminum foil and bake for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake another 10 minutes.

Sweet & Sour Meatballs
Meatballs:
1 ½ lbs ground beef
¼ cup oats, pulsed in a blender
2 eggs
½ cup finely chopped onion
¼ cup milk
1 tsp salt
½ tsp pepper
1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
Sauce:
¼ cup brown sugar
¼ cup apple cider vinegar
1 tsp yellow mustard
¼ cup barbecue sauce
1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. For meatballs, combine all ingredients and mix well. Form into 2 inch meatballs and place in greased 13x9 pan (should make 12-15 meatballs). For the sauce, whisk all ingredients together and pour over meatballs. Bake for 30 minutes until meatballs are cooked through and sauce is thickened. 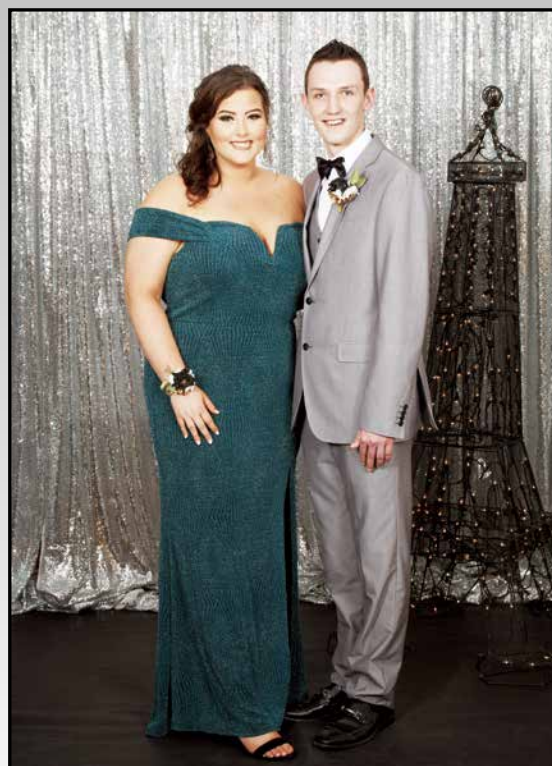
