Grygla’s official vegetable of the summer is announced

The One Vegetable, One Community program kicked off at the Grygla community garden last week. One Vegetable, One Community unites local communities by encouraging gardeners of all levels to plant, grow, cook, and/or share a featured vegetable of the year. Each community chooses their own featured vegetable; this year’s veggie in Grygla is the tomato!

One Vegetable, One Community is held through University of Minnesota Extension SNAP-Ed, the Northwest Regional Sustainable Development Partnership, and various Grygla community partners. Together these organizations are partnering to encourage healthy food access and community building.

The Health & Nutrition Programs, SNAP-Ed Educator for our area is Kristina Kaml. Last week, she came to meet with the Grygla 4th and 5th graders as part of the school’s nutrition class. The group went over to the community garden and transplanted plants they had been growing in the classroom, along with planting seeds & plants donated by the Grygla Coop. Of course, tomatoes were also planted, which had been started from seed in the classrooms almost two months ago.

One Vegetable, One Community increases access and enthusiasm for local and inexpensive healthy food. The kick-off event be-

gins a season-long campaign with the hopes that tomatoes will be grown around every corner: from community, personal and school gardens, to gardens at businesses, faith-based organizations and government buildings. By including the chosen vegetable at community events/potlucks; growing it in a community or personal garden; incorporating it on menus at local restaurants; and growing in garden boxes outside local businesses, we are broadening the conversation and making this a community norm.

Will you choose to participate and plant our featured vegetable, too? Tomato seed packages have been made up and can be found at the American State Bank, Grygla Coop Store, Farmer’s Union and the Grygla Library. Though it may be too late to start them from seeds, you can always save the packages for next year, Kristina suggested. She also put growing and harvesting tips, along with recipes, inside the free packages.

28 communities applied and are participating in OVOC this 2018 season! In addition to Grygla, the others are Bagley, Bemidji, Bigfork, Blackduck, Breckenridge, Cloquet, Cohasset, Crookston, Detroit Lakes, East Grand Forks, Elbow Lake, Fergus Falls, Fosston, Grand Rapids, Kelliher, Laporte, Little Falls, Middle River, Moorhead, Newfolden, Park Rapids, Pelican Rapids, Roseau, Thief River Falls, Virginia, Wadena and Warren.

FORESTRY NEWS

Warroad area foresters have been keeping busy this spring with a number of missions. Spring tree planting in the area involved planting 362,000 trees across 488 acres this spring. Trees consisted primarily of jack pine with smaller amounts of red pine, spruce, and white pine mixed in across the forest. Members of the contract planting crew averaged 3,000 trees per day per person. Planting was mainly in the Beltrami Island State Forest.

A total of 149 acres were aerial seeding this spring in the forest. Of these, 137 acres were beetle-damaged tamarack that was salvaged as fuelwood, and the land was seeded back to a mix of tamarack and spruce.

Foresters were also working on finishing 3,500 acres of regeneration; surveys need to be completed by the end of the spring. Surveys are typically conducted systematically at years one, three and five following timber harvest to ensure there are enough trees present to establish and develop a new stand.

The last month has also been very busy in terms of wildfire suppression. Local fire

departments and forestry staff have combined to suppress 62 wildfires totaling 6,465 acres in the Warroad area (Roseau, Kittson, Marshall, Pennington, northwest Beltrami and western Lake of the Woods counties). The County Road 7 Fire in northwest Roseau County has accounted for 3,500 of the total acreage. Greenbush, Lancaster, Lake Bronson and Karlstad fire departments, along with the Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, responded to this fire. The recent rains and green-up have helped to lower the fire danger in the area; however, we encourage folks to use caution and have good breaks in place to prevent fire escapes. Remember to get your burning permit and activate each day you burn.

Road restrictions were lifted in the state forest on May 17. Forest roads are open with the exception of a few trails that are currently under repair. See the DNR website at www.dnr.state.mn.us/trailconditions/listing.html for the latest on forest road and trail status.

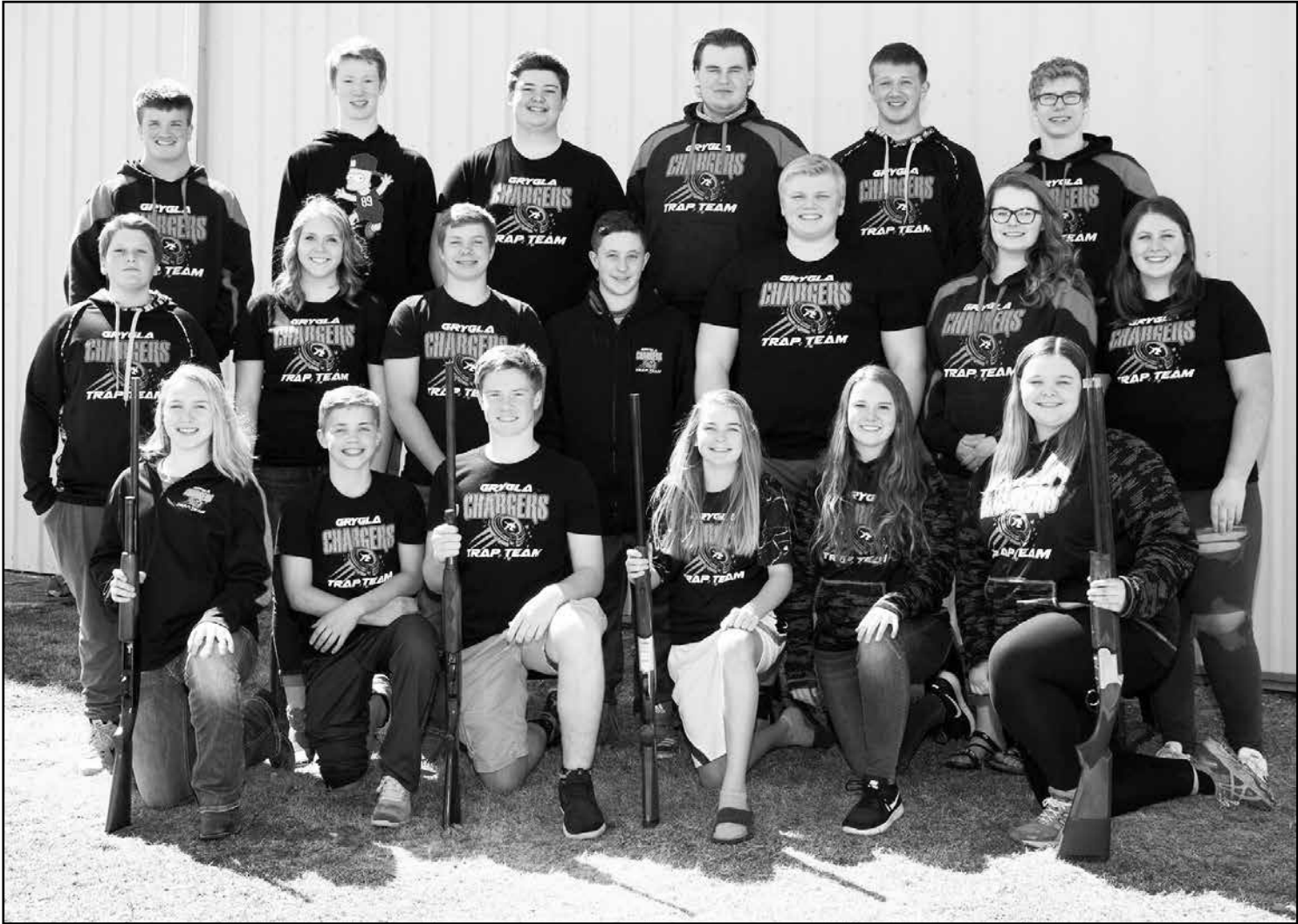
Thursday: Believe essential oil blend for my business. Believe in things to happen and what’s to come! This is one of my favorite blends.

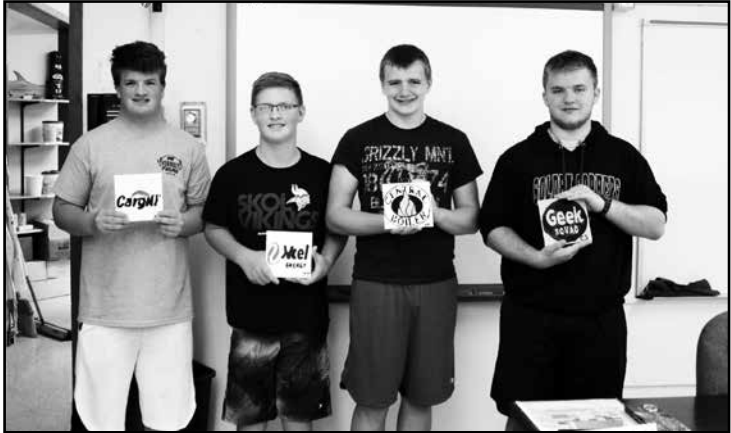

Getting rid of tent worms



Tent caterpillars are a big pest for trees, especially fruit trees. A large nest of them can quickly defoliate your trees and shrubs in a short time. If your trees are larger and more mature, the damage the tent worm will do normally won't kill your tree. Healthy trees will simply grow back a new set of leaves. However, it does cause the tree stress and you'll have loss of blossoms and fruit harvest. If trees are younger, the stress of losing their leaves can really set back their growth or worse yet, kill the tree.

Females lay their eggs in early spring in clusters of 200-300 eggs. These eggs grow quickly and in 3 weeks the caterpillars can be fully formed. Baby caterpillars stay in a dormant stage and hatch in timing to new budding of trees.

After hatching, a silk nest gets built and is made larger as the worms grow. Forks of tree branches are a favorite place for these nests. Tent worms typically feed 3 times a day and leave the nest and return together. It's best to wait until they are all in their nest before attempting to kill them.

To get rid of them, you can simply burn the nest, however, this can damage your tree and leave large patches behind. Another method suggested is to spray the nest with vegetable oil. You can also simply scrape the nest into a bucket of soapy water or use pruning shears to remove the twigs supporting the nest. Many stores also sell products to eliminate these pests, but you can usually get rid of them with a few DIY methods if you do a little online research!

This particular nest was on a tree at the home of Robert Sundberg. He opted to burn the nest off!
