Jelle completes Pohlad Internship Program with our local newspaper

Grygla High School Sophomore, Trystan Jelle, has completed her 10-week internship with the Eagle. This was the 11th year of the Pohlad Internship Program, which is offered to member newspapers by the Minnesota Newspaper Association. The summer youth employment program is a unique and special experience for high-school aged students as they get a taste for what a career in the communication or journalism field may look like.

Jelle summed up her summer internship by saying it was a great learning experience and she has gained some really great skills. "I feel a lot more comfortable talking to people around the community and putting myself out there," she added. Eagle Editor, Kari Sundberg, noticed a big change over Jelle's 10 weeks with the paper. "When Trystan interviewed for this job last spring, I knew right away that I wanted to bring her on board. Although she was pretty quiet and nervous in the beginning, I knew by the end that she would gain the confidence and skills needed to write some great stories. She has been a huge asset to me this summer and I've really enjoyed watching her grow the last few weeks."

Jelle's employment allowed her the freedom to choose and write her own weekly stories, which were featured on the front page each week. With minimal guidance, Jelle wrote some great articles this summer that included a feature on the new owners of Motel 89, area youth and their

summer jobs, and also an interview with local farm help from South Africa. Some of her other contributions to the paper included a variety of photographs, Yard of the Week, Do It Yourself, What a Joke and a personal column.

"Getting into the swing of things was difficult at first, but it has been really rewarding," she says. It was also rewarding to the Eagle; not only does the editor get to work with the intern on interviewing skills and offer some valuable guidance, the newspaper also gains that youth voice, better engaging younger readers in the town.

Nearing the end of her 10 weeks, Jelle asked if she could stay on as a part-time employee of the Grygla Eagle. She will only be working a few hours each week, covering various sporting and community events, but the extra hours will be beneficial to her and to the paper! "I know what I'm doing now," Trystan laughed. "The job has gotten easier for me and I really enjoy it. I figured since I live right in town, it's easier to attend things and take pictures if I'm going to be there anyway! I also won't mind the extra spending money," she added.

As mentioned, Trystan will be a sophomore this coming school year. In addition to her part-time employment, she will stay busy with many extra curricular activities that include JV/Varsity Volleyball and the Iron Chargers Robotics team.

Low Crop Prices

Most farmers are struggling with low crop prices and tight margins. Frayne Olson, NDSU Crops Economist, recently shared his insights on this frustrating concern.

A farmer recently asked a very simple but extremely relevant question at a market outlook meeting: “Will I ever see high grain prices again in my lifetime?”

The farmer asking this question started his farming career in the early 1980s and remembers the low commodity prices and tough financial conditions in agriculture at the time. The fear was that the grain markets were going to return to many years of low prices.

As usual, simple questions often have complicated answers. My short answer to the question was, “Yes, it is possible to see high grain prices again, but it likely will not happen this year.”

That doesn’t mean that current crop prices can’t improve, but they won’t reach the lofty levels we saw in 2012-13 for some time.

The key to understanding my answer is to examine the crop supply and demand conditions that led to the high and volatile prices during the past seven years and compare them to the market conditions in the 1980s, which extended into the early 2000s. The price volatility and price levels seen since 2007 are the result of three key interconnected conditions: the expansion of corn ethanol, the growth in Chinese soybean imports and historically tight U.S. grain ending stocks.

In contrast, the 1980s saw record large U.S. and world grain endings stocks, relatively stable export levels and a slow growth in U.S. domestic use, which included a very small, but evolving, ethanol industry.

The current crop market can be characterized by moderate U.S. and world ending stocks levels, stable ethanol use and a growing, but very

competitive, export market. In short, back-to-back record U.S. corn and soybean production in 2013 and 2014, combined with expanding production in other key grain exporting countries, has outpaced the growth in consumption.

As long as crop production continues to grow at about the same pace as consumption, crop inventories are large enough to buffer short-term supply chain disruptions. Crop prices will remain low with small bursts of price volatility.

However, if a significant production problem occurs in the U.S. or other major crop production region, or an event significantly disrupts the flow of grain, crop prices can increase rapidly. U.S. and world carryover stocks are not large enough to absorb major supply disruptions. A crop production problem likely will result in higher prices lasting nearly one year, while disruptions in grain flows, often caused by geo-political events, likely will last for several months.

My view is that the next several years will be a blend of the conditions experienced in the 1980s and those seen the past several years. The “typical” market will result in relatively low, stable crop prices and tight farm-level profit margins. But farmers will have periods of rapid price rallies and better profit opportunities. Unfortunately, the timing of these price rallies are impossible to predict and likely will not last for a long time. This makes developing a crop marketing plan more important, but also very difficult and frustrating. Farmers never will be able to price all of their grain at the peak of the market, but spending time monitoring market conditions will pay dividends.

DO IT YOURSELF



With the school year just around the corner, we’re all looking for ways to stay organized and prepared for the school week. This super fun and easy DIY project is customizable with the kids helping by choosing their own pattern and colors!

On August 12, 2015, North Dakota Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem announced that effective immediately, North Dakota will recognize all Minnesota permits to conceal and carry in their state. Similarly, Class 1 licenses issued in North Dakota will be recognized in the state of Minnesota.

Legislation authored by Representative Dan Fabian (R-Roseau) and passed into law this year allowed for this reciprocity agreement between the two states, removing the requirement in Minnesota that another state’s permit to carry must be substantially similar.

The word substantially was removed from statute.

“This is great news for folks who live in Northwest Minnesota, and it will simplify conceal and carry laws for people who often travel back and forth across state lines,” said Rep. Fabian. “This simple change to state statute is something I have been working on since 2013, and I’m pleased that a reciprocity agreement has finally come to fruition. I will continue to stand up for our Second Amendment rights, and the people and common sense priorities of our community.”

Marshall County Sheriff’s Office announces scholarship opportunity

Sheriff Boman of Marshall County announced today the commencement of the Law Enforcement Scholarship Program for 2015. Sheriff Boman proudly announced that the MSA Board of Directors has established a scholarship fund for the awarding of up to 15-\$600 scholarships for this year. These scholarships are due to the coordinated efforts of the 87 Sheriffs of the State of Minnesota.

The Members of MSA gives special recognition to the financial needs of students attending the peace officer skills course, or one of the two or four year law enforcement degree colleges. “The Board of Directors feel peace officers in our democratic society have complex duties to perform,” said Sheriff Boman. MSA recognizes the importance of pre-entry training for people considering law enforcement as their career choice. MSA recognizes some students need outside help in meeting the costs of such training, even though they excel academically.

The Scholarship Commit-

tee, in making its selection of awards, intends on achieving representation from all geographical areas of the state. Scholarship awards will be announced by December 31st of the same year. Application forms and a statement of procedures are available at the Marshall County Sheriff’s Office. Scholarships are only available to students currently enrolled in one of the following three categories:

- 1. Mandated POST Skills Program
- 2. In their second year of a two year law enforcement program.
- 3. In their third or fourth year of a four year college criminal justice program.

In order to qualify, students must have completed at least one year of the two year program or two years of a four year program. Students meeting these criteria are invited to obtain a scholarship application form from their local sheriff’s office or online at www.mn-sheriffs.org.

USDA encourages producers to consider risk protection coverage before fall crop sales deadlines

Farm Service Agency Administrator Val Dolcini encourages producers to examine the available U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) crop risk protection options, including federal crop insurance and Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage, before the sales deadline for fall crops.

"Deadlines are quickly approaching to purchase cover-

age for fall-seeded crops," said Dolcini. "We remind producers that crops not covered by insurance may be eligible for the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program. The 2014 Farm Bill expanded NAP to include higher levels of protection. Beginning, underserved and limited resource farmers are now eligible for free catastrophic level coverage, as well as discounted premiums for ad-

ditional levels of protection."

Federal crop insurance covers crop losses from natural adversities such as drought, hail and excessive moisture. NAP covers losses from natural disasters on crops for which no permanent federal crop insurance program is available, including forage and grazing crops, fruits, vegetables, mushrooms, floriculture, ornamental nursery, aquaculture, turf

grass, ginseng, honey, syrup, bioenergy, and industrial crops.

USDA has an online tool at www.fsa.usda.gov/nap that allows producers to determine whether their crops are eligible for federal crop insurance or NAP and to explore the best level of protection for their operation. NAP basic coverage is available at 55 percent of the average market price for crop losses that exceed 50 percent

of expected production, with higher levels of coverage, up to 65 percent of their expected production at 100 percent of the average market price, including coverage for organics and crops marketed directly to consumers.

Deadlines for coverage vary by state and crop. To learn more about NAP visit www.fsa.usda.gov/nap or contact your local USDA Service Center. Federal

crop insurance coverage is sold and delivered solely through private insurance agents. Agent lists are available at all USDA Service Centers or at USDA's online Agent Locator: <http://prodwebnlb.rma.usda.gov/apps/AgentLocator/#>. Producers can use the USDA Cost Estimator, <https://ewebapp.rma.usda.gov/apps/costestimator/Default.aspx>, to predict insurance premium costs.
