Ryan Petersburg dedicates his efforts to The Outdoor Adventure Foundation

"I went fishing last summer up at The Angle with my buddy, Scott Baumgartner. He's a full-time fishing guide that I've known since high school. It was about a month after that trip that we decided to start our own handicapped-accessible fishing service," said Petersburg, now Director of the NW MN Chapter of The Outdoor Adventure Foundation.

The Outdoor Adventure Foundation is a non-profit foundation that fulfills hunting and fishing adventures for children and young adults with cancer, or other life-threatening illnesses, and combat disabled veterans who have lost a limb or are wheelchair-bound due to an active service injury.

Recently, Ryan Petersburg, of Warroad, who has many ties to the Grygla area, became a Director of the foundation, while his friend, Scott Baumgartner, was named Co-Director.

After that fishing trip on Lake of the Woods, the two quickly found out that starting their own handicapped-accessible fishing service costs too much given the fees, the lawyers and everything else related to beginning a non-profit. A family friend referred Ryan to the founder and president of The Outdoor Adventure Foundation, Brian Solum. Solum grew up in the Argyle area and started the nation-wide foundation in Fargo in 2009. After talking about getting a new chapter started in northwest Minnesota, Solum thought Ryan would be the perfect fit as director for this corner of the state. The foundation previously had only one chapter in Minnesota, down by the Minneapolis area. Solum and Petersburg started talking in January of 2018; by February the plan was in place with Ryan being named the Director of the NW MN Chapter of The Outdoor Adventure Foundation.

As mentioned, this foundation sends kids and young adults (under the age of 40) on outdoor adventures at no cost to them at all. Similar to how

the Make A Wish Foundation works, this foundation fulfills dream hunts for individuals who are dealing with life-threatening illnesses or are disabled. Outdoor adventures include big game hunts (deer, elk, moose, bear), small game hunts (duck, goose, pheasant, quail) and fishing trips that may include fresh or salt water!

"Really the sky's the limit when it comes to the outdoor adventure," offered Ryan. "We actually just sent a group of about 30-some kids down to the cities for a Minnesota Twin's game!" Because the NW MN Chapter is so new, no recipients have yet been awarded from this area. Ryan's focus is on the entire northwest Minnesota area and he encourages people to give him a call if they have a recipient in mind. "We are focusing on this corner of the state, but if someone is a Minnesota native, we're definitely open to that and are willing to discuss it," he added.

As Director, Ryan's duties the last few months have included setting up the new website, finding volunteers to help on future excursions, seeking out recipients to award, in addition to sponsors to help on the funding end of things. (10% of all funds go into the general account for fees/insurance/etc.)

Funds for The Outdoor Adventure Foundation come from sponsors and private donations; Ryan is also applying for multiple grants, as well. He and Scott have been busy in this corner of the state securing funding from sponsors that include Bon Bon's Guide Service, Angle Outpost Resort, Trails 'N' More Landscaping, Nelson Construction, Hovda & Associates, Inc., DLS Farms, Inc., Argyle, Fleet Supply, Coast True Value, Mattson Pharmacy, Vigen Construction and Streiff Sporting Goods, to name a few.

Besides the newest Warroad-based chapter, there are also chapters in North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas, Nevada and Utah, Ryan explained. Each chapter works together and shares equipment or items, even funding, although each chapter is in charge of their own fundraisers, banquets and volunteers.

Ryan is an avid outdoorsman. He grew up in northwest Minnesota and laughed, saying, "There wasn't much else to do up here!" In 2012, Ryan was in an accident that changed his life. He broke his neck at the C6 level, which left him wheelchair bound as a quadriplegic. But because of his love for the outdoors and his strong-will, he didn't want that to affect his favorite hobbies. He admits, "After my accident, I realized how hard it is for people with disabilities to get out and enjoy the outdoors and feel comfortable, safe and in good hands. Just because I'm in a wheelchair doesn't mean these things have to be out of reach." Ryan explained how a lot of resorts around the Lake of the Woods area aren't set up to handle people in wheelchairs. That's why he is striving to make a difference.

He is looking into getting adaptive equipment for outdoor activities. That equipment would ultimately include a portable lift that would assist in boat transfers, a floating dock that is wheelchair accessible and possibly a cabin set up that's all accessible, including a roll-in shower. "Right now, we just use man power. People don't realize how hard and unsafe that is," Ryan acknowledged.

A volunteer for the foundation, Jason Goulet, owns the Angle Outpost Resort. That's where Co-Director Scott Baumgartner keeps his boat. Ryan said the private resort would be the perfect place to

get their dock set up for the foundation. In addition to the accessible fishing, there are many other pieces of equipment that would be of great use. "Some of these wounded warriors only have one arm, so we had to get a special fishing rod holder. Or there's gun rests that people with no movement can use to shoot – they've also got a gun mechanism where you just blow into it and it pulls the trigger – we're hoping to get more stuff like that," Ryan says.

Ryan and Scott are planning a future banquet for the foundation, but still working on establishing their major sponsors first. Ryan admits this has been taking up a lot of his time, but quickly added, "I love it and do it with a smile. I've always been into helping others."

In addition to all of his work with the foundation, Ryan is also in charge of the Grygla Fall Fest Demolition Derby and has been a member of the Fourtown/Grygla Sportsman's Club for the last 17 years. He will soon be back out on the road driving again, too. He is looking at purchasing a Ford Explorer, but the entire process has taken about two years. He's had to go down to the cities to do initial assessments, as that is the only place in the state where they have a vehicle you can drive while being in a wheelchair. But after doing his 'behind the wheel' lessons, Ryan is just about set. He'll have to buy the vehicle of his choice, but vocational rehab out of Roseau is helping with the conversion of it.

It's no wonder he is committed to giving back, as Ryan has first-hand experience with receiving, as well.

His mission as a new director for The Outdoor Adventure Foundation is to pass it on – to break down the boundaries for others or help fulfill outdoor dreams for others who share the same passion as him.

Moving on, our Summer Reading Program will be wrapping up on Wednesday, August 1st. Ross Sutter will be coming to the library at 4pm to do an hour performance called "Songs Take You Everywhere!" It's open to anyone - not just reading kids. Then at 5pm, we'll be drawing for the grand prize. Some lucky kid will be getting a \$50 Visa gift card! I'll share photos and the winner next week.

Lastly, I have a book suggestion to share. I read the monthly Book Page publication and try to jot down a couple of titles for myself or that I think friends will like. (I also keep these magazines in the library if you ever want to borrow them.) They're just a short 12-15 page pamphlet that shares a ton of suggestions in every genre - fiction, nonfiction, mystery, sports, outdoors, childrens, young adults...and so on. I added a couple to my list but won't get to them for a while, so thought I'd share one with you guys. It's called Wrapped in Rain by Charles Martin. So the summary isn't what hooked me, it was the reviews that did it. Men and women alike have voted this novel 5 stars and some of the reviews are as follows:

Stunning. This book got you hooked right from the start. As with all of Charles Martin's books, you are a much more conscientious, compassionate, God-centered and grateful human being at the end of his books than at the start. Miss Ella will live in my heart forever. She is glorious splendor wrapped in a tiny body broken by fists, slashings, kicks and insults. Yet, she radiates love with every thought, word and deed.

This is an amazing book that

draws the reader into a deep and poignant story. Charles Martin provides well-developed characters and a plausible yet unusual storyline that make for a true page turner.

The author has a gift for sucking you into the scenes to the point that you hold your breath so that the characters don't notice that you are there. If you are looking for a novel that is deep, filled with heartache, hope, pain, joy, faith, doubt and everything in between, you are going to love Wrapped in Rain. Spectacular novel that teaches the true meaning of LOVE!

I read a lot. I read a lot of authors. This is in my top 5 favorite.

(I could keep going with those reviews, but you get the idea.)

Now onto the book summary:

An internationally famous photographer, Tucker Mason has traveled the world, capturing things other people don't see. But what Tucker himself can't see is how to let go of the past and forgive his father.

On a sprawling Southern estate, Tucker and his younger brother, Mutt, were raised by their housekeeper, Miss Ella Rain, who loved the motherless boys like her own. Hiring her to take care of Waverly Hall and the boys was the only good thing their father ever did.

When his brother escapes from a mental hospital and an old girlfriend appears with her son and a black eye, Tucker is forced to return home and face the agony of his own tragic past.

Though Miss Ella has been gone for many years, Tucker can still hear her voice—and her prayers. But finding peace and starting anew will take a measure of grace that Tucker scarcely believes in.

So there you have it. As always, we can order this book in for you if it sounds like something you'd like to get lost in. I know it's not on our shelves in Grygla, but we can have it within 1-2 weeks for you.

FORESTRY NEWS

On July 17th, the Warroad area had their first timber sale auction of the fiscal year. The area offered 42 tracts on 2430 acres within the five county area of Kittson, Marshall, Beltrami, Roseau and Lake of the Woods. The Warroad Area Forestry Office offered 39,885 cords of jack pine, Norway pine, white pine, white and black spruce, trembling aspen, paper birch, tamarack and black ash. There

are 9 tracts that did not sell at auction that are now available for purchase. The 33 tracts that sold had an appraised (starting) value of \$475,548. At the auction, loggers bid up the sold tracts for a total dollar value of \$581,719.96. Revenue from the sold tracts is appropriated to the land ownership of the timber parcel such as School Trust, Wildlife Acquired, Land Utili-

zation Project (LUP) and Consolidated Conservation lands (con-con). Thus, dollars are deposited in several accounts such as the school trust fund, fish and game fund, forestry investment account, Beltrami Island Fund and to various county funds after the sales are completed.

Fifteen logging companies were present and several industrial procurement foresters (Boise, Potlatch, Norbord). Last year, Warroad area was 2nd out of 15 forestry areas statewide for volume of timber offered and sold at over 100,000, behind only Littlefork. The next Warroad area auction is scheduled for December 11, 2018.

Every year the State Forestry Nursery at Badoura has a quota for seed purchases for each forestry area. This year, the Warroad DNR Forestry is responsible for acquiring jack pine, white spruce, black spruce and tamarack cones. The seeds are used to grow bare root nursery stock and to supply seed to aerial seed stands that are not accessible for had planting in the spring. Most times these are lowland

conifer stand like spruce in tamarack in the Warroad Area. The tamarack cones are currently maturing and the nursery is paying \$150 per bushel of cones. Keep in mind that the cones are small and it takes a while to get a bushel. Please contact Doug Sirrine at the Warroad Area Forestry Office at 218-386-1304 for timing, locations, more information and BEFORE you start harvesting.

Otherwise, forestry staff have been busy marking Norway pine stands for thinning and jack pine stands for final harvest, timber sale supervision and forest inventory work. Several staff had had the honor of participating in local area events like town parades and county fairs with Smokey the Bear. The continued drought in the area and nationally has once again put the spotlight on wildfire danger. Dense smoke in our area, as recently as last week, from fires in Canada, has been an issue. Currently, 3 area staff have been mobilized to assist with fires out of state and in Canada for a 2-3 week detail.

Cheesy Baked Egg Toast

Eggs and toast are such a perfect breakfast staple. They're our default and our "go-to" breakfast...but they CAN and DO get a little boring. This recipe for cheesy baked egg toast first caught my eye because it looks delicious, yes, but it also looks a little gourmet to me and like something I'd feel really cool serving to guests in the morning on a pretty plate. Add a little side of turkey bacon and, well, what a way to start the day.

Ingredients

Eggs
Bread
Butter
Pepper
Shredded Cheese

Directions

Spray a cookie sheet with nonstick spray and put your bread slices on the pan. Press a spoon into the bread, making a rectangle indent for the egg to sit in. Repeat for all slices. Spread some butter around the edges near the crust; this helps hold the cheese in place and toasts the edges better. Crack an egg into the rectangle impression, trying hard not to break the yolk. Sprinkle your shredded cheese around the edges onto the butter. (When I get around the making this, I think I'll choose pepper jack shredded cheese.) Finally, season it all with some pepper.

Place your cookie sheet in the oven for about 10-15 minutes at 350 degrees, watching carefully to ensure the bread doesn't burn, yet the egg get cooked.

Looking back 20 years ago
