Lucian Tinnes and Cheyenne Irlbeck, AAA

The purpose is also to elevate academic standards and create greater awareness of League-sponsored activities and their values, and to provide member schools of the League with the opportunity to participate in a statewide program that supports, promotes and recognizes academic and extra-curricular

achievements.

Evan Fish, Boys State

Minnesota American Legion Boys State is a week-long experience of learning about Minnesota government at the local, county and state levels by "doing." It is a week of intensive study and involvement. The participants will actually organize and participate in the various levels and branches of government in addition to participating in athletics, music, writing for the newspaper or holding leadership positions across all levels of the program. Fully Charged Foundation to offer Wendy Sandmark Memorial Scholarship

When he moved to Grygla last fall, Patrick Hackley says he was very impressed at how the community rallies around each other and supports their own like a big family; it was something he wanted to be a part of and decided to give back. Taking some time over the winter to come up with ideas, Patrick decided to found the Fully Charged Foundation, which is a newly developed scholarship opportunity that is striving to provide scholarships to students who are pursuing careers in skilled trades.

With developing the first official award as the Wendy Sandmark Memorial Scholarship, Patrick explains how that decision was reached. "Our first scholarship is very near and dear to the staff at the Fully Charged Foundation. Last spring we lost a dear friend suddenly. Wendy Sandmark was a positive voice in a world entrenched in negativity, a smile where there were frowns and a light shining brightly in the dark." He added, "We have spoken to members of Wendy's family and have asked to honor her memory by naming our first scholarship the Wendy Sandmark Memorial Scholarship. Those who knew her came to find that she never turned her back on anybody and was always willing to lend a hand."

Currently, the scholarship is being funded 100% by individual donations, but the hope is to get corporate sponsorship to participate. The initial dollar amount towards this specific scholarship is \$5,000; as of Monday, October 15th, \$350 has been raised.

Patrick envisions Fully Charged Foundation having several scholarships available each year and, as mentioned, hopes corporate sponsors jump on board. "Along with these bigger companies around here, we need to groom these young adults to stay around here. We want to give out scholarships, yes, but we also want to be a

resource for companies that are seeking out highly qualified and motivated people to work for them," he noted.

Fully Charged Foundation is currently made up of one staff member, Patrick Hackley, however, he is encouraging anyone interested in serving on the board to get in touch with him. Details are still being worked out on how students will apply for the scholarship, in addition to the selection process, but updates will be made on the Fully Charged Foundation Facebook page, along with the Grygla Eagle Newspaper. The Wendy Sandmark Memorial Scholarship will be awarded to a Charger recipient, meaning a student from the Goodridge or Grygla School is eligible. Patrick stated that Wendy's family will be involved in the selection process and he hopes they will be on stage the day it's presented. For this particular scholarship, the full amount raised will be awarded to one student.

As for the foundation he founded, Patrick is looking towards the future with big goals. He expressed, "Maybe one day this could be one of the most sought after scholarships in the area! A larger goal would be to fully fund a two year school." Long-term, he doesn't just see scholarship opportunities for Goodridge and Grygla students, but for other schools in the area, as well.

Is there room to tell you everything I want to tell you? I hate being limited for space, but I'll do my best.

First, I want to remind you all about next Wednesday, Oc-tober 24th! Make sure to come to the Grygla Library from 2-4pm! We're going to have lo-cal author, Emily Yager, set up for a meet and greet, along with some coffee and treats! She will have her books avail-able to purchase and we're re-ally looking forward to having her in the library that day!

Next, I want to talk about the Minnesota Library Asso-ciation Conference that I at-tended last week in St. Cloud. Three days of being inspired and motivated. That's how I can sum it up for you. The theme of the event was "Pro-grammed to Lead" and it was held at the River's Edge Con-vention Center, which is ab-solutely beautiful, by the way, and is set right alongside the Mississippi River. The dura-tion of the conference included a huge variety of sessions that were spread out from 8am-4:30pm; we could choose any of them to go to, and there were a ton of choices, let me tell ya! (In addition to the sessions and an evening awards banquet, there was also a huge exhibit hall with tons of booths, giveaways and activities!)

Some of the day sessions I went to included:

Creating Community En-gagement by Building Rela-tionships, Community Reads, Building Relationships with Teens in your Library, 40 in 50 Book Blast, 12 DIY Adult Programs, Out-of-the-Box Book Clubs, Smash that Wall: A Dialogue with Two Disabled Library Workers, Using Com-munity Involvement to Guide Collection and Program Devel-opment, Tips for Connecting with Writers, to name a few.

I choose each session for a variety of reasons, mainly takeaways I can bring back to my own library, but the "Smash that Wall" session had the most impact on me. It was an hour of open dialogue with two disabled library workers – one was a paraplegic and the other had autism. They both work in libraries and each had such different experiences to share with us. It was truly eye-opening in so many ways.

It was also fun to get in on some book club discussion as I started a Young Adult book club in Grygla a couple of years ago. I'm playing with the idea of starting up a Middle School Book Club for kids in grades 4-8, so stay tuned for that! (The only thing holding me back on that is the process of actually getting the books the kids choose. Of course, libr-aries aren't made of money, so to order in a dozen books for each book club bag is the is-sue at hand, and the fact that we probably want 5-6 different book club bags. A lot of libr-aries, most in fact, have "Friends of the Library" where people donate money to their local li-brary for specific things. TRF has a great group of "friends" – Grygla has none. I supposed that's partly my own fault be-

cause I've never put it out there and requested "friends" or "do-nations" for specific things – maybe I will write a future col-umn on just that. Grygla is so small, that even just a couple of hundred dollars can go a long ways. If anyone is interested in becoming a "friend" of the Grygla Library – let me know – and we'll take the proper steps to become friends. Ha. (You can tell I'm not really sure how to word that at the moment, but I'm working on it!)

As I finished typing that paragraph, I just decided at this week's Northwest Region-al Library Extension meeting, that I'm going to get the details on "Friends of the Library" and write a column in an upcom-ing Eagle. Yup. It's happen-ing. "Friends" are so great to have as those donations (small or large) can range anywhere from supplies, crafts, books, etc. and it really helps the li-brary out. So, that's my mis-sion this week – to get info on that and beg kindly and hum-bly for "Friends."

Lastly, I want to mention NaNoWriMo.

It sounds very robotic, doesn't it...

NaNoWriMo stands for National Novel Writing Month.

One month. One book. An adventure you'll never forget.

Have you ever heard of it? National Novel Writing Month takes place November 1-30. I wouldn't be a great librarian if I didn't tell you a little bit about it. NaNoWriMo is a fun approach to writing. On No-vember 1st, participants begin working towards the goal of writing a 50,000-word novel by 11:59pm on November 30th. It's for ANYONE who has ever thought about writing a book. Check out the website nanow-rimo.org – everything you need to know is on there, including a free profile you set up so like-minded writers can connect with you. Not only can you meet fellow writers online, you can also get pep talks and sup-port from them and track your writing progress all month long. You are free to type your words in your own preferred document and then submit a copy for automatic counting on-line. There is no limit on win-ners, either; you simply WIN by reaching your 50,000 words at the end of the month. Even if you end the month with only 1,000 words written – that's still 1,000 words you DIDN'T have written before, right?

Personally, I'm taking part in it this year, but that's a discussion for another column (and one that goes better with wine). But if you've ever con-sidered writing a book – of any kind – I challenge you to join me this November. This is the largest writing community in the world and they're here to help. "You won't believe the things you can accomplish with a deadline, some friends to cheer you on, and occasion-ally excessive quantities of caf-feine," they say.

I'm in. I'm committed. I'm scared. I'm nervous. I'm excit-ed. Hopefully on December 1st, I can sit back, relax, and feel something like pride.

Seven complete Read, Write, Math program

Seven Grygla students in grades K-6 successfully completed the Read, Write, Math summer program and celebrated with a pizza party at Yo-Hawn's on September 18th. Coordinator Robin Johnson provided the following information: Fifteen kids initially signed up with seven completing the program. American State Bank once again was generous and gave each participant who completed the program a \$25 VISA gift card.

Laurie Polansky gave out the gift cards at YoHawn's and talked to the kids about the importance of continuing to do educational activities throughout the summer months. She also talked about the bank's summer internship program that was available to an individual high school student each summer. In addition, all of the winners each received a dozen other prizes.

Each student kept track of their reading, writing, or math

activities on calendars given out prior to summer vacation. Cheesy Ground Beef Rice Casserole

This was a really easy recipe I found on Pinterest and made. I'm SO not a fan of peas, but put them in anyway because a) my husband loves them and b) I like to make my kids eat vegetables. Besides said peas, the entire dish was excellent. So cheesy. So creamy. Probably not the healthiest, but hey, definitely add those peas to help yourself feel better about that. (Sidenote: The more I look at the ingredients below, the more I'm almost positive I added more rice than it called for.)

What you need
1 lb ground beef
1 small onion, diced
2 teaspoons garlic powder
1 small can tomato sauce
1 cup cooked rice
1 cup chicken broth
1 cup sour cream
2 cups shredded cheese
salt, pepper, oregano
1 cup frozen peas
How you make it
Preheat oven to 350° F.
Spray a skillet with cooking

spray and turn on the heat to high. Roast the onions for a few minutes. Add ground beef and garlic, brown the ground beef completely, turn heat to medium. Spice with salt, pepper and oregano how you like it. Add rice, peas, tomato sauce, 1 cup cheese and broth, let simmer for 3 minutes.

Transfer everything into a casserole dish and bake for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, combine the rest of the cheese with the sour cream. After 15 minutes, put that cheese/sour cream mixture on top of your casserole and bake for another 15 minutes.

Offal Wildlife Watching Camera-trap monitoring of hunter provided carrion

This is an invitation to deer hunters, or those that participate in deer camps, or know hunters and have access to deer gut piles immediately after the deer is harvested and field dressed to participate in "Offal Wildlife Watching." The purpose of this research is to better understand what and when species use deer gut piles provided by hunters across Minnesota. Minnesota offers a unique opportunity to look at this across four different biomes, a major metro area, and different scavenger assemblages. There are also several methods of hunting such as archery, rifle, and shotgun that may influence where a gut pile is located, and which species visit. Hunters are needed from every biome (Laurentian Mixed Forest, Prairie Parkland, Tallgrass

Aspen Parkland, and Eastern Broadleaf Forest and the metro area (Figure 1).

Researchers are looking for hunters with their own game camera to set the camera on their gut pile and leave it to record pictures of when and what animals come in to use the gut pile for one month. Hunters are uniquely positioned to record everything that comes in to feed on that gut pile by setting a camera immediately after field dressing a deer in order.

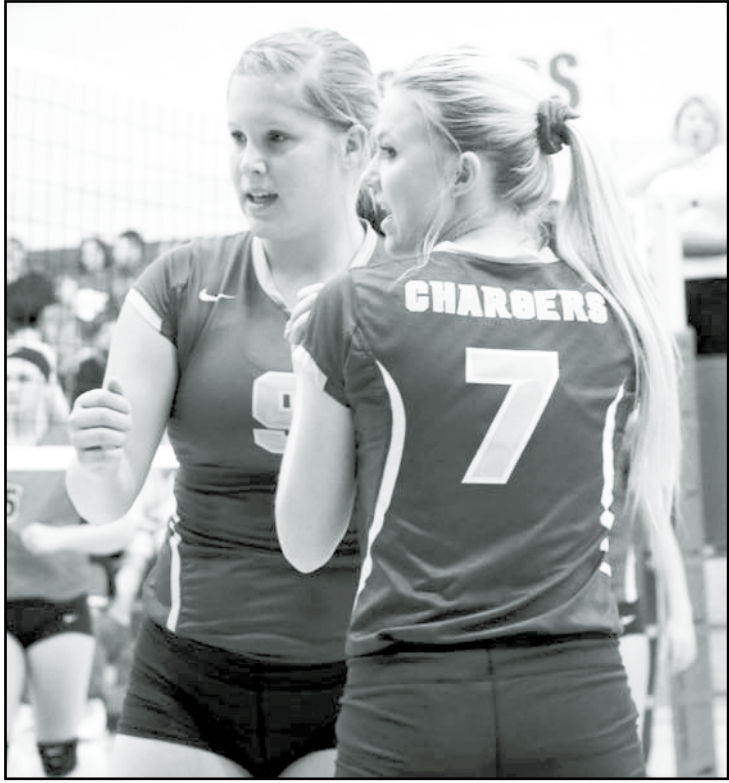

Youth gear up for hunting weekend

Area youth ages 10-15 are gearing up to participate in a special deer season that runs from Thursday, October 18th, to Sunday, October 21st. "Youth can hunt with adult mentors during youth deer season," said Mike Kurre, DNR mentoring program coordinator. "This season is a way to focus on young hunters so they have good experiences and learn valuable skills."

Blaze orange requirements apply to all hunters, trappers and adult mentors in areas open for the youth deer season. Youth must meet all firearms safety requirements, purchase a license and use the appropriate firearm for the permit area in which they are hunting. Youth may take a deer of either

sex and may only take one deer during the youth season.

An adult mentor must accompany the youth but may not hunt or carry a firearm and does not need a license.

Public land is open, and private land is also open provided the hunters have landowner permission. Participating in the youth deer season does not affect eligibility of youth to participate in the regular firearms deer season but any deer harvested does count against the youth's season bag limit.
