I'm still trying to get used to that electronic stuff, but it's pretty easy so that helps me out! (Smile!) Are there any specific new books you'd like to see on the shelves? I know I talked about this last week, but I'm going to plead with you again today ... wouldn't one of you just love to come and help me out at the library a few hours a month? Like I mentioned before, it's not hard work and it's all pretty enjoyable so you'd be getting out and having some fun ... and be helping me! (Smile!) last name. These are known as easy books and are generally the ones read by adults or older children to younger ones. The second category of fiction books have a "j" on the binding with the first three letters of the author's last name. These are for junior or juvenile readers, otherwise known as chapter books. Most often these books are found in the possession of middle grade students. Finally, for older children there are the young adult fiction books with a "ya" on the binding. These books are for older teens and young 20's. They are books for transitioning into adult books (but a lot of adults like these books too! Smile!). There are also non-fiction books for children. These come in two categories. Some have an "e" on the binding with a number after it and some have a "j" on the binding with a number after it. Again, these are for the very young and older children, respectively. I hope this helps you as you search for books for your children. If you have any questions about this, please feel free to ask.

For my book suggestion this week I'll name a patron-recommended book. The book is a young adult book and is called WITNESS by Karen Hesse. My patron said it really gripped her as she read it. It takes place in a small town in Vermont in 1924. I can order it for you if you'd like to read it.

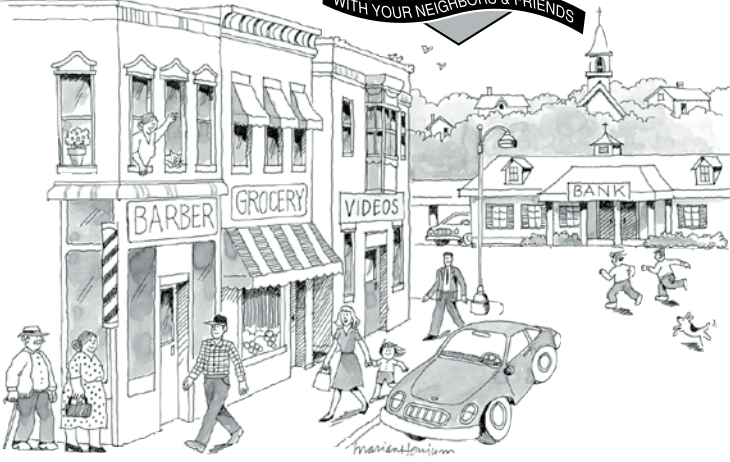
The Middle River area youth will also be on hand speaking about their experiences on their mission trips. Special music will be provided and the program will close with a luncheon at 11:30am.

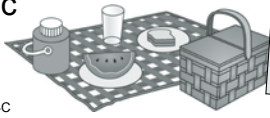

Join in the fun – band ducks at Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge

Mark your calendars for an evening of duck banding on Saturday, September 12th, at 5:30pm at Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge. All ages are welcome to join in the fun and ‘ruffle some feathers’. Meet at Refuge headquarters at 5:30pm; no pre-registration is required and the event is free to the public.

Banding ducks is a “hands on” experience, and can be a little messy so you’ll want to dress sensibly. Old clothing or rain gear is recommended if you plan on handling the ducks. Those of you who would rather watch, bring your cameras to capture the experience.

This annual event brings many ‘repeat’ banders and Refuge staff looks forward to seeing you each year. Newcomers will have an opportunity to learn about the life history of several duck species, baiting, capture, and handling techniques, as well as sexing and aging techniques. Predomi-

nantly mallards are banded, with a few wood ducks, blue-winged teal, and northern pintails mixed in. Agassiz bands an average of 1,500 ducks per year.

More than one million birds are banded in North America every year. Banding provides valuable information on migration routes and breeding and wintering areas of different bird species, as well as helping support hunting regulations development and detecting changes in bird populations. Secondly, the strong waterfowling contingent in northwestern Minnesota also recognizes harvested ducks sporting “jewelry” in the form of metal leg bands as special trophies.

Marshall County Assessor’s Office hosts Passport Day

The Marshall County Assessor’s Office is hosting a special passport event in Warren, MN on Saturday, September 19, 2015 from 9:00am until 2:00pm to provide passport information to U.S. citizens and to accept passport applications. The Marshall County Assessor’s Office is joining the Department of State in celebrating Passport Day in the USA 2015, a national passport acceptance and outreach event.

U.S. citizens must present a valid passport book when entering or re-entering the United States by air. U.S. citizens entering the United States from Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean and Bermuda at land borders and sea ports of entry must present a passport book, passport card, or other travel documents approved by the U.S. government.

Information on the cost and how to apply for a U.S. passport is available at travel.state.gov or by calling the County Assessor’s Office at 218-745-5331. There are differing guidelines for minors 17 years of age and under.

Items needed to apply for your passport include: proof of citizenship (i.e. certified birth certificate), photo ID, completed application (available at the County Assessor’s Office), 2 x 2 photo (can be taken at the County Assessor’s Office), check or money order for payment to the Dept. of State, check for payment to Marshall County for processing fees and photo (we will only accept checks on this day).

The Marshall County Courthouse Assessor’s Office is located at 208 E Colvin Avenue, Suite 13, Warren, MN.

Marshall County participates in National Prescription Take Back Day

Marshall County will participate in the 10th National Prescription Take Back Day on September 26th. Unwanted, expired, or unneeded prescription or over-the-counter medicines can be dropped off in the permanent collection box in the lobby of the law enforcement center in Warren.

The National Prescription Drug Take-Back addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Many Americans are not aware that medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are at alarming rates, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that many abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, many Americans do not know how to properly dispose of their unused medicine, often flushing them down the toilet

or throwing them away – both potential safety and health hazards.

The permanent collection box for safe disposal is available 24/7. Take Back Day is a special effort to bring awareness to the problem of prescription drug abuse.

“Prescription drug abuse is a huge problem and this is a great opportunity for folks around the county to help reduce the threat,” Sheriff Jason Boman said. “Please clean out your medicine cabinet and make your home safe from drug theft and abuse.”

If you have a large amount of unwanted drugs and are unable to get to the collection box, you can call the county law enforcement center at 218-745-5411 and arrange to have them picked up.

In the previous nine Take-Back events nationwide from 2010-2014, 4,823,251 pounds (2,411 tons) of drugs were collected.

Explanation of crop insurance hidden benefits

During the last farm bill debate we heard Congressional leaders say, farmers don’t get a check, they get a bill for their crop insurance. While that statement may be true, it’s also true that crop insurance is heavily subsidized, providing unlimited premium subsidies to the nation’s largest and wealthiest farms on every acre, every year, regardless of prices, production or farm profitability.

We created a mock “explanation of benefits” to demonstrate the largess. In this explanation of benefits (which is based on central Nebraska insurance costs and yield data), if a corn farmer received over \$1 million in crop insurance premium subsidies at the 70% coverage level, that would cover roughly 52,000 acres. Is that an effective

safety net to eliminate risk for one operation on that many acres? The recent Government Accountability Office study points to an egregious example where a farmer insured crops in eight counties and received about \$1.3 million in premium subsidies.

Let’s be clear, crop insurance is a valuable risk management tool for farmers. Fundamentally, we believe in the government helping family-scale farmers manage risk. But the problem lies in the fact that we are subsidizing the largest operators no matter how big they get. If one entity farmed an entire state, under current law, we all would share in the cost of their crop insurance on every acre.

Not only should there be full transparency to this largess, we think there should be a limit too.

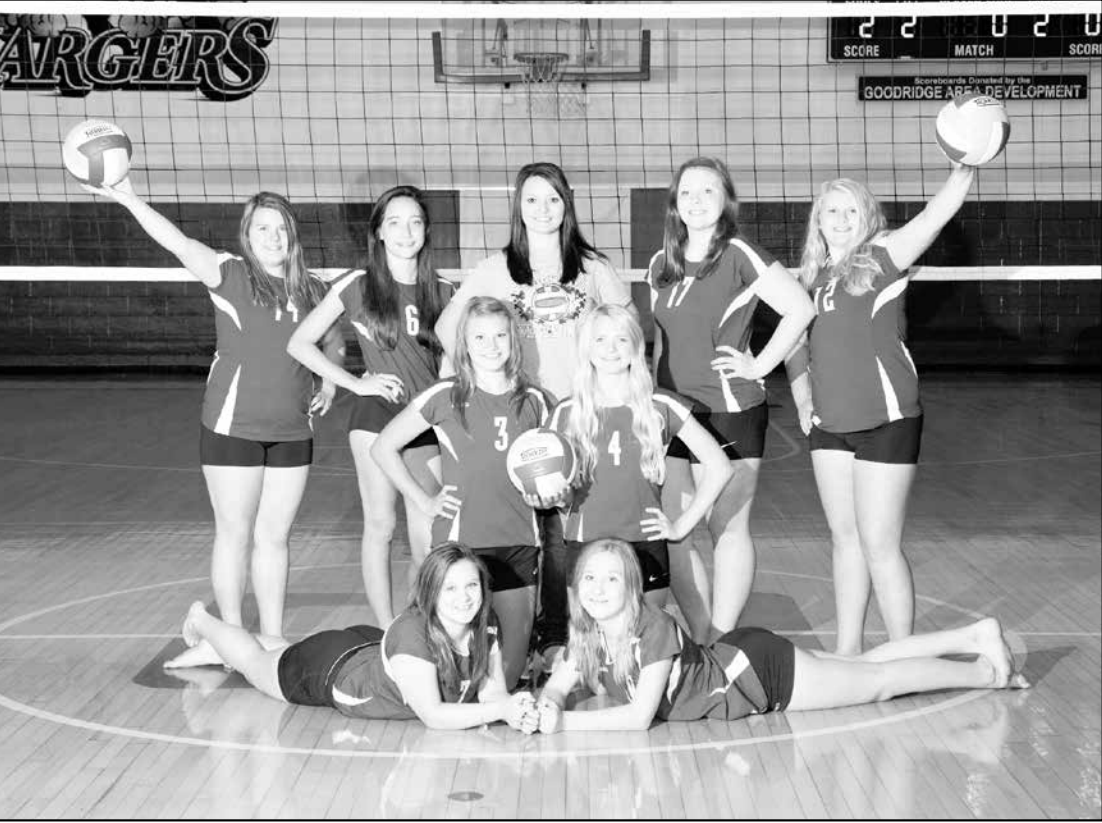

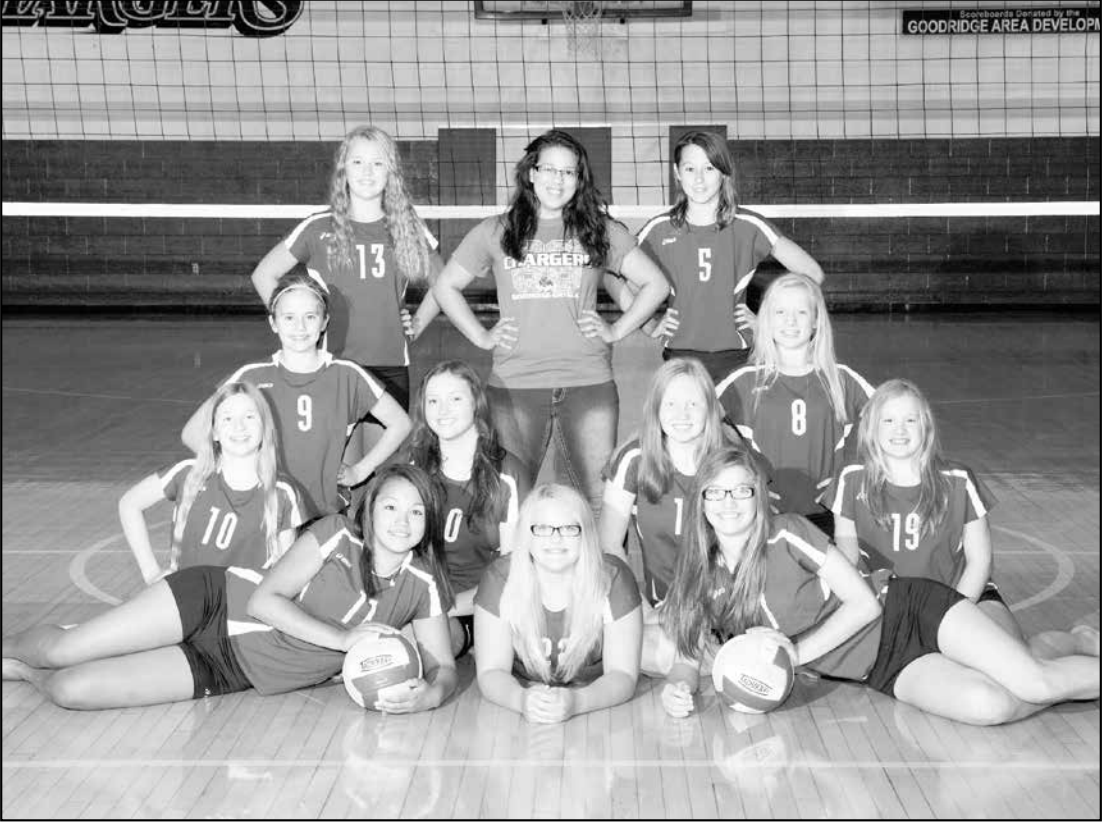

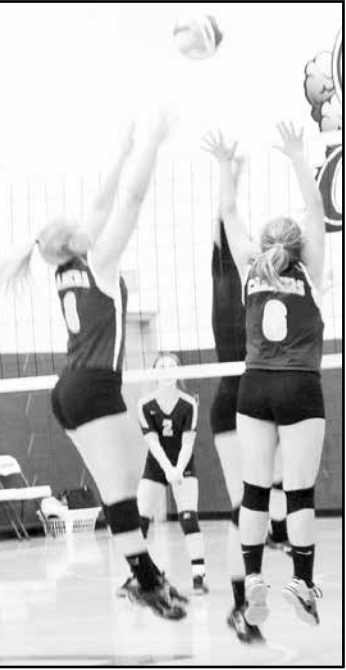
