Opportunities available within the Fully Charged Foundation



“Our scholarship selection committee is eager to review the applications and award our first annual scholarships, including the Wendy Sandmark Memorial Scholarship and several Fully Charged Foundation Scholarships,” says Patrick Hackley, Fully Charged Foundation Executive Director.

The Fully Charged Foundation is a non-profit business entity fully permitted to conduct business in the state of Minnesota per officially filed paperwork dated 27 December 2018 with the Secretary of State’s office.

In addition to Hackley serving as Executive Director, the CFO/Board Chair is Adrienne Hanson from Gonvick. Other board members are Stephanie Wilde from McIntosh, Nicole Hackley from Grygla, Kevin Smith from Bagley, and a student member, Richard Hale, from Gully. Hackley explained,

“We chose a diverse board from out of town to eliminate the possibility of a “well, your dad/uncle/aunt is on the board” type of situation. We have also made it an internal rule that if a board member is related to an applicant in any way, they must recuse themselves from the selection process.”

The Fully Charged Foundation is gearing up to award two scholarships this year. The Wendy Sandmark Memorial Scholarship will go to a student from either Grygla or Goodridge High School and the Fully Charged Scholarship (official name not yet determined) will go to an area student to be determined by the board.

Interested scholarship applicants can email fullychargedfoundation@gmail.com for a copy of the application. The application spells out the guidelines for the scholarship. The scholarship committee is not

basing this solely on academics, but on the student’s entire body of work as a student, athlete (if in sports), community volunteer and character based on letters of recommendation and answers to the essay questions on the scholarship application. Award amounts and number of scholarships are still to be determined based on the success of the Foundation’s fundraiser raffle and ability to secure more sponsorships.

The board has also been issued a permit from the Minnesota Gambling Control Board, which has them in full compliance with state and local government rules and regulations to hold their raffle on June 7, 2019.

Tickets are on sale now for the raffle of a 2019 Ford F-150 XLT Super Crew 4x4 or \$40,000 cash. 3,000 tickets are being sold at \$100/each and are available at the following businesses: Thief River Ford - Thief River Falls, Erl’s Market - Thief River Falls, Northern State Bank – Gonvick, Richard’s Publishing – Gonvick, Gully Tri-Coop – Gully, Grygla Coop Store – Grygla. The raffle is sponsored by Fully Charged Foundation and Thief River Ford.

As mentioned, the drawing will be held on June 7, 2019, at the Grygla Community Center. On that date, one lucky winner will have their choice of a brand new pickup or \$40,000. There will also be smaller door prizes available from sponsors. Your \$100 ticket not only gives you a chance at these prizes, but it also gives you admission to the event that includes

a steak dinner, sponsored in part by the Minnesota State Cattlemens Association and the Minnesota Beef Council and all-inclusive beverages for the evening. Hackley added, “There is nowhere around here that will have a family atmosphere, a steak dinner, all-inclusive beverages, a concert by a marquee entertainer and a 1/3000 chance at a 2019 Ford F-150 XLT or \$40,000.” The Fully Charged Foundation will be providing musical entertainment at the June 7th event. They will be announcing the opening act and headliner entertainment as soon as they get their signed contract back, which they anticipate to be this week.

The board has set a minimum goal of \$25,000 to award in scholarships after they pay for the vehicle or money, the entertainer and vendors, with the goal set higher if they can sell all 3,000 raffle tickets.

“Nothing we do happens without the blessing of our CFO and board. We as a community have a real opportunity to make a difference for our kids and our future, and be positive role models for our youth. We can show our little slice of the world that we can disagree on certain things but agree on investing in our future leaders,” Hackley encouraged. Farmer’s Union Oil Company preps for Annual Meeting

A reminder that community members are encouraged to attend the Farmer’s Union Oil Company Annual Meeting of the Stockholders on Monday, March 25th. As you can see by their ad on page 2 of this issue, a free meal will be served to attendees prior to the 1pm meeting. In addition to the election of two directors and a reading of the financials, an update on the Grygla Coop Store will be presented. The local grocery store is for sale on bids until this Friday, March 15th. The board will be meeting and reviewing bids on Monday, March 18th.

According to FOU General Manager, Brenda Mosher, serious inquiries/bids have been received with the outlook appearing positive. “We will have information available at the meeting on the 25th, but right now it’s looking really positive for the future of the store,” Mosher commented. A lot of negative feedback surrounded the announcement of the store closure, but Mosher remains confident in the decision to let it go. “It’s time,” she concluded. “It’s time for Farmer’s Union to give it up and have new owners take over.”

Those potential new owners are bidding on the store building, property, equipment and grocery inventory; the current hardware inventory will be moving across the street and sold by Farmer’s Union.

As mentioned, the board will be making their final decisions next week with information available to the public at the March 25th meeting. Community members are encouraged to attend; for those unable to, there will be a complete write-up in the April 3rd Grygla Eagle Newspaper.

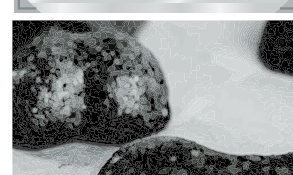

Boys basketball season ends in Cass Lake

Early last week, Monday, March 4th, the Chargers hosted the Lake of the Woods Bears in Grygla for the play-in game. GG defeated the Bears 58-35 and Head Coach Andrew Sundberg said the Chargers came out to play! “We were able to jump out on the Bears right away led by our pressure defense and transition offense. I thought we moved the ball very well against their zone and got good shots in the first half, and we got many steals which lead to some easier scoring opportunities. Dylan, Jake and Jaden did an excellent job in the front of the press being very active and aggressive. We took a 33-9 lead into halftime. I didn’t think we played as well in the second half, but we were able to keep the lead about the same. It was nice for the seniors to get a win on the final home game of

their careers,” said Sundberg.

Stats from that game: Jake Tharaldson (24 pts, 3 reb, 3 steals), Hudson McMillin (12 pts, 2 blocks), Kaleb Sjulestad (8 pts, 7 reb, 3 asst), Riley Manderud (4 pts, 2 reb), Dylan Wold (3 pts, 4 reb, 5 asst, 3 steals), Levi Kiesow (3 pts), Jaden Kiesow (2 pts, 3 reb), Aaron Jones (2 pts), Lucian Tinnnes (2 reb), Moses Jensen (3 reb, 2 steals).

Monday’s victory sent the Chargers to Cass Lake on Thursday, March 7th, for their first playoff game. After losing by 22 points, the 2018-19 season officially came to an end.

Coach Sundberg remarked, “We knew we had our work cut out for us, playing against the top seed in the section and the #2 ranked team in the state. However, the Chargers showed up ready to battle. We hung around, played extremely hard,

and executed our game plan pretty well throughout the first half. Kaleb hit a long, last second 3 pointer at the halftime buzzer and we trailed at halftime only 33-25. In the second half, the Panthers turned up their defensive intensity and we weren’t able to take care of the ball well enough to hang in the game. Despite the result, I couldn’t be prouder of how the kids competed in this game. We were huge underdogs, but the kids played like they expected to do well and definitely were not going to be outworked.”

Sundberg concluded, “The Chargers were extremely appreciative of the fan turnout to the game. I think there were just as many, if not more, Charger fans at the game than Cass Lake fans! We have enjoyed tremendous fan support all season, and we would like to thank the communities for that. I would like to thank our seniors Jaden, Jake, Kaleb, Peyton, Payton, Dylan, Aaron, and Lucian for all of your hard work and commitment throughout your basketball careers. They are all impressive young men who have bright futures ahead of them!”

► MNDNR NEWS

Local wildlife managers in northwestern Minnesota invite the public to come to open-house meetings to ask their deer questions and learn about the state’s most popular mammal.

These local, open-house-style meetings are a way to encourage discussions about deer and deer management, enhance local relationships and foster two-way communication between the DNR and the public. The DNR began the meetings last year with the release of its statewide deer management plan.

In addition to discussing general concerns about deer, individuals can ask DNR staff about last year’s harvest data, share observations, discuss potential season changes and get a preview of the Chronic Wasting Disease Response Plan that has been updated since the 2010 edition and will be formally released in April. Season changes include a proposed statewide youth deer hunting season.

No formal presentations have been planned; people can arrive any time during the scheduled meeting times.

The DNR will provide further online feedback opportunities for the public, with surveys that will cover chronic wasting disease management alternatives, perception of local deer populations, and potential hunting season changes for deer and other species. The survey addressing CWD will be available online at mndnr.gov/deerplan in late March. Online feedback opportunities concerning deer perceptions and season changes will be available in early April.

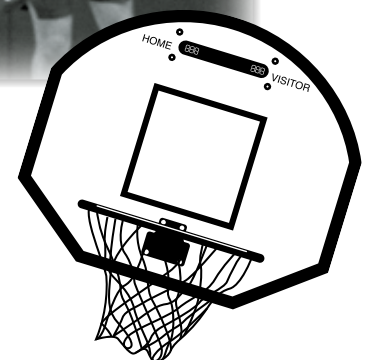
