Fox Lake has always been home to the Haugen family

Visiting Fox Lake Campground has been a tradition of the Haugens for years; it's always felt like home to them.

But now it IS home – literally – and the family couldn't be more thrilled!

Mark Haugen, son of Orvis and Debbie Haugen, is a Grygla High School 1999 graduate. He and his wife Amanda have recently purchased a 70+ site campground just north of Bemidji and they feel right at home.

Mark's family has been going to Fox Lake Campground of Bemidji (formerly Hamilton's Fox Lake Campground) since Mark was around 10 years old; almost 30 years now. His parents, Orvis and Debbie, have been seasonal there since 1997.

"Our girls have been coming here since they were newborns," shared Amanda. "We came every weekend to visit family and just hang out!" Mark

and Amanda have two daughters, Jillian, age 9, and Alix, age 7. Around the 4th of July last year, Mark told Amanda the campground was for sale and the couple joked about buying it. The previous owners ran it for 43 years and were soon set to retire. "We started talking about what we'd do to make it our own, which led to researching if it was something we could do or actually wanted to do," Amanda laughed.

Deciding to make the leap, the couple moved forward with their ideas and plans, and the campground was officially theirs on March 18th, 2019.

After meeting at Bemidji State in 1999 and getting married in 2004, Mark and Amanda previously lived in Park Rapids and most recently, Becker, MN, where they lived for the last 6 years. They now reside on site at Fox Lake Campground. Among all the personal and professional perks, their new

home is also only five minutes away from their girls' new school and also has a 54-foot deck overlooking the beautiful lake view.

Approximately 10 minutes north of Bemidji, the manager's residence is right within the 13-acre campground. "13 acres isn't a lot," explained Amanda. "But 13 acres on 1100 feet of shoreline is pretty special."

Fox Lake Campground is entirely along the shore line, which means excellent lake views for every guest. The quiet lake is on the Turtle River chain of lakes. There are some resorts nearby, but they don't have a lot of RV capabilities so people are sent on over to FLC. Amanda said a lot of fishermen go after pan fish on the quiet lake, with many using the connected channel to venture onto a bigger lake for the day.

FLC has four docks people can use and, as mentioned, 70+ sites; 40 of those are seasonal

spots. Everything is full hook-up – sewer, water and electric. People can also put tents up.

Guests and visitors will immediately be drawn to the sandy beach at Fox Lake Campground and will have water toys at their fingertips, which includes access to paddle boats, kayaks, canoes (and life jackets). On site is a playground, volleyball and basketball courts, a campground store and game room.

Amanda said she loves to decorate and her big goal this year is to attack the game room and store. "I love all things cozy, comfy, bright and shiny! My goal for the store is to make it more of a boutique with clothing available inside," she explained. "As for the game room, we're trying to make it a little more loungey where guests can sit back with their coffee or ice cream and just enjoy a different vibe. We'll also have a little library nook going in, too," she confirmed.

The previous owners still own a lot across the road and will help the Haugens with some mentoring and maintenance the next couple of months.

Fox Lake Campground officially opens for the season the weekend of May 3rd; fishing opener is May 11th.

While the role of being new owners will keep them quite busy, Mark is also still working full-time with the U of M Extension based out of Crookston, where he'll travel 1-2 times a week, in addition to working from his home office. Amanda owned a photography studio for the last 15 years and still plans to do some photographing, but says it'll look a bit different now with this transition.

She says, "Photography has helped me a lot in doing my own web design and social media marketing." That design and photography image background helps Amanda manage the campground's new website and monthly newsletter, among other things. Amanda has been taking photos at Fox Lake for years and now gets to use some of those photos for advertising purposes!

One of the biggest changes made to the website, also includes online reservations being an option. You can check out Fox Lake Campground of Bemidji on Facebook and online at campatfoxlake.com. 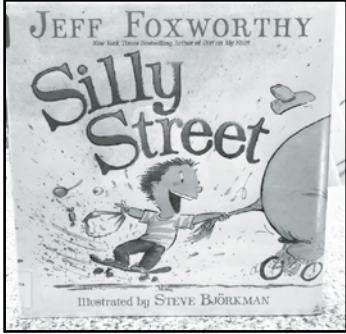
GRYGLA LIBRARY LINK

FSA 2019 Acreage Reporting Maps are available for producers

The Marshall County Farm Service Agency (FSA) has the 2019 Acreage reporting maps printed and ready for producers to pick-up at the Marshall County Farm Service Agency office. The County Office asks that farm operators stop by the Marshall County FSA Office and ask to pick up their 2019 acreage reporting maps. If farm operators have made changes to the land they operate they

are asked to inform the County Office of these changes prior to picking up their maps. To better serve producers, Marshall County FSA has additionally arranged a map pick-up day for producers at the following times and locations. Please stop by and ask for your maps at these locations if it is more convenient for you to do so.

- Monday April 29 from 9:00 AM to 1:30 PM at American

State Bank of Grygla

- Tuesday, April 30 from 9:00 AM to 1:30 PM at Newfolden Co-op Oil CO.
- Thursday, May 2 from 9:00 AM to 1:30 PM at KodaBank in Stephen, MN.

Once producers have completed planting they should complete their maps and then call the County Office to schedule their appointment for Acreage Reporting. A letter at-

tached to the map explains how to complete the map and what information is needed. This information will include the crop, variety, planting date, and intended use. Producers with questions about picking up their maps or acreage reporting requirements should contact their local FSA County Office or the Marshall County FSA Office at (218) 745-4251 ext. 2.

Chairperson of the board Karina Tinnes called the meeting to order at 8:28 p.m. with Jeremy Rychlock, James Verbout, Andrew Oslund, Tera Nordby, Clinton Brobst, Principal Lunsetter and Superintendent Clow present.

Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Jeremy Rychlock, second by Andrew Oslund, to approve the agenda as presented. Passed 6-0. Minutes of the 2/20/19 regular school board meeting were approved as printed. Motion by James Verbout, second by Karina Tinnes, to approve payment of the bills check #36616 through check #36685 and wire payments. Passed 6-0.

Student Report: Given by Abby Kiesow. The band and choir both received “Excellent” ratings at the contests in Greenbush. Driver’s Education started last week in Goodridge. On Tuesday, the 5th grade went to Norris Camp, where they snowshoed and saw two moose. On Wednesday, Art students went to Fosston for the Visual Arts Festival. Many students received “Excellent” and “Superior” ratings, as well as “Best in Show”. The Sophomores recently attended a Career Fair at NCTC. The 10th grade took the Accuplacer today for OCHS classes. The elementary basketball night and ECCE fundraiser was tonight. This Friday is the end

of the 3rd quarter. Saturday is the alumni basketball tournament. Next week is Spring Fling, with dress up days every day, hallway decorating, a food drive for the Grygla Food Shelf, and coronation at 2:40 pm on Friday. Tuesday, March 26th is vocal ensembles at Stephen. Mr. Lunsetter, Elise, Maci, Bailey, Courtney and Jared will be attending. There is a Junior High Knowledge Bowl meet in Thief River on Wednesday, March 27th. Robotics also leaves for the National Tournament in Council Bluffs, Iowa on Wednesday. Monday, April 8th is the Winter Sports Banquet in Goodridge at 7:00 PM. Track also begins on Monday, April 8th.

Teacher Report: Jean Schulz and Renae Westbrook. The ECCE fundraiser was a success tonight, along with Elementary basketball night. Our ECCE program donated \$2000 to the ECI-Marshall County Dolly Parton Library. The elementary students took a trip to DigiKey in Thief River Falls. They were able to tour the facility, and also made robots out of a solo cup, small motor and popsicle sticks. Mrs. Westbrook thanked the board and the communities for the opportunity to teach and live here, as they now look to the next chapter in their lives.

Principal Report: Presented by Mr. Lunsetter. The Drama Club has started rehearsals for the spring play under the direction of Audrya Nelson. Mr. Lunsetter also submitted a proposal for make-up storm days. Under the proposal, the two storm days in the calendar would be used. In addition, staff would make up two extra days to fulfill their 180 day contract, and two student days would be forgiven. New girls basketball and volleyball jerseys are being ordered. BSN has also pro-

vided an incentive to purchase uniforms in them, which would result in the Goodridge and Grygla schools receiving \$5000 in Nike cash each year for the next five years. The 6th grade trip is up for review. Track season will be starting on April 8th, and the track schedule was given out. The 19-20 School Calendar was presented for review. The bus inspection went very well, thanks to Wayne and Jake’s dedication to maintaining our bus fleet. We are currently exploring our options for bus purchasing, and possibly selling one of our route buses. The Senior class trip is up for approval later in the meeting. An update was given on our winter heating season. We are on track to save over 2,000 gallons of fuel from last year.

Bear hunt applications available; deadline is May 3

Applications for bear hunting licenses are being accepted now through Friday, May 3, wherever Minnesota hunting and fishing licenses are sold, online at mndnr.gov/buylicense, and by telephone at 888-665-4236.

A total of 3,400 licenses are available in 13 permit areas. Bear licenses cost \$44 for residents and \$230 for non-residents, and there is a \$5 application fee. The 2019 season is open from Sunday, Sept. 1, through Sunday, Oct. 13.

Lottery winners will be notified by June 1. The deadline to purchase licenses awarded by lottery will be Thursday, Aug. 1. Any remaining unpurchased licenses will be available over the counter starting at noon on

Tuesday, Aug. 6.

An unlimited number of bear licenses will be sold over-the-counter for the no-quota area that includes east-central and far northwestern Minnesota. No-quota licenses are valid only in the no-quota area. Hunters with a no-quota license can harvest one bear.

The DNR has set 2019 bear permit numbers for quota areas to allow bear population numbers to gradually increase and support a robust bear population.

This old newspaper clipping was given to Harold Klamar. It hung on a bulletin board at the St. Paul Pioneer Press (June 11th, 2008) and was captioned as follows: The Little Treasures - writes Navy Dave of Bayport: “Here are two of my uncles, Sigfred (standing) and Irvin (Nygard), performing their harvesting chores. The grain appears to be wheat, and their machine, called a binder, cuts the standing grain and ties it

into the bundles. The bundles are called shocks, and would be positioned upright by hand to aid in drying. Later, a threshing crew would come along. As you can see, there are a lot of moving parts on this contraption, which made a four-horse hitch necessary. Anyway, this little slice of early American farm life took place around 1915 just east of Grygla in far northwestern Minnesota.

What is the Little Brother/Little Sister Program?
The Little Brother/Little Sister Program is based on the concept that young people can benefit from having the influence of a consistent, positive, role model in their life. This program helps youth between the ages of 4 and 14 in meeting a youth’s need for acceptance, understanding and positive guidance. The mentor and their “Little” get together at least once a month and participate in fun activities that enable the child to have a relationship with a role model who helps them build their self-esteem, expand their horizons and enrich their future. Free group activities are offered to program participants as well.
How is a match made?
Mentors are matched to meet the individual needs of the child. The matching of youth and mentor is made on the basis of location, personalities, interests, and the ability of the mentor to meet any particular needs which the youth may be experiences. All

volunteer mentors receive a background check and provide three character reference referrals. You need to commit to spending four hours a month with your Little.
How do I enroll my child?
To enroll your child in the program, the parent/guardian would request and fill out the youth enrollment packet which helps to know more about the likes and dislikes of your child, what their hobbies are and any needs they might have. This information will help make the right match for your child. The program coordinator can answer any of your questions and help you decide if this program is a good fit for your family. Referrals can also come in from schools, grandparents, social services and law enforcement.
What kinds of activities can you do together?
There are free group activities provided by the program every other month that include mini golf, pool parties and movie nights. You are also encouraged to find other cost free activities in your area such as

local sporting events, church events, going to the park, help with homework, ice skating, etc.

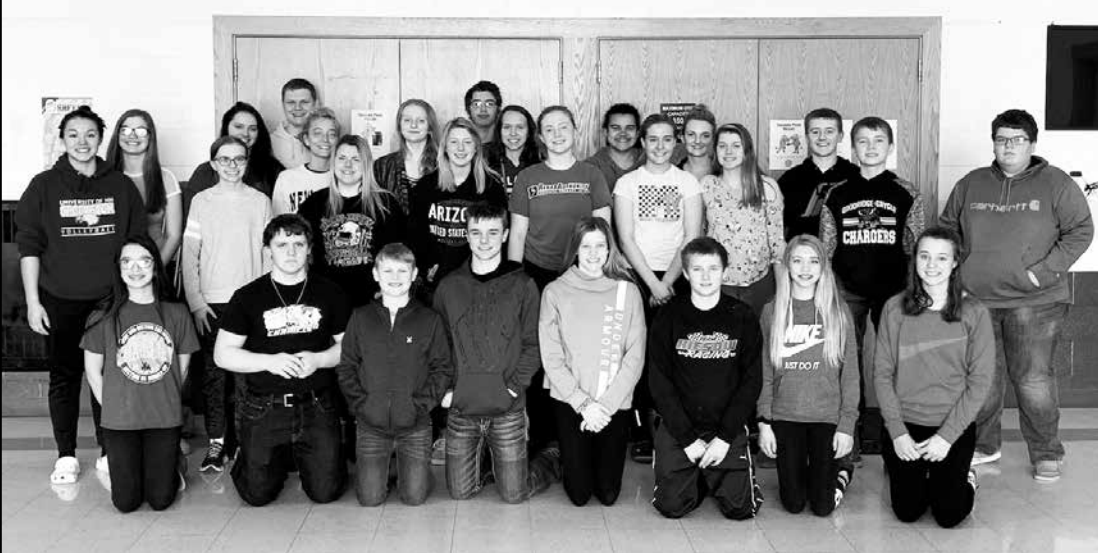
