At the library, I'm busy getting things ready for our Summer Reading Program, which is always a hit with the kids. I can't believe it's already time to start making those plans again! I'm so impressed by the number of kids (and parents who bring their kids!) in each week and participate in it. So far, we've got three awesome programs lined up for the youngsters. I'll share more information on that in a couple of weeks so you can be sure to get the events on your calendar. One is a repeat act who is always a hit with the kids (hint, hint: he brings a bunch of exotic zoo animals) and two are new performers that have never been here and I'm excited to bring in! Moving on to a couple of book suggestions for you. Cheryl Sistad visited me last week and shared two titles she recently read and wanted to suggest. I think they both sound fantastic and want to add them to my ever-growing list of books to read. Maybe you'll be interested in them also!?

The first one is called After Anna by Lisa Scottoline. It's a thriller that promises to keep readers on their toes until the final shocking page.

Dr. Noah Alderman, a widower and single father, has remarried a wonderful woman, Maggie Ippolitti, and for the first time in a long time, he and his young son are happy. Despite her longing for the daughter she hasn't seen since she was a baby, Maggie is happy too, and she's even more overjoyed when she unexpectedly gets another chance to be a mother to the child she thought she'd lost forever, her only daughter Anna.

Maggie and Noah know that having Anna around will change their lives, but they would never have guessed that everything would go wrong, and so quickly. Anna turns out to be a gorgeous seventeen-year-old who balks at living under their rules, though Maggie, ecstatic to have her daughter back, ignores the red flags that hint at the trouble brewing in a once-perfect marriage and home. Events take a heartbreaking turn when Anna is murdered and Noah is accused and tried for the heinous crime. Maggie must face not only the devastation of losing her daughter, but the realization that Anna's murder may have been at the hands of a husband she loves. In the wake of this tragedy, new information drives Maggie to search for the truth, leading her to discover something darker than she could have ever imagined.

The next book suggestion is called The Pact by Jodi Picoult, which definitely sounds like a haunting read you're sure not to forget.

For eighteen years the Hartes and the Golds have lived next door to each other, sharing everything from Chinese food to chicken pox to car-pool duty. Parents and children alike have been best friends - so it's no surprise that in high school Chris and Emily's friendship blossoms into something more. They've been soul mates since they were born. So when midnight calls from the hospital come in, no one is ready for the appalling truth: Emily is dead at seventeen from a gunshot wound to the head. There's a single unspent bullet in the gun that Chris took from his father's cabinet - a bullet that Chris tells police he intended for himself. But a local detective has doubts about the suicide pact that Chris has described. As its chapters unfold, alternating between an idyllic past and an unthinkable present, "The Pact" paints an indelible portrait of families in anguish...

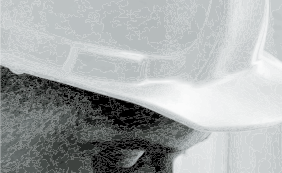

Marshall County Sheriff's Deputy Gillund and K9 Eva apprehend illegal alien



(Submitted) On 4/24/2019, at 08:38, Marshall County Sheriff's Office dispatch received a 911 call from a male individual stating he was getting assaulted by another male individual in Alvarado, MN. Marshall County Deputies responded to the scene and upon arrival, made contact with the victim. Through a quick investigation, the deputy found out who the suspect

was. The suspect was unable to speak English and had a hard time communicating with the officer, but could understand some of what the deputy was asking him. The deputy was trying to talk with him and all of a sudden, the male individual took off running from the deputy. The individual ran east down the track behind MarKit Grain and then turned North across

their lot and into the field North of MarKit across State Hwy 1. The deputy pursued the individual across the parking lot, and was given a John Deere Gator from one of the employees of MarKit Grain to help apprehend the suspect. The suspect ended up hiding in the woods across from MarKit Grain. This is when Deputy Gillund and his K9, Eva, were

called to help apprehend the suspect. Eva found the tracks of the individual going into the woods and followed them about 30 to 40 yards into the woods and found the male individual hiding under fallen trees. Through many commands to come out and show hands from Deputy Gillund, and the suspect not listening, Eva was released for an apprehension.

The suspect was taking into custody and brought back to the Marshall County Sheriff's Office. Through the help of the United States Customs and Border Patrol, the individual was found to be an illegal alien from Honduras. His name was Jose Ulloa-Flores. The Border Patrol took custody of Jose and will process him as an illegal alien.

A special thanks to the MarKit Grain employees and the use of the Gator, the citizens of Alvarado, and K9 Eva for the help in apprehending Jose.

Spinach and Tortellini Salad

Spring and summer are the perfect seasons for a good side salad and I'm always looking for new options to make. This salad compliments some grilled meat perfectly and it tastes so fresh and good. You've got a healthy dose of spinach and tomatoes in this salad and the tortellini cooks so fast that it's ready in no time. This is an all-around favorite salad of mine to make for all the reasons listed above.

1 bag frozen cheese tortellini (I like to buy the tri-colored stuff)

4 cups fresh baby spinach

1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

2 tomatoes, chopped

Creamy Italian Dressing, to coat

Instructions

Cook the tortellini according to package directions. It only takes about 5 minutes in the water. Rinse with cold water

and drain. In your bowl, mix the tortellini, spinach, cheese and tomatoes together – coat with Creamy Italian dressing. I didn't measure it out, but you'll know how much you like so it's not too dry! I also used Kraft vs. a homemade dressing, but you can definitely make your own if you're into that. This salad can be made in advance, just don't add the spinach until you are ready to serve otherwise it wilts a bit.

Skywarn was developed by the National Weather Service in the early 1970's to equip the public and emergency responders with training in the detection of severe weather and how

to effectively and efficiently report severe weather to the National Weather Service. Skywarn spotters provide real-time information to the National Weather Service which assists in forecasting and the warning decisions during severe weather.

Class attendees will be provided with the National Weather Service Field Spotter's Guide and view a multimedia presentation on severe weather. Anyone with an interest in weather or becoming a contributing Skywarn spotter is invited to attend.
