Mar-Bel Homes sell on an online auction

The Mar-Bel Homes in Grygla were up for bid on an online auction on Thursday, May 2nd, through McMullen Auctioneers. Lynn Anderson, along with Wayne Thomas, Brad Monson and Owen Hagen, serves on the Mar-Bel Homes Board of Directors. Anderson provided information on the sale confirming the same party bought all of the buildings. An offer was accepted with no final date set, pending the legal process of closing. The complexes will have a new name, new owner and caretaker, but until the sale is final, the Board of Directors will carry over until it's complete. Anderson provided, "A firm from out of our area had the winning bid. They have many complexes around the state, which is encouraging to everyone already residing in the buildings. As far as rental agreements or anything switching, I'm unsure, but it seems to be a win-win situation where no one will have to move out."

Mar-Bel Homes consists of 3-8 unit apartment buildings and 2 duplexes within Grygla. Both duplexes are rented out 100%. As for the apartment buildings, the Independence Hall has 5 out of 8 apartments rented; the Blair House also has 5 of 8 rented; the White House has 4 apartments out of 8 rented.

Joe McMullen, of McMullen Sales, said the sale is looking to be final around mid-July. The name of the firm wasn't disclosed, but they are located out of southern Minnesota. "The new owner wants to keep the current tenants, get a higher percentage of the apartments rented out and put some money into the properties in order to make that happen," McMullen offered.

When the sale becomes final, we look forward to bringing you an update on these properties.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

It's spring. Time for baseball once again. One of our Public Service Colleagues gave an analogy that as Public Servants we are entrusted to our jobs similarly to that of a baseball umpire. Not always an easy job, but once a pitch is made you have to call a ball or a strike a strike, but you have to make the call. The game has to move forward.

In Minnesota we are seeing a breakdown of this simple premise. Bureaucracy and processes that never end are causing a stalemate of being able to move forward in any clear direction. Specifically, the issues with two highly impactful decisions regarding Enbridge that have now been going on for 5 and 7 years of being in this seemingly never ending process and how this affects our people is a cause of great concern.

Line 3 Replacement - In process now for 5th year.

Enbridge has been notified by the federal government that their current line 3 is not adequate and antiquated. Enbridge has come forward and agreed to replace this line with a new state of the art line with the entire multi billion dollar investment by their company. The new line is in place in all areas it crosses, Canada, North Dakota and Wisconsin, with Minnesota being the only entity where it is still in process with no decision made. Enbridge has played by the rules set by the State, but encounter new roadblocks of additional scrutiny with the process, while the passionate debate on this issue continues. Opponents of the project stress safety and environmental concerns. Proponents of the project, (of which

Marshall County is one of), debate the same concerns, but in a different way. If the oil is going to come in some way, (and hopefully all sides are able to agree on this fact), the question is what transportation system provides the most safety for all? Are rail cars or an old line the best mode of transportation or a new line with no outside investment? Increased rail traffic causes additional concerns with safety, not only with this mode of transportation itself and possible derailments, but increased length of trains and ability to cross these lines with emergency services. If you need to get to the hospital, longer waits at a rail crossing are the last thing one needs. And if the old line stays as is, are the risks of using it a chance we dare to take?

Economic impacts of this line are also immense. Governor Walz has requested the legislature to provide over a billion dollars for infrastructure and job creation. Line 3 alone will provide thousands of immediate jobs, not only during line replacement but beyond, with no investment by government or ANY increase in taxes. Once in place the tax revenues alone are significant and enduring. In Marshall County, Enbridge currently pays 1/4 of all taxes collected and in some Counties this is even a higher percentage. Without Line 3, and without raising taxes by any amount, ALL persons in the County will see significant tax increases on their homes and property. Are the people prepared to absorb this increase? As the transportation of oil by rail continues to grow, this will mean further economic issues

for our farmers by not having available rail cars to ship agricultural products.

Enbridge Valuation Lawsuit – In process now for 7th year.

Minnesota sets the value of Utility Companies for tax purposes. Enbridge has appealed their valuation by the State for each year since 2013, stating that Minnesota's system by far creates the highest valuation of any state or province they operate in. The "process" for determining what this valuation should be is now going on 7 years. If the final decision is realized in favor of the pipeline, it could mean an immediate return of payment by affected Townships, Cities, Schools, the County and other taxing entities to our largest taxpayer and again significantly increase costs to all taxpayers in the County as this new lessened base is realized. None of the affected entities have had any say in what this valuation should be, but ironically would be on the hook for all payments due. How much time does this have to take to process? How much can our taxpayers absorb? Is it right that they pay this bill due to an error caused by the state?

No matter what happens in either of these situations above, (if any resolve will ever be realized), it is clear to us at the County level that the "process" in Minnesota is broken and needs to be changed. We implore the State to evaluate its process and work toward a timely resolve, no matter what the outcome may be.

Time to play ball - make the call Minnesota! Is it a strike or is it a ball?
