Caricaturist Trevour, of Exaggerated Entertainment, is from Moorhead, MN. He will

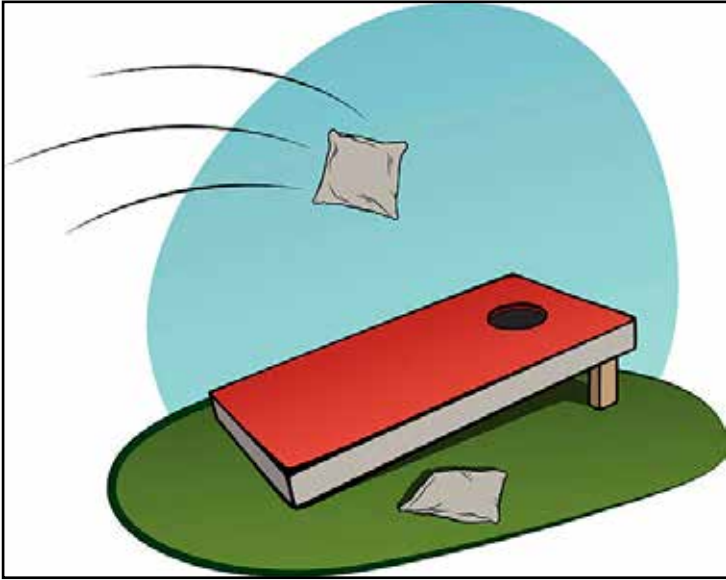
be back again this year to draw his caricatures that everyone so much enjoyed!

The Roseau County Museum is in search of a licensed electrician for a lighting restructure project within the museum. The job would consist of:
a. Install occupancy sensors and dimmers to control the exhibit track lighting. These controls will limit both the intensity and duration of light exposure on your collection objects as well as reducing your energy costs.
b. Replace obsolete fluorescent and quartz/halogen lighting fixtures with new energy efficient LED fixtures. Linear fixtures will provide ambient light in both the gallery and research area and track lighting will accent focal points of the exhibits. The fixtures should have color temperature of 3000 Kelvin, a color rendering index above 90, and should dimmable to provide between 5 and 30 footcandles of light. This range will provide adequate light levels for the wide range and viewing requirements of your visitors.
c. Install retrofit LED tubes in existing fluorescent fixtures in the collection storage area. The look of the light fixture isn't important and the retrofit tube is the most cost effective option.
d. Add additional electrical outlets throughout the certain locations in the museum.

The Roseau County Museum hired a consultant for a lighting redesign being lighting is one of the most critical elements in the museum environment. Proper lighting not only protects valuable artifacts but also plays a major role in providing a positive visitor experience. Thompson made a motion, seconded by Oslund, to approve the extension of the Fully Charged Foundation Raffle if needed. Motion was carried unanimously. In a letter to the Minnesota Gambling Control Board in Roseville, MN, Patrick J. Hackley, Fully Charged Foundation Executive Director, wrote:

"As of 8am on June 6th, 2019, the Fully Charged Foundation raffle License #X-94372-19-001 has not met the required number of ticket sales to cover the cost of the prizes publicized on the raffle tickets and on promotional materials. Because of this reason, we must change the raffle date of this raffle to July 26, 2019, to allow for more tickets to be sold."

The letter went on to state: "We are prepared to get quite a bit of walk in traffic the day of the event, Friday, June 7, 2019, and if the ticket sales surpass the cost threshold, we fully intend on drawing the winner that night."

The letter was signed by Hackley, along with Richard Mosher, who represented the City of Grygla.

Thompson made a motion, seconded by Nordby, that there will not be another extension added on to the previous extension, and the raffle will have to be drawn on July 26th if not on June 7th. Motion was carried unanimously.

Pasta salad is always such an awesome thing to take to a pot luck or barbecue. It's easy to put together, it travels really well, and most people seem to really like it! Though there are a million recipes out there, it's hard to sometimes know what pasta salads to throw together. Here are a couple of good ones worth trying.



Black Bean and Corn Pasta Salad

- 1 (16-ounce) box rotini tri-colored pasta, cooked
- 2 cans black beans rinsed and drained well
- 1 small bag frozen corn, thawed
- 1 can Rotel
- 4 green onions, chopped
- ½ cup bell pepper, chopped
- ½ cup white onion, chopped
- 2-3 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped
- ¾ of a large bottle of Zesty Italian dressing

Mix all together and refrigerate at least 2 hours.

Mandarin Pasta Spinach Salad

- 8 ounces bowtie pasta noodles
- 4 cups spinach leaves
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/3 cup Diamond of California Pine Nuts or cashews (or leave out!)
- 1 4-ounce can mandarin oranges, drained
- 1/4 cup cilantro leaves, roughly chopped

You can make your own teriyaki dressing, but a great bottle to buy if you aren't up to making your own is the Kikkoman brand and can be found at almost every grocery store.

Cook pasta according to package instructions, drain and rinse with cold water. In a large bowl toss together pasta, spinach, raisins, nuts (or leave these out), mandarin oranges, and cilantro. Just before serving pour dressing over salad, toss, and serve.
