USMCA provides the lift MN farmers need

Farmers in Minnesota are an optimistic breed. You have to be to farm here. The weather that makes our crops grow, can turn on you in an instant. But optimism has been hard to come by this year.

Crop prices are down. The rural economy is struggling. Mother Nature has been uncooperative. And overseas sales have dried up.

Minnesota farmers need some good news.

Our leaders in Washington, D.C. have a chance to give us a shot in the arm by passing a bipartisan trade deal, the United States-Canada-Mexico Agreement (USMCA). This agreement will boost the way of life for wheat growers like me by leveling the playing field and increasing opportunities for all farmers across the state.

The USMCA updates the already established framework found in the North American Free Trade Agreement while greatly improving our trade relations with Canada and Mexico. Not to be understated

are the economic benefits this trade deal contains. The U.S. International Trade Commission has projected the deal will create 176,000 new jobs while also increasing the size of the United States economy by over \$68 billion.

Wheat farmers will directly benefit from the USMCA's ratification by locking in sales to Mexico and leveling the playing field with Canada, which has used unfair trade practices to block our goods for far too long.

Hopefully, Congress won't let politics keep American farmers from enjoying the fruits of a good USMCA deal.

There's a lot on the line. Agricultural exports are critical to our state's economy, contributing to more than one-third of Minnesota's total ag sales and supporting 57,000 on and off-farm jobs. In wheat alone, we export more than \$200 million, with Mexico being a top market.

For wheat growers, the economy, jobs and clear assurance of a brighter future to come, the time is ripe to ratify the USMCA. Lawmakers must act soon.

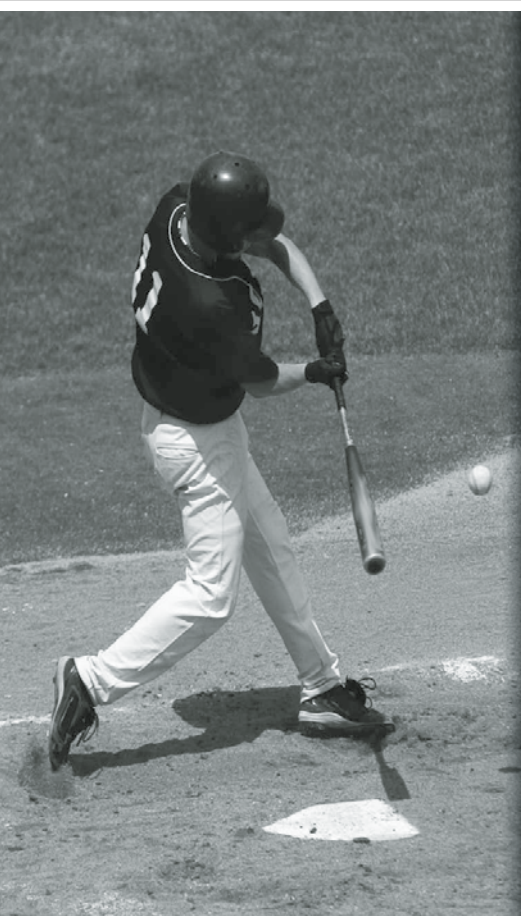
Volunteer - Make a Difference

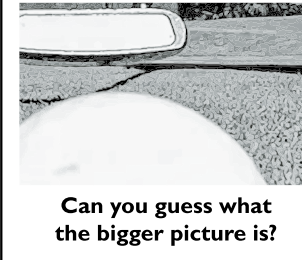

An Early History of Gatzke, Minn.

Note: Over the course of the next few weeks, and as room allows, we are going to be sharing things out of the book titled "An Early History of Gatzke, Minnesota: Second Edition - As told by Walter Lunsetter."

Let's dive into Week 5... The Great Gatzke Bank Robbery!

The Gatzke Bank was started in 1916 and operated until 1929. Severt O. Ostegaard was the banker, but left Gatzke after the bank failed in 1929.

On December 3, 1920, a big bank robbery took place in Gatzke; \$880 was stolen, but the robbers left over \$4,000 behind! Two masked gunmen in a Model T Ford came and held up the bank, using rifles to cover the 3 men in the bank while they stole the cash. The 2 men were later captured near Hallock after getting their car tangled up in a wire fence while driving without lights.

Bits and pieces from a story that was printed in the December 8, 1920, Warren Sheaf:

A daring bank robbery took place when in broad daylight two masked bandits held up the Farmer's State Bank of Gatzke.

The two bad men entered the bank between 2:00-3:00 and ordered the cashier, S.O. Ostegaard, his assistant and a farmer customer to hold up their hands. Mr. Ostegaard was greatly surprised and thought it was all a joke at first, but when he looked into the muzzle of a 30-30 rifle in the hands of one man and a .32 caliber revolver in the hands of the other man, he realized it was no joke and all in the bank complied with the demand, accompanied by a threat to shoot to kill.

They were backed into one place in the building, one robber covering them all the time with a gun while the other hurriedly ransacked the till and safe, gathering up what money he could find. Shortly after, they jumped in their automobile and headed north. As soon as the robbers departed,

Mr. Ostegaard notified Sheriff Hans C. Hanson at Warren by telephone. The Sheriff's office immediately telephoned towns in Marshall, Kittson and Roseau counties asking them to be on the lookout for the robbers.

In the pursuit, tracks were singled out by a car in the snow on roads not used very much for travel. The tracks were followed north towards Thief Lake, where the robbers got into swampy country and struck poor roads. The prisoners were caught about 5am the next morning.

The bandits gave their names as Earl Cook, 18, and Samuel Thompson, 24, and said they were from Joliet, ND. They claimed to have been engaged in the whiskey running business, but that their automobile and contents were taken from them at the boundary line. Then they stole a Ford automobile from a farmer near St. Vincent and got away; the same car they were driving when caught.

Justice moved swiftly in the case of these two young men. A week after the robbery was committed they were on their way to Stillwater Prison for life.

Numerous articles are printed in Walter Lunsetter's book that basically tell the same interesting story!

SIMPLY DELICIOUS

What I've got for you this week: quick food that didn't taste like quick food.

1st: The pineapple/brat apps. These were so good and so easy to make. You can use any kind of brat (I used a jalapeño/cheddar venison brat) and cut them up, along with a can of pineapple chunks.

I cut up my brats and pan fried them. In a separate bowl, I combined some pineapple juice from the can, some honey, some teriyaki sauce and sweet chili sauce - all to taste. Use however much you want. I did enough of that glaze to cover the bottom of the pan. I let simmer for a few minutes and stuck a toothpick in the pineapple/brat piece - put them all in a small crockpot and poured the hot glaze on top.

They were a total hit.

2nd: Just a quick tip to spruce up your frozen green beans. I steamed in the microwave according to the package. Then sauted minced garlic and onion slices in butter and added my steamed green beans. After a few minutes, I sprinkled some plain bread crumbs on top and added some bacon bits - the packaged "real" kind.

This combo tasted so good and made the frozen veggies taste like something off a restaurant menu! Go make them.
