Let's take a look at the Pine Cone Apartments in Grygla

Dave Hunter, a partner in Pine Cone Investments, LLC, has been spending some time in Grygla this last week. As a new owner of multiple buildings in town, Dave has truly enjoyed spending time here. "I have been so impressed with how friendly and helpful everyone has been up here; I've never felt so welcome! Our tenants have even made dinner for me this week," he beamed. "You sit down at the café and just feel like one of the people. The generosity and kindness of everyone is really impressive," he added.

The Pine Cone Apartments, formerly Mar-Bel Homes, sold in an online auction on May 2nd, 2019. A firm from Fairmont, MN, bought the properties which currently consist of three 8-unit apartment buildings and two duplexes within Grygla. Pine Cone Investments, LLC, is a separate entity of the firm that owns about 300 rental units nation-wide. "Most of our properties are family houses," stated Dave, who partners with Doug Willner, CEO. "We rent apartments, mobile home parks, and even have around a dozen farms we own and rent out," he added. Hunter says he and Willner

are long-time friends who are your typical small-town country boys who value hard work. The two have been in the housing market for about 35 years now with their headquarters located in Fairmont. As of August 1st, MarBel Homes officially became Pine Cone Apartments and Dave is overseeing some pretty exciting changes as the new property manager. Eventually, when everything is up and running, they look forward to hiring a full-time property manager on site in Grygla, but for now, Dave is taking on the task and operating out of an office set up in the Independence Hall. Many upgrades have already taken place and more are on the schedule. Dave says they've replaced toilets, sinks, lighting, carpeting and many more inside changes. They also have some roofing to do and gutter/foundation work on the White House as it's currently leaking. "We have so much to get accomplished," he pointed out. Dave is also a licensed general contractor with an 11-man crew that they shuffle around to their properties. With that help, they hope to get more units up to date here in Grygla. "We're anxious to keep improving the facilities and are looking for ways to add to the properties," offered Dave. For example, they are currently working on getting WiFi installed free to their

renters. They want to make it friendlier outside by adding some grilling and dining areas. They also want to make some more of the units handicap accessible and upgrade the existing sidewalks. "These are people's homes...we want it to feel like home," he said. Dave also mentioned that though their company is not religious-based, they do base their values on religion. When asked how they do that, he said they visit with and share their values with their tenants. Right now, Pine Cone Apartments is offering a referral fee. They are giving \$100 cash if you refer someone who signs a lease. Also, with that one-year lease, they are offering the first month's rent free to their new tenants. Dave also said that HRA has been a tremendous help and the properties are all Section 8 accepted. Majority of the units are 1-bedroom, however, there are three 2-bedroom units currently available. Dave said Pine Cone Investments took over the 12 tenants out of the 28 max that they hold; they are currently up to 17 tenants. Dave concluded, "These buildings used to be full at one time and can be full again with the upgrades and improvements we are making. People want to move into nice, clean facilities and we're happy to make that happen."

As we are planning and working on the Marshall County Area Veterans Memorial Park, we do so with the hope and ideal that we can keep the history and memories of those men and women who served and those who are currently serving this country alive for generations to come. We realize that to do so we need the help of you, our family, friends, and veterans themselves to accomplish these goals.

A portion of the park will be located in the lower level of the Marshall County Courthouse. The design will include a mural on the wall, along with a digital display that will include a living history of photos, and stories. This living history will include interviews, letters, memories, stories, and photographs from those that are willing to share about our service men and women. This is your chance to ask the questions or share the stories of the people in your lives whose lives were changed by the sacrifice of serving our country. We also have individuals in place who will be interviewing willing veterans or family members, preserving their living history forever. Outside will be granite monuments encompassing a bronze statue of a soldier kneeling at the battle ground cross. There will be benches for a place to sit and reflect. The flag poles and granite portion will be in the center of the courthouse lawn surrounded by trees that add to the humble and solemn tribute to our area service men and women, past, present and future.

While we are excited by the opportunity to honor and remember our veterans, we have much work to do. To accomplish this project, it will require a lot of work and monetary investment. We again need your help and support. Now is our time to step up to say thank you and we will always remember. We need to build the park together, all-inclusive and all important. Any and everything you can do, through input to the history and through monetary donations will help bring this special place to fruition. Marshall County accepts all of the items collected at the fall HHW collections, from May thru October, each Wednesday from 8am-4:30pm at the Marshall County Demolition Landfill. The Marshall County Demolition Landfill is located approximately 4 miles south of Argyle or 5 miles north of Warren on Highway 75. The landfill is located on the west side of the highway. All demolition debris can be disposed of on-site during these hours. Other items that are collected, from households, at the facility are: appliances, televisions, computer monitors, fluorescent bulbs, batteries, ballasts, tires, oil paint, latex paint, solvents, acids, caustics, adhesives, and home & garden pesticides. 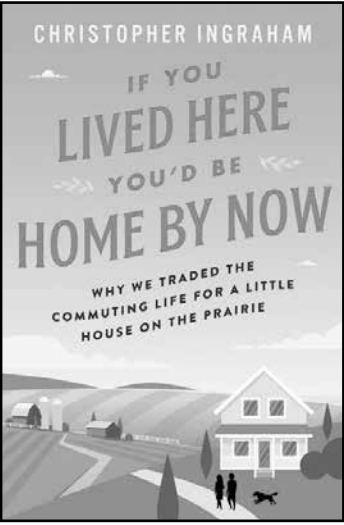

This week, I'd like to share a local author I think you'll be interested in. Remember that guy who wrote for the *Washington Post* who said Red Lake County, MN, was the absolute worst place to live in America? But then he was invited to visit it and actually moved his family up here!?! YES.

That's the guy.

I can't wait to read his book and I'm looking into getting him to make the short drive to Grygla for an author visit sometime in the near future. The book is called *If you lived here you'd be home by now: Why we traded the commuting life for a little house on the prairie* by Christopher Ingraham. It's available to check out through the NWRL system and is also on Overdrive for those who do e-books.

An online summary provided: The hilarious, charming, and candid story of writer Christopher Ingraham's decision to uproot his life and move his family to Red Lake Falls, Minnesota, population 1,400—the community he made famous as “the worst place to live in America” in a story he wrote for the *Washington Post*.

Like so many young American couples, Chris Ingraham and his wife Briana were having a difficult time making ends meet as they tried to raise their twin boys in the East Coast suburbs. One day, Chris – in his role as a “data guy” reporter at the *Washington Post* – stumbled on a study that would change his life. It was a ranking of America's 3,000+ counties from ugliest to most scenic. He quickly scrolled to the bottom of the list and gleefully wrote the words “The absolute worst place to live in America is (drumroll please) ... Red Lake County, Minn.” The story went viral, to put it mildly.

Among the reactions were many from residents of Red Lake County. While they were unflappably polite – it's not called “Minnesota Nice” for nothing – they challenged him to look beyond the spreadsheet and actually visit their community. Ingraham, with slight trepidation, accepted. Impressed by the locals' warmth, humor and hospitality – and ever more aware of his financial situation and torturous commute – Chris and Briana eventually decided to relocate to the town he'd just dragged through the dirt on the Internet.

If You Lived Here You'd Be Home by Now is the story of making a decision that turns all your preconceptions, good and bad, on their heads. In Red Lake County, Ingraham experiences the intensity and power of small-town gossip, struggles to find a decent cup of coffee, suffers through winters with temperatures dropping to forty below zero, and unearths some truths about small-town life that the coastal media usually miss. It's a wry and charming tale – with data! - of what happened to one family brave enough to move waaaay beyond its comfort zone.

Honey Mustard Pork-chops

This recipe takes about 10 minutes to prep and about 20-30 minutes to cook, which also makes it ideal for a week-night meal. They are decadent enough for a Sunday dinner or a special occasion as well.

Here is what you will need to grab from the grocery store:

- 4 pork chops, bone in
- 1 box of Oven fry for Pork (made by Kraft)
- 2 eggs
- 4 tbsp butter
- 2 tbsp honey
- 1 tbsp mustard
- 1 tbsp vinegar (Red Wine Vinegar is recommended)
- 3-4 tbsp fresh parsley, minced
- 1 tsp paprika

Time to get cooking. There are a few important steps you need to remember to do. Dry the pork chops really well on all sides with paper towels. Let them sit out for about 30 minutes before prepping them. Set

yourself up a breeding area with the egg. Oven fry, chops and an empty plate to make it easy on yourself.

Bread the chops following these steps:

1. Dip a chop in the egg mixture making sure to coat all sides.
2. Then press the chop down into the oven fry, turn to get all the edges and opposite sides.
3. Place chops on plate while you do the remaining pork chops.
4. Prepare a baking sheet with foil and non stick spray and place the chops on the sheet while heating the oven to 375 degrees.
5. Then sprinkle a little bit of the oven fry on top of the chops with a pat of butter on top of each.
6. Bake for approximately 20 minutes.

While the chops bake, prepare the honey mustard glaze by whisking together the honey, vinegar, mustard, half the parsley and paprika.

Remove the chops from the oven, drizzle the chops with the honey mustard glaze and place the sheet pan back in the oven (that is turned off) for about 5 to 7 minutes so the glaze bakes on. Reserve the remaining glaze for dipping.

Remove the chops from the oven, plate and sprinkle with the remaining parsley.

The bone in pork chops are key in this recipe because they make the finished dish so much more juicy. The honey mustard glaze adds such a delicious sticky sweet touch, too.
