National Fire Prevention Week

Not every hero wears a cape. PLAN and PRACTICE your ESCAPE!

That's the theme of this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, which is October 6th-12th, 2019. This year's campaign recognizes the everyday people who motivate their households to develop and practice a home fire escape plan; these seemingly basic behaviors can have life-saving impact.

"This year's campaign works to celebrate people of all ages who learn about home fire escape planning and practice, bring that information home, and spur their families to action," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of Outreach and Advocacy at NFPA. "From young students who learn about the campaign at school to parents who attend a community event like a fire station open house - all of them truly are heroes because they're taking steps to make their households much, much safer from fire."

"Not Every Hero Wears a Cape. Plan and Practice Your Escape!" also focuses on what a home escape plan entails and the value of practicing it. These messages are more important than ever, particularly because today's homes burn faster than ever. Carli notes that synthetic fibers used in modern home furnishings, along with the fact that newer homes tend to be built with more open spaces and unprotected lightweight construction, are contributing factors to the increased burn rate.

"People tend to underestimate their risk to fire, particularly at home. That over-confidence lends itself to a complacency toward home escape planning and practice," said Carli. "But in a fire situation, we've seen time and again that advance planning can make a potentially life-saving difference."

A home escape plan includes working smoke alarms on every level of the home, in every bedroom, and near all sleeping areas. It also includes two ways out of every room, usually a door and a window, with a clear path to an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) that's a safe distance from the home. Home escape plans should be practiced twice a year by all members of the household.

Violence Intervention Project welcomes October as National Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Violence Intervention Project (VIP) welcomes October as National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. One in four women will be the victim of domestic violence at some point in their lifetime, and, on average, three women are killed every day at the hands of a current or former intimate partner.

Despite tremendous challenges, domestic violence shelters served nearly 70,000 victims in one day alone, according to the latest National Network to End Domestic Violence Domestic Violence Counts. More than three out of four domestic violence survivors who sought support groups, counseling,

supportive services and legal advocacy found these services to be "very helpful," the National Resource Center on Domestic Violence and the University of Connecticut School of Social Work reported.

"Domestic violence happens in every community, even though we may not see it," says Staci Reay, VIP Fund Development Coordinator. VIP serves five counties in Northwest Minnesota and served more than 650 victims of domestic violence in 2018.

Throughout October, communities across the country will mourn for those whose lives were taken by domestic violence, celebrate the tremen-

dous progress victim advocates have made over the years, and connect with one another with a true sense of unity to end domestic violence.

"Join VIP as we work to increase awareness during Domestic Violence Awareness Month," asks Reay. VIP is partnering with area coffee shops, Wired Bean (Thief River Falls), Bear and Bean (Roseau), and Bean and Brush in Hallock to promote awareness, and organizing a fundraiser luncheon. In addition, VIP is partnering with Northland Community and Technical College to display the Clothesline Project, October 21-23. You can learn more at violenceintervention.org.

Back in the saddle again for St. Jude

Last weekend at the Bemis Hill Campground in the Beltrami Island State Forest, Darlene Danielson wasn't walking like she was playing dodgeball and trying to side step occasional horse poop.

She's an old cowgirl.

Step in it often?

"Probably, but it doesn't bother me none," she laughed, adding that she doesn't sleep with her boots on.

"The weather was great actually. There was a little rain on Friday, but Saturday was a good day," she said on Sunday afternoon during the clean up at Bemis Hill.

"The turnout was less than last year, but we had about 40 riders and four wagons," she

said, noting that Ernie Meier, Rod Cargo, Stan Weston and Scott Langton were the wagon masters.

"We had to change the route because of the water," said Danielson. "We took the wheel-er and checked out the trails. Some were pretty deep water holes, so we had to change the route. We tried staying on higher ground."

There was one little cowboy on the 10-mile trail ride that she was impressed with.

"He's a cute, little bugger. It was his first time here. He's five-years-old, and he rode the entire way on a fat, little pony," she said.

Little Wyatt Thomas, who hails from Rush City, rode alongside his dad, Drew.

"We served a hundred people for supper on Saturday,"

she said. "Groovy Grub was really happy with that. They donate some of what they make back to us," said Darlene.

Once again, Lancaster's Dixie Strege, the all-time fund-raising champ for the St. Jude annual Bemis Hill event, led the charge.

"Dixie raised \$6,900 and was followed by Garry Langton of Salol with \$1,365, and Dave Danielson of Roseau with \$1,075," she said, adding that there were no prizes for being the top three fundraisers.

"We do this for the kids," she said, tipping her cowboy hat to a local couple.

"Arnold and Nora Kaml of Pencer donated the firewood for the lodge and outside campfires. It was a big load of popple and tamarack slabs."

How much did you raise?

"Right now, we're sitting

at, believe it or not, \$15,976. There's more coming in," she said. "We exceeded last year's total of a little over \$14,000," she said.

They had a few new people, but it was mostly the same crew that come every year to help support the St. Jude Trail Ride.

"We have raised a total of \$202,094.25, not counting this year," said Danielson appreciatively.

Darlene and Mary Cole are the co-coordinators of the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital Trail Ride.

"This was our 20th year, and we get a lot of support from our families," she said. "The date next year is September 26."

And she's hoping the same little guy on the fat little pony rides the trails again for her favorite charity.
