The Grygla area appeals to nature lovers and seekers, alike. With a few different routes bringing you to our neck of the woods, you're sure to see an abundance of wildlife whichever trek you take. The rural roads to Grygla can often include sightings of deer, moose, black bear, wolves and coyotes, with the scenes providing an idyllic setting for wildlife observation, including birdwatching.

Grygla is an established elk herd that is regularly seen along main highways and roads typically north of town. At last count by the MN DNR, the herd was made up of approximately 20 elk.

To further your outdoor adventure and wildlife viewing opportunities, Agassiz National Wildlife Refuge is "purt-near" in Grygla's back yard; just 17 miles west!

Grygla is a central location of many wildlife areas and public lands, noted as a great hunting spot!

With numerous clubs and organizations, there's a way to get involved around every corner! With almost 150 members, the Fourtown/Grygla Sportsman's Club has emerged into one of the most active sportsman's clubs in Northwest Minnesota. Members take pride in the area's outdoor recreational opportunities, which includes maintaining approximately 240 miles of Grant-In-Aid snowmobile trails and 180 miles of an ATV Trail System around the Grygla/Fourtown area.

Other areas of interest in and around town include a city camp-

ground, two parks, a public-use airport, a hiking trail along the Mud River, which also serves as a quiet, serene spot to snow shoe and cross-country ski. Grygla also has newly constructed sand volleyball, tennis, horseshoe and basketball courts in town, along with two baseball/softball fields and an indoor ice skating rink.

Home of the Chargers, the Grygla Public School offers small class sizes with excellent teacher to student ratio, excellent technology access, bus routes extending beyond school district lines, and a safe and exciting learning experience for its students.

Grygla has a progressive city government, which is continually seeking to attract business and industry. 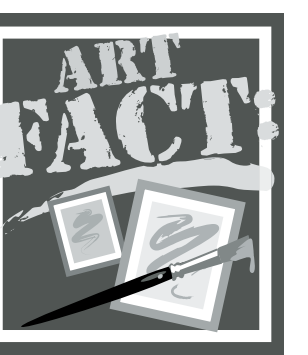

SIMPLY DELICIOUS

This week I've got a couple different soup recipes to share. They seem a bit similar, yet they aren't. One is squash – the other pumpkin. With these both being two soups I really love, I've yet to find the perfect go-to recipe. I haven't made either of these yet, but plan to this week. My fingers are crossed that one of them is a hit and my search will be over. Past recipes for squash/pumpkin soups have fallen short for me and been a bit “blah.” These two caught my eye and seem promising.

Autumn Squash Soup
This velvety, autumn soup is made completely in a slow cooker, is so easy, and the perfect soup for fall and winter.

Ingredients
3 cups vegetable broth
1 small yellow onion chopped
6 heaping cups of peeled and chopped butternut squash
1 cup peeled and chopped carrots
2 cups apple juice or apple cider

1/2 cup pumpkin puree
2 tbsp brown sugar
1 tsp salt
1/2 tsp pepper
1/2 tsp cinnamon
A pinch of nutmeg
2 tbsp butter
1/2 cup heavy cream
¼ of the brick of cream cheese

Instructions
Add all of the ingredients (except heavy cream and cream cheese) to your slow cooker/ crock pot: vegetable broth, onion, squash, carrots, apple juice/cider, pumpkin puree, brown sugar, salt & pepper, cinnamon, nutmeg, and butter. Mix ingredients together. Place heat on low and cover - let cook for 5 hours. If you would like this to cook faster, you can

set your cooker to high for 3-4 hours.

About the last ½ hour, add cream cheese. After ingredients have cooked, use a hand blender to puree your soup or use a blender and in batches blend your soup until consistency is velvety smooth. Stir in heavy cream and adjust taste if you would like more cinnamon, brown sugar, etc.

Creamy Pumpkin Soup with Grilled Cheese Croutons

Ok, clearly you can see why this one pulled me in. Grilled cheese croutons!? Yes, please. I hope this recipe is what fall dinner dreams are made of.

Ingredients
3 cups vegetable or chicken broth
2 cups pumpkin puree (not pumpkin pie filling)
1.5 tsp garlic powder
1.5 tsp onion powder
¼ tsp ground ginger
2 tbsp sugar
1 tsp salt
¼ tsp pepper
1.5 cups heavy cream

Instructions
In a large pot whisk together broth, pumpkin, garlic powder, onion powder, ground ginger, sugar, salt, and pepper and bring to a boil over high heat. Once boiling, stir in heavy cream. Reduce heat to medium and simmer 5-10 minutes longer.

While soup is simmering, prepare the grilled cheese croutons. Make your grilled cheese as you normally would. Provolone cheese is a little thicker and is recommended if you are using them for soup croutons. After grilled, cut into 1-inch pieces.

Serve soup hot with the grilled cheese croutons. For a garnish, top with cracked black paper and fresh basil.



DO IT YOURSELF

This DIY ties in with the Simply Delicious recipes. Presenting pumpkin soup in pumpkins or squash bowls takes hosting to a whole new level. There are a variety of ways to make these and it all depends on whether or not you clean the insides out or choose to roast and eat them.

Preheat your oven to 400 degrees. Line a baking sheet with

parchment paper. Cut around the steams, scoop out the seeds. Rub the inside with olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Replace the tops and roast until the flesh is tender but not so soft that the pumpkin or squash begins to collapse – maybe 20-25 minutes.

You can cut your insides out to make your serving bowl smaller or larger!

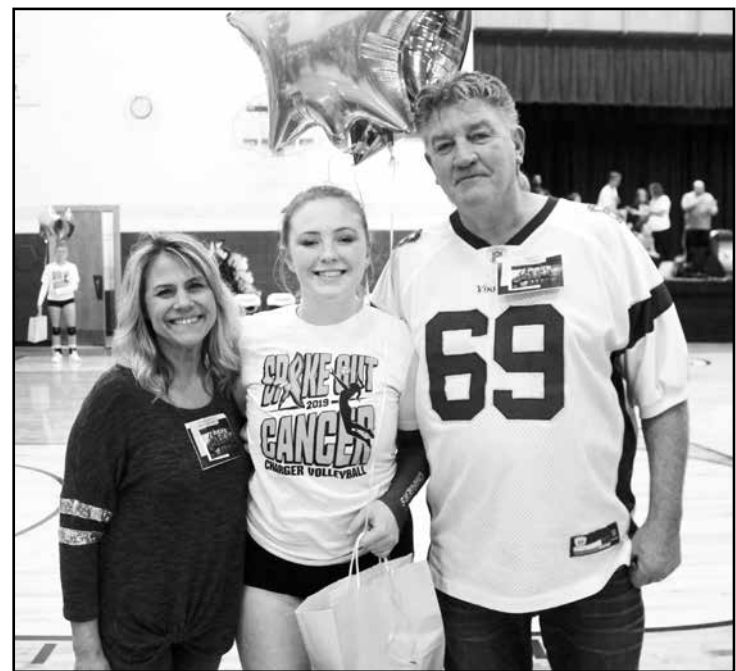

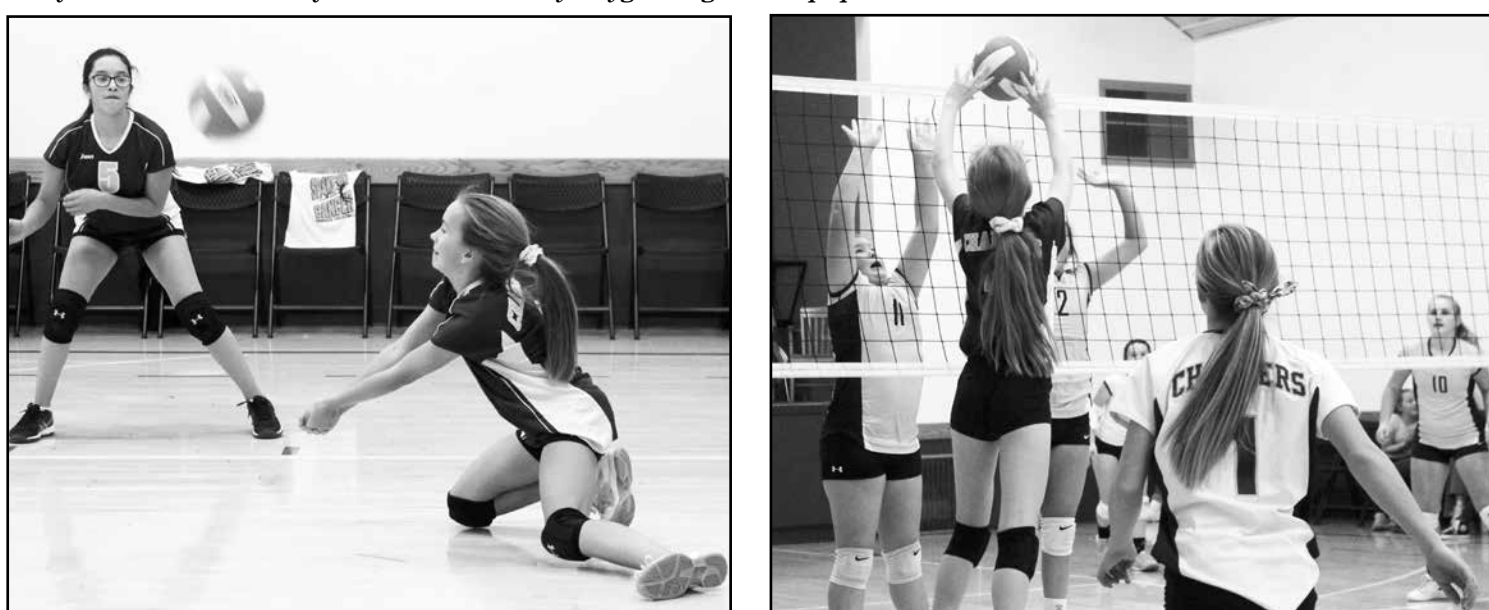
BIA-ALCL is a rare form of T-cell lymphoma that may affect a very small number of women who have received breast implants or expanders. It's a cancer of the immune system and occurs in the scar tissue that surrounds the implant. BIA-ALCL generally progresses slowly and can be treated by surgically removing the breast implant and the capsules. Sometimes tissue, lymphnodes and scar tissue also needs to be removed.

On September 10th, Vicki received an endblock bilateral capsulectomy of both breasts, as well as extensive scar tissue removal from her rib cage. Due to the fact that this is such a rare form of cancer, she is still undergoing testing to determine was the next course of treatment will be.

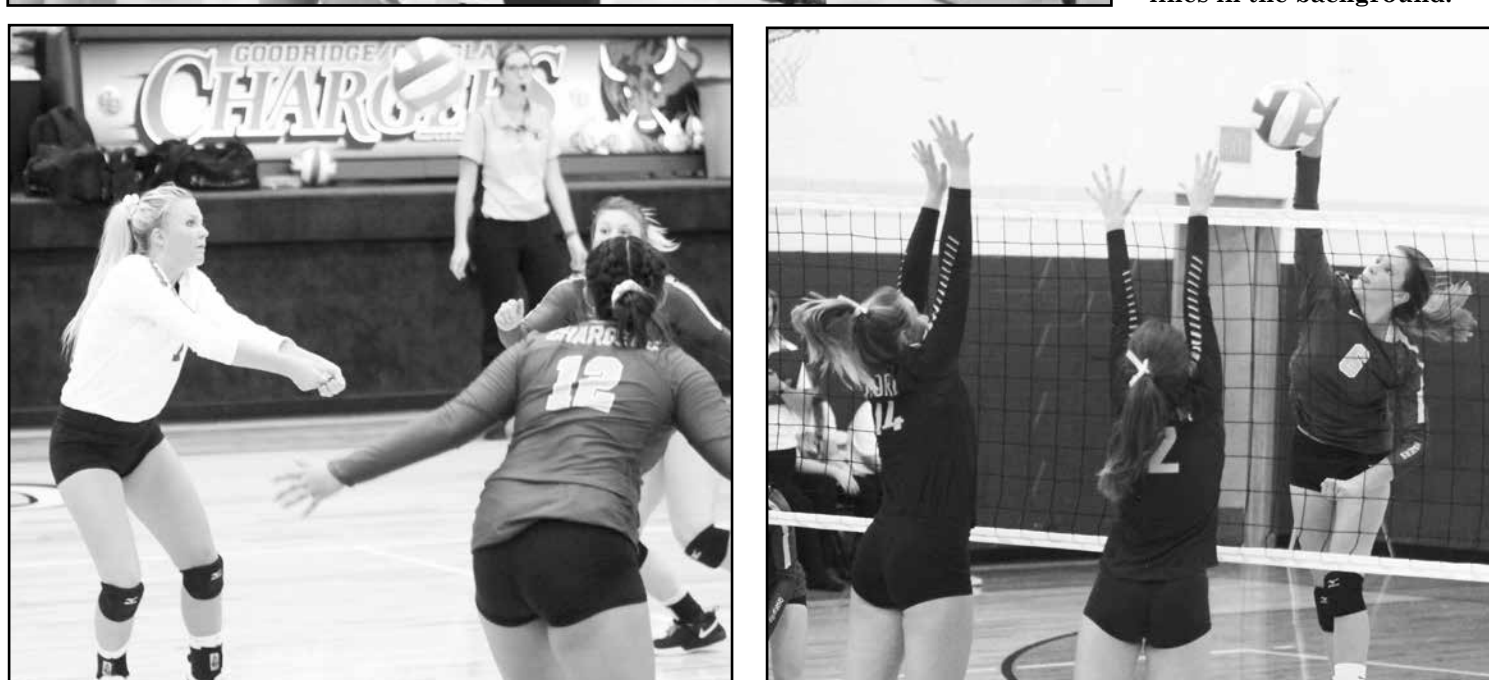
