Sargent gets a huge win for the Prowlers

The Thief River Falls Prowler Wrestling Team includes two wrestlers from the Goodridge School - Jolson Sargent (HWT), a sophomore, and Kehan Nelson (120 lbs), an 8th grader.
The Prowler Wrestling Team traveled to Bemidji last Friday morning to participate in the annual Rick Lee Wrestling Tournament. The team

had wrestlers participating in the Middle School and JV individual tournaments. The varsity squad prepared to take on teams from Frazee, Ottertail County, and Tracy-Milroy-Balaton-Westbrook-Walnut-Grove in pool action to determine tournament placement on Saturday.
All three opponents had strong teams, it was not going to be an easy path to the cham-

pionship pool.
The Prowlers first took on Frazee and fell short with a 32-36 loss. Ottertail County was defeated during the second round of pool action. The third and final round for the day the Prowlers took on TMBW, who were undefeated for the day. After 4 bouts, TMBW led the Prowlers 17-3. The Prowlers answered with three consecutive pins to take the lead 21-17.

After the 12th bout, TMBW retook the lead with a score of 30-24. Mason Iverson came out and won by a fall giving the team six more points to tie it up at 30-30.
The final decision came down to the Heavy Weight bout. The Prowlers sent out Jolson Sargent in hopes for a win.
Jolson fought through two, 2 minute periods and was coming up short with a score of 1-8 going into the final 2 minute period. 27 seconds into the 3rd period, Jolson got in his tie up and with a throw pinned his opponent, which sent the Prowler wrestling team and fans to their feet as Jolson sealed the victory over TMBW, 36-32.
The Prowlers went on to the championship pool on Saturday, January 11. They faced three new opponents - Bemidji, LPGE-Browerville Wolves, and Big Lake. Bemidji defeated the Prowlers 48-27, LPGE-Browerville defeated the Prowlers 49-15, and in a back and forth match up against Big Lake, the Prowlers came out victorious by criteria after a 39-39 tie in regular bouts.
The Prowler Wrestling Team took 3rd place out of 16 teams at the Rick Lee Varsity Duals held 1/10-1/11 in Bemidji.

mare.

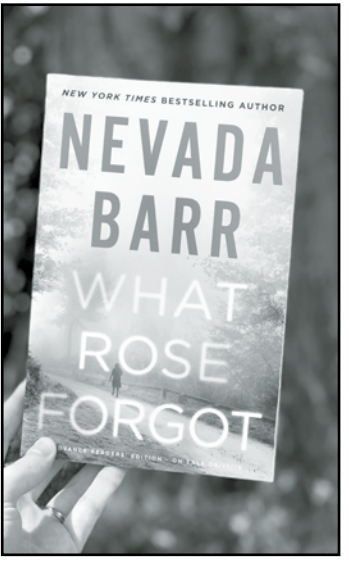
The book is called *What
Rose Forgot*. Here is a quick
summary for you that I took
from Barnes and Noble online.

Summary: Rose Dennis
wakes up in a hospital gown,
her brain in a fog, only to dis-
cover that she's been commit-
ted to an Alzheimer's Unit in
a nursing home. With no
memory of how she ended up
in this position, Rose is sure
that something is very wrong.
When she overhears one of the
administrators saying about
her that she's "not making it
through the week," Rose is con-
vinced that if she's to survive,
she has to get out of the nurs-
ing home. She avoids taking
her medication, putting on a

show for the aides, then stages
her escape.

The only problem is—how
does she convince anyone that
she's not actually demented?
Her relatives were the ones
to commit her, all the legal
papers were drawn up, the
authorities are on the side of
the nursing home, and even
she isn't sure she sounds com-
pletely sane. But any lingering
doubt Rose herself might have
had is erased when a would-be
killer shows up in her house in
the middle of the night. Now

granddaughter Mel, and Mel's

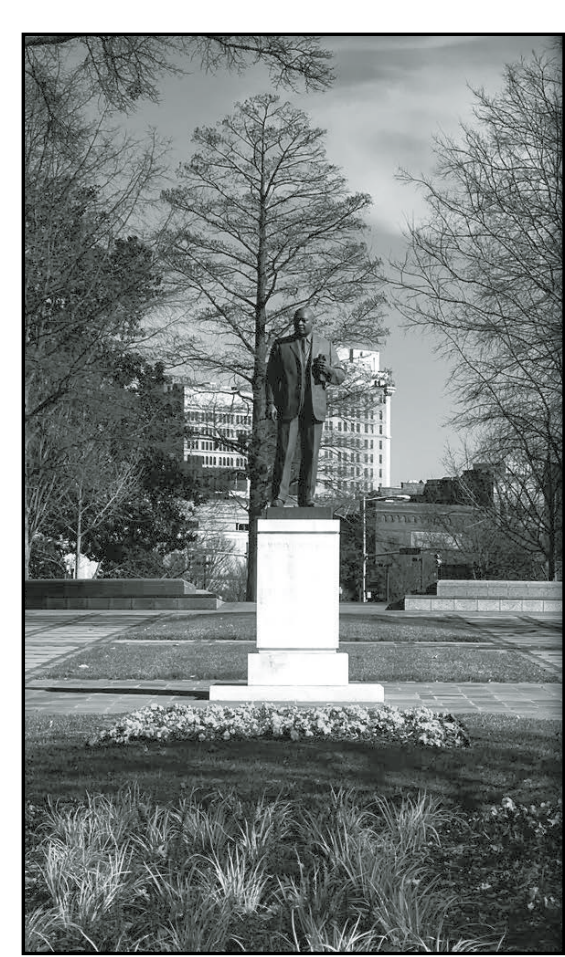

Only in Minnesota: a new addition to the Eagle

Did you know? Betty Crocker, a fictional character created by General Mills, had her start in Minneapolis. She started on a radio show and

was voiced by Agnes White. A hike through this 400-acre woods in Minnesota is like a trip back to the 1800s Here in Minnesota, most of our old ghost towns are long past the point of return. The buildings are gone, the roads are abandoned, and any people once there have long since fled. But there's one old village still standing that hosts plenty of visitors every year. It's hidden away deep in the woods of southern Minnesota, but it's well worth the drive. Take a look:

Forestville is a tiny former village that is now part of Forestville/Mystery Cave State Park. You'll find it at 21071

County Rd. 118, Preston, MN 55965. Forestville is nestled deep in southern Minnesota. Visiting this 425-acre park is a wonderful way to explore rural Minnesota's backroads. When you arrive, you can take a walk across the historic Forestville bridge. Built in 1900, it's a replacement for a previous bridge that was washed away by flooding. When you enter Forestville itself, you'll be completely charmed by the historic buildings that date back to the mid-1800s. The town had more than 100 residents by 1858, becoming a center of trading for this rural region of Minnesota. Though the town slowly faded

when it was bypassed by a railroad, you can still see evidence of its prosperity. The general store still houses things you could have purchased over 150 years ago. There's also an old carriage on the premises, just like those driven back in the 1850s. You can even peek into an old storage area where carriages were once kept. Forestville is a fascinating look at Minnesota life way back in the 1800s. The charming old buildings tell the story of people long ago. Planning an outing? Take a drive along the beautifully wooded backroads of southern Minnesota to this little-known historic village. Enjoy all the photos below!



Marshall County FSA Office encourages producers to attend 2018 Farm Bill informational meeting on January 21

The Marshall County Farm Service Agency (FSA) Office and the University of Minnesota Extension Service are hosting a 2018 Farm Bill Informational Meeting on Tuesday, January 21, 2020, from 9:30 a.m. – 11:30 a.m. at the Newfolden Community Center located at 164 Bakke Ave in Newfolden, MN. Preregistration is not required, and the meeting is free and open to the public. Meeting attendees will learn about Farm Service Agency (FSA) 2018 Farm Bill Programs including Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC). The ARC Program is an income support program that provides payments when actual crop revenue declines below a specified guarantee level. The PLC Program provides income support payments when the effective price for a covered commodity falls below its effective reference price. Learning more about ARC and PLC is extremely important for producers who must make a one-time decision about ARC or PLC election effective for 2019 and 2020, and a 2020 PLC yield update. An FSA representative will be in attendance to present ARC and PLC policy and procedure and answer policy related questions.

Producers will need to communicate with landowners on program decisions. For instance, yield updates are landowner decisions, while other program decisions (ARC or PLC elections) are made by the farm operator. SIMPLY DELICIOUS

Pan-fried cinnamon bananas

These only take a few minutes to make and transform boring old bananas into a drool-worthy snack or dessert. Enjoy these all on their own or serve over ice cream, yogurt or even over pancakes or French toast. They're caramelized on the outside with a soft and sweet inside and definitely best served hot. Sidenote: I wouldn't recommend using overripe bananas. The bananas get softer when you cook them, so over ripe bananas would get really mushy.

2 bananas, cut into ½" pieces
½ teaspoon Cinnamon
1 tablespoon butter
2 tablespoons honey
Combine the cinnamon, butter and honey in a frying pan over medium-high heat until melted and combined. Add the banana slices and cook for about 4 minutes until the bottoms start to caramelize and turn golden brown. Adjust the temperature and cooking time as needed so that they don't burn. Flip all the banana pieces and cook for another 4 minutes until the other side is golden brown. Serve immediately.

Fabian responds to state disaster assistance authorizations

Governor Walz notified the Legislature this week that several Minnesota counties qualified for disaster assistance due to the flooding that occurred this fall. This authorized the Department of Public Safety Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management to provide public assistance, allocate state disaster assistance funds as necessary, and provide additional assistance if requested by local governments. Representative Dan Fabian, R-Roseau, released the following statement regarding the authorizations.

“I am glad to see the Governor has authorized disaster assistance due to the flooding we saw this fall,” said Fabian. “Our area has been hard hit by heavy rain, and this is a welcome development as we continue to deal with the aftermath of this incredibly difficult time. These authorizations will go a long way toward helping ease the financial burdens faced by the people of Marshall, Kittson, and Roseau Counties.” Rep. Fabian previously requested a disaster declaration following the flooding in October.
