Goodridge-Grygla 500 USXC Snowmobile Race comes to town next month

The weekend of February 7th -9th will be a busy and action-packed weekend that many have, once again, been busy planning and gearing up for and YOU can be a part of it all! The United States X-Country (USXC) Snowmobile Racing presents the Goodridge-Grygla 500 taking place February 8-9, 2020. With 500 miles of ditch, river, woods and cross-country, the winner will be named the best cross-country racer in the world, and it's all happening right here!

With 17 specific classes, multiple age groups, all skill levels and over 50 entries so far, all USXC classes will run plus new additional classes for the first time racer. There will be many more entries to come as racers have until the night before to sign up. New this year is the 286 Snow Series, which is a kids snow cross for ages 4-17 on 120's up to 200 cc sleds. USXC now has the detailed map for the routes of the race. Pictured is the Saturday (Day

1) loop, which is a 125 miles that the racers will do twice; a fuel stop will be east of the Smiley Bridge this day. The Sunday (Day 2) loop is also 125 miles that will be completed twice and runs north to Grygla with a fuel stop at Grande Corner; this stop also provides a lot of space for spectators!

There are lots of activities being planned by local sportsman's clubs, including an autograph session with the racers on Friday, February 7th, at the Goodridge Lion's Hall from 5-7pm.

Nicole Kiesow, coordinator of the big event, said there will be open pits so folks can see the racers work and check out their impressive trailers. The pits are located south of the old DW's in the field, which is also where the start and finish line will be.

Race Check-in will be at the Goodridge Lion's Hall on Friday, February 7th, from 3-7pm with the autograph session being held from 5-7pm.

Saturday's race begins at 9am in Goodridge. Food will be available each day by Goodridge High School groups as a fundraising activity. After the race is completed, there will be a band Saturday night

at the Goodridge Municipal Liquor Store.

Sunday's race also begins at 9am in Goodridge. There will be an awards ceremony at the end of the day at the Goodridge Lion's Hall. All are welcome to attend.

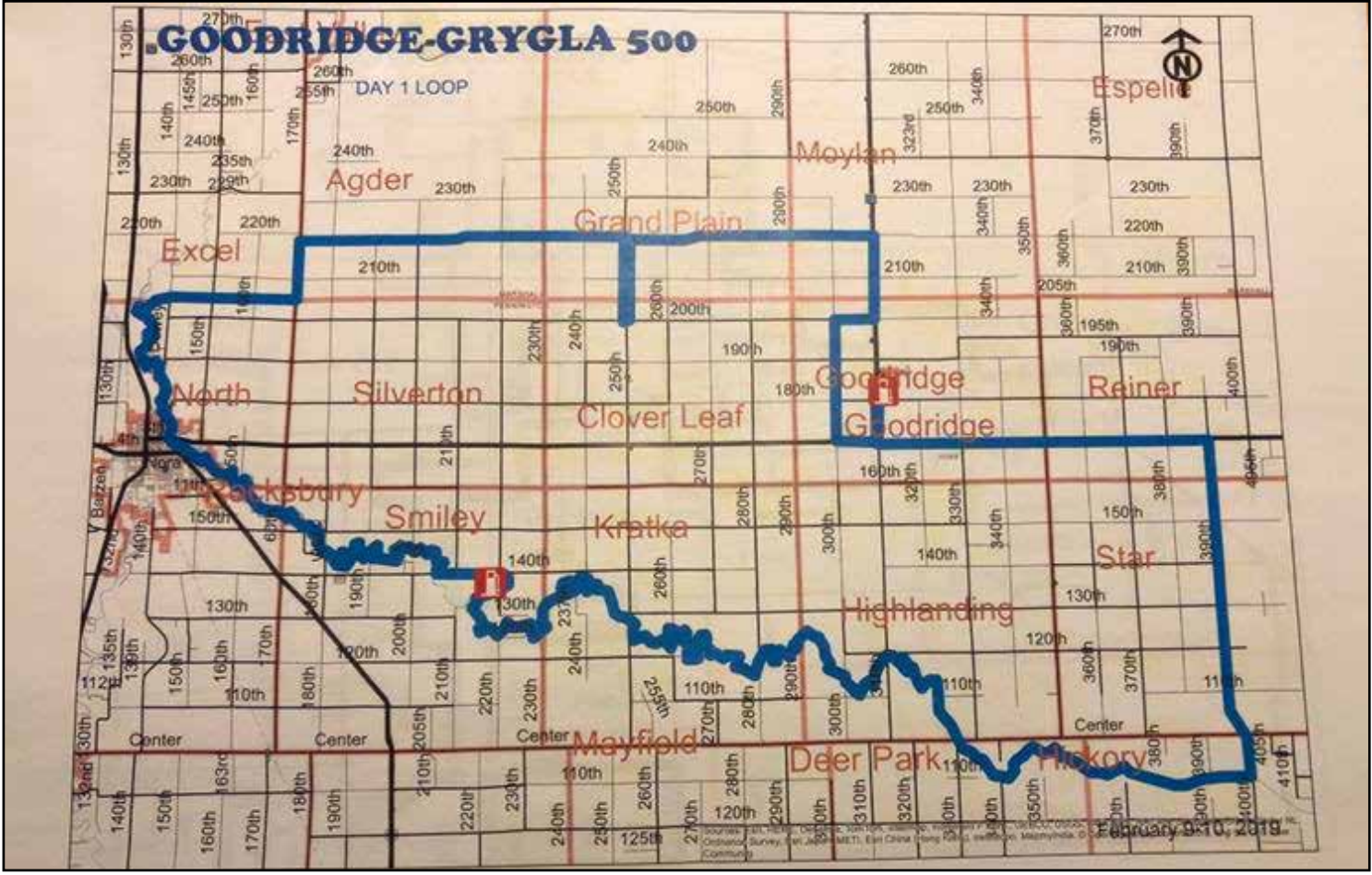

Goodridge School holds Snowfest this week

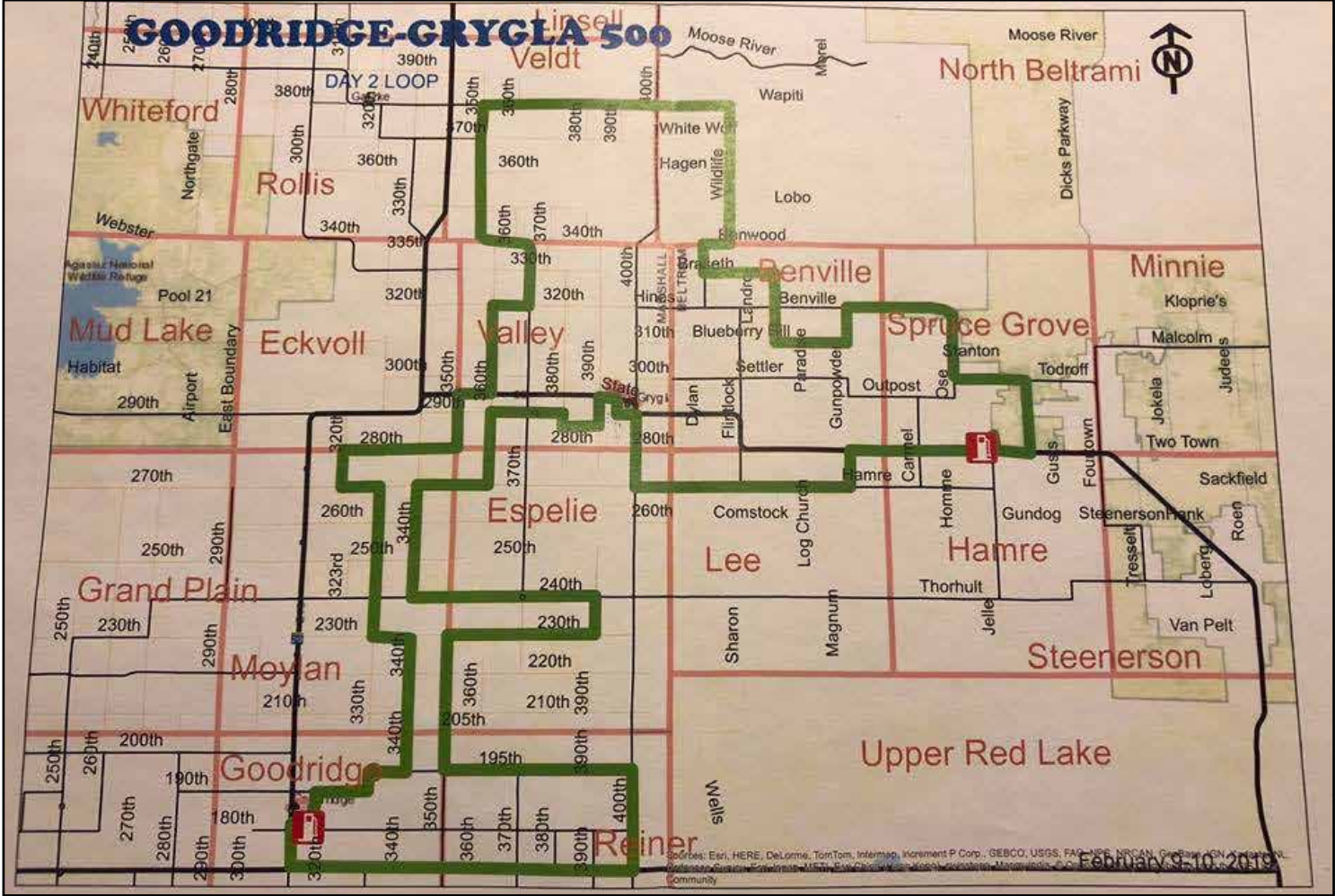

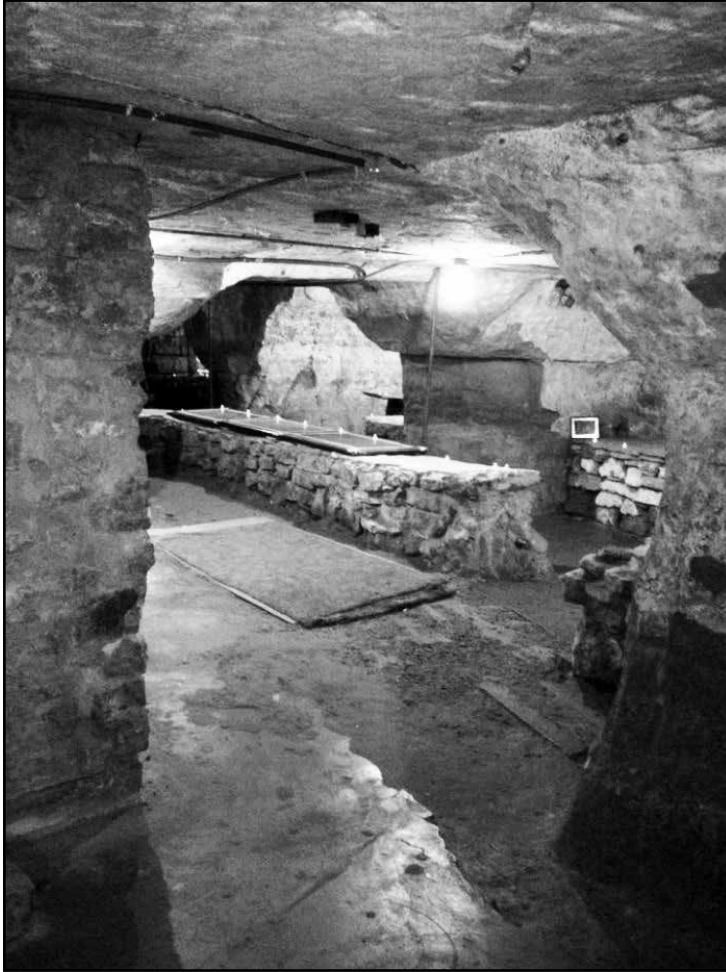

DNR seeks to fill up to 200 paid summer internships

Corn and Soybean Planting Date Survey: Seeking your help

The extremely wet conditions of 2019 in Minnesota led to planting delays and unprecedented levels of prevent plant acres. Where planting delays continued late into the growing season, farmers needed to decide whether or not to plant a crop during or after the late planting date for crop insurance. Historical planting date information was helpful but limited for planting dates in June (corn for grain) and July (corn for silage and soybean).

University of MN Extension is asking farmers to share their experiences from 2019 to help increase our knowledge base on the impacts of late planting and other weather-related factors on yield and grain moisture in corn and soybean. This information will be used to help fill knowledge gaps in the decision-making progress if/when we are faced with a late-planting situation in the

future. This information may also be used to help identify future research needs.

Information requested includes corn or soybean maturity, planting and harvest dates, yield, moisture, test weight, conditions at planting, and conditions following planting. Information is requested from as many fields as farmers wish to report on and planting dates ranging from the earliest to the latest planted crops. Results will be shared with researchers in IL and OH who are conducting a similar survey.

If you planted corn or soybean in MN in 2019, please see z.umn.edu/plantingdatesurvey for more details and to participate in the survey. Participation is completely voluntary and information provided will remain anonymous. We will collect this data until March 6, 2020. We thank all respondents in advance for their participation!

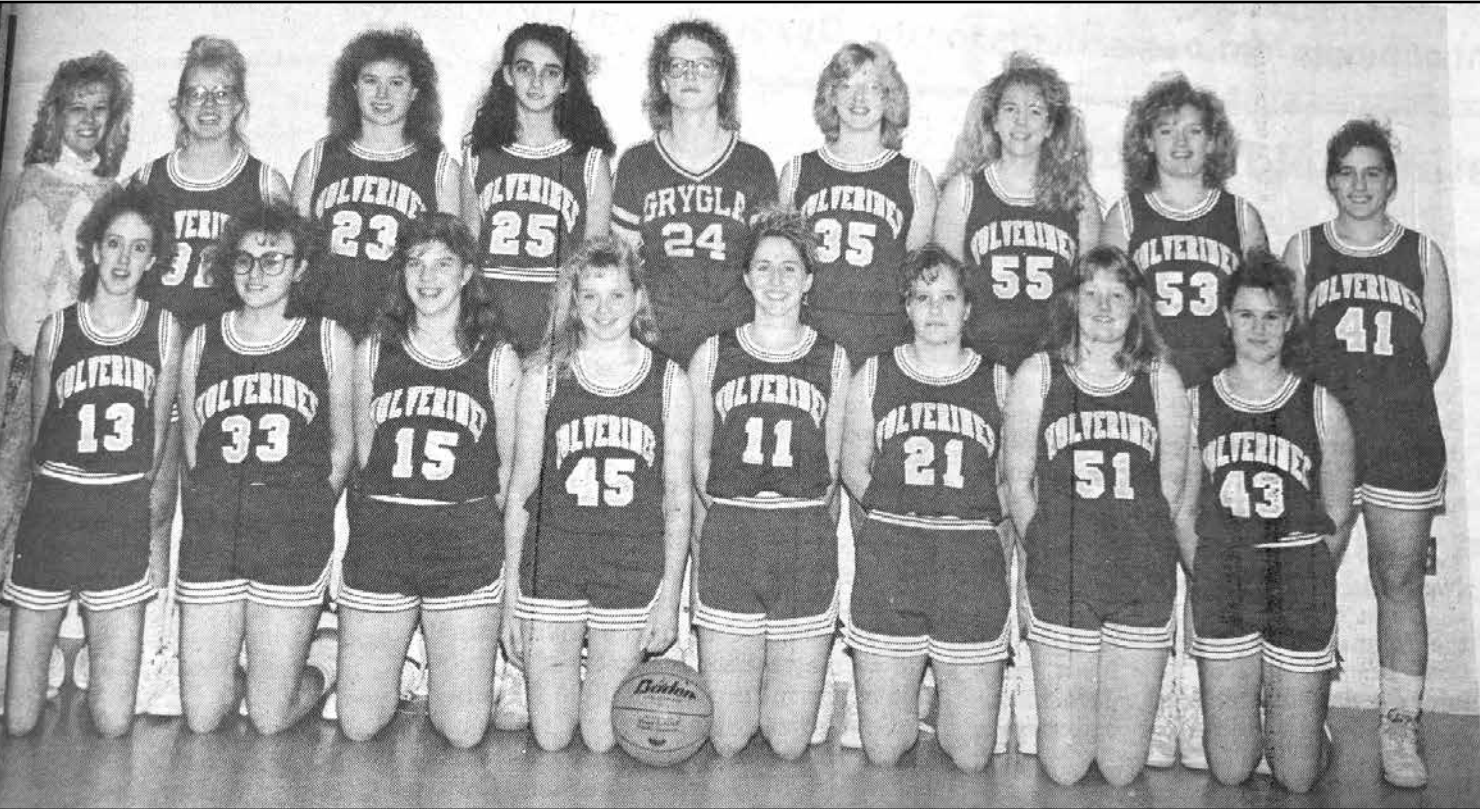

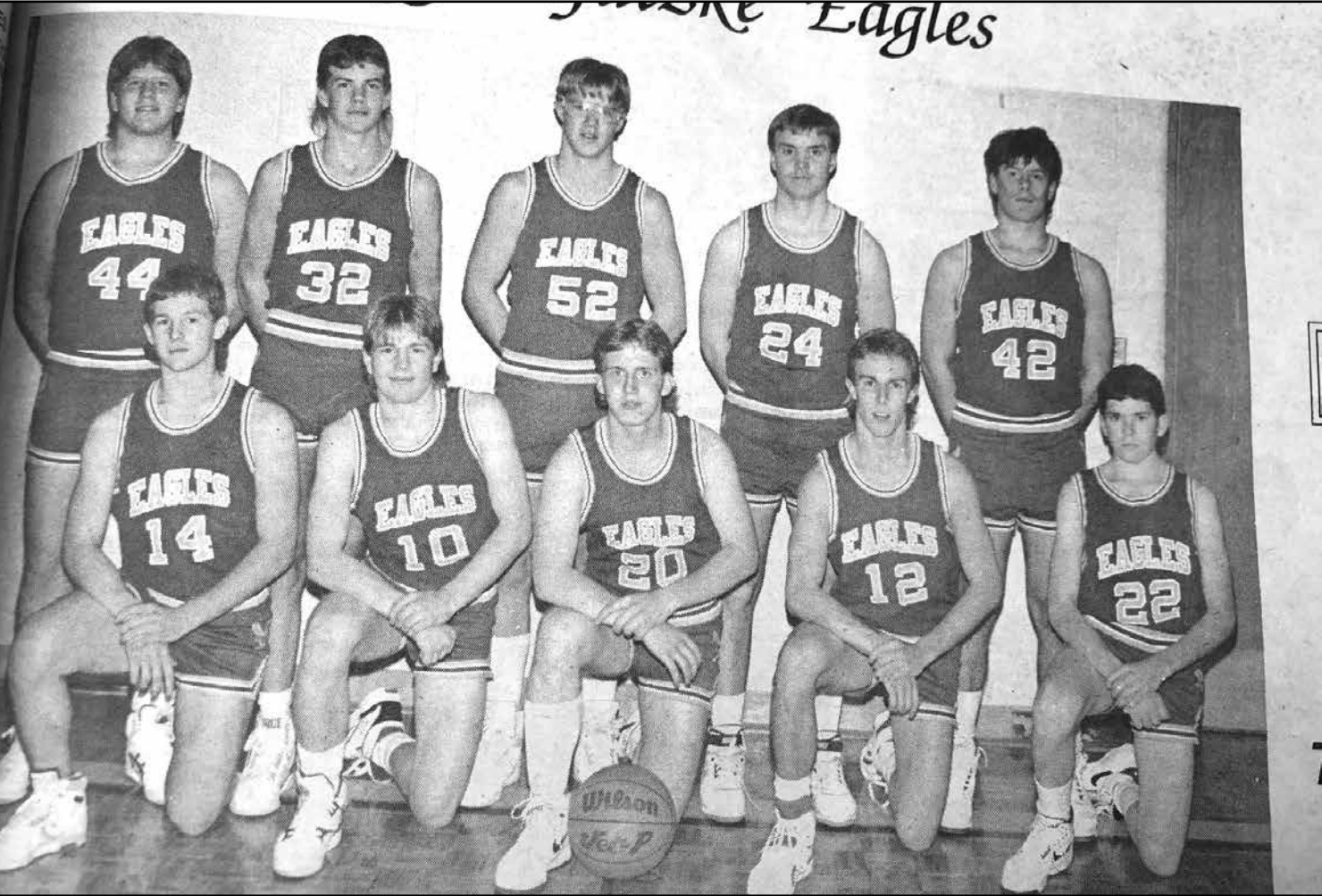

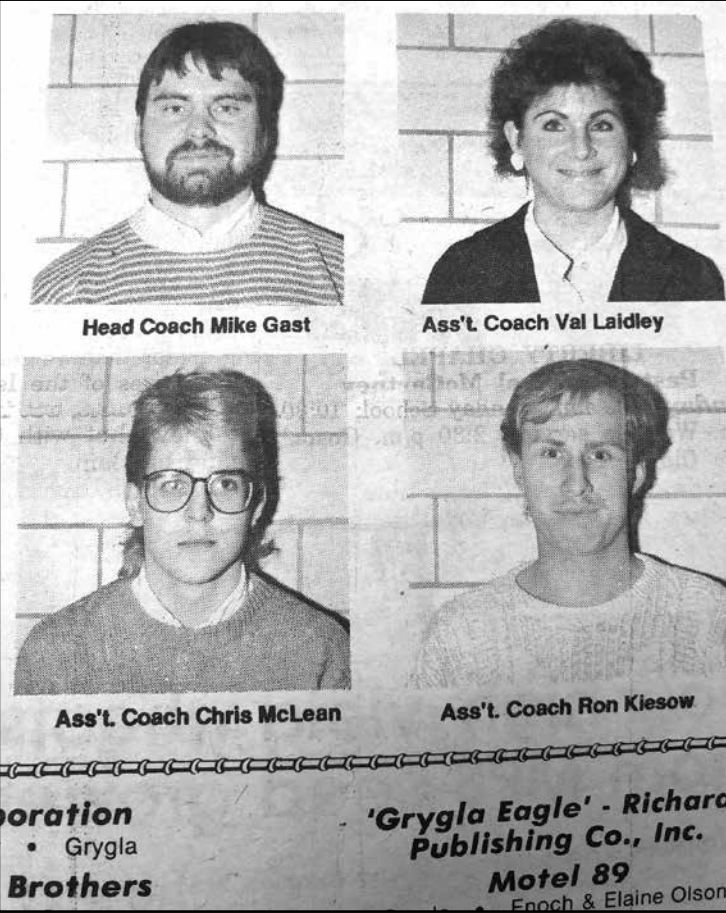
