Somebody made a forest shaped exactly like Minnesota and it's absolutely incredible

Did you know there's a forest in Minnesota that is shaped just like our state? It's true! A few years ago, someone discovered the forest while tinkering with Google Earth. As people

became interested in the trees and their mysterious origin, more details came to light. Here's what we know today:

Take a good look at the photo. Can you see it? If you've got eagle eyes, you probably noticed a small patch of green in the center-left of the photo. At first glance, it looks like just

another stand of trees. But look closer...

...and you'll see that it's a forest shaped exactly like Minnesota. Turns out, this patch of state-shaped woods has been around for at least 25 years. It was created by a DNR forester with just a compass and a map. The shape was created by cut-

ting away a section of trees shaped like Minnesota. Over time, the trees grew back into the shape of our state.

The forest is close to the Canadian border near Faunce Forest Road SW in Williams, Minnesota.



Deadline to enroll in Annual Farm Program

The Marshall, Pennington, and Red Lake, County Farm Service Agency (FSA) Offices want to remind area producers that March 16, 2020, is the deadline for producers to make the one-time unanimous election decision on whether to enroll crop acreage bases in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs.

Producers are also reminded that March 16, 2020 is the deadline to enroll farm(s) in the ARC/PLC program for the 2019 crop year.

If a program election is not made by the deadline the farm will automatically be defaulted to the previous election(s) on the farm under the 2014 Farm Bill for the 2019 & 2020 crop years and would not be eligible for any potential payments earned for 2019.

Starting with the 2021 crop year producers can make annual elections on the farm for the 2021, 2022, and 2023 crop

years.

To better serve producers the ARC/PLC Program election process is being conducted by appointment.

The decision to choose which program(s) to elect is made by all producers on the farm who have an interest in a commodity on the farm. If the farm is cash rented, then the decision can be made by the operator. If it is share rent, then the operator, and any producer(s) who have a share in a crop(s) on the farm, would have to make a unanimous decision on program(s) election and sign the applicable forms by the March 16 deadline.

The ARC-County (ARC-CO) program provides revenue loss coverage at the county level. ARC-CO payments are issued when the actual county crop revenue for a covered commodity is less than the ARC-CO guarantee for the covered commodity.

The ARC-CO guarantee

equals 86 percent of the previous five-year national Market Year Average (MYA) price, excluding the years with the highest and lowest price, multiplied by the five-year average county yield, excluding the years with the highest and lowest yields.

The PLC program payments are issued when the effective price, the higher of the MYA or national loan rate for the covered commodity, is less than the reference price for the applicable covered commodity.

ARC-CO & PLC payments are not dependent on the crops planted or considered planted on the farm for the current year but are determined by the applicable bases on the farm.

ARC-Individual Coverage (ARC-IC) program provides revenue loss coverage at the farm level. ARC-IC revenue loss payments are made when the current year revenue for the ARC-IC farm for all covered commodities planted on the ARC-IC farm falls below

86 percent of the ARC-IC farm benchmark revenue.

Prevented plant acreage is not included in ARC-IC current year revenue unless 100% of the covered commodities on the ARC-IC farm were approved for prevented planting by FSA. An ARC-IC farm includes all farms within a State that the applicable producer elected ARC-IC coverage.

The decision to elect ARC-CO or PLC is made on a commodity-by commodity basis on the applicable farm. If ARC-IC is elected, then all covered commodities on the farm are enrolled in ARC-IC.

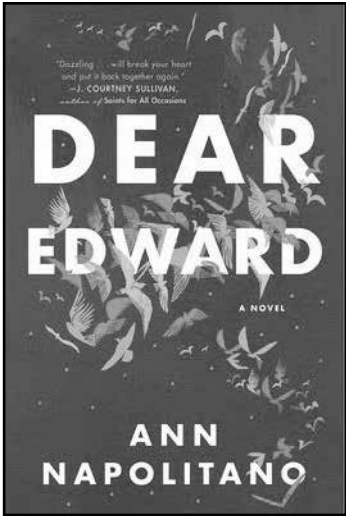

Sheet Pan Pancakes

Quick and easy breakfast idea for sleepovers, holidays, brunches, or large families! The easiest way to make everyone happy. In fact, you could make a couple of sheets and top each one a little differently. The topping options are endless: berries, chocolate chips, banana slices, cinnamon, walnuts, peanut butter, whatever. Go crazy.

Flipping pancakes doesn't seem like a big chore, but it's way quicker and easier to make them in a sheet pan. They're all done at the same time so everyone can enjoy a hot breakfast together. Extra bonus: the butter's also brushed on as soon as it's out of the oven, so no passing the butter tray around the table!

- Ingredients:
- 4 cups Bisquick Pancake Mix
 - 2 cups milk
 - 4 eggs
 - Toppings of your choice
 - 8 tbsp butter, melted

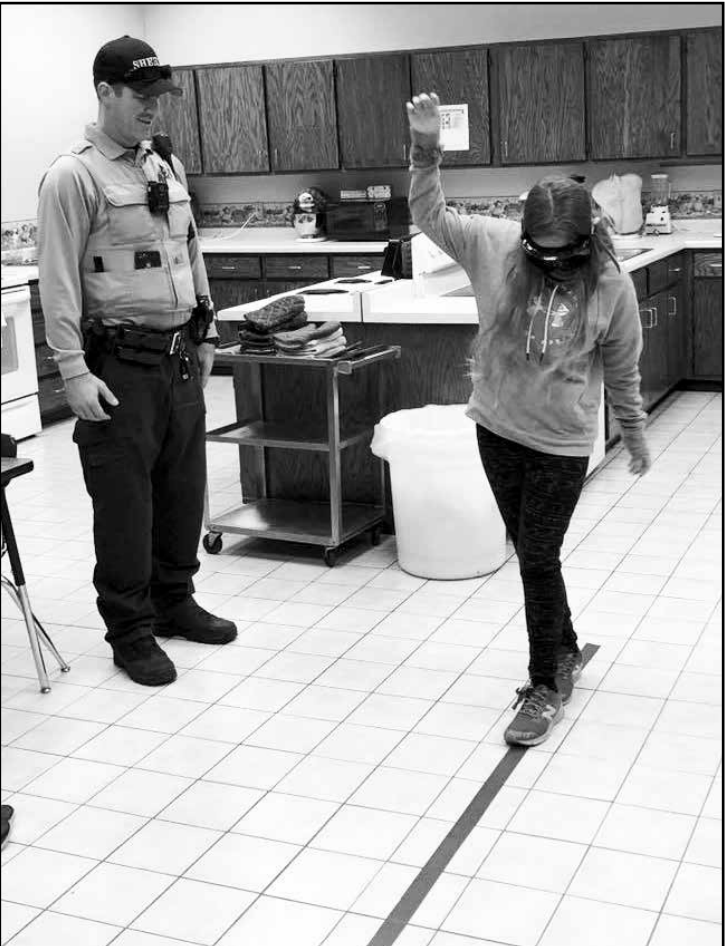
Instructions:
