Greetings from the Grygla Fire Department

We hope this letter finds you well, and that your family has been able to stay in good health. Usually about this time of the year, we send out letters inviting people to our annual Firemen's Supper. Unfortunately, due to recommendations by the CDC in response to COVID-19, we will not be holding a meal this year.

During the past year, the fire department has responded to 53 calls. This included 8 wildland/grass fires, 3 structure fires, 6 auto/atv accidents, and 30 medical calls. We also had 2 alarm activation/ service calls. Have you checked your smoke detector recently?

We have had an active year with non-emergency events as well. We provided fire and rescue service at the Fall Festival Demo Derby. During fire prevention week, we invited elementary students into the fire hall to learn about fire safety, and to handle some of the equipment we use in emergency situations. We also participated with the school on a mock fire drill. In February, we provided assistance with the Goodridge/Grygla 500 snowmobile

race. This winter, we were able to purchase new battery powered vehicle extrication tools and upgrade medical equipment in the ambulance. Polaris donated a new snowmobile for us to use for winter emergencies. We are in the process of purchasing new communication devices that utilize the 800 mhz ARMER system.

We would like to acknowledge the support of all the individuals, businesses, service clubs, and civic organizations in our area. With your generous donations, we have been able to make improvements to our equipment, attend trainings, and maintain our Fire Hall.

The Grygla Fire Department serves 6 townships in Marshall County, 8 townships in Beltrami County, and provides mutual aid (when requested) to the surrounding departments in Goodridge, Middle River, and Roseau.

Grygla/Gatzke Food Shelf update

This has been a crazy busy week for us trying to keep up on the latest information and guidelines for the food shelf. We thought we had it under control with limiting our clients to one person in the food shelf at a time, but after a web streaming program with the Minnesota Department of Human Services last Friday afternoon, this has changed. We will be doing the food packing for our clients, as they will no longer be allowed to have contact with any food items. We have been one of the food shelves that have allowed our clients to choose their own foods, but in the future, we are going to have to give them pre packed boxes instead. This is because we get Federal TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program) foods and we have to follow their guidelines. We have another conference call for all the meal sites, food shelves, pantries, etc. that receive food from North Country Food Bank scheduled for Monday, so we are continuing to get updates.

I have also filled out a survey with Hunger Solutions (and expect more will be coming) as to how it is impacting our area and what our prior-

ity needs are. This is the part of the Federal "Family First" legislation passed to help with those impacted by COVID19 that deals with getting funding to food shelves.

All this is happening when we are usually holding our big fundraiser for the year. Now with church services being temporally suspended and the school closed (they were planning a food drive the last week of March), we have taken a real hit in food donations. Food donations may still be left at the Grygla Coop store as there is still a need and we don't know how this may impact our food shelf in the coming weeks. The 2020 Minnesota Food Share March Campaign for Hunger Awareness has extended the deadline to participate in the March Campaign until April 30th. Hopefully things will be looking up by then.

Financial donations can be sent to the treasurer of the Grygla/Gatzke Food Shelf, Lori Thompson, 222 Evelyn Avenue, P. O. Box 105, Grygla, MN, 56727. Also, if you bank locally at the American State Bank, you can call them to make an electronic transfer to the food shelf.

The purpose of this meeting is to determine whether property in the jurisdiction has been properly valued and classified by the assessor. If you believe the value or classification of your property is incorrect, please contact your assessor's office to discuss your concerns. If you disagree with the valuation or classification after discussing it with your assessor, you may appear before the local board of appeal and equalization. The board will review your assessment and may make corrections as needed. Generally, you must appeal to the local board before appealing to the county board of appeal and equalization.

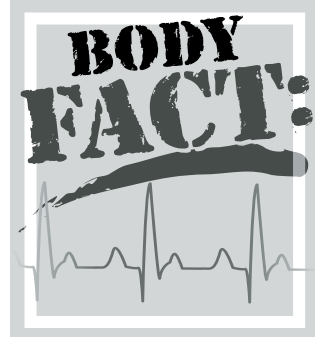

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

This waterfall in Minnesota is so hidden, you'll probably have it all to yourself!

Here in Minnesota, we're lucky to have plenty of incredible waterfalls in every corner of the state. Our most popular, Gooseberry Falls and Minnehaha Falls, draw crowds just about every day of the year. But what about when you want to go somewhere a bit more

quiet?

There's one lesser known state park in Minnesota that is home to an even lesser known waterfall.

Nerstrand-Big Woods State Park is located in southern Minnesota, about an hour south of Minneapolis. The address is 9700 170th St. E., Nerstrand, MN 55053. The park is home to more than 2,800 acres of southern Minnesota's beau-

tiful landscape. There are 11 miles of hiking trails. These lead through a huge oak savannah prairie that offers some of the best scenery around. In warmer months, you may get lucky and spot some native Minnesota wildflowers. In the fall, the park gets even more beautiful. The trails will lead you through a forest blazing with color. You won't be able to take your eyes off the oranges,

yellows, and reds of the canopy. But Nerstrand-Big Woods State Park holds an even bigger surprise: Hidden Falls. This little-known waterfall on Prairie Creek runs over the 500 million-year-old limestone deposits in the area. And because the park is lesser known, you're likely to have the waterfall all to yourself.

Peterson announces U.S.-Canada border restrictions

Congressman Collin Peterson announced new restrictions at the border between the United States and Canada, which will be put into place by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) starting March 21, 2020, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The restrictions mean that travelers will no longer be permitted to cross the border for recreation or tourism, but that essential travel will continue. The bilateral deal to restrict travel across the U.S.-Canada border has a 30-day sunset clause.

"In my district, commerce doesn't stop at the border," said Peterson. "I will work with the Administration to ensure these restrictions are time-limited and implemented in good faith on both sides of the border as an added layer of protection in the efforts to lessen the impact of COVID-19."

Minnesota shares a 547-mile border with the Canadian provinces of Manitoba and Ontario. There are five border crossings in the Seventh District, including Baudette, Lancaster, Piney Creek-Piney, Roseau and Warroad.

The notification of temporary travel restrictions at Land Ports of Entry defines essential travel as follows: For purposes of the temporary alteration in certain designated ports of entry operations authorized under 19 U.S.C. 1318(b)(1)(C) and (b)(2), travel through the land ports of entry and ferry terminals along the United States-Canada border shall be limited to "essential travel," which in-

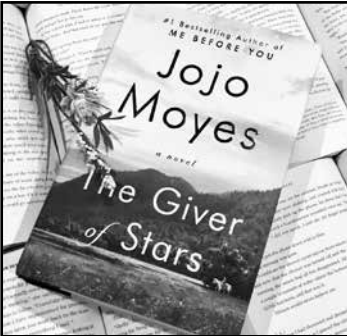

cludes, but is not limited to—

- U.S. citizens and lawful permanent residents returning to the United States;
- Individuals traveling for medical purposes (e.g., to receive medical treatment in the United States);
- Individuals traveling to attend educational institutions;
- Individuals traveling to work in the United States (e.g., individuals working in the farming or agriculture industry who must travel between the United States and Canada in furtherance of such work);
- Individuals traveling for emergency response and public health purposes (e.g., government officials or emergency responders entering the United States to support Federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial government efforts to respond to COVID-19 or other emergencies);
- Individuals engaged in lawful cross-border trade (e.g., truck drivers supporting the movement of cargo between the United States and Canada);
- Individuals engaged in official government travel or diplomatic travel;

- Members of the U.S. Armed Forces, and the spouses and children of members of the U.S. Armed Forces, returning to the United States; and
- Individuals engaged in military-related travel or operations.

The following travel does not fall within the definition of “essential travel” for purposes of this Notification—

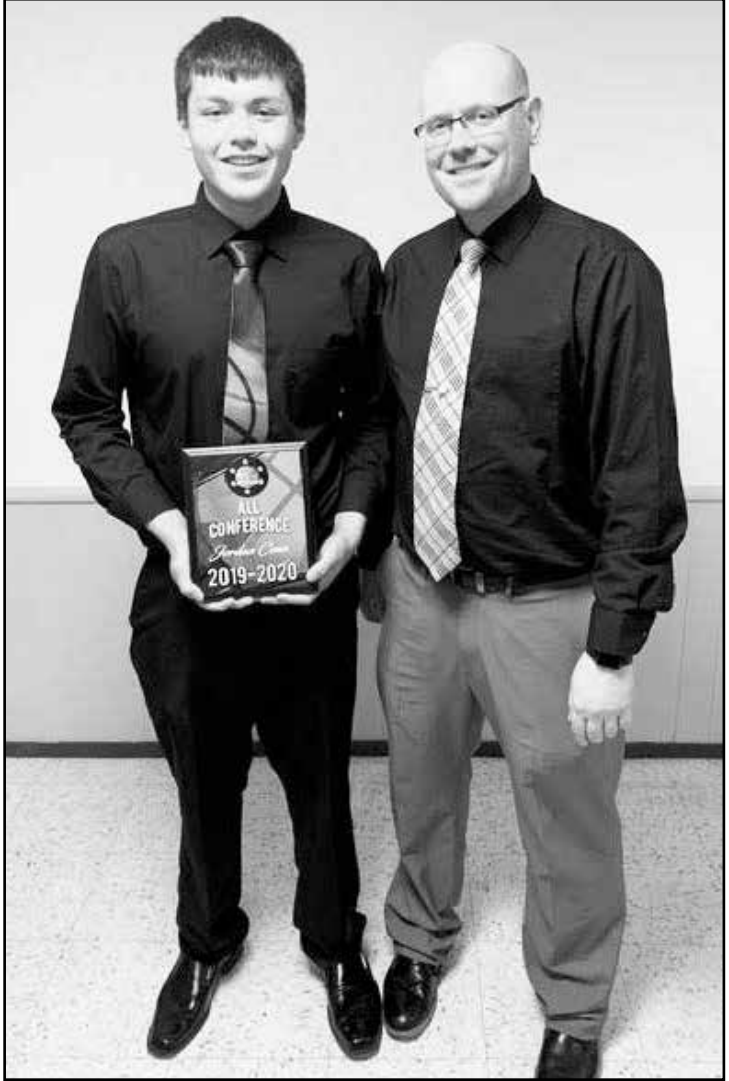
- Individuals traveling for tourism purposes (e.g., sight-seeing, recreation, gambling, or attending cultural events).

At this time, this Notification does not apply to air, freight rail, or sea travel between the United States and Canada, but does apply to passenger rail and ferry travel between the United States and Canada.

These restrictions are temporary in nature and shall remain in effect until 11:59 p.m. EDT on April 20, 2020.

Peterson is a member of the Northern Border Caucus. The Northern Border constitutes the longest land boundary between two countries in the world. At 5,525 miles, approximately 400,000 people and over \$1.6 billion in goods cross the border daily through more than 120 ports of entry.

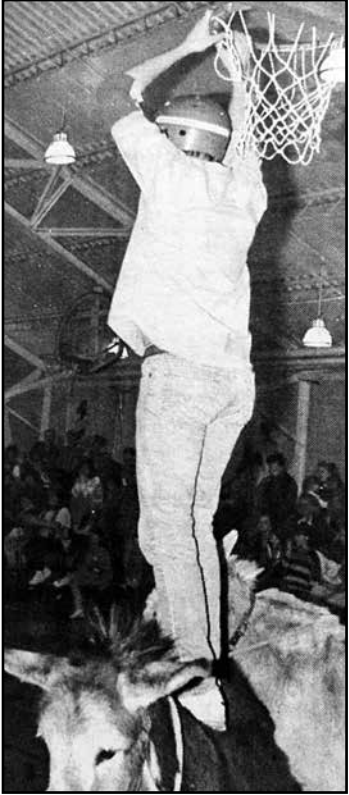

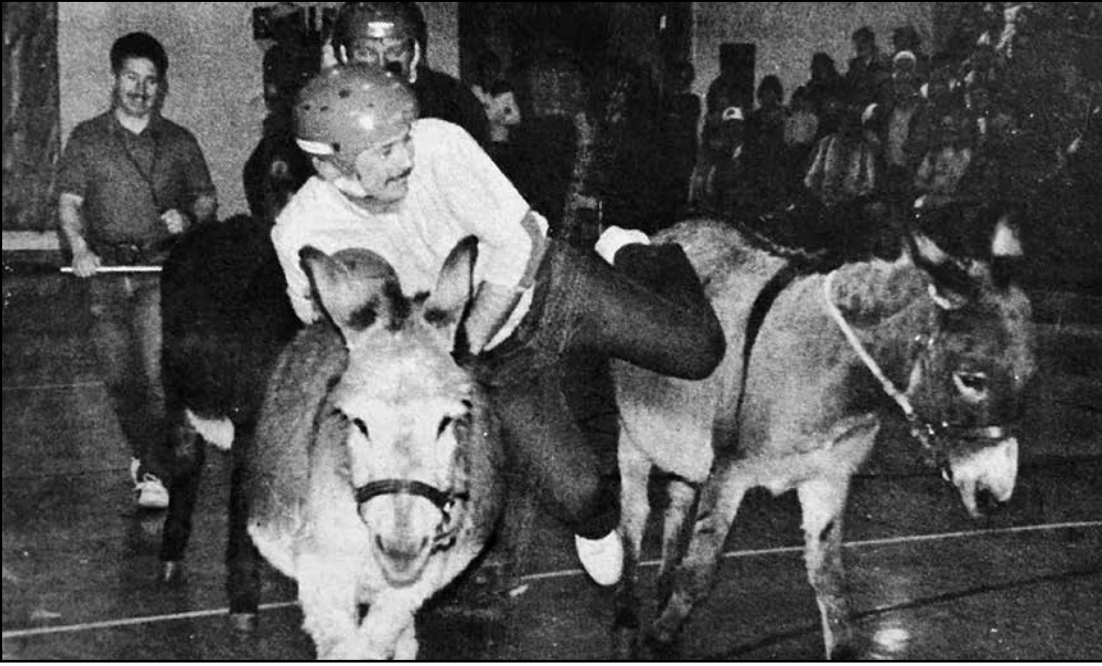
