Graduation ceremonies to be held this weekend

Grygla Graduation information
Grygla's graduation ceremony will be held at the football field this Saturday, May 16th, at 2pm. It will be streamed via Facebook Live that day and also aired on Lake Country KQ92 (92.5 FM) for anyone wanting to listen; it will also be shown at a later date on GVTV Channel 36.
Due to the current Governor's orders, the ceremony in Grygla will proceed as follows:
From 12pm-1:45pm, there will be a card drop-off station set up on the east side of the Grygla School. A supervised table will be set up for anyone wanting to drop off cards for the graduates. The Commencement Ceremony will begin at 2pm for family and students only. Family cars (2 per family maximum) are asked to be parked along the west side of the football field with people entering the southeast corner of the field. There will be student speeches, a welcome address, honor student addresses, and the diploma, scholarship and flower presentation.
Diplomas, scholarship awards and flowers will be on a table in the middle of the field. The student, along with their parents/step-parents only will come out. Mr. Derek Gieseke will announce the graduate's name. As they walk out with their parents, Mr. Jamie Lunsetter will announce the scholarships. Each student will pick up their own diploma on a disinfected table. Their parents will flip the tassel on the graduates mortar boards, then walk over to the scoreboard, which will be lit up with 2020, for a photo. Both the yearbook and newspaper will be in attendance to take photos. The student and their family will then return to their vehicle before the next graduate comes onto the field.
Grygla Class of 2020 consists of 10 students. See the back page

for the complete list of graduates.
After the ceremony, roughly 2:45pm, the Grygla Fire Department will lead the seniors and their parents on a procession around town; Marshall County Sheriff Deputy Ben Kucera will follow behind. Community members, friends, family and neighbors are encouraged to line the streets of Grygla and show your support for our graduates! Please be mindful of the social distancing requirements while still giving the GHS Class of 2020 the fanfare they deserve!
Goodridge Graduation information
The Goodridge School will hold an informal commencement ceremony for the graduating class, and immediate family, on Sunday, May 17th, at 10am in the gymnasium. The public may only attend virtually via a Facebook Live event under the Goodridge Facebook page and on GVTV Channel 36.
After the informal ceremony, there will be a parade in Goodridge from 2-4pm for the graduates that is open to the public. The 15 graduates will be in stationary locations throughout Goodridge and vehicles will drive by and wave/honk/congratulate them on a designated parade route.
The parade route will be shared on the Goodridge School website and Facebook page as we get closer to May 17th. There will be a gift/card drive-thru drop-off site along the parade route for family, friends, and community members to use from 2-4pm that day. On Sunday, August 9th, at 2pm, the Goodridge Public School will be having their formal commencement ceremony for the Class of 2020 that will be open to the public. Details for this event will be available on the Goodridge School website and Facebook page by July 15th.



More healthy meals available to older Minnesotans

Through a new federal grant that is part of the CARES Act, Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota is now able to provide older Minnesotans ages 60+ two meals a day, seven days a week through its LSS Meals service – up from one daily meal.
Since the start of the pandemic, Lutheran Social Service has experienced a dramatic increase in meals requested. More than 120,000 meals have been served since mid-March, an increase of 30 percent over the same period last year.
The availability of additional meals comes at a time of increased demand when many older adults are facing more difficulties securing healthy nutrition.
“While social distancing measures are important for our safety and health, they also have an impact on older adults and nutrition,” explained Kristin Schurrer, senior director of LSS Meals. “It’s a risk for them to go to the grocery store. And adult children or neighbors who might have helped them with shopping or cooking may not be leaving their homes, because of underlying health conditions.”
Lutheran Social Service provides home-delivered and curbside meals to Minnesotans age 60 or older in 39 counties in Minnesota. Federal and community funding allows Lutheran Social Service to provide meals for a suggested donation of \$5 per meal. No diner will be turned away because they can’t afford a meal.
Lutheran Social Service also offers Meals to Go, which ships healthy, affordable frozen meals anywhere in Minnesota. A generous donation from Dr.

Donald Nelson of Northfield recently helped Lutheran Social Service renovate its kitchen in Waterville, Minnesota near Faribault. The newly-refurbished kitchen is also helping to meet a growing need for shipped meals.
Lutheran Social Service will continue offering meals for curbside pickup as well as home-delivered Meals on Wheels left at diners’ doors to limit contact.

MPCA grants aim to strengthen demand for recyclable materials

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) is now offering grants designed to help create a strong, sustainable market for recyclable materials. The MPCA will award a total of \$400,000 in amounts from \$50,000 to \$250,000, to Minnesota businesses or organizations that use recyclable materials in their products. The goal is to help increase both demand for and value of such materials, while also keeping items out of landfills and creating jobs in Minnesota.

Minnesota's recycling manufacturing industry is an important contributor to the state's economy. In recent years, the industry has supported more than 60,000 jobs and more than \$3.4 billion in wages. But in the wake of China refusing to import U.S. recyclables, recycling markets are fragile. This new Recycling Market Development Grants program was approved by the Minnesota Legislature in 2019 to ensure the recycling market remains strong and to protect jobs.

Businesses and nonprofit organizations are encouraged to submit proposals for projects, including research, development, and testing of new or existing recyclable materials as the basis for products. Grants will also support businesses looking to expand their use of recyclable materials with new equipment, facilities, or production methods.

Proposals that increase use of mixed paper, glass, or organics will be given priority, but projects using any type of

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Foster parents needed for kids

Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota (LSS) is seeking foster parents for children and youth in need. If you have a special heart for children, consider becoming a foster parent.

On an average day in 2019, there were approximately 9,300 children in foster care in Minnesota, according to the Minnesota Department of Human Services. Most children are referred to foster care because of parental drug abuse and neglect.

Even amidst COVID-19, Minnesota still has a great need for foster parents to provide safe, supportive homes for children and youth. According to researchers with Harvard University, supportive relationships with adults are key to children developing resiliency.

"It is vital for children in foster care to have support from caring adults during this difficult time in their lives," said Jodi Raidt, statewide program manager with Lutheran Social Service. "We need families who are committed to children's overall wellbeing."

Foster parents can be sin-

gle or married, home owners or renters. Lutheran Social Service is seeking prospective foster parents who have time to listen, support young people through challenges, and provide positive relationships in the family and community. Flexibility, patience, consistency and a healthy sense of humor are also ideal characteristics for foster parents.

Lutheran Social Service provides Therapeutic Foster Care, which is a highly supportive, trauma-informed service. Foster parents receive on-going education and support. Children also receive weekly support from a mental health professional.

The 2020 Minnesota Food Share Campaign has officially ended. Because of the Covid-19, it was extended until April 30th. It ran from March 1st to April 30th. It sure changed our normal fundraising efforts. Still, the Grygla-Gatzke Food Shelf is excited to report that we collected 495 pounds in food donations. This included a couple of larger donations from the Natural Way Mills and Walmart in Thief River Falls, MN. We also collected \$6,225.00 in financial support during this time.

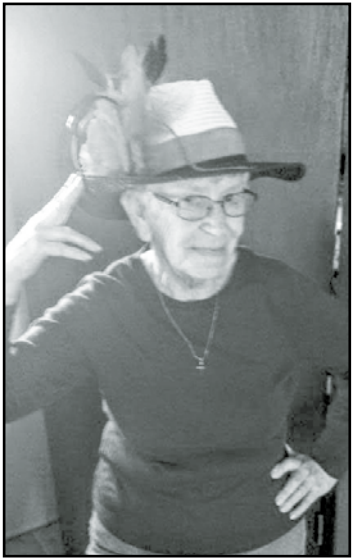
This amount includes \$2,000.00 from Roseau Electric through Operation Round-Up to help get food to people who may need it during the Covid-19 crisis. Besides their grant, we will be receiving a \$2,000.00 grant from the state and we have a \$3,000.00 credit with North Country Food Bank to purchase food during this

pandemic. We are here for ALL who may need a little extra help during these unsettling times, so don't be afraid or embarrassed to ask!

This compares to last year's totals when we collected 1,357 pounds of food and \$4,021.00 in monetary donations and 2018 when 736 pounds of food and \$5,135.00 in donations. The big difference in food donations is the friendly "Pack the Pews" collection from Grace Lutheran Church and food drives held at the Grygla School.

Again, we are overwhelmed by the support of the community, especially during this time of uncertainty. Saying thank you sounds so small compared to all you do to support us, but we really do appreciate it so much. Without the support of our churches, businesses, organizations, individuals, volunteers and our board members, we wouldn't be able to accomplish what we do!

Alright, yes. I get it. This seems like something to share in the fall. But it was discovered while searching online and seemed like a total “of interest” and great thing to share, whether you want to visit NOW or later in the fall, giving you time to plan and get your trip on the calendar!

Let's look at Aamodts Apple Farm in Stillwater, Minnesota.

This Apple Orchard is a place you have to visit. Apples are only the beginning here – the orchard has food stands, fun activities, an on-site vineyard with wine tasting, apple-picking, and a lot of history.

We've got the room on the page, so let's go ALL in and give you the whole picture.

About Aamodts

Harry S. Truman was president. The average American family earned \$2,950 a year. Gas cost 16 cents a gallon. Just a few years post-World War II, young families were filled with optimism and ambition. It was a great time to start something new. For Thor and Lucille Aamodt, the America Dream meant starting their own family-run apple orchard. They purchased a pretty piece of land near Stillwater, Minnesota, that seemed to have just the right soil and climate for growing crisp, juicy apples. And even then it was just a short, scenic drive from Minneapolis and St. Paul.

Thor and Lucille put every-

thing they had into the apple farm. With some seedling apple trees, a well-thought-out plan for planting, help from young son Tom, and a lot of prayers, Aamodt's Apple Farm was born.

A few decades down the road, Tom and his wife, JoAnn, expanded the farm to include over 6,000 apple trees covering more than 50 acres.

Today, the apple farm is run by the third and fourth generations of Aamodt apple growers.

Tom's son, Chris Aamodt, now runs the orchard, along with his wife Billi Jo, sons Andreas, Christopher, Geoffrey, Ian and daughters Laura and Audrey.

Reach up to pick an apple from a tree, and experience a little trip back to a simpler time. Explore the historic buildings on the farm. The 1880s barn and granary are now the heart and soul of our apple store, bakery and winery.

Sustainable & Sensibly Grown

At Aamodt's Apple Farm, we value sustainability. We know that the best way to grow apples is to work with nature, not against it.

Nurtured by Nature

We use agricultural practices that produce the high quality Minnesota apples our customers look forward to every year, while minimizing our impact on the environment. During the growing season, we use only the minimal amount of spray necessary to keep

harmful insects away, protecting our trees and assuring we grow beautiful, healthy apples.

Our growing practices promote the ecology of the orchard by allowing natural processes to replace chemicals in the growing process whenever we can.

Protective of Natural Resources

Did you know that many of the apples sold in grocery stores are grown and shipped from California or even New Zealand? Those apples leave a BIG carbon footprint. Aamodt's apples are Minnesota grown. The trip from our orchard to your driveway requires minimal fuel and produces far less carbon emissions.

Our impact on local water resources is near zero. Aamodt's apples receive water only from the purest source available, Mother Nature—and only when she blesses our trees with precipitation. A large rain garden installed at the orchard slows runoff to help protect Brown's Creek watershed and the beautiful St. Croix River.

Planning for the Future

Apple trees take 3 to 5 years to produce fruit. We are always planning ahead to make sure we continue to produce the most popular apple varieties. Recently, we planted over 300 new trees—mostly Honeycrisp and Sweet RiverBelle apples. We're continuously planning and planting to ensure our family-owned business remains the best apple orchard!

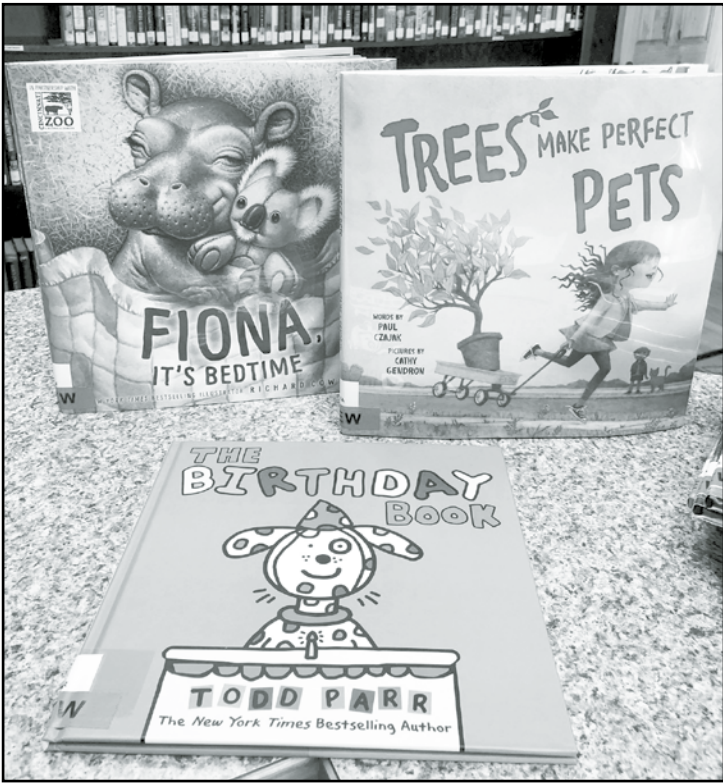

Super quick and easy chicken asparagus stir fry recipe pick for you this week!

INGREDIENTS

1 lb boneless skinless chicken breasts cut into 1-inch pieces

1 tbsp vegetable oil, plus 1 teaspoon

¾ lb asparagus stalks trimmed and cut into 1-inch lengths

1 cup sliced mushrooms

1 tsp minced garlic

¾ cup oyster sauce

¾ cup low sodium chicken broth

2 tsp honey

2 tsp toasted sesame oil

1 tsp soy sauce

1 tsp cornstarch

Salt and pepper to taste

1 tbsp sesame seeds

INSTRUCTIONS

Heat 1 teaspoon of oil in a large pan over medium heat.

Add the asparagus and mushrooms and cook for 2-3 minutes or until just tender. Add the garlic to the pan and cook for 30 seconds more. Remove the vegetables from the pan and place on a plate. Cover the plate with foil to keep warm. Add the remaining tablespoon

Feels like Falling by Kristy Woodson Harvey: It's summertime on the North Carolina coast and the livin' is easy.

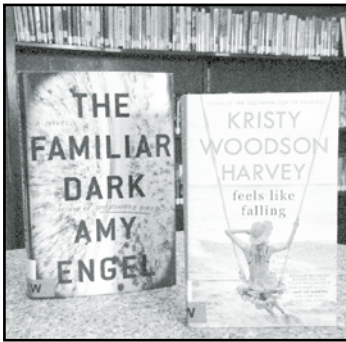

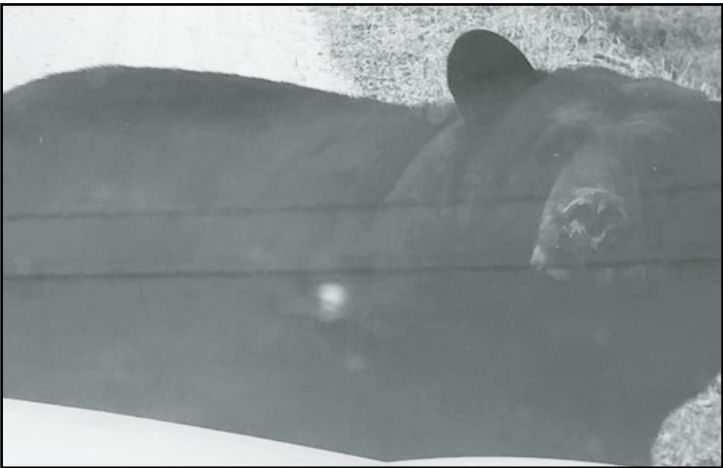
