Carly Lunsetter, age 22, is the daughter of Gene and Jackie Lunsetter. Living in Grand Forks, ND, Carly just graduated this spring from the University of North Dakota

with her Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree. “I have always loved to draw. Growing up, I even got in trouble with some of my teachers for doodling on my homework assignments,” she spilled.

Carly’s drawing skills consist of various materials like pencil, colored pencil and ink pen; she also paints occasionally with either watercolor or acrylic. It was decided early on that she would pursue art as a career.

Before earning her degree, Carly voluntarily took part in a unique exhibit. With the COVID-19 pandemic hanging in the air, the UND Art Collections put together a show titled “Free Time: It’s Not What We Thought It Would Be.” As mentioned, it was a voluntary exhibit for UND students who were interested, with the title giving them a general theme to work with, still allowing each artist the freedom to interpret the title any way they wanted when creating their pieces.

With her current work inspired by nature and plant life, as well as the relationship between humanity and the environment, Carly created “Dormant.”

“I thought the title fit perfectly because dormancy implies that the subject will eventually become active again,” she explained.

Carly went on to talk about her work or art.

“The work is a reflection of my mentality during this diffi-

cult situation that our world is currently in. I’m lucky enough to be in a position where I can stay home until it’s safer to re-enter public spaces, but being isolated for a long period of time comes with its own challenges. The purpose of the vines and flowers growing around the woman depicted is to indicate that time is passing, while the woman’s meditative position and expression are meant to create a sense of purposeful inactivity.”

Carly said that during this pandemic, she has spent a lot of time at home unable to do the things that she would normally do, but is using the free time to self-reflect and grow as both an artist and a person, in general. She’s also trying to maintain a positive attitude, preparing for when the time comes to resume her normal activities.

As for that next step in her journey, the job search is still pending. When the COVID-19 threat settles down, Carly hopes to travel more and look for job opportunities in other parts of the country.

The public can view “Dormant,” along with the other pieces in the show, online as part of UND’s first ever virtual art exhibit.

USDA announces details of direct assistance to farmers

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue today announced details of the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP), which will provide up to \$16 billion in direct payments to deliver relief to America's farmers and ranchers impacted by the coronavirus pandemic. In addition to this direct support to farmers and ranchers, USDA's Farmers to Families Food Box program is partnering with regional and local distributors, whose workforces have been significantly impacted by the closure of many restaurants, hotels, and other food service entities, to purchase \$3 billion in fresh produce, dairy, and meat and deliver boxes to Americans in need.

"America's farming community is facing an unprecedented situation as our nation tackles the coronavirus. President Trump has authorized USDA to ensure our patriotic farmers, ranchers, and producers are supported and we are moving quickly to open applications to get payments out the door and into the pockets of farmers," said Secretary Perdue. "These payments will help keep farmers afloat while market demand returns as our nation reopens and recovers. America's farmers are resilient and will get through this challenge just like they always do with faith, hard work, and determination."

Beginning May 26, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), through the Farm Service Agency (FSA), will be accepting applications from agricultural producers who have suffered losses.

Background:

CFAP provides vital financial assistance to producers of agricultural commodities who have suffered a five-percent-or-greater price decline due to COVID-19 and face additional significant marketing costs as a result of lower demand, surplus production, and disruptions to shipping patterns and the orderly marketing of commodities.

Farmers and ranchers will receive direct support, drawn from two possible funding sources. The first source of funding is \$9.5 billion in appropriated funding provided in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Stability (CARES) Act to compensate farmers for losses due to price declines that occurred between mid-January 2020, and mid-April 2020 and provides support for specialty crops for product that had been shipped from the farm between the same time period but subsequently spoiled due to loss of marketing channels. The second funding source uses the Commodity Credit Corporation Charter Act to compensate producers for \$6.5 billion in losses due to on-going market disruptions.

Non-Specialty Crops and Wool

Non-specialty crops eligible for CFAP payments include malting barley, canola, corn, upland cotton, millet, oats, soybeans, sorghum, sunflowers, durum wheat, and hard red spring wheat. Wool is also eligible. Producers will be paid based on inventory subject to price risk held as of January 15, 2020. A payment will be made based 50 percent of a producer's 2019 total produc-

tion or the 2019 inventory as of January 15, 2020, whichever is smaller, multiplied by the commodity's applicable payment rates.

Livestock

Livestock eligible for CFAP include cattle, lambs, yearlings and hogs. The total payment will be calculated using the sum of the producer's number of livestock sold between January 15 and April 15, 2020, multiplied by the payment rates per head, and the highest inventory number of livestock between April 16 and May 14, 2020, multiplied by the payment rate per head.

Dairy

For dairy, the total payment will be calculated based on a producer's certification of milk production for the first quarter of calendar year 2020 multiplied by a national price decline during the same quarter. The second part of the payment is based a national adjustment to each producer's production in the first quarter.

Specialty Crops

For eligible specialty crops, the total payment will be based on the volume of production sold between January 15 and April 15, 2020; the volume of production shipped, but unpaid; and the number of acres for which harvested production did not leave the farm or mature product destroyed or not harvested during that same time period, and which have not and will not be sold. Specialty crops include, but are not limited to, almonds, beans, broccoli, sweet corn,

Northern Lights fishing report

With the weather finally warming up and the water temps now in the mid 50's, fishing is getting better. Last week we were out on Long Lake, south of Bagley, fishing for Rainbow Trout. Trout are one of my favorite fish to target all through the summer because of their fun fight. Trout like to surface and dance across the water and dive back down to the bottom.

There is a public access on Long Lake and a county campground with many amenities, including a fishing pier, boat rentals, playground and volleyball courts, a beautiful swim beach, and more. Unfortunately, the campground is closed due to Covid, but will hopefully open in June.

Long Lake reaches a depth of 100' and a water clarity of 20'. We caught 16 trout in 2 hours and averaged about a 15.5" per trout. The trout were active in 60' of water, placing your bait at about 30'-40' down. I like to slip bobber them for the most part and use a tungsten plain hook on a 2' 4# mono-filament leader with a swivel.

The sunfish and crappies are not in shallows as of yet, but when they are, it is one af-

ter another. The sunfish should move up the first week of June.

I have heard that Lake of the Woods is picking up with a lot of slot fish being caught. Fish are being caught in about 10'-20' of water mainly with a jig and minnow. Some are trolling spinners and minnow, as well.

The river in Thief River Falls is picking up, as well, with walleyes and northern pike being caught. Most of the walleye are being caught below the dam or from a boat by the access at the 8th St. bridge. We caught a couple walleyes, small mouth bass, and a few northern pike just casting from shore.

Below is a 7' light, fast rod in metallic purple and a diamond wrap that I built. It got the job done on some great rainbows.

FSA expands Set-Aside Loan Provision for customers impacted by COVID-19

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will broaden the use of the Disaster Set-Aside (DSA) loan provision, normally used in the wake of natural disasters, to allow farmers with USDA farm loans who are affected by COVID-19, and are determined eligible, to have their next payment set aside. In some cases, FSA may also set aside a second payment for farmers who have already had one payment set aside because of a prior designated disaster.

"This immediate change of the Set-Aside provision can provide some welcome financial relief to borrowers during this current crisis," said FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce. "FSA recognizes that some customers may need this option to improve their cash flow circumstances in response to the COVID-19 outbreak."

FSA direct loan borrowers will receive a letter with the details of the expanded Disaster Set-Aside authorities, which includes the possible set-aside of annual operating loans, as well as explanations of the additional loan servicing options that are available. To discuss or request a loan payment Set-Aside, borrowers should call or email the farm loan staff at their local FSA county office.

The set-aside payment's due date is moved to the final maturity date of the loan or extended up to twelve months in the case of an annual operating loan. Any principal set-aside will continue to accrue interest until it is repaid. This aims to improve the borrower's cashflow in the current production cycle.

FSA previously announced it was relaxing the loan-making process and adding flexibilities for servicing direct and guaran-

lemons, iceberg lettuce, spinach, squash, strawberries and tomatoes. A full list of eligible crops can be found on farmers.gov/cfap. Additional crops may be deemed eligible at a later date.

Eligibility

There is a payment limitation of \$250,000 per person or entity for all commodities combined. Applicants who are corporations, limited liability companies or limited partnerships may qualify for additional payment limits where members actively provide personal labor or personal management for the farming operation. Producers will also have to certify they meet the Adjusted Gross Income limitation of \$900,000 unless at least 75 percent or more of their income is derived from farming, ranching or forestry-related activities. Producers must also be in compliance with Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation provisions.

Applying for Assistance

Producers can apply for assistance beginning on May 26, 2020. Additional information and application forms can be found at farmers.gov/cfap. Producers of all eligible commodities will apply through their local FSA office. Documentation

to support the producer's application and certification may be requested. FSA has streamlined the signup process to not require an acreage report at the time of application and a USDA farm number may not be immediately needed. Applications will be accepted through August 28, 2020.

Payment Structure

To ensure the availability of funding throughout the application period, producers will receive 80 percent of their maximum total payment upon approval of the application. The remaining portion of the payment, not to exceed the payment limit, will be paid at a later date as funds remain available.

USDA Service Centers are open for business by phone appointment only, and field work will continue with appropriate social distancing. While program delivery staff will continue to come into the office, they will be working with producers by phone and using online tools whenever possible. All Service Center visitors wishing to conduct business with the FSA, Natural Resources Conservation Service, or any other Service Center agency are required to call their Service Center to schedule a phone appointment. teed loans to provide credit to producers in need. Direct loan applicants and borrowers are encouraged to contact their local FSA county office to discuss loan making and servicing flexibilities and other needs or concerns. Customers participating in FSA's guaranteed loan programs are encouraged to contact their lender. Information on these flexibilities, and office contact information, can be found on farmers.gov/coronavirus.

FSA will be accepting most forms and applications by facsimile or electronic signature. Some services are also available online to customers with an eAuth account, which provides access to the farmers.gov portal where producers can view USDA farm loan information and certain program applications and payments. Customers

can track payments, report completed practices, request conservation assistance and electronically sign documents. Customers who do not already have an eAuth account can enroll at farmers.gov/signin.

USDA Service Centers are open for business by phone appointment only, and field work will continue with appropriate social distancing. While program delivery staff will continue to come into the office, they will be working with producers by phone and using online tools whenever possible. All Service Center visitors wishing to conduct business with the FSA, Natural Resources Conservation Service or any other Service Center agency are required to call their Service Center to schedule a phone appointment. 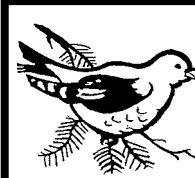

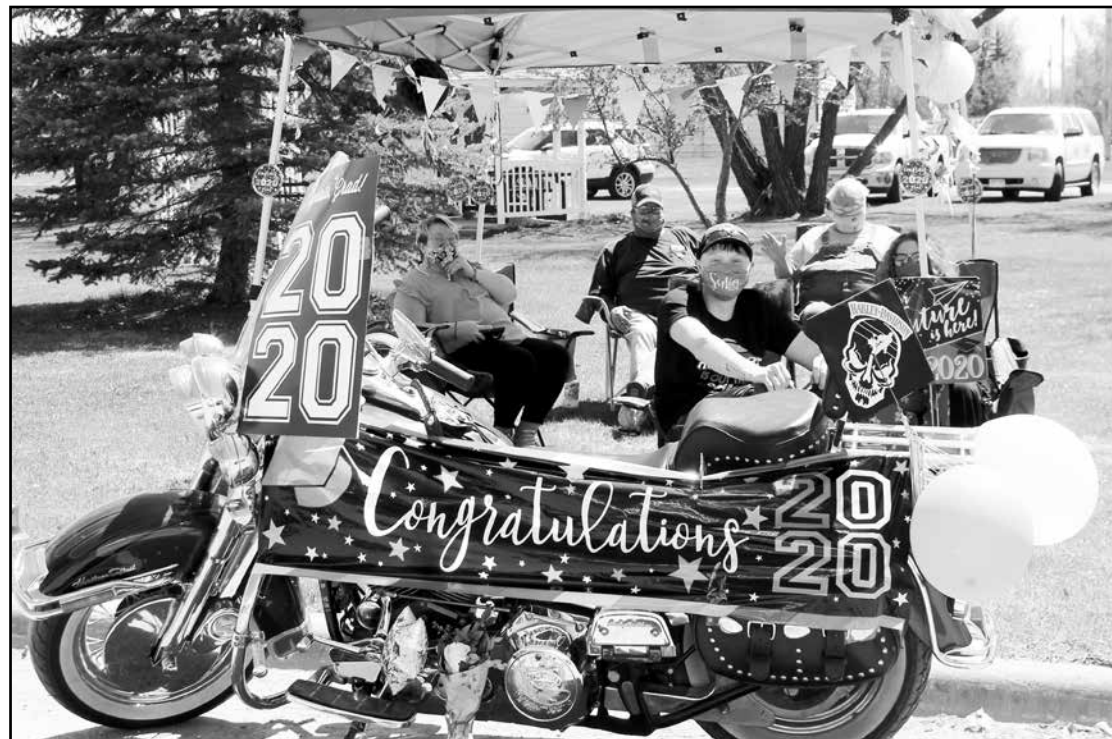
