Marshall County Historical Society holds annual meeting

Marshall County Historical Society's 2015 Annual meeting was held October 22nd at the Viking Diner. Numerous reports were read highlighting another successful year for the historical society. Over the past year about 4,000 people visited the museum coming from 14 different states and two countries. There were 36 individuals who donated 315 artifacts, bringing the total number of artifacts in the museum to about 14,000. Also to be noted, it was an excellent year financially.

77 volunteers performed various tasks around the museum, donating a total of 1180 hours of labor. The society held three special events this past summer and co-sponsored another. Numerous people made contact searching for historical and genealogical information.

Needs for upcoming year are: Air quality control in the Visitor Center (there are some humidity issues), structural repairs and painting for the historic Alma Church and general maintenance to buildings.

The Historical Society's Settlers Square Museum in Warren is open Monday-Friday from 10am-5pm from Memorial Day through Labor Day, and other times by appointment. They can be reached at 218-745-4803 or mchs@wiktel.com.

Chargers Basketball upcoming Jamborees

The Goodridge/Grygla Chargers boys basketball team will be traveling to Clearbrook on Saturday, November 14th to start off their season with a basketball jamboree. Scrimmages begin at 9am with the actual jamboree set to start at 12:30pm.

Anticipation builds for Saturday's deer opener

Deer hunters will soon head out to the fields and forests in anticipation of the firearms deer opener that gets underway a half-hour before sunrise this Saturday, November 7th.

"Many hunters look forward to deer season all year as a way to enjoy nature and the outdoors, and reconnect with family," said Steve Merchant, wildlife populations and regulations program manager with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "Hunters also enjoy seeing deer, and the good news is there should be more deer out there this year."

Deer populations are on the rise following a milder winter and a conservative hunting season last year. This season will again be a conservative one, which means fewer antlerless deer permits were issued. Harvesting fewer does allows deer populations to grow and helps provide more opportunity in the future.

Here are some other reminders from the DNR for the Minnesota firearms deer season.

Check regulations
The DNR strongly advises hunters to review new deer hunting regulations, permit area designations and boundary changes. Current and up-to-date information is available at www.mndnr.gov/hunting/deer.

Buy license
With nearly 500,000 firearms deer hunters in the state, the DNR encourages hunters to purchase their licenses early to avoid long lines and any potential system issues associated with the high sales volume. A list of DNR license agents across Minnesota can be found

at www.mndnr.gov/licenses/agents.html.

Changes in 2015 affect when licenses are valid if purchased after a season is open. A deer hunting license purchased after a season is open is valid the same day of purchase if purchased prior to the beginning of legal shooting hours. If the license is purchased after legal shooting hours have begun, then the license is valid the following day.

Register deer
Deer must be registered within 48 hours after the deer was taken, before being processed and before antlers are removed. Hunters can register deer they harvest by making a telephone call, using the Internet or bringing deer to a big-game registration station. Hunters need to provide accurate information when registering. It is a violation to register a deer as taken in a permit area different from where it was actually taken. Registration instructions for all methods are available at www.mndnr.gov/gameregistrationhelp. Registration is important because it provides harvest data used for management of deer populations.

Projected harvest
The 2015 season will be the second year of a management approach to rebuild deer populations in areas below population goals. The DNR is projecting the 2015 total harvest to be between 140,000 to 155,000 deer. The 2014 total harvest after last year's conservative season was just over 139,000. 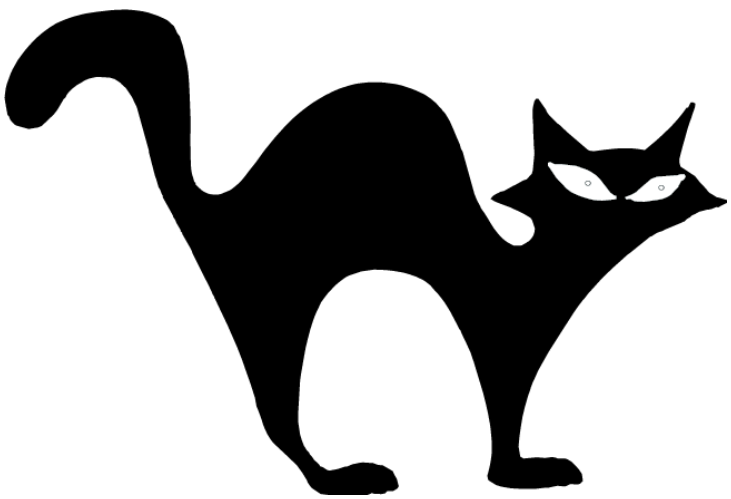

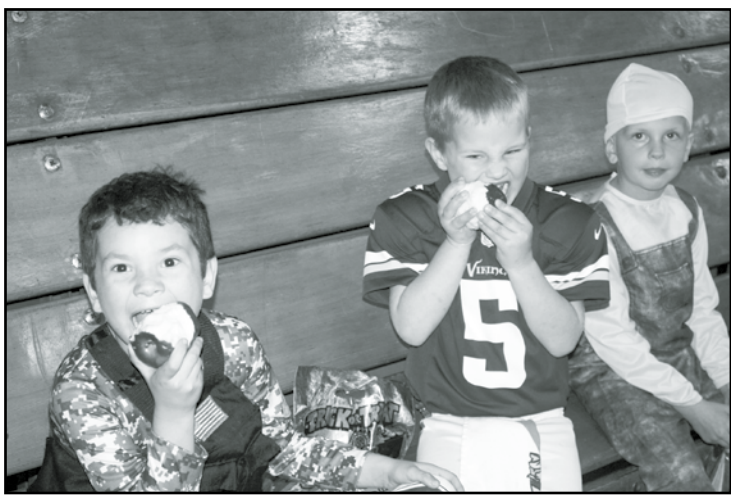

Rep. Fabian renews push for Minnesota to file suit against EPA

Last Thursday, October 29th, Representative Dan Fabian (R-Roseau) sent a letter to Minnesota Attorney General Lori Swanson asking her to add Minnesota to a coalition of 25 states who have filed suit in the last week against the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) over President Obama's Clean Power Plan.

A previous letter was sent to the Attorney General's office in late September, signed by Rep. Fabian and 43 other state representatives, which requested Attorney General Swanson take action against this overreaching federal rule. Her office responded that this could not be done until the rule was published in the Federal Register, which it was on October 23, 2015.

"This expensive and burdensome new rule, which the EPA has conceded will have no measurable environmental benefit, greatly expands federal authority over state energy policy and will impact the availability of affordable energy for folks across the state," said Rep. Fabian. "Twenty-five states have already filed suit which demonstrates just how overreaching and devastating President Obama's Clean Power Plan is. This is a bipartisan issue that has people across the nation concerned, and that's why now is the time for Minnesota to lead and stand up for the people of our state."

The full letter reads as follows:

Dear Attorney General Swanson,

On September 29, 2015, your office responded to a letter sent by myself and forty-three other state representatives asking the Attorney General to add Minnesota to the growing coalition of states challenging the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in a federal court regarding President Obama's Clean Power Plan, issued under the agency's 111(d) rulemaking authority. You indicated that your office would consult with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) regarding the rule, as well as wait for it to be published by the Federal Register.

This overreaching new rule is now in effect, having been published in the Federal Register on October 23, 2015. Furthermore, you have had ample time to consult with the MPCA in regards to the effects these new federal guidelines will have on our state. That is why I would like to once again ask you to challenge this rule in a federal court on behalf of the state of Minnesota.

As I stated before, not only will this significantly expanded scope of federal power under EPA rulemaking undermine state regulatory authority, but it will also impact the availability of affordable energy for families, businesses and communities statewide. Additionally, there is a possibility that its implementation could lead to the closure of coal-fired power plants in our state, creating significant job loss and increased energy costs. These price increases will most greatly affect those who can least afford it including people with low or fixed incomes, the elderly, local schools and nursing homes.

Furthermore, the EPA conceded there will be no measurable environmental benefit which calls to question the validity of implementing these expensive, overreaching new federal requirements when there is little expected positive environmental results.

Twenty-five states have already filed suit against the Clean Power Plan in the last week, and by joining as a plaintiff, Minnesota will be a strong voice for state regulatory authority, protect Minnesota jobs and energy reliability, and hopefully help stop the alarming expansion of federal power over state energy policy.

USDA issues safety-net payments to farmers facing market downturn

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced that nearly one half of the 1.7 million farms that signed up for either the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs will receive safety-net payments for the 2014 crop year.

“Unlike the old direct payments program, which paid farmers in good years and bad, the 2014 Farm Bill authorized a new safety-net that protects producers only when market forces or adverse weather cause unexpected drops in crop prices or revenues,” said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. “For example, the corn price for 2014 is 30 percent below the historical benchmark price used by the ARC-County program, and revenues of the farms participating in the ARC-County program are down by about \$20 billion from the benchmark during the same period. The nearly \$4 billion provided today by the ARC and PLC safety-net programs will give assistance to producers where revenues dropped below normal.”

The ARC/PLC programs primarily allow producers to continue to produce for the market by making payments on a percentage of historical base production, limiting the impact on production decisions.

Nationwide, 96 percent of soybean farms, 91 percent of corn farms, and 66 percent of wheat farms elected the ARC-County coverage option. Ninety-nine percent of long grain rice and peanut farms, and 94 percent of medium grain rice farms elected the PLC option. Overall, 76 percent of participating farm acres are protected by ARC-County, 23 percent by PLC, and 1 percent by ARC-Individual. For data about other crops, as well as state-by-state program election results, final PLC price and payment data, and other program information including frequently asked questions, visit www.fsa.usda.gov/arc-plc.

Crops receiving assistance include barley, corn, grain sorghum, lentils, oats, peanuts, dry peas, soybeans, and wheat. In the upcoming months, disbursements will be made for other crops after marketing year average prices are published by USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Any disbursements to participants in ARC-County or PLC for long and medium grain rice (except for temperate Japonica rice) will occur in November, for remaining oilseeds and also chickpeas in December, and temperate Japonica rice in early February 2016. ARC-individual payments will begin

in November. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity.

The Budget Control Act of 2011, passed by Congress, requires USDA to reduce payments by 6.8 percent. For more information, producers are encouraged to visit their local Farm Service Agency office. To find a local Farm Service Agency office, visit <http://offices.usda.gov>.

The Agriculture Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage programs were made possible by the 2014 Farm Bill, which builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past six years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for taxpayers. Since enactment, USDA has made significant progress to implement each provision of this critical legislation, including providing disaster relief to farmers and ranchers; strengthening risk management tools; expanding access to rural credit; funding critical research; establishing innovative public-private conservation partnerships; developing new markets for rural-made products; and investing in infrastructure, housing and community facilities to help improve quality of life in rural America.

Fruit Flies in the Home

Fruit flies are particularly common in homes during fall. These tiny flies are about 1/8th inch long with a tannish body, and a dark-colored abdomen. An easy way to identify fruit flies is by their bright red eyes. However, their eyes do appear darker after they are dead and may not be as distinctive. Be careful, not every small-sized fly you encounter is automatically a fruit fly. Moth flies, phorid flies (also called humpbacked flies), and fungus gnats can also be common in homes. It is important to know which fly you are seeing because control will vary depending on which fly is present. If you have any doubts as to which fly is in your home, have an expert identify it for you.

Fruit flies can potentially be carried into homes in fruits and vegetables or they could fly in from the outside. Once in homes, they are attracted to fermenting and souring smells, e.g. around garbage containers and produce that is starting to become overripe. Fruit flies lay their eggs in a wide variety of sites as long as they are moist, contains fermenting organic matter, and are in reasonably undisturbed places.

You can help prevent fruit flies by eating fruits and vegetables while they are fresh or keep them refrigerated; do not allow produce to sit out and become overripe. Also, keep the inside of garbage containers clean from food residues. Rinse bottles and cans that you recycle and remove recyclables on a regular basis. Don't forget to periodically clean recycling containers to prevent a build-up of food residue. Remove garbage in tied plastic bags on a regular basis.

If you find you have a persistent problem with fruit flies, the most effective, permanent control is sanitation, i.e. eliminate their food source. Fruit flies are commonly found infesting overripe fruits and vegetables like bananas, tomatoes, potatoes and onions. Also look for them around soft drink, wine, and beer bottles and cans that are being saved for recycling as well as in the recycling container itself. Another common site is

trash containers especially when they are lined with plastic bags (look between the liner and the container). Remember that the source of the infestation may not be where the adult flies are found.

Fruit flies, however, will take advantage of a wide variety of different food sources and there are also plenty of unusual sites where you may discover fruit flies. You may need to be a detective and be imaginative to determine where they are coming from. In one case, fruit flies were infesting a tea maker after tea was brewed but was not cleaned out before it was put away. In another instance, they were found in rotting osage oranges (non-edible fruit that are purported to repel insects, spiders, and rodents) that were left out and forgotten. Remember that fruit flies are found in moist, undisturbed places where fermenting organic material is found.

Some people are tempted to spray fruit flies with an insecticide. While that will kill the flies you see, it is not a long term solution and more will return. Just spraying adults doesn't have any impact on the source of the infestation and the larvae that are developing. As long as a food source still exists, adults will continue to be present.

Fruit fly traps (either store bought or homemade) generally do not eliminate fruit flies. While you may capture some individuals, like spraying, it is difficult to catch them fast enough to actually eliminate them. However, you could use traps to help narrow down where infestations are located. By placing traps in every room, the trap with the most fruit flies usually indicates approximately where the problem can be found. Hunters and other recreationists asked to report bear den locations

Hunters and other recreationists spending time outdoors this fall are asked to report the locations of occupied bear dens they encounter within an hour's drive of Bemidji, and in and around the Chippewa National Forest, north of Grand Rapids.

Bear researchers with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources are starting a new bear study in the summer of 2016 and hope to fit a number of bears with GPS tracking collars.

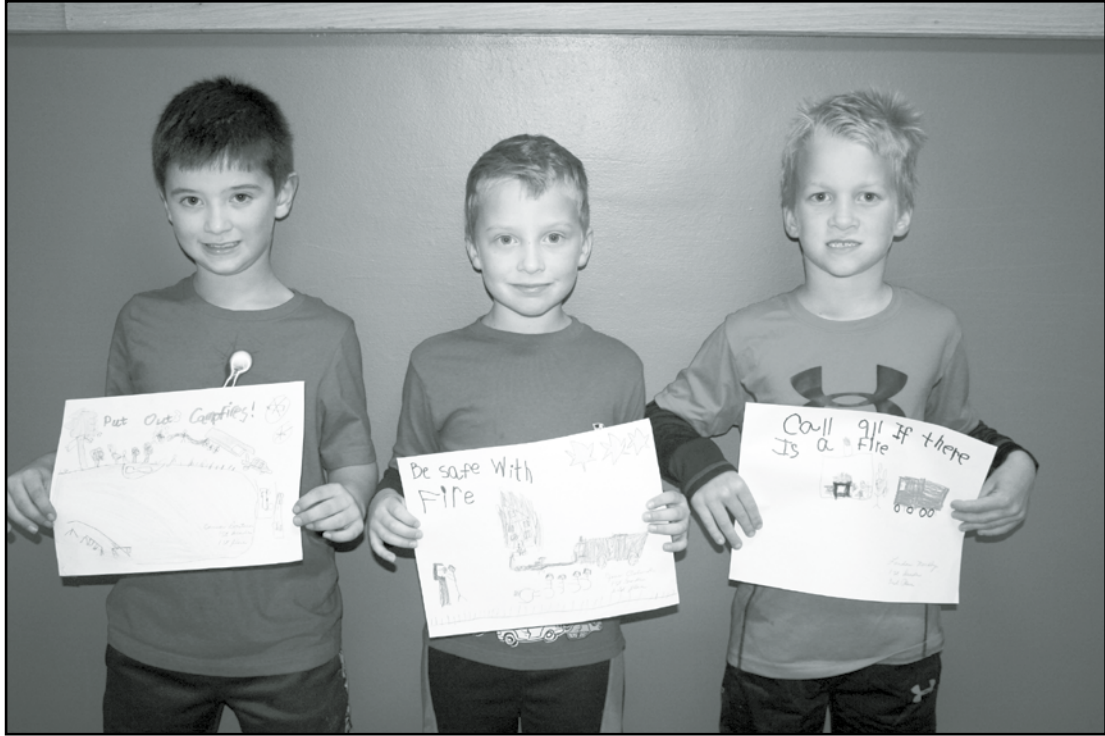
"Getting a few bears collared in winter would really help jump-start the study," said Dave Garshelis, DNR bear project leader. "It would allow us to get a whole year of movement data, which we can't do with bears that we catch and collar in mid-summer."

The purpose of the study is to examine how bears may have responded to changes in the forest since the 1980s. The DNR previously collared bears in this same study area, roughly between Grand Rapids and Bigfork, through the 1980s and early 1990s. Those bears were located weekly from an airplane to understand how they moved and what habitats they used most. The new generation GPS collars will collect their own locations and transmit these locations via satellite to the researchers. "It appears that the age and composition of trees on the national forest has changed significantly during the past 30 years," said Garshelis, "and with that has been changes in food supplies for bears. Bear research provides a better understanding of factors that cause populations to change, and in this way enables the DNR to better manage and conserve this species.

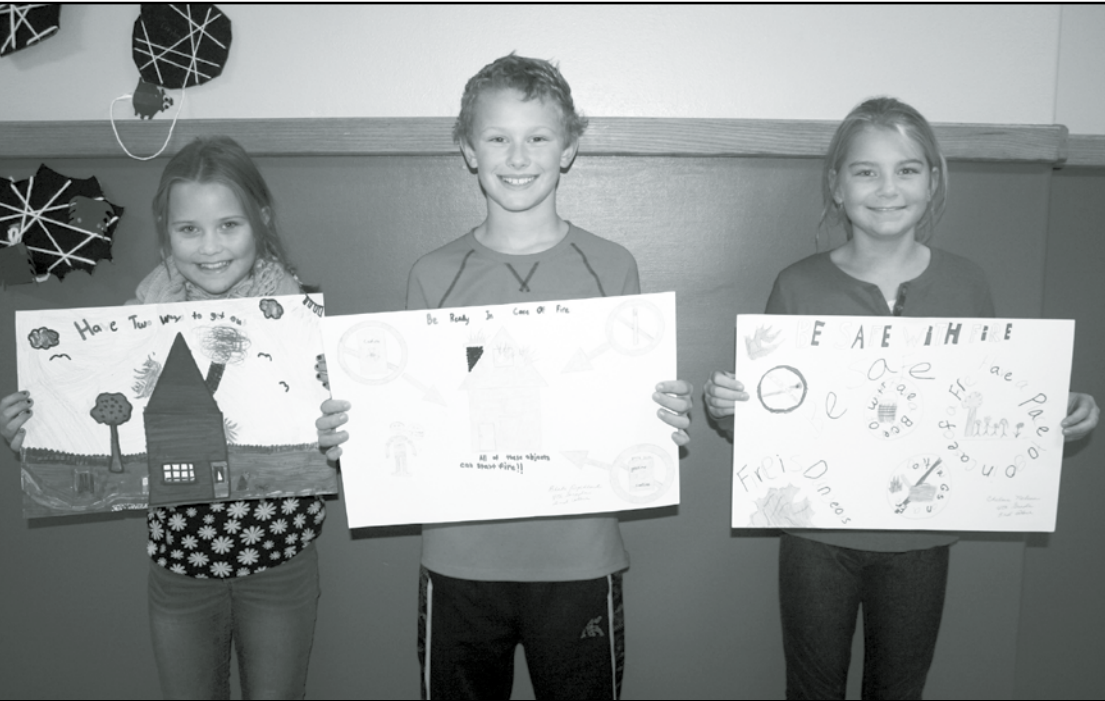

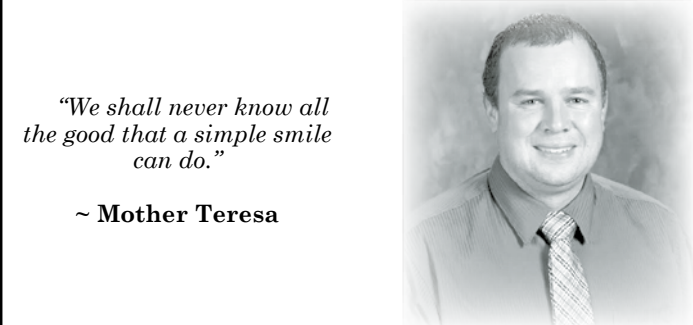

Cajun Meatloaf

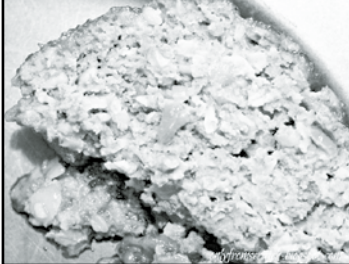
- 2 tbsp butter
 1/3 cup finely chopped onion
 1/4 cup diced green pepper
 1 1/2 tbsp blackened cajun seasoning
 1/2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
 1 tsp minced garlic
 1 bay leaf
 1/4 cup milk
 1/4 cup ketchup
 1 pound ground beef
 1 egg
 1/2 cup rolled oats
 Glaze Topping:
 1/3 cup ketchup
 1/3 cup brown sugar
 2 tsp Worcestershire sauce

Preheat oven to 350F. Place butter in a medium sized skillet and melt over medium heat. Add onion and pepper – sauté until tender. Add all the seasonings and cook for about 5 minutes. Stir in the milk and

ketchup - cook for about 2 minutes. Remove the bay leaf. Let cool slightly.

In a large mixing bowl, mix cooked sauce mixture, ground beef, egg and oats. Stir to combine. Form into a loaf and place in a greased baking dish. Bake for one hour.

In a small bowl combine ketchup, brown sugar and Worcestershire sauce to form a glaze topping. Spread on top of baked meatloaf. Place under the broiler for about 5 minutes, until bubbly.
