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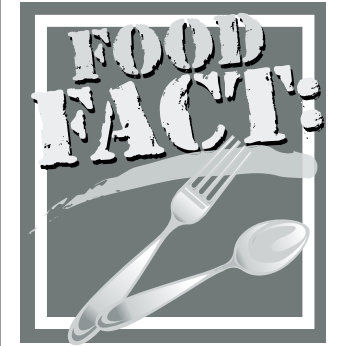

# Northern Lights fishing report

 In this week's fishing report, we went to the Rainy River. The target for this trip - catching a dinosaur, the mighty sturgeon. After my successful spring outing, where my dad land his fish of a lifetime, a 68.5" sturgeon, weighing in at 85 pounds, my wife decided she wanted to get one (and my daughter just wanted to see a dinosaur).  
 We got a late start to the morning and launched the boat around 8am at the public access by Border View Lodge. All of the launches were heading out at this time, as well. I set us up at the mouth of the Rainy and 4 mile bay in 22' of water that dropped into 30'. My wife was hopeful when I pointed out the fish jumping and told her they were sturgeon.  
 Fishing was slow, at best. We boated 3 small sturgeon and a few walleye and sauger. Around 10am, the sturgeon stopped jumping, the wind stopped and it got hot. We decided to run out to the gap and try for a couple walleye, but that, too, was very slow.  
 There were a few boats in shallow at the gap, but a lot of boats were running at least 2 miles north and fishing the flats off the reefs. Most reports was the bite was slow with no wind; there was a big mayfly hatch, as well. Most of the week that was the report from most guides - slow bite with no wind, but fishing is still good, you just have to work for them.  
 Whiskey flats, flats off of 5 mile in that 15-25', 14'-20' off the blinker, and the flats off of Bridges and Garden Island are still producing. There are more and more people starting to down rig or troll lead core with crank baits and having great success. Spinners with crawlers are really picking up along with leeches. I still prefer to use jig and shiner as my bait of choice and used that last Thursday.  
 Long lake still has a hot trout bite going and oodles of sunfish. The bass are a little tricky there but are biting on a jig and plastic or crawler.  
 Blackduck Lake has slowed down a bit with just a few walleye being caught a long with some giant sunfish. They are trying to get the sunfish popu-

lation up and have a special limit of 5.  
 Maple Lake has been slow, also, but is a hard lake to fish this time of year with a lot of water sports going on. They are catching pike, few bass and crappies around the docks, and some sunfish.  
 The river in Thief is starting to pick up with cat fish and small mouth bass being caught below the dam and by Hartz Park.  
 I haven't heard much about the bite on Red lake, but have heard the walleye fishing on Leech Lake is really good. Like Lake of the Woods, pulling spinners with leeches or crawlers and fishing in 8-15' of water.  
 If you've ever considered needing a new fishing rod and want to know what a custom rod is all about, get a hold of me and we can talk or show you some of the customs I have; you can feel the difference right away. I only have a couple rods to do and am about 1.5-2 weeks out on a completed rod. My custom rods are light weight but can tame the wildest fish. Prices range, but they are around \$140-\$160 but can be more depending on what you want. If you need some jigs or spinners for a trip north or anywhere get a hold of me and I can get some made for you.  
 This week I hope to fish a couple different lakes. I'm looking at fishing Lake Plantaganet by Bemidji to target bass, pike and try for the elusive musky. We may try for a few walleye, too. The other lakes we are looking at are Balm and Long Lost Lake for bass; may try to get up to the big lake, as well.  
 If you have any lakes that you would like me to check out and give a report on get a hold of the Grygla Eagle or contact me and we will check it out and add it to the fishing report!

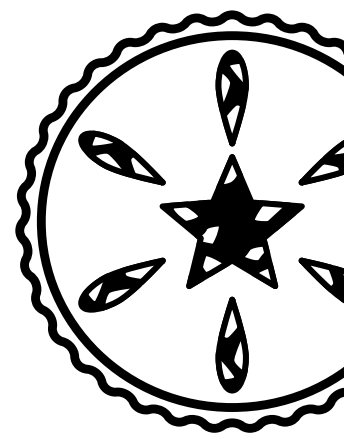
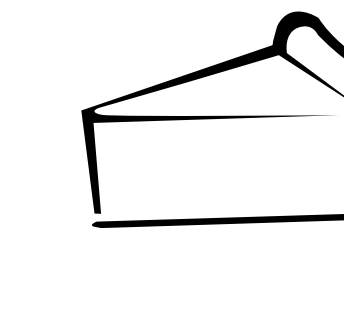

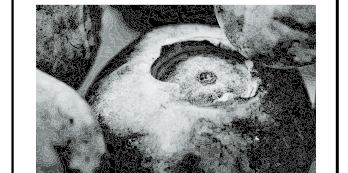

Marshall County Area Veterans Memorial Park

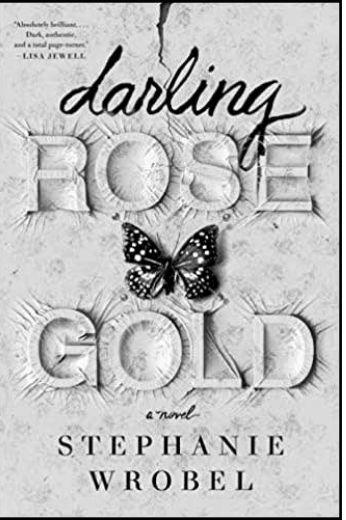
We want to update everyone on the progress of the Marshall County Area Veterans Memorial Park (MCAVMP). As we continue searching for a humble way to show our gratitude to our area veterans, it has become increasingly clear that every American's life is connected to service men and women in some fashion. With that in mind the committee is again moving forward with the process of building the park and veteran tribute. We do this with the ardent belief that there is a legacy from each of our veterans in Marshall County and the surrounding area that needs to be honored. Born out of these beliefs is the Marshall County Area Veterans Memorial Park (MCAVMP). Our hope is to establish a peaceful place where veterans and their families can reflect on the gifts we enjoy from the service and sacrifice our veterans endured. A quote from an unknown

author says, "A nation reveals itself not only by the men and women it produces... But by the men and women it honors and remembers." So, it is our hope to honor and remember with the MCAVMP. As we go through the process of creating the park, so many stories come to life. It became clear we need to honor those stories and keep alive the history of the veterans and their families from this area. The MCAVMP will be multifaceted. Located on the courthouse lawn will be granite tablets for the five branches of service. There will be benches to sit and reflect next to our flag display. Inside will be a mural to further reflect the message and diversity of service. Also, inside will be a kiosk with interviews of veterans and history from this area, which should serve as a great educational opportunity for our area and schools. Most all of the ideas are from the veterans on the

committee. A great group to work with. Humble and proud all in one. To meet our visions for MCAVMP, it will require roughly \$250,000. We are over 60% of the way there and feeling optimistic. One anonymous donor contributed \$20,000 on two separate occasions on the premise we could raise matching funds. We were able to meet both goals with a lot of great folks helping out. In addition, we have received some \$5,000 and \$10,000 donations. We have also received from businesses and individuals donations of materials and labor. The area and community are excited for this to become a reality and contributing in every possible way. Currently, we are in the process of painting the mural, and gathering interviews. We are planning to break ground in late July for the concrete. Soldiering on in our own way. Our request of you is to con-

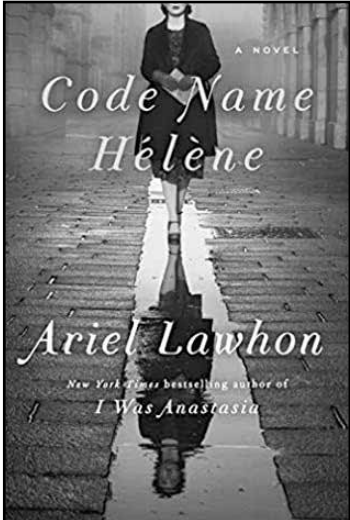

However, I do know there's a handful of you out there who read this weekly AND order in the titles I talk about here, so that makes me feel like there's at least a point to all this.

Ok, so two books for you this week. I actually haven't read them yet, but I just got them downloaded on my Nook to read the ebook this week! We're away all week on vacation and I can't wait to read this lakeside while catching some sun or unwinding for the night with a glass of wine in the sun porch. I'm really excited for these two books and the reviews are on fire, which makes me even more excited. Book 1: Darling Rose Gold by Stephanie Wrobel Mothers never forget. Daughters never forgive. For the first eighteen years of her life, Rose Gold Watts believed she was seriously ill. She was allergic to everything, used a wheelchair and prac-



tically lived at the hospital. DO IT YOURSELF



Nature Paint Brushes for Kids.... Making your own nature paint brushes is easy, fun and free! It will get you and your kids out in nature and it's so fun collecting natural materials. Also, pine needles make fantastic brushes! You'll need: several twigs; string, twine or a piece of raffia; a rubberband (optional); materials for bristles (pine needles, spruce needles, cypress foliage, even tree buds, etc.) Small children will need assistance with this activity. To make it easier, you can use a rubber band to hold the bristle material together while the child wraps raffia around. For a heavy-duty use, the rubber band alone will not be enough. Wrap raffia (or twine) several times around the handle and the bristle material, then tie it firmly and cut off any excessive string.

A Nature Mobile.... What do you do with all those treasures your children collect from the ground? Little ones can't go out and play without filling their pockets with beautiful things they've found. Leaves, acorns, shells, seeds, blossom, pebbles and feathers have all made their way into our homes throughout the year. Gather up all the items they've collected and make a nature mobile to hang in their room! Let your child carefully choose which item to display and what order to string them on, and how high or low they should be threaded. Find a thin twig and attach each item carefully with floristry wire or some kind of twine or string. Finally, tie some more twine or string to each end of the stick so it can hang on the wall.

Blackberry Chicken Salad This blackberry chicken salad is full of fresh and juicy blackberries and drizzled over with a blackberry balsamic vinegar dressing. Load on the chicken to make the salad a meal. Salad • 1/2 pound chicken breasts • 6 cups spring mix lettuce • 1 cup fresh blackberries • 1 avocado, sliced • 1/4 cup red onion, sliced • 1/4 cup chopped walnuts Dressing • 1/2 cup blackberries • 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard • 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar • 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

• 2 tablespoons honey  
• 1 teaspoon soy sauce  
• Salt and pepper to taste  
Instructions Sauté the chicken in a cast iron skillet over medium-high heat until fully cooked through. Add the spring mix lettuce to a large bowl. Arrange the blackberries, avocado, red onion, and walnuts on top of the bed of lettuce. Set aside. In a medium bowl, combine the dressing ingredients except for the salt and pepper. Use a fork to mash the blackberries to release the juices. Whisk to combine. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Slice the cooked chicken and set over the salad. Drizzle with dressing. Serve immediately.

## Planning for shade or sun in your garden

The article featured today is a discussion on shade versus sunny garden spots. What does "full sun" or "partial shade" even mean?

Well, plants that need full sun would mean they need 6 hours of sunlight. Partial shade indicates that plants needs about 3 hours of sunlight. Some plants are not particular and do well in most situations. Often we buy plants and we are not sure they will do well in our yards.

I've made many mistakes in placement of perennials and annuals over the years. Sometimes I've noticed they don't like the spot where I planted them, so I have moved them hoping they will do better, sometimes that works out and sometimes it doesn't, chalk it up to experience I guess. I've had some perennials die the following season, after struggling the first year. I have an area on the south side of our house that is full heat and full sun most of the day, I often struggle with plants surviving there. We are having a very hot humid spell the past few days and my beautiful new Geraniums are suffering. I love the way they look along our house but ...time will tell. I will either have to move them or make a shade tent for them for the afternoons sweltering heat....lets hope the heatwave ends on a good note-no storm!

More than likely your yard has both sunny and shady areas. When you research plants be aware of the "full sun" or "part shade" notations on the information given for that plant. If you have a yard surrounded by tall trees planting a grapevine in an area you might consider your sunny spot may still not provide enough sun to grow grapes. Grapes need at least 6 hours of full sunlight each day.

Many plants are adapted to shade when they are young but need more sun as they mature. This is true for maple trees and many forest trees. When trees are seedlings they need the shade of an existing forest canopy, but as they mature they eventually reach the light and become the canopy. For example, I have 6 spruce seedlings growing in a sheltered area in my vegetable garden this summer, they are in an area that is protected by other trees. I plan to move them out to a sunny spot when they are approximately a foot tall. For now I baby them. They are about 8" tall now so we will see how quickly they grow this summer before

I move them. I've planted many trees and failed at it more than I've succeeded. But I persist.

My favorite tree in the whole world is a Basswood or also called a Linden tree. Two years ago I planted one and it's doing really well now. This year I bought 6 really small basswoods and so far I've lost 1, another is on it's way out because of a puppy (whom I love more than the tree, lucky for him). Funny Rosco story~ I was coming out of the shop, and glanced over to the yard. Rosco was on his back chewing on a long stick, legs kicking in the air...I quickly realized it was a little basswood tree. He heard me say, "Oh Rosco!" In my stern grandma voice as I was coming close and he let go of the little tree, the poor little basswood looked like a small catapult as it sprung back and forth. I think that tree is toast. Oh Rosco! My next story might be called "holes" I know he's a digger-labs usually are!

So anyway, often part shade or part sun occurs when leaves block the sun, or when they grow close to buildings and get sun for only part of the day. The east side gets only morning sun, this is a cool place and is well suited to evergreens, clematis or hydrangeas. Any of these would scorch on a west facing wall. A west facing wall is more suited to, thyme, potentilla or a santonlina. Look for plants that tolerate the hot fury of afternoon sun. Plants near a north facing wall receive diffused light. I find Hostas do well on the north side of my house. Don't be disappointed if you find that some of your full sun areas are in fact part shade. Plenty of plants enjoy the dappled light through trees and branches and the coolness of a northern or eastern wall. Shade lovers are represented in every plant category. Deciduous woody plants like honeysuckle, dogwood, evergreen woody plants and vines like a Boston or English Ivy. Perennials like bleeding heart, Columbine, daisy, primrose or violets. Impatiens and Begonias are annuals that do well in the shade.

Don't be afraid to ask for advice from the greenhouse on placement of plants. Bring pictures of the area you want to plant perennials and annuals to show to them. Most of all enjoy learning about plants and watching them grow.
