July 13th Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Grygla City Council

The meeting was called to order, at 7pm by Mayor Mosher with the following council members present: Gavin Nordby, Dave Dunrud, Robert Thompson and Lindsay Oslund. Absent: None. Also present was Rose Aune.

Council approved minutes, along with receipts, disbursements, checking, savings & total balances for that month. The payment of all bills was also approved. Other items included:

CITY PICKUP

There were 2 bids for the 1997 Ford F150 Regular cab, 8' box, 4.2 V6 manual transmission 4x4 pickup. Skyler Crowther bid \$500 and Brent Welin bid \$1,215. Council accepted the bid from Brent Welin for \$1,215.

WATER SALESMAN (BULK WATER FILL STATION)

The access center for the fill station wasn't set up for credit/debit card use. It was going to be another \$5,000 to have that set up. The council decided to just leave the same way for a while and see how it works without that option.

WATER TOWER

Still having problems with getting the SAM # and eAuth for Mayor Mosher.

COMMUNITY CENTER

There have been some birds in the attic of the CC. Need to check with Lions about doing some renovations there.

PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT

There was nothing new to report at this time.

MARBEL HOMES

There was nothing new to report at this time.

LOT 7 BLOCK 1 PLANK ADDITION

Council approved to have the selling price for Lot 7 Block 1 of Plank Addition be \$5,000, which includes the street assessments.

WORK CONTRACTS

Work contracts will be tabled to August and have increases prorated back to July 1st at that time.

CFAP food boxes – change of date

There is a change of date for the delivery of the CFAP (Covid Food Assistance Program) boxes coming to Grygla in August. They will be distributed on Wednesday, August 26, at 9:30 AM. We will again be handing out the boxes from Saurdoff's truck garage (230 East Park Drive) and we are asking everyone to line up on the north side of the garage ready for the drive-through distribution.

From Highway 89, turn on 6th Avenue by Yo-Hawn's, then turn left (east) on Woodrow to get in line. Please stay in your vehicle and you will be directed through the parking lot as soon as the delivery truck has finished unloading the boxes.

So far, we are scheduled to receive 400 of the protein boxes, but only 100 of the dairy and 70 of the produce boxes. Each car can receive three protein boxes and one each of the other two. They will be distributed on a

first-come-first-served basis.

The boxes are FREE and available to EVERYONE! This includes the surrounding area, not just residents of Grygla.

There is nothing to sign or no paperwork to fill out. Just come and pick up your boxes. If you are unable to come at the scheduled time, you may have a friend or neighbor pick up your box for you.

Although the boxes are free, there is a delivery charge involved for Grygla to be able to participate. The Grygla-Gatzke Food Shelf received a grant from Roseau Electric through their Operation Round-Up program and a donation from the Soybean Growers to bring this program to the Grygla-Gatzke area.

If anyone is willing to help hand out the boxes, please let Joni Anderson or Cheryl Sistad know. We can always use your volunteer services!

Northern Lights fishing report

Fishing this past week was slow and spotty. The wind played havoc and the talk around the lake was that when they could get out fishing you had to hunt for them and was more like fishing than catching like this past summer has been.
They are still catching fish at whiskey, the blinker and the sandbar, but the fish have been scattered. Some were finding decent fishing off of south tip. Trolling a crank or a harness has still been producing the best but a lot of small fish with few keepers. Off of swift ditch was starting to produce more fish now in the 16'-18' range, but don't just do that - locate the fish. There are reports of them being caught in 6' of water, as well.
Long Point is still the same. LEMs reef and the flats around it are producing some fish, but has slowed down; same way with the GAP. Use your electronics and find schools of bait or subtle changes in depth.

MN DNR news: DNR urges people to take precautions to keep bears away

A shortage of natural foods is causing more bear-human conflicts in northeastern and north-central Minnesota as bears gravitate toward food sources at homes, cabins and campsites.

“We’re asking people to remove food sources that could attract bears from their properties or campsites,” said Andrew Tri, a bear biologist for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. “It’s important that folks be extra vigilant in keeping trash and birdseed away from bears to ensure they don’t get an easy meal from what people leave out.”

Dry conditions in the north-east and north-central part of the state have caused the natural food shortage. Human-bear conflicts are amplified in these areas when attractants (such as garbage, birdseed or coolers of food) are abundant and not protected from bears.

Dumpsters should be fitted with locking steel lids. Trash containers should be put in a locked shed or garage. Property owners also may erect an energized fence around a trash can to keep bears from getting into it. The DNR has information online about these fences.

Bird feeders in northeastern and north-central Minnesota should be removed until mid-November and spilled seed should be cleaned up. If one person in a neighborhood feeds birds, a bear will remain in the area.

Campers, especially those who use remote campsites, should follow “Leave No Trace” principles. Plan ahead. Pack out trash and dispose of it properly. Store coolers out of sight in a locked vehicle or in bear-resistant containers. Carry bear spray and learn to use it properly.

“If bears are in the area, let your neighbors, homeowners association or lake-owners association and fellow campers know about it so everybody keeps potential attractants away from bears,” Tri said. “Together, we can reduce conflicts with bears and avoid teaching them bad habits.”

Black bears are the only bear species that lives in Minnesota. Bears are more common in the forested region of northern Minnesota but can live anywhere in the state if they find suitable habitat. They usually are shy and flee when encountered but become bolder

Hunters asked not to shoot ear-tagged and radio-collared research bears

The Minnesota bear hunting season opens Tuesday, Sept. 1, and the Department of Natural Resources is asking hunters to avoid shooting marked research bears. These bears are marked with distinctively large, colorful ear tags and have radio collars.

Researchers with the DNR are monitoring about 20 radio collared black bears across the state, especially in bear hunting zones 27, 25 and 45, and in parts of the no-quota zone. Most of them are in or near the Chippewa National Forest between Grand Rapids and Bigfork. Others are near Voyageurs National Park or around Camp Ripley.

“We’re asking hunters to avoid shooting these valuable research bears. These collared bears give us much of the data we use in bear management,” said Dave Garshelis, DNR bear research scientist.

A key to the research is look-

ing at year-to-year changes in natural food supplies and how that affects individual bears in terms of their habitat use, physical condition, denning, reproduction and interactions with people. This research is not designed to evaluate mortality from hunting. Trapping new bears every year to replace the ones killed cannot substitute for long-term data on individuals.

Most of the collars have GPS units. The GPS coordinates are either uploaded to a satellite, or stored in the collar and downloaded by DNR researchers when they visit the bears in their dens. Each bear provides several thousand data points per year.

The bear’s coat often hides the collar, especially in the fall, and most of the collars are black. But all collared bears have large (3 by 2 inch), colorful ear tags so hunters can simply identify a collared animal

by these large tags, whether or not a collar is visible. The tags should be plainly visible when a bear is at a bait, or on trail cam photos.

Photos of collared research bears and some research findings gained from them are available on the DNR website at mndnr.gov/bear.

DNR officials recognize that a hunter may not be able to see a radio collar or ear tags in some situations. For this reason, taking a bear with a radio collar is legal; however, waiting a few minutes to get a clear view of the bear’s head would reveal whether it has large ear tags, which indicates that it is collared. Bears with small ear tags (1 by 1/4 inch) are not collared but are important for other ongoing research projects. It is OK to take a bear with these small ear tags; if a hunter does take a bear with a small ear tag, they should report it as they would with any collared

bear.

Any hunters who do shoot a collared bear should bring the collar to a bear registration station and call the DNR Wildlife Research Office in Grand Rapids at 218-328-8879 or 218-328-8874 to report shooting a collared bear.

Most collared bears have a small implanted heart monitor under the skin on the left chest. It looks like a small, silver capsule that is approximately the width of a paper clip. This contains valuable information stored in memory. Hunters who find this device while skinning the bear should leave it with the collar. Hunters with trail cam photos of ear tagged bears are asked to email the photos and locational information (nearest town or GPS coordinates) to mnbearcams.dnr@state.mn.us.

School packets

Good afternoon, here is just a quick update. We sent out our Safe Return to School Plan last week to families. A couple of things with this:

The plan outlines what we need to do to return to school safely, not necessarily what all of the day to day operations will look like. Here’s a few additional things I want you to know:

1. We are working to make sure that we follow all of the state mandates regarding face coverings, and I believe we are doing that. We also recognize that for some, it is difficult to be in a face covering. Therefore, we are planning to have many classes outside throughout the day, socially distanced, to allow for breaks for our kids and staff.
2. What Music class will look like this year, may be a little different. We have not
