**Spectator rules for Charger football games**  
By attending these event you are acknowledging that you are aware of all these rules and consent to following them.

- We are conducting these events following and enforcing all guidelines from the Minnesota Department of Health and the Minnesota State High School League.
- If you are experiencing COVID-19 related symptoms, have been diagnosed with COVID-19, or have been a close contact of someone who tested positive for COVID-19 within the last 14 days you should not attend the event under any circumstances.
- Spectators are limited to 250 persons. It is first come first served, with encouragement for parents/guardians and family members to arrive early.
- Admission is \$5 for Adults, \$3 for kids, and \$2 for Senior Citizens. Please have exact dollar amounts available. We also accept checks made out to the school. Spectators will be given a ticket upon admission. Please keep this ticket as proof that

you have been included in the 250 person capacity.

- Spectators must practice social distancing (6' of space away from non-family groups).
- There will be no bleachers or seating available. Fans may bring their own chair. Most people just stand and watch the game or sit in their vehicles and watch the game.
- Children under the age 18 will not be allowed to attend the event without parent/guardian present.
- Children under 18 also must stay with their parents/family group while at the game at all times. They will not be allowed to play football or catch on the sidelines.
- We encourage fans to watch the game from their vehicle if possible. We will allow parking around the field in non-blocked off areas.
- Home Fans should stay on their side of the football field.
- Visiting Fans should stay on their side of the football field.
- The main concession stand will not be open.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Thank you to the Grygla Eagle for the recent publication of interviews for the School Board candidates that will be on the upcoming November ballot. It was informative and provided valuable information as to who is truly invested in our school, community and students. It also clearly identified who is seeking candidacy in an attempt to target the current administration.

We find it very disrespectful and disheartening to read and hear about the malicious attacks on the current administration and school board that is fed and supported by one sitting board member, a current staff member and a handful of community members. Not only are these attacks a false representation but they also attack the integrity of all past board members, staff, and administration, including those who fought so hard to establish the school district as we know it today. There has never been a "good old boys club" and there never will be. These false accusations of frivolous spending, lack of long term planning and "yes men" are absurd. The fact alone that a small community like Grygla can still support a K-12 school proves these inaccurate. The board has never been secretive or deceptive to our taxpayers. All board meetings are open to the public, with the exception of negotiations, and when major decisions are on the table, community input is relied upon and received openly. It is the board's job to have the qualified administration and staff in place to carry on the daily duties required to ensure that all our students receive the education and support that they deserve. It is NOT the boards job to micro manage just as it is with any other organization governed by a board of directors. A board of directors approves budgets, policies and provides guidance and oversight.

There are standards for which are expected of a school board member. Those are available for review on [www.mnmsba.org](http://www.mnmsba.org) and we strongly suggest that they be read and followed. When you are in an elected position, such as the school board, you represent the interests of not only the community, but the entire school district. Saying you don't care about public perception or backlash clearly indicates you are not willing to listen and work as a team member. Seeking election is not a personal quest, as one person cannot bully their way in as an attempt to drive changes. Collaborative discussion and shared thoughts is what makes a truly successful board.

The countless hours that every employee at the Grygla School District dedicates to provide our students the foundation to succeed should be applauded and not insulted on the book of face. The responsibilities that have been cast upon the school administration and staff during this COVID pandemic in order to keep providing our children with an education is enormous. To have every ounce of that effort undermined by gossip for personal gain is shameful.

We strongly suggest you do some research on the auditing process required by EVERY school board and the guidelines established by the Department of Education that must be followed. Governance and abiding by set rules are key to keeping the district open and viable. Blatant disregard for those rules is unacceptable.

Several references have been made about transparency and fiscal responsibility. Transparency is guided by the principles of honesty, integrity and ethics. If you plan on "bringing to the table" transparency, then you need to show that transparency in your own personal affairs. If you plan on demanding fiscal responsibility, then you need to demonstrate your own fiscal responsibility in your own personal affairs.

Once you run for an elected position you open yourself up to personal scrutiny and you are held to a higher level of integrity. As a voter, make sure your candidate is worthy of your trust and that you are not following the wrong path.

Wildfire risk increases across Minnesota

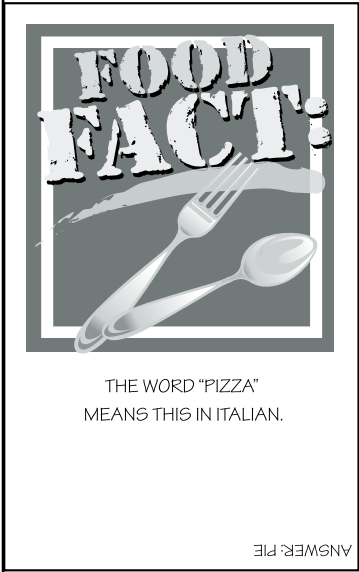
Dry weather and drought across Minnesota have created conditions favorable for wildfires this fall. The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources urges homeowners, woodland owners, farmers and outdoor recreationists to monitor statewide fire danger and current burning restrictions, which can fluctuate quickly this time of year. "Don't fall for the trap that cooler weather cancels fire danger," said Casey McCoy, DNR wildfire prevention supervisor. "October is historically one of Minnesota's most active wildfire months." Following a hard frost, plants stop taking in moisture and begin drying, creating more available fuel for a wildfire, McCoy said. Wildfire risk has increased in southwestern and northeastern Minnesota – areas that experienced below-normal rainfall this summer and are in a moderate drought. Red Flag conditions are possible this weekend in the southwest. Fire danger is also high in the northwest. Additional factors that can quickly fan fall fire flames include low relative humidity and warm, breezy days. Homeowners and woodland owners working outdoors are Wildfire risks... Continued on back

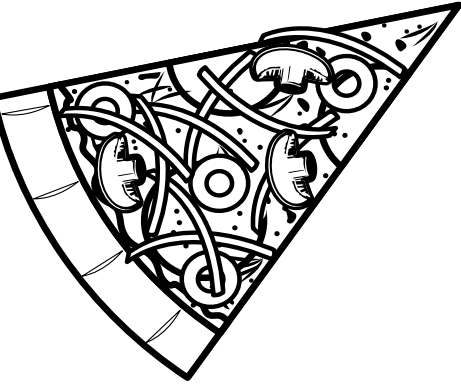
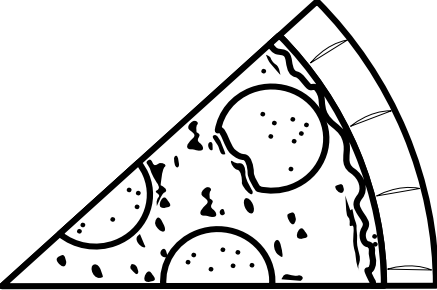

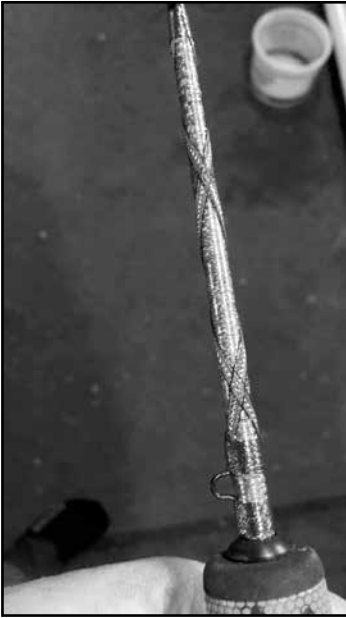

Northern Lights fishing report

This past week's report: mix of weather as the last nice days are behind us. This week, the goal was ducks Thursday, and geese through the weekend. Thursday I headed out west to hunt with a coworker that had finally found a few ducks. The morning opened up with 5 nice mallards dropping in to the decoys and shots rang out harmlessly, barely winging down one. The rest of the day we watched a lot of swans and other birds fly around. We wound up with 11 ducks. Friday morning came and I was on a solo mission for geese. I watched hundreds of cranes pour into the neighboring field and finally my turn came. A flock of 30 geese started to work my spread with the furthest one landing 20 yards from me. I took my time looking to see if any were banded, and then a pair started to land in. I took the pair down, swinging one of the geese, only to realize I had only put 2 shells in. Another pair was in. I took one, ending my mission and setting my sights on the field loaded with cranes. Saturday came and, again, I was alone. The cranes were flying, but did what they do best - flying aimlessly around, not sure where they wanted to go. After a while, the geese started to fly. A 3 pack worked and in 1,2,3 fashion, they were all taken down. My waterfowl adventures have been great on geese but just a lack of ducks.

The woods, on the other hand, are starting to look good for grouse hunters to enjoy. The fishing report on Lake of the Woods has been intermittent this week. The high winds made it hard to fish, but if you could get out, the fishing was good. The usual areas I like to talk about; the blinker, sand bar, and swift are still producing. The main baits are still jig and minnow or pulling cranks. The fish are still mainly in that 10'-16' area. Elm point area has been alrigh up shallower, 8'-15'. Longpoint area is starting to pick up around the shoreline and Twin in that 15'-25'. Reports on the Rainy is the shiners are running hard and the walleye and big pike are chasing. Find a school of bait and fish the edge of it with a jig and shiner. I am back into the swing of things and making some ice rods and have been busy with tungsten jigs. If you are wanting to try something different get a hold of me and I can get a new ice rod built before ice fishing season is here. **Fried Mashed Potato Balls**  
Believe me, life would be easier if we didn't have carbs, right? But because we have them, let's do them right. (Correction: life wouldn't be easier because we NEED carbs. This is true, yes. Maybe I should have said "our pants would fit better without carbs." Let's go with that, instead.) Anyway. This recipe is for fried mashed potato balls. There's not much one can do with leftover mashed potatoes, but now we know they can turn into something magical. Personally, I can't think of anything better dipped in some sour cream, but that could be the carbs talkin'.  
**INGREDIENTS**  
3 c. leftover mashed potatoes  
3 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled  
2/3 c. shredded cheddar

cheese  
2 tbsp. thinly sliced chives  
1/2 tsp. garlic powder  
Salt & Pepper  
2 eggs, beaten  
1 1/3 c. panko bread crumbs  
Vegetable oil, for frying  
**DIRECTIONS**  
In a large bowl, combine mashed potatoes with cooked bacon, cheddar, chives, and garlic powder, and season with salt and pepper. Stir until all ingredients are incorporated. Place eggs and panko in separate shallow bowls. Use a small cookie scoop to scoop 1" to 2" balls of mashed potato mixture. Roll into a ball in your hands, then dredge first in egg and then in panko. Repeat until all mashed potatoes are used. Heat 3" of oil in a large cast iron skillet until candy thermometer reads 375°. Fry potato balls in batches until golden on all sides, 2 to 3 minutes. Drain on a paper towel lined plate. Serve plain or with a side of sour cream.

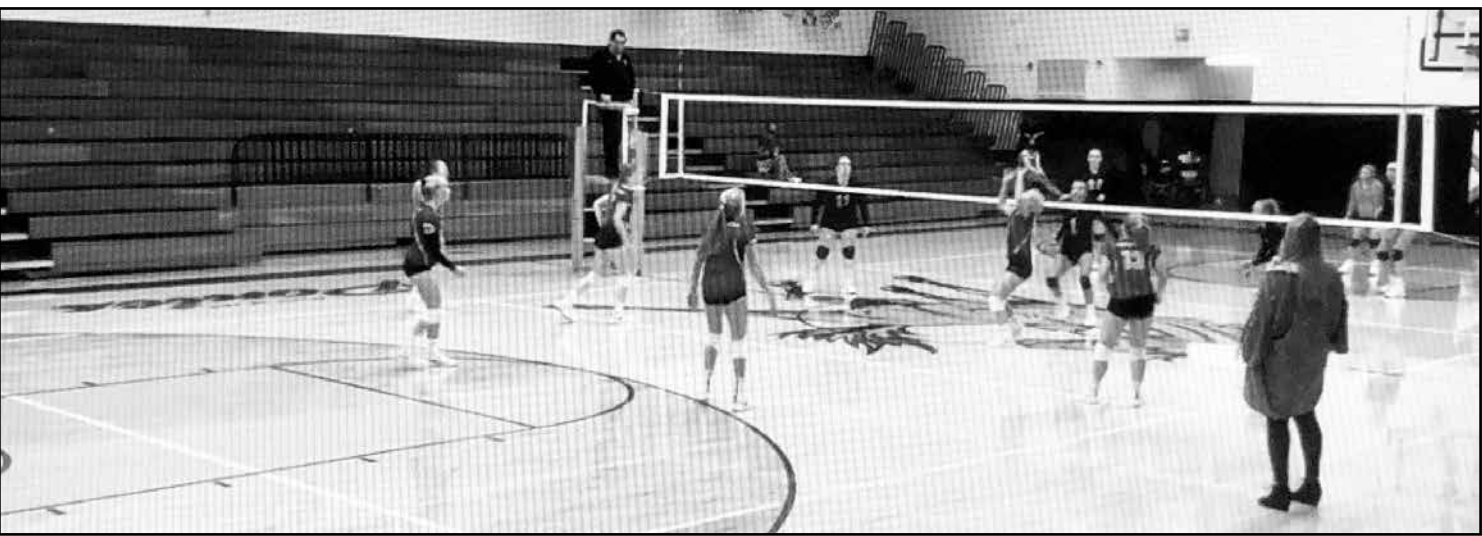

often tempted to burn leaves and piles of woody debris, but McCoy encourages alternatives.

“Composting or hauling brush to a collection site are the best options,” McCoy said. “Fall colors shouldn’t include a wildfire’s burnt orange.”

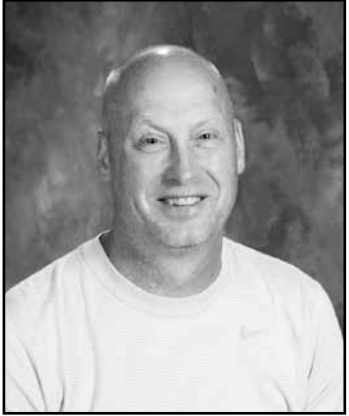
If considering an open burn, obtain a burning permit and always check the fire danger.

Fall harvest and hunting

seasons also bring inherent fire risks. Heat and sparks from farm implements and heavy equipment can be fire-starting sources, as can escaped camp-fires in the woods and vehicles parked over tall grass.

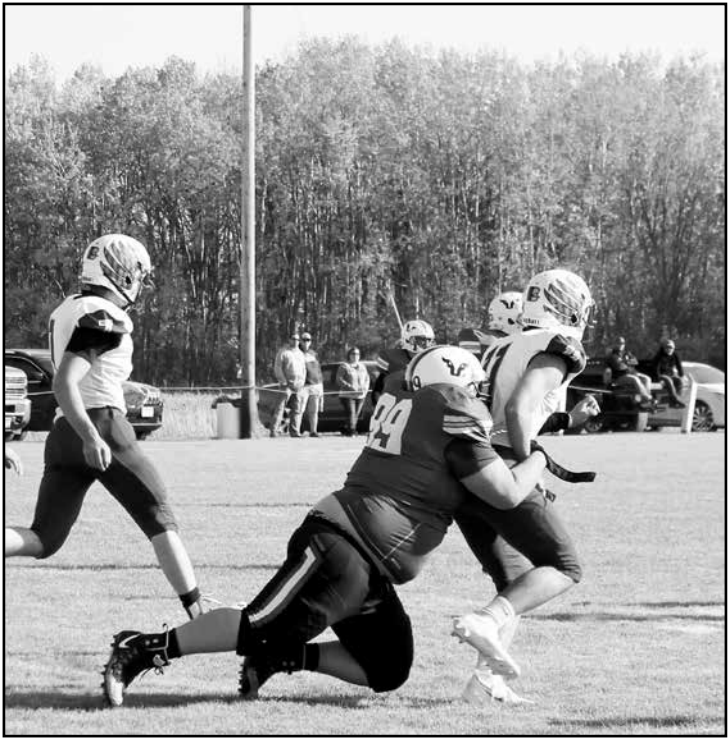

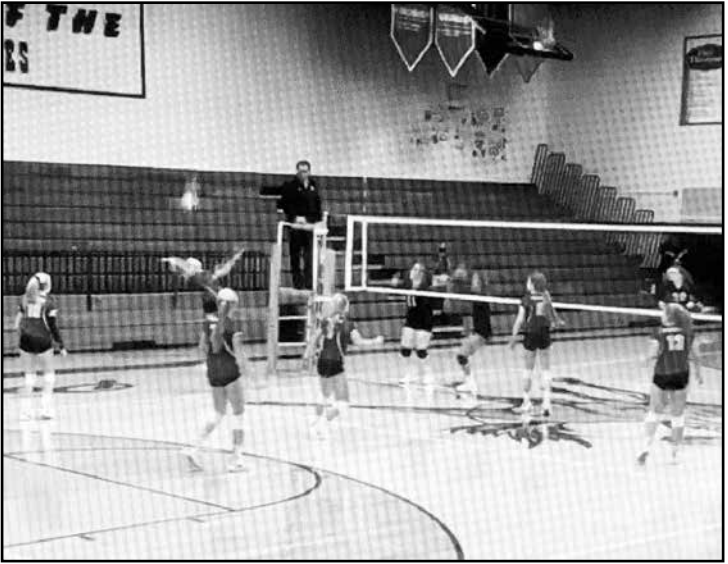
