distribution. From Highway 89, turn on 6th Avenue by Yo-Hawns, then turn left (east) on Woodrow to get in line. Please stay in your vehicle and you will be directed through the parking lot as soon as the delivery truck has finished unloading the boxes.

This time the make-up of the boxes is different as each box should contain potatoes, apples, onions, cheese, yogurt, milk, hot dogs and diced chicken/pork. Each box weighs about 35 pounds.

The boxes are FREE and available to EVERYONE! This includes the surrounding area, not just residents of Grygla.

There is nothing to sign or no paperwork to fill out. Just come and pick up your boxes. If you are unable to come at the scheduled time, you may have a friend or neighbor pick up your box for you.

Note: The Grygla-Gatzke Food Shelf will be open during our normal time – Saturday October 24th from 8-10:30am at our location at Motel 89.

Disclaimer: We have been told that the boxes will contain a letter from the White House signed by President Trump urging everyone to wash hands, maintain social distancing and they will support the recovery. 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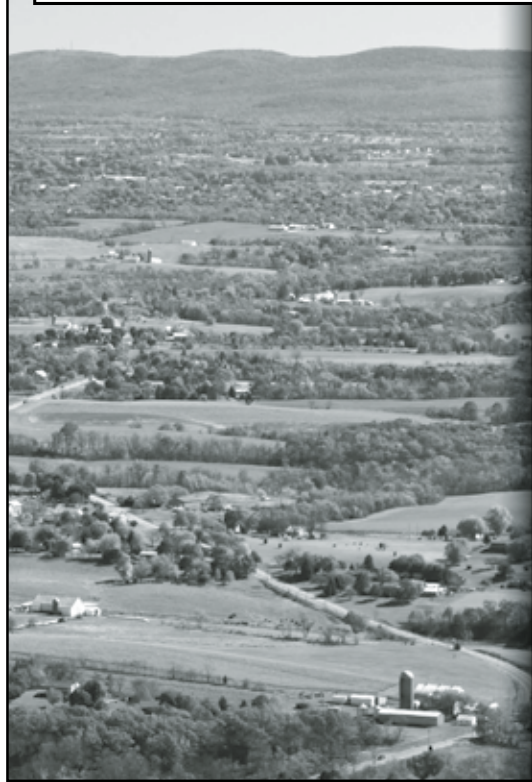

Only in Minnesota: a weekly feature in the Eagle

This tiny, isolated Minnesota village is one of the last of its kind

Minnesota is full of lovely small towns that tourists flock to for their charming downtowns and quaint activities. Many are so popular that, when you visit during certain times, they don't seem very small at all. But there are still some genuinely tiny towns out there, and Minnesota is full of them. On the shores of Lake Superior, a tiny village stand

is the oldest settlement on the North Shore. The town still holds on to its historic charm to this day. Take a look:

Beaver Bay is located on the North Shore of Lake Superior, about 25 miles north of Two Harbors. Though small, the town has a long history. Established in 1856, it is the oldest settlement on the North Shore.

If you've ever traveled on Highway 61, you may have passed through this little town. With a population of less



than 200 people, the village is made up of just a few buildings. Coupled with the beautiful natural surroundings of the North Shore, this small spread of buildings makes Beaver Bay a unique stop.

Even more unique is an event named for an early inhabitant of Beaver Bay. John Beargrease was born in Beaver Bay in 1858, just two years after the town was established. Each year, the John Beargrease Sled Dog Marathon honors this

local legend, who was known for traveling through the snowy region by sled. It is one of the few sled dog events in Minnesota. Thanks to the marathon - and the town's remote, natural surroundings and unassuming downtown - Beaver Bay holds on to a small part of undeveloped past.

Given its old-time charm and scenic beauty, this little village is worth a visit next time you're up north.

Now wasn't that better than any picture could've done?!

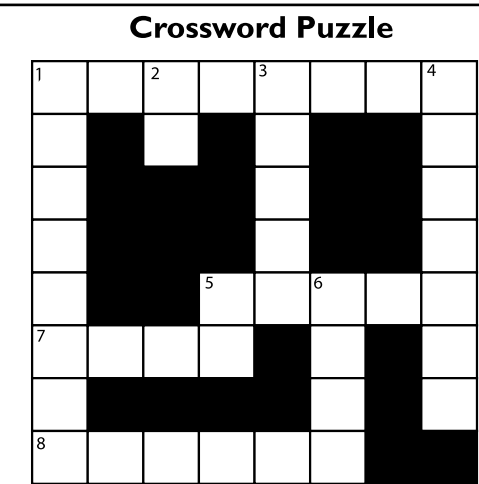
I promise I'll share a low carb, low calorie recipe next week to make us all feel better about this one, deal?

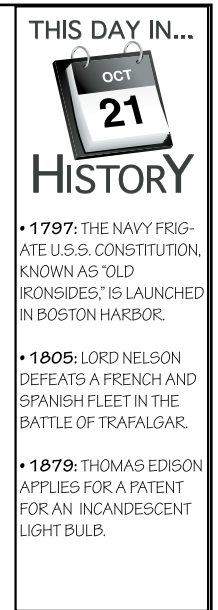
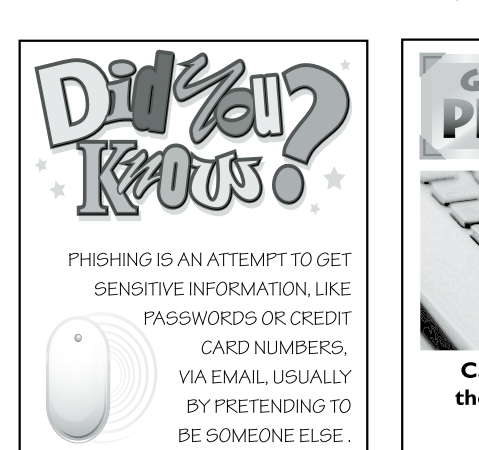

Northern Lights fishing report

On this week's report, waterfowl season may be coming to an early end. The cold weather that has moved in and has decided to stick around for the next few weeks and has already made ice in the sloughs and ditches.

This past week, my focus was on one good duck hunt before the end, and on Saturday it happened. Saturday morning was a still, cold morning; temperatures were around 25 degrees. We launched the canoe into open water to get back into a slough. As soon as we rounded the corner, there it was - ice about 1/8-1/4 inch thick. So we busted our way and opened a hole for the decoys. Our hiding spot was not good and was basically in the open. At legal shooting time, it was on. We had a flock of 20 mallards drop in and 4 didn't make it out. Working a pair of ducks in, all of a sudden we heard splashes as 20 green wing teal had splashed in and then jumped out. Only 2 were downed. The day kept going until we had our limit by 0815 and started the hard work of breaking out.

This past week there hasn't been much for fishing activity because of the strong winds it seemed we had every day. The Rainy River has been hit or miss and nothing consistent. Out of the Warroad area, fishing has stayed consistent all

year round. With the winds prevailing out of the west or northwest, you may be able to find a little shelter along the sandbar and Springsteel area. The bite has been decent in the shallows but still better in the 10-20 feet of water off of the sandbar, Elm, Blinker, and Swift.

Just be careful and monitor the weather this time of year the water is extremely cold and a person won't last too long even with a life jacket on.

The youth deer hunt was this past weekend, as well, and we had 2 youth hunters trying to fill their tags. My cousin was able to tag a nice doe and my other cousin was not able to pull the trigger. Around the area it seemed that there were a few other successful youth hunters. I ran across two while I was out looking for ducks. Regular rifle will be upon us soon and ice fishing to follow.

Good luck on your outdoor adventures and stay safe.
