Due to positive COVID-19 cases and exposure, the Grygla School closed on Monday for a two week distance learning period. All athletic events for the two week period are postponed, as well. Per the Grygla School, "These are all difficult decisions, but ones that we feel ultimately are our best opportunity to keep our kids, staff and communities safe. Thank you for your understanding on this."

This fall's outdoor learning

Grygla staff and students got in 7 weeks of in-school learning before having to transition to Distance Ed. During the course of those weeks, a variety of classes enjoyed outdoor learning, in order to spread out more, get some fresh air and have a break from masks. Jana Nelson, Grygla 5th grade teacher, offered some insight on what that looked like for her class. "The fifth graders enjoyed heading outside daily during the beautiful fall days. We mainly journaled and read our A.R. books. Being outside prompted many journal topic ideas such as harvesting and different types of vehicles that would drive by. What we thought was mainly going to be used for our reading curriculum turned into Science education as our class adopted a caterpillar for a day and discussed its habitat and how it was best to set it free at the end of the day. We also had many discussions as we watched the Garden Valley crew install wifi lines near the edge of our school to the football field." She added, "An outside learning environment provided our class with many unexpected educational opportunities with the bonus of breathing in the fresh outside air." Riley Saurdiff, Grygla High School Junior, agreed. "Learning outside was a wonderful experience. We were able to get the education we needed and the freedom from the mask we wanted," she said. Warroad Area Forestry News

The Thompson Forest Road is now open to traffic. A stretch from the Bemis Campground to the Root Road had been re-shaped to improve water drainage on the road surface. Mulching and seeding still need to be completed. Weather dependent, the hope is to complete the seeding yet this year; but it may have to wait until next spring. Right of way work is also continuing on the first 4 miles of the River road. This project is expected to be completed the beginning of November.
Staff have been busy working on next year's stand exam list-checking on sites for potential timber sales. The drier conditions have given loggers the opportunity to begin harvesting sites that generally require frozen soil conditions. If individuals are looking for bough or fuelwood permits please feel free to call the offices at Warroad, Wannaska or Grygla sites are available. Timber sale activity is expected to occur this year in the

People are getting out on the lake, but some of the harbors and shallows are starting to freeze up, as well. They may open back up with some warmer temps in the forecast. The bite has been hit and miss. Scattered reports from around the area are if you can find fish, try it for half hour and move on. The shallows are heating up and continue to be consistent on the Westside. 8'-16' of water has been producing the

best and on jig and minnow (shiner).
The deer are starting to really move and the bucks are starting to fight and enter rut. By rifle season, the rut should be in full swing. Good luck to everyone hitting the lake one last time and or in the woods and stay safe. Ice fishing is just around the corner.

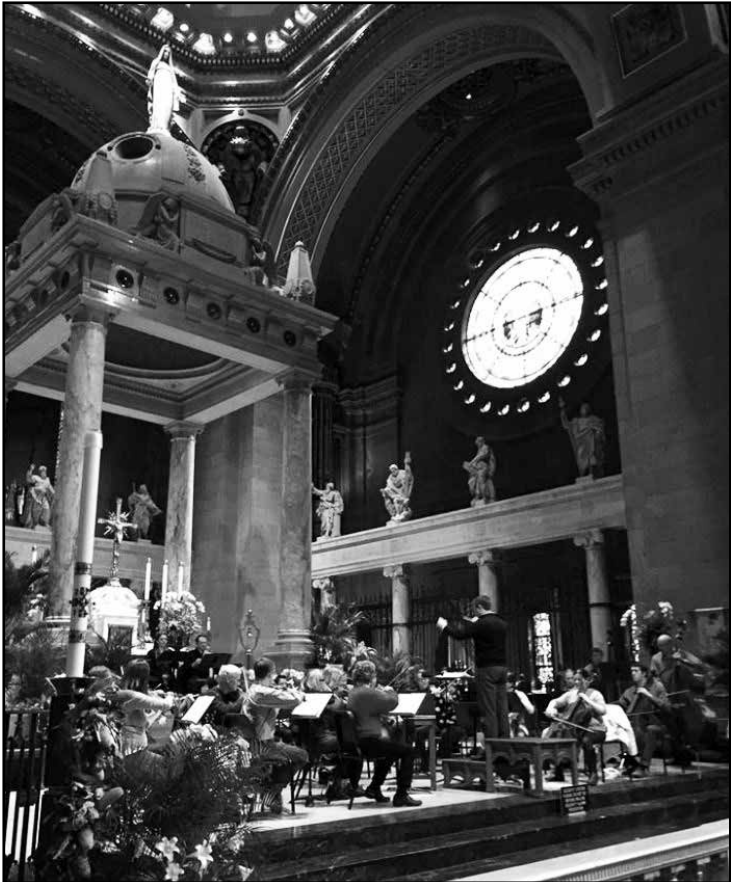

The 1st Basilica in the United States is right here in Minnesota

In Minneapolis, right next to the 94/394 interchange, you might find yourself face to face with a massive church. In the Loring Park neighborhood, across from the Walker Art Center, The Basilica of Saint Mary stands resolute against the skyline. Most Twin Cities residents are used to seeing its gargantuan silhouette as they drive by, but many don't stop to appreciate the amazing detail and history behind it.

Commissioned by Archbishop Ireland and built between 1907-



DO IT YOURSELF

DID YOU KNOW THIS? Who knew there were so many uses for coffee filters besides the obvious, intended use!?

- 1. Cover bowls or dishes when cooking in the microwave. Coffee filters make excellent covers.
- 2. Clean windows, mirrors, and chrome. Coffee filters are lint-free so they'll leave windows sparkling.
- 3. Protect China by separating your good dishes with a coffee filter between each dish.
- 4. Filter broken cork from wine. If you break the cork when opening a wine bottle, filter the wine through a coffee filter.
- 5. Protect a cast-iron skillet. Place a coffee filter in the skillet to absorb moisture and prevent rust.
- 6. Apply shoe polish. Ball up a lint-free coffee filter.
- 7. Recycle frying oil. After frying, strain oil through a sieve lined with a coffee filter.
- 8. Weigh chopped foods. Place chopped ingredients in a coffee filter on a kitchen scale.
- 9. Hold tacos. Coffee filters make convenient wrappers for messy foods.
- 10. Stop the soil from leaking out of a plant pot. Line a plant pot with a coffee filter to prevent the soil from going through the drainage holes.
- 11. Prevent a Popsicle from dripping. Poke one or two holes as needed in a coffee filter.
- 12. Do you think we used expensive strips to wax eyebrows? Use strips of coffee filters.
- 13. Put a few on a plate and put your fried bacon, fries, chicken fingers, etc. on them. It soaks out all the grease.
- 14. Keep in the bathroom. They make great "razor nick fixers."

- 15. Use a filter as an easy-to-tear backing for embroidering or appliqueing soft fabrics.
- 16. Put baking soda into a coffee filter and insert into shoes or a closet to absorb or prevent odors.
- 17. Use them to strain soup stock and to tie fresh herbs in to put in soups and stews.
- 18. Use a coffee filter to prevent spilling when you add fluids to your car.
- 19. Use them as a spoon rest while cooking and clean up small counter spills.
- 20. Can use to hold dry ingredients when baking or when cutting a piece of fruit or veggies - saves on having extra bowls to wash.
- 21. Use them to wrap Christmas ornaments for storage.
- 22. Use them to remove fingernail polish when out of cotton balls.
- 23. Use them to sprout seeds. Simply dampen the coffee filter, place seeds inside, fold it and place it into a plastic baggie until they sprout.
- 24. Use coffee filters as blotting paper for pressed flowers. Place the flowers between two coffee filters and put the coffee filters in phone book.
- 25. Use as a disposable "snack bowl" for popcorn, chips, etc.

Farm programs during COVID19: Making government programs work for you

The I-29 Moo University webinar series continues with a presentation by Minnesota Extension Ag Business Management Specialist, Megan Roberts, on Wednesday, November 4. This presentation will dive into what we do and don't know about COVID 19 government programs, including PPP forgiveness application changes, tax considerations, and the upcoming December 11 CFAP 2 deadline. 1915, the Basilica was named the first one in America by Pope Pius XI when the interior was near completion in February 1, 1926. The beautiful stained glass windows were designed and installed by Thomas J. Gaytee Studios in 1924. The wrought iron grille surrounding the sanctuary was created by Flour City Ornamental Iron Company of Minneapolis and is held up by Cipollino marble pillars from Italy. The Basilica and the chapels are truly a part of Minneapolis history - and a visit to them is absolutely worth it for a chance to see the stunning architecture.

western fringes of the work area in places such as central Marshall County and eastern Kittson County. Recent snowfalls have lowered the area fire danger. However, burning permits are still required in areas

with less than 3" of snow on the ground. Forestry staff have started to light some slash piles in the forest area to aid in preparing sites for planting this spring. A few staff have also been re-deployed to aid in the western fires. Deer rifle season is just around the corner have fun and be safe.

SIMPLY DELICIOUS

As promised, a low-carb, healthier recipe for you guys this week, but STILL DELICIOUS.

Alright, so this is just like an egg roll, minus the wrapper. All the ingredients on the inside are actually pretty healthy and super flavorful, so who needs the greasy wrapper, anyway!?! (Trying hard not to raise my hand right now....)

Ok, so this is an egg roll in a bowl and I can't wait to make it this week. I already added the ingredients to my grocery list. From start to finish, it's quick and easy...ready in under 30 minutes.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Tbsp. olive oil divided
- 1 lb. ground pork, turkey or beef
- 1 ½ cup onion, finely diced
- 1 cup carrots, shredded
- ½ tsp ginger, minced
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- ¼ cup chicken broth
- 5 cups cabbage, cut into ½-inch shreds
- 2 Tbsp. soy sauce
- 2 tsp. apple cider vinegar (or rice wine vinegar)
- ½ tsp. salt to taste
- ¼ tsp. pepper to taste
- 1 tsp. toasted sesame oil
- Toasted sesame seeds, optional
- Green onions, optional

Recipe notes:

Traditionally ground pork is used. To make this recipe healthier you can either use ground turkey, ground chicken, or ground beef, instead.

Green cabbage is used in this recipe. You can also do a mixture of purple and green cabbage to give it an extra pop of color.

A sweet onion is used in this recipe. Green onions also make a wonderful addition when serving.

Sesame Oil: Do not leave this very important ingredient out! It gives this recipe a unique flavor.

INSTRUCTIONS

Saute olive oil and ground meat in a large saute pan over medium heat. Cook for 5-6 minutes, or until cooked through. Push meat to the side of the pan and add onion and the other tbsp. of oil. Saute for 3-4 minutes. Add shredded carrots, garlic, and ginger and saute for 2 minutes. Stir the vegetables and meat together.

Pour chicken broth in the pan and scrape the bottom of it to deglaze it. Add cabbage, soy sauce, vinegar, salt, and pepper. Stir well and cover with a lid.

Reduce heat to medium-low and cook for 12-15 minutes, or until cabbage is to your desired tenderness.

Just before serving add toasted sesame oil and stir to combine.
